Dear Lord, I am nothing without Thee, I have failed so many times,


Lean down, dear Saviour, just now And let me hear these words,

KEEP INFORMED

People who keep up to date on what is going on must be on the alert to keep themselves informed. You can do yourself, your church, and our youth a great favor by keeping informed on the new developments of the Church Training Service (formerly known as League).

The future is bright for Free Will Baptist, so let us face the challenge. At the State Association in Springfield we voted to adopt and promote the Youth Program, and the Church Training Program as recommended by the National Association. This involves several changes in our present set up. It will take awhile to make the necessary adjustments, but if we will spend a little time to get familiar with the program, this will answer most of the questions that will arise.

NEW NAMES

This program is to begin in January, 1965. The name League will be dropped, and will be replaced by the name "Church Training Service". Of course we will slip and say League for awhile. Manuals and materials are being prepared to direct us in this work.

There will be six groups in this organization with their names and ages as follows:

"Helpers For Christ", ages 2-5. This group has been known as the "Story Hour". If possible this group should be divided with the two and three year olds together, and the four and five year olds together.

as the "Primary League".

"Adventurers For Christ", ages 9-11. This group has been known as the "Junior League"

"Heralds For Christ," ages 12-14. This group has been known as "Junior High".

This group has been known as "Senior High".

"Adults For Christ", ages 18-up. No special name has been chosen for the adults. These may be divided and named as the Written by: number and ages justify.

YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS

The organizations of the Missionary Midgets, G.T.A.'s, and 601 Buckley Street Y.P.A.'s will be dropped or disbanded. To replace these organ- Flat River, Missouri October 1964

izations the leaders of the youth groups listed above will meet, in addition to each Sunday night, once or twice a month as they see fit, to have their youth meetings. The same leader they have on Sunday night will be their leader on the weekday meeting, as far as possible.

Materials are being written, and will be included in the same quarterlies, to provide programs for Sunday nights and other special youth meetings. Manuals on the organization, and helps for the leaders will be provided.

There will be competitive activities, and achievement programs with names and ranks designed for the needs of each age group. Since work with the Youth Program of the church comes under the Church Training Service organization of the church, this explains why all of this is woven together.

FINALLY

This is generally regarded as being a great step forward in our denomination. It will only succeed if we try to make it work. Some time will be needed to adjust to the change over. There will be many questions arising. Your State and National Church Training Board are eager to do all they can to assist you with getting off to a good start. Don't wait until the last minute to get familiar with the program. Start to work on it now. Read all you can on it, think it through, ask others who are acquainted with it all the questions you can, and then do not hesitate to call on either of the Boards mentioned above for help.

This brief article serves only to introduce the subject rather "Learners For Christ", ages 6-8. This group has been known than to tell everything about it. We shall be praying for you concerning this program. With some time, prayer, and effort this should be a great blessing to your church.

The need of worship is no new thing. Eversince there have been men, they have felt themselves dependent on some power greater than themselves and have worshiped that power. In primitive times their place of worship was a high rock, a mighty tree, a little cave or a tent.

Early primitive peoples thought there were many gods, who protected them and and helped them fight their enemies. But now we know there is only one God; there never has been any other, and all men are searching to find and to understand the one God.



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IN TOTAL COMMITMENT

All sermons should be <u>short</u>, <u>simple</u>, strong, sincere. It should have a good sound reason - not a reason that sounds good. We must communicate our message - a church needing a new lighting system was defeated in its need, because some one chose to ask for chandeliers. It was voted down on the ground that the clerk couldn't spell the word to place it in their minutes, "And besides," said a devout member, "we need light fixtures more than those things, anyway." Of course, the way for a pastor to get something in a church is to suggest it, then vigorously oppose it at the next business meeting, and it will pass!

I am delighted to be in your state association, and especially to visit this church. Twenty years ago last month, I visited my first church in Missouri and from that day until this one, I have great admiration and love for the people of this state, and I cherish your fellowship so much.

When I assumed my present ministry, as Home Missions Director, one of the first checks I wrote was for this church, and this is the first time I have had the pleasure to see it. I regret that I cannot stay for the business session tomorrow, but as some of you know, this is the first engagement from Nashville in some time, and I am now recuperating from an illness. The Lord has given me a real touch of His healing hand, but other matters demand that I return to Nashville early tomorrow morning. I have been afflicted with the ailment jokingly called, "The Badge of American Success", ulcers, but let me be quick to point out they are no joke!

As we advance with Christ and make fresh and total commitment to Him, byproducts of that commitment will be commitment to <u>old fashion Americanism</u>, democracy, evangelical Christianity, and the work of our church on a local, district, <u>state and National level</u>. In some areas the overwhelming evidence is that we are not advancing. Some can well sing the old hymn, "Brethren we are troding where we have always trod." I know a church, well over 100 years old, in a "Free Will Baptist" city of 400,000 population that had 114 in Sunday School last Sunday. A mission church should reach that many in one year in that size city.

Forward with Christ in total commitment means we must have a supreme love for Jesus a devoted love for one another, and a keen love for the lost.

1. We go forward only if we are what we ought to be, and if we are what we ought to be we have a life of unusual joy - I Peter 1:8 "Ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory."

2. A life of unusual <u>peace</u>. Phil. 4:7 "And the peace of God which passeth all understanding shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." This peace keeps one on the front line. No one leaves Christ as a "blow-out - it is always a slow leak."

3. Alife of unusual <u>contentment</u>. Phil. 4;11 "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content". A man wrote and said, "I have been preaching 17 years and I think it is high time I got a church that pays well - where is it?" When doing good it is always too soon to give up. But, when doing evil, it is always time to give in.

4. A life of unusual <u>faith</u>. Matt. 21: 21 Jesus said, "If ye have <u>faith</u> and doubt not..." Abraham believed, we must believe. Don't let the demons of doubt have a holiday in your heart. "Nothing shall be impossible", Matt. 17:20. "It is by faith that we are justified." Romans 4:16. Don't take the rustling of \$5 bills for the approach of angels wings.

5. Life of unusual love, I Cor. 13:7,

Jeremiah 7:7; 22-28 Preached by Rev. Homer Willis at the 51st Session of the Missouri State Association in Springfield

> "Love beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things". We must learn to love one another! In some Free Will Baptist circles, "if a man gets the ball and starts to the goal line, he is tackled and downed by his own team."

> 6. Life of unusual <u>power</u>. Phil. 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." Too many Christians act like pagans - showing a constant attitude of fear, and blaming someone else for all their weaknesses and failures. When the pressure is turned on they are totally frustrated. Brother, we have power if we will use it.

> 7. Life of unusual <u>victory</u>. Romans 8:35, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine or nakedness, or peril, or sword?" A lot of people need this message - take it to them. You can never be charged with stealing sheep while out gathering goats.

In conclusion, I wish to make a proposal. Who among us will make a public commitment to go forward with Christ by agreeing for one month, not to miss a single day without spending 15 minutes alone with God? This will change us from what we are to what we ought to be. We have all eternity to celebrate the glorious victory, of a live lived in His will, but we have only until sunset to win it.

May we dedicate our lives, men, women, young people to three particular things: With Christ we will see the Invisible; With Christ we will believe the Incredible; With Christ we will do the Impossible.

May we come dedicating ourselves to real and sincere work in evangelism, for this is the way we go forward.

Evangelism is the job of God. Evangelism is the cry of John Knox, "Give me Scotland or I die." Give us America - or blot us out.

Evangelism is the cry of parents in the night, weeping over a prodigal child.

Evangelism is the cry of a preacher's heart-the world is my parish, and I must do or die!

Text: "Neither is there salvation in any other; for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Acts 4:12.

As I speak to you tonight on the subject assigned to me, "Forward With Christ In Evangelism", I do so, conscious of the awful fact that there are more unevangelized people in the world than ever before

fore... Out of every 100 people living in the world today:

37 live under Communist domination

25 belong to the Roman or Eastern Catholic Churches

15 are Moslems

11 are Hindus

15 are either Confucianists or Buddhists

8 are Christians

And all along there is the solemn declaration from the Bible: "Neither is there salvation in any other; for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Something is dreadfully wrong!

UNCTION IN THE PULPIT is a must to forward with Christ. One of the tragedies of this late hour is that we have too many dead men in dead pulpits giving out too many dead sermons to too many dead people.

Paul the Apostle sensing the need of the hour THUNDERED OUT, "WOE IS ME IF I PREACH NOT THE GOSPEL."

Then again: I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL OF CHRIST FOR IT IS THE POWER OF GOD UNTO SALVA-TION..."

Then again Paul proclaims, "For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit."

Unction in the pulpit will bring RED HOT BIBLE PREACHING, and red hot Bible preaching will convict the sinners and convicted sinners will come to the altar to pray through. When they repent they are then ready to come with us to evangelize the world. When people are saved they are ONE IN CHRIST. "Now October 1964 therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the household of God: And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone; In whom all the building fitly framed together groweth unto an holy temple in the Lord.

IN EVANGELISM

Preaching is a spiritual business. A sermon born in the head reaches the head; a sermon born in the heart reaches the heart.

Under God, a spiritual preacher will produce spiritually minded people.

Unction cannot be learned, only earned by prayer and clean Christlike living.

Victory is not won in the pulpit by firing intellectual bullets or wisecracks, but in the prayer closet; It is won or lost before the preacher's foot enters the pulpit. UNCTION is like dynamite. Let's forward with Christ by getting Holy Unction in the pulpit.

Have you noticed that Rome does not call us Protestants any more? We have only earned the name NON-CATHOLICS! Significant, isn't it. May I ask, where are our unctionized pulpit crusaders.

Preachers who should be fishing for men are now too often fishing for compliments from men. Preachers who should be on their knees praying to God are too often out playing golf. Preachers used to sow seed; now they string intellectual pearls. Well, just for the record, remember that you can have as many degrees as a themeator and still not be UNCTION to preach. The preacher's heart must be stirred about our awful sins. He must be actually capitulated by the POWER OF THE HOLY GHOST AND TRULY KNOW THAT THERE IS SALVATION IN NONE OTHER, FOR THERE IS NONE OTHER NAME GIVEN UNDER HEAVEN AMONG MEN WHEREBY WE MUST BE SAVED. ACTION IN THE PEW is required to

forward with Christ.

Many Christians of this day seem to have forgotten the fact that we are a RE-DEEMED PEOPLE and consequently there is not the needed action in the pew. Peter says, "Forasmuch as ye know that Acts 4:12

ye were not redeemed with corruptable things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; BUT WITH THE PRECIOUS BLOOD OF CHRIST, AS OF A LAMB WITHOUT BLEMISH AND WITHOUT SPOT."

The family altar in the average Christian home now consists of the members thereof sitting around the television set watching some silly vulgar plot being unfolded before the eyes of parents and children while the PRECIOUS OLD BLACK BACKED BIBLE LIES ON THE TABLE UNTOUCHED, UNREAD, AND UNHEEDED.

I am old enough to remember when family altars were the real thing. My mother sang to us "Amazing Grace". I can hear her now lifting her voice to the refrain, "There is a name I love to hear, I love to sing it's worth, It sounds like music to... Mothers with a record of LATE, LATE MOVIES, AND SHORT, SHORT SHORTS will not be able to make the impression necessary to see her family actively serving Christ in helping to EVAN-GELIZE THE WORLD.

The Bible says Christians are "A chosen generation, a royal priesthood, and holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light."

ASKING AT THE ALTARS is a requirement to forward with Christ...

We need a revival in our churches of penitent SINNERS COMING AND FALL-ING ON THEIR FACES WEEPING THEIR WAY TO GOD WITH SUCH GODLY SORROW THAT JESUS SAVES THEM. Our churches each weekend should see their altars full of people asking for FORGIVENESS FOR SINS.

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

Dear Pastor;

It has been thrilling to discuss the growth of Free Will Baptist foreign missions with other missions leaders. Compared with the work of others, the prospects of our missions ministry are glorious because of our great potential. In the youth of your church we have developing missionary personnel. Among your people is the potential support to send these young people to the ends-of the earth with the glorious message of salvation through the blood of Jesus Christ.

You may well rejoice in the part you have had in our missionary advance. We are members of a great team, and you have a holy calling to life's greatest work...shepherd of God's dear sheep. And you are a friend with whom I can share details of our missions operation.

Because of an increasing number of missionaries going to the field, emphasis has been placed on personalized giving. And no church or individual should be deprived of the privilege of designating his gift as he feels led by the Holy Spirit.

However, designations to the general fund have not kept pace with the growing missions expenditures from that fund. Our foreign language literature program, which includes the publication of the Spanish language magazine <u>Impacto</u>, is supported entirely through gifts to the general fund. <u>Heartbeat</u> and other informational materials, films and filmstrips, expenses of maintaining the home office, and administrative salaries all come from the general fund.

In addition, working budgets of North and South India, Japan and Cuba-Miami are provided through the general fund.

Many ministries in these older fields are not provided for through designations to individual missionary accounts. For these reasons a healthy balance must be maintained between designations to the general fund and to individual missionary accounts.

I am not suggesting that any church discontinue its designated support. But I do urge churches increasing their missionary budgets to consider these ministries receiving support from the general fund. The general fund needs a total of \$15,000 designated to it each month. At present, designations average between \$7,000 and \$10,000. As the general fund increases, allocations will be made to accounts in need. Increased designations to the general fund can eventually eliminate deficits in individual accounts.

A financial report is given each month in <u>Heartbeat</u> to keep you regularly informed of God's blessing in financial aspects of our foreign ministry. I ask you to pray with us and to give guidance when possible so that proper balance can be maintained in our work..

Dear Friends:

Greetings to you from Goumere, Ivory Coast. We send greetings from the Christians ws well.

The first session of the Bible Institute ended on June 17. Three of the four students who began the term finished. They plan to return for the fall session.

The Kulango Bible Camp convened July 4-11 here at Goumere. Over 80 men, women and children participated. The classes were conducted by two African Christians, the Palmers and ourselves. On Sunday morning, July 5, we had 117 in church (counting the two missionary families). This is the largest gathering of Christians we have had in this area thus far.

The help of nationals in village work has been tremendous. God is blessing their labors. For instance, in one of the villages which has opened recently, the work was about to fall through. The ones who prayed were either away on Sunday, or didn't seem too interested. One Sunday as we were approaching the turn-off to the village, I asked Kouadio (pronounced Kwah-jo), one of the preacher boys, if he thought the time was being spent wisely, or if perhaps it wouldn't be better spent in another of our villages which we were not able to reach on Sunday. He said he chose to continue. When I retưrned to pick him up, four were wanting to make decisions for Christ. Since then, three others have prayed, two of which have been young ladies. Also, they have already found a place to have their meetings. Kouadio had been largely responsible for the work in that village, so this was a great encouragement to him and an indication that God's hand is upon him. For a young man of non-Christian background, he thrills us with his knowledge of the Word. Pray that he will be a power for the Lord. It is so important that he keep his life unspotted.

The Kulango primer was finished and mimeographed the first of July. The reception thus far has been encouraging. Further language work is planned, es-Free Will Baptist Gem. pecially Bible translation, during the time when the Bible Institute students are on vacation. Please remember this ministry in prayer.

Before the end of this year, five groups should be worshipping in church buildings in this immediate area. We are thankful for this. Although buildings in themselves are unimportant, those groups who care enough to build are usually more stable.

The children are doing fine. The other day we noticed Paul had taken the shoe strings out of his tennis shoes and had bent the heels down. That's the way they wear them here. Also, he wants a cloth to wear like the other boys. Noel, who is two in August, is the singer of the family. He can hum about any tune we sing in church.

RETIRED MINISTER PASSES AWAY

Benjamin Franklin Brown was born January 6, 1870 in Haney's Corner, Indiana, the oldest son of Francis Marion and Sarah Catherine Brown. He grew to young manhood in Indiana, leaving in 1888 to live some years in Nebraska and Iowa. He attended Normal Institute in Shenandoah, Iowa, and moved to North Missouri in 1896, where he taught in rural schools. On December 24, 1899 he was married to Orpha Jones, in Maitland, Missouri. In March, 1906 they moved to Hannon, Missouri and in November of that year his wife Orpha passed away, leaving 3 small children, whom with the help of their maternal grandparents were raised to maturity.

B. F. Brown was converted in 1907, and became a member of the Hannon Free Will Baptist Church, later being ordained to preach. In 1922 he went to Tecumseh, Oklahoma, and was affiliated with the Free Will Baptist College there, and also printed the church paper. He was married in Tecumseh, to Mrs. Grace Morris in 1925. They moved to Purdy, Missouri where he and his wife published the "Free Will Baptist Gem", and he preached among the churches in this area. He was also active in the Missouri State Association for many years in an official capacity.

In 1939 they moved to a farm in the Merl's Chapel community where they lived until 1958 when they moved to Monett. In November, 1960 Mrs. Brown passed away. He was also preceded in death by two brothers, two sisters, and one son, Melvin. Bro. Brown was a member of Merl's Chapel Free Will Bap-Page 12 tist Church until October, 1963 when he joined the First Free Will Baptist Church of Monett, Missouri.


