We want you to know our state for we know that you will pray and help in every way you can. We had planned to leave North Carolina on June 1, 1964 for Alaska. We are going to Juneau to start the new work. As we received our final letters of instructions we were very happy and thrilled that the time had come. However we become keenly aware that we did not have the needed amount of money to get to Alaska and settled in Juneau. This was very hard for us to take for the car was loaded to go.

Juneau is in the Southeastern part of the state. The only way we can get to this city is by ferry, or fly, there are no roads. We will go by ferry. In order to make the trip to Alaska and move from our home in Fairbanks to Juneau and get settled and start the work we need \$1,000. Moving our belongings by ferry and renting an apartment will be very high, and a place for church.

For the last three months over \$800 has been sent to our account. May God lead you to send in a special gift this

month for the new work which we will be going to, (make sure it is earmarked for our account). We are praying for \$1,000 by August 1, 1964. Our account is out of the red so all that comes in now can be used for the work, without part of it being used to balance out the account. God has blessed in such a wonderful way. His name is to be praised for this. May you do as David did in Psa. 109:4 and give yourself unto prayer.

Thanks from the depth of our heart to each of you for your prayers and support, for remembering us each month with a gift. My prayer is that we shall remain faithful to God in His service and that you shall remain faithful to Him.

REPORT OF THE **EXECUTIVE SECRETARY**

New Headquarters Building: Last year we returned from Detroit and our National meeting with proper guide lines and a green light to get our new building under construction. Little did I realize (perhaps others did!) that there was so much yet to be done and just how involved such a project could be. However, in due time plans were completed, negotiations were finalized with Prudential Insurance Company for a \$175,000 loan for 20 years at 5 3/4%, construction money was secured from First American National Bank at 5 3/4% and bids were taken which produced a bid in the price range which we expected to pay. A contract was signed with George A. Patton of Nashville for the construction of the building and on June 21, 1964 groundbreaking services were held. The building is now under construction and we are hopeful that we will be able to gain occupancy about the turn of the year.

Unless unforseen developments occur, we hope to have our corner-stone laying and open house in connection with the Bible Conference next April.

There is one matter associated with this project that I need to remind you of at this time. There is yet outstanding an obligation of \$20,000 on two acres of land which we feel we must have for future development. Two years of a three-year option yet remain. I would strongly urge that we continue to encourage gifts from our churches that we can soon be relieved of this obligation.

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT 1963

In 1963 Mary Ellen Rice, Pat Franks, and the Rev. and Mrs. Earnie Deeds were sent to Brazil. The Rev. and Mrs. Bill Phipps were appointed to Panama and entered language study in Costa Rica. The Rev. and Mrs. Jimmy Aldridge and the Rev. and Mrs. Eddie Payne were appointed to the Ivory Coast, Africa, and entered Ianguage study in Switzerland.

Since the last annual session of the Nat-Page 4

ional Association, the Rev. and Mrs. Louis Coscia, the Rev. and Mrs. Walter Ellison, the Rev. and Mrs. Jim Combs and the Rev. and Mrs. Don Robirds have been appointed to Brazil. The Rev. and Mrs. Archie Mayhew to the Ivory Coast of Africa; Miss Molly Barker, R.N., to Uruguay; Ella Rae Jones, R. N., and Patsy Tyson, R.N. to Ecuador. The Rev. and Mrs. John Moehlman are being transferred from Panama to Ecuador. This is a new field for Free Will Baptists, and we are entering this country in cooperation with World Radio Missionary Fellowship.

Field Activities. The Dan Cronks returned to North India, and property is being purchased for a boy's hostel and a missionary house. The Carlisle Hannas are home for furlough and will return to North India in September. Miss Volina Wilson has returned to a growing work in South India.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS Report for 1963

Again this year growth has been witnessed in the work of home missions and church extension. Since our last report the following have been appointed to serve in the home mission ministry:

Rev. and Mrs. Wade Jernigan - Idaho and Northwest.

Rev. and Mrs. Lonnie L. Rolen - New Mexico.

Rev. and Mrs. Malcolm Fry - Arizona Rev. and Mrs. E. B. Ledlow - Sponsored by State Board in Alabama Rew. and Mrs. Billy Jackson - Sponsored by South Georgia Board Rev. Herman Brooks - Summer worker to Canada

Income for the year 1963 was \$105,-855.92, an increase of \$13,251.03 over the previous year. However, our greatest victory was in the number of souls reported converted and the churches established.

We have sent approximately \$30,000. for the land in Hawaii and have continued this project through 1964.

The board has also endorsed abuilding project for Fairbanks, Alaska church and approved the building project for the Mexico Bible Institute at Monterrey, N. L.,

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

God has blessed the ministry of the Sunday School Department of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. We climaxed a successful year with an increase in sales. Sales for the year (1963) totaled \$143,516.62 in contrast with sales totaling \$110,878.42 for (1962). Our chief purpose for existance, however, is not selling Sunday School literature. We are distributing the glorious gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. I wish facts and figures were available on the results of our sowing the seed. Furthermore, we do not exist as a money making organization. It is our goal to give our people the best literature that is produced anywhere. We are rapidly achieving this goal. In addition, we are doing our best to assist our Sunday Schools throughout the nation and to insert a new life and a new thrust into

Teacher Training

We are now involved in an intensive teacher training program. This program is headed up by Reverend Harrold Harrison, our Promotional Secretary. Reverend Harrison travels extensively conducting Training Institutes in our churches. We have entered into a joint effort with the League Department in sponsoring Regional Training Rallies. Two of these have been conducted already with two more scheduled for the fall: one at Greenville, North Carolina, and the other at Dothan, Alabama. We are also cooperating with the League Department in producing a

brand new Christian education publication called "Teach N Train". Copies of this magazine are available at both the League Sunday School booths.

PROMOTION The 300 Club

We now have 13 churches in the 300 Club. These churches represent approximately 5000 in Sunday School.

Superintendent of the Year

Each year the Department will name a Sunday School Superintendent of the Year. A superintendent may be nominated for this honor by means of a letter from his pastor. The letter should relate the progress of the Sunday School under the leadership of the superintendent. To further qualify, the superintendent must be leading his church in a teacher training program, regular officers and teachers meetings and regular visitation. All of these facts must be stated in the letter of nomination from the pastor. Judges will be selected to review the nominations and name the Superintendent of the Year. The award will be presented by the General Director at a special service at the winner's church on the second Sunday in December. A related story will appear in "Contact" or "Teach N Train".

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NATIONAL LEAGUE BOARD

New Thrust For Youth and Training

At the National Association in July, 1963, the League Board was charged with the responsibility of developing a total youth and training program. Many hours of research and planning by many individuals have been spent thus far. The basic proposals are to be presented at the National Association this year.

One of the major proposals will be for a change in the over all name from League to Church Training Service, C.T.S. It Page 5

is believed that the new name more adequately defines our work and will be more meaningful to all who are associated with it.

A structured program is being planned for each age group and includes a definite program of achievement over a three year period. The quarterly publications are being modified and expanded to provide for the additional activities. A full-time worker has been employed to help promote the youth work.

REPORT OF THE SUPERANNUATION BOARD

Since the 1962 session of the National Association, the Superannuation Board has worked with those that have given us an occasion to work with them. We have presented to our people the new retirement plan with some results. We have mailed letters, brochures, and other materials, when requested, to all of the ministers whose addresses we have. Members of the board have given of their time to meet with groups and explain the plan. The plan has also been presented through our national magazine, Contact, and some of our state papers.

This being the first real retirement plan to be offered to our ministers and full-time Christian workers, we note some reluctance on the part of some to grasp this opportunity. This is probably due to a lack of knowledge of the plan. We realize the need of an extensive educational program, but our funds have not been sufficient to put a full-time worker on the field to acquaint our people with the plan.

Since we are unable to put a full-time worker on the field to present the plan to our people, we offer the following sugguestions:

- 1. That our ministers and laymen examine the Retirement Plan of the National Association, and present it to their Church Boards for their consideration.
- 2. That church groups, associations and ministers' conferences invite a member of the Superannuation Board to meet with them to discuss the plan.

3. That each church, or minister, ask for full information to be sent to them about the plan, especially where it is impossible to get a group together.

The Superannuation Board is grateful to the departments of the National Association that have assisted in promoting the retirement plan in any way, and to our Executive Secretary, Rev. Billy A. Melvin, for his assistance in getting our promotional materials. The Ministers Life and Casualty Union has been very helpful in furnishing us materials needed to promote the plan.

We appreciate you who have supported this department with your prayers and gifts. If this plan is to exist we must have more then the denomination's good wishes. We must have more subscribing to the program.

The Charter of Incorporation has been completed and we are now incorporated by the state of Tennessee.

WOMAN'S NATIONAL AUXILIARY CONVENTION, 1964

RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas, Christian women are increasingly aware of the pressure of today's living and the presence of emotional problems,

and whereas a recent survey taken among Study Course Chairmen has revealed a desire for study in this area,

and whereas many good books are available.

Be it resolved that a new course of study called Christian Living be added to the Standard of Achievement Chart, making a total of seven possible areas of study.

2. Because of increased operational and postage expenses, be it resolved that postage be charged on all literature orders.

3. Be it resolved that an auxiliary pin be adopted, the design as recommended by the Executive Committee.

4. Be it resolved that the youth scholarships be continued under the direction of the WNAC Executive Committee and that they be taken from the Student Loan Fund.

5. Be it resolved that a fund be created for the Missions Department of Free Will Baptist Bible College to be used specifically for the purpose of bringing specialized missionary speakers to the department.

6. In response to a request of the editor of Contact, be it resolved that we spearhead an annual subscription drive for Contact through the month of October. We suggest the following goals:

(a) That we cooperate by using the subscription packets supplied by the National Association. (Subscription cards, brochures, etc.)

(b) That we set as our goal 3,000 new subscribers.

(c) Goals established for each state to be as follows: Alabama, 177; Arizona, 15; Alaska, 5; Arkansas, 248; California, 207; Florida, 102; Georgia 205; Illinois, 103; Indiana, 40; Kansas, 59; Kentucky, 90; Louisiana, 5; Maryland, 10; Michigan, 90; Mississippi, 90; Missouri, 216; New Mexico, 20; N. Carolina, 407; Ohio, 140; Oklahoma, 403; S. Carolina, 257; Tennessee, 282; Texas, 144; Virginia, 140; West Virginia, 40; Washington, 5.

7. Whereas WNAC will lose the income formerly derived from the sale of youth literature and materials, we recom-

mend that a special effort be made to increase our giving in other areas, namely:

(a) Co-Laborer offerings

(b) WNAC new office furnishings fund

(c) Special gifts for increased maintenance costs of new headquarters and office moving expense.

8. Be it resolved that the theme, watchword, and hymn for 1966 be as follows: Theme, "The Field is the World" Matt. 13:38. Watchword: "...who will go for us...?" Isaiah 6:8. Hymn, "Christ for the Whole Wide World".

That we adopt the student loan supplement #1 concerning missionaries

loan retirement.

10. Whereas the National Association in its 1963 session at Detroit, Michigan, voted to set up a new Youth Program under a Denominational Youth Board - designed to reach into every area of Denominational Youth Activity, and Whereas, the youth program's which have formerly been under the sponsorship and direction of the Youth Auxiliary Chairman will be included in the new set-up, and,

Whereas, the need will no longer exist for the office of Youth Auxiliary Chairman in the W.N.A.C.,

Therefore be it resolved, that the Constitution and By-Laws be amended as follows:

- 1. Under Article III of the Constitution delete the words "Youth Auxiliary Chairman."
- 2. In the same Article change the number 7 to "5 of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business."
- 3. Under By-Laws delete Section 6 of Article I and renumber all succeeding Sections so that Section 7 becomes Section 6, Section 8 becomes Section 7, Section 9 becomes Section 8, and Section 10 becomes Section 9.
- 11. Be it resolved that Mrs. Cleo Pursell be named as a member of the committee to revise the Manual of Methods.

The Junior class averaged the highest attendance of 22. We had children from the various churches in attendance.


The last day of the school the church treated the pupils with a picnic, which they enjoyed so much.







MONTH

"Every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible corwn; but we an incorruptible." I Cor. 9:25

The television camera has brought the ancient Olympian games into the living room of most American homes. For the first time, we are beginning to understand just as did the Corinthians of old, Paul's spiritual application of these Olympics. One of the most famous of the Greek athletic festivals was held near the city of Corinth. Paul must have been present at some of these games. I can imagine how his heroic soul thrilled at the exhibition of fitness and physical strength.

When he began to inquire into the preparation that these young men had to go through he found that there was a long period of training, consisting in temperate living, regular and clean habits, and arduous exercise. He learned that the crown of the victor was not easily won, that it was not won merely because he was endowed with good lungs and a strong body. It involved sacrifice, self-denial, and hard work.

Actually, discipline is necessary for every department of life, whether it be athletics or business or professional life. One must keep fit physically and mentally and live up to the rules of the game. So it is in the Christian life. Paul points to the athlete and says, "He is temperate in all things."

The word temperance has been narrowed down to a fraction of its meaning. To many people it has come to mean only the disuse of alchholic beverages. But it means a great deal more than that, both in the New Testament and in its present-day dictionary meaning.

The Christian is a temperate man. He is temperate in all his passions and appetites. We frown upon the use of intoxicants, but has not the Bible also something to say about those whose god is their stomach? The Christian is temperate in speech, not only refraining from unseemly and profane language, but also from extravagant and untrue statements. He is temperate in his judgments. Too many Christians are apt to be intemperate in judgment of those who differ from them in belief or practice. In short, he is a Christian gentleman who is temperate in all things.

Temperance also means self-denial. The athlete of the present day cannot use alcoholic beverages nor indulge in rich and indigestible foods. And the Christian, because of his example to others, must often deny himself things not technically wrong, but which would be wrong for him. If there is something that impairs your usefulness or your health, you must deny yourself to that extent. If there is something that is hindering the best development of your powers, or something that tends to draw you away from things that are true and pure and of good report, you must deny yourself.

Jesus said: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself." That means let him say "no" to his appetites which might interfere with his discipleship.

The athlete has one purpose in view, and everything was made to serve that one end and aim. Greatly impressed, Paul wrote to the Christians, "So run that ye may obtain." But many so-called Christians are little concerned about their religion. They are neither soldiers "marching as to war," nor athletes "striving for a crown." When life draws toward evening, may God give us the right to say with Paul: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith."

If your League is crippled because you just don't have as many people as you need to do a good job, why not try a good visitation program with each League group sharing in the visiting. You may not have more people because you lack one of the following

POWER-If your Leagues lack power it is probably because we have not put enough prayer into it. No League can be truly effective and powerful if its members are not praying, Bible-reading Christians. In the midst of all our plans, programs and activities, let us not forget to ask the Holy Spirit to be in our midst and do a work of grace.

PURPOSE-Some people never get anywhere because they were not headed glad in the Lord.

anywhere. Some Leagues aim at nothing and hit it with great success. What are the purposes of your League? Do you know? Fine, but do all the League members know? Are your sights set high enough? We shall never hit higher than we aim in the League.

PLANNING—Every phase of League work must be carefully planned well in advance. Planning pays great dividends. Why be all on edge wondering what is going to happen next? Plan AHEAD.

PARTICIPATION—League is fundamentally different than Sunday School in that each individual is the primary actor, not the teacher. The slogan of the League is, "LEARN TO DO BY DOING!" If there is not adequate opportunity for individual participation, then the League is failing to fulfill its purpose.

PROGRAM-Programs make or break a League. Good programs dissolve many discipline problems and make League an exciting profitable experience. Nothing can substitute for well planned attractive pro-

You can encourage this pleasant atmosphere by developing a warm spirit of fellowship. League is a place where the visitor should receive the warmest and most sincere welcome ever. WHAT IS CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE?

For some time nowleaders in churches throughout our denomination have realized that the image and concept of "League" no longer has the vitality which is demanded by our present day. The term league has come to be so associated with sports and other secular activities that its meaning is no longer clear. You have probably had the experiences of inviting others to "League" and receiving a blank look of "What is that?" In order to give a new and fresh impetus to the training program of our churches the name Church Training Service is proposed as the new title for the overall youth and training department.

In Detroit at the National Association in 1963, the present National League Board was charged with the responsibility of bringing all of our youth and training activities under one program. Many hours of planning and preparation have been spent since the convention. Many individuals have given of their time to studying the needs in this area and proposing ways and means of meeting the need. The proposed name of Church Training Service is one part of this new thrust in training. An outline of the total program is to be presented at the 1964 National Association which meets in Kansas City, Missouri.

Each age group which is served through the Sunday evening training hour is to have a name of its own and a planned program of achievement. The following are suggested names:

Preschool - Learners for Christ Primary - Helpers for Christ Junior - Adventurers for Christ Junior High - Heralds for Christ Senior High - Crusaders for Christ

The adult program guide will be called FOCUS, The Training Magazine for Adults.

Manuals are to be written for each group and a guide for achievement as well as organizational material will be included. Plans for weekday meetings in addition to the Sunday evening meetings will be provided.

The literature for each age group will be enlarged to provide guidance for additional activities. The adult training magazine will be increased from the present forty pages to a total of fiftysix pages with the fourth quarter edition of this year, 1964. All of the literature will be enlarged and modified with the first quarter, 1965, publication. Each publication will be given a name that will be appropriate for the age group served.

A program of awards for meeting the goals of achievement is being designed particularly for the youth groups. There will be an outline of projects for every member of the group to attain, and a program of electives to meet the different interest of the young people. The Juniors will have a program for girls and a separate one for boys as relates to week-day activity.

Competitive activities will also have a part in the overall program. There will continue to be such contests as declamation, essay, and Sword Drill. Some changes will be made and other activities are to be added. Each age group will have certain features that are all its own. A program of awards at each

level of eleimination will be suggested.

Once final plans are laid and approved by the National Association an all out effort will be put forth to enlist every church in a training program. Each church will be challenged to revitalize and enlarge its present program to better meet the local needs for training. You are asked to pray and work to make Christian training available to every born-again child of Jesus Christ. The Church Training Service is one means of accomplishing this objective.



MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION

The Fortieth Annual Session of the Missouri State Association is history. A large delegation was present at the New Harmony Church near Greentop in Northeast Missouri Association for the very first service on Monday evening and a good representation remained through the final worship service on Friday at eleven o'clock. New Harmony Church, the community, and Northeast Association did a fine job in caring for the delegation and thus added to the success of the Association.

The State Sunday School Convention opened on Monday evening with guest speaker, Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, bringing the message. Bro. Mooneyham is the National Executive Secretary, now of Nashville, Tennessee. The Convention continued on Tuesday morning. A short business period of hearing and receiving reports was held. The host church presented a pagent that vividly portrayed the coming judgment. So effective was the pagent that by popular demand it was again presented Wednesday evening. Again at eleven o'clock, Rev. Mooneyham delivered another powerful message, with the Sunday School as the central theme. Rev. Rolla Smith was chairman of this convention.

On Tuesday afternoon, the League Convention, under the direction of Rev. Willard C. Day, came together in annual

session. A short business session of receiving reports was held. At the 2:30 hour, Rev. Mooneyham brought a message with the League in emphasis. The Hazel Creek League presented a short playlet with a fine message. Though the convention was rather short, all present enjoyed it and received much help from it.

The Association proper began Tuesday evening with the clerk calling the assembly to order. The moderator, Rev. O. T. Allred, in a short message, outlined our obligation as an association to our God, to one another, to our youth, and to the unsaved. Lively congregational singing and several special numbers dominated the devotional period. Rev. Willard Day delivered the introductory message to the association. His text was II John 7, 8. Bro. Day summarized several things that the Free Will Baptist denomination has been able to lose that has proved a blessing. Conversely, enumerated many things that we must guard carefully to keep from losing. The message was a blessing to all.

The State Auxiliary Convention commenced with the morning worship service Wednesday. The very fine preaching already enjoyed, continued in this service, as it did throughout the entire session. Rev. James Franklin, pastor of South Side Church in St. Louis, brought the message from Matt. 28:18-20, and challenged us to even greater works from the text "Go ye." We were made aware that as a denomination we can still more effectively carry out this great commission

of the Lord Jesus.

Highlights of the afternoon session of the Auxiliary Convention was the devotional thoughts of Rev. Mrs. Eunice Edwards around the assigned subject "Challenge of Christian Stewardship." Sis. Edwards summarized that for many Christians it is relatively easy to be good stewards as long as only the material things are concerned; even several Christians become obedient and willing to yield self to conform to the will of Godfor their lives, but it is noticeably hard for one to be compatable to the will of God to be worked in the life of some loved one, especially when that loved one must sacrifice many of the usual conforts of home and family. Our hearts were indeed solemnized before God.

Continuing in the worship services, Rev. W. T. Newsome, pastor of the Fredericktown church, brought the Wednesday evening sermon from Luke 5:14, using the subject "Deep." Another fine message was received as we were challenged to not over estimate our ability, but rather follow the direction of the Lord for effective service.

Rev. James Barker, pastor of the St. Louis Third Church and moderator of Southeast Missouri Association, was the speaker Thursday morning. Your editor was busy in a necessary committee meeting and missed this service. All reports were very favorable, and expressions at the noon hour convince us that the message was timely and well received. We apologize to your and to Bro. Barker for not being able to report more definitely on this message.

Rev. William Buster, evangelist of Thebes, Illinois, brought the message to a large crowd on Thursday evening. Bro. Buster used Matt. 16:24, 25 and Gal. 2:20 for Scripture texts and drew a comparison between living "in" the flesh and "of" the flesh. A spiritual service was enjoyed.

The final message was delivered by Rev. Fred Kirby, pastor of the First Church in Flat River. Rev. Kirby used Matt. 27:26-31 as a Scripture text, and "the robe" as a subject, picturing the "robe" that Jesus would have us exhibit. Although Rev. Kirby had but a few minutes notice to prepare for this service, the Lord blessed and a fine spiritual sermon was enjoyed.
