

OUGHT TO BE

TEACHERS

Hebrews 5:12 says, "For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which be the first principles of the oracles of God; and are become such as have need of milk, and not of strong meat."

All of us should have something of a spiritual nature to share with others. Those who teach others must be willing to be taught. We can make a lot of excuses to try to cover our failures, but much of it comes from our unwillingness to be trained or taught in the ways of the Lord in order to serve Himmore effectively.

A LOOK AT SUNDAY SCHOOL

THE PASTOR - The pastor is the key man of the Sunday School. While he alone may not make it or break it, much of the success or failure rest with the pastor. Some pastors are not interested in Sunday School and seldom, if ever, attend. Sunday School is worth the pastor's time and consideration, and he should put forth effort and work with the officers to promote the work.

THE SUPERINTENDENT - Nothing said of the pastor takes anything away from the superintendent. He should be chosen from among the best spiritual leadership in the church. His relationship to the pastor is important and they must work closely together. He will carry much of the burden of Sunday School along with the pastor. Good superintendents are valuable to the church and thank God for them.

PROMOTIONS - Most growing Sunday Schools have some type of promotion occasionally. These will work successfully when properly done. Unless there is an interest in it you are wasting time and money. Start your promotional contest early, enlist the support of all the workers and make it a worthwhile venture. Why not try something special for your church this spring.

T.N.T. - This refers to a book called "Teach 'N Train", published quarterly and may be ordered from the Nashville office. This book will be a great help to your church. It carries articles for the pastor, Sunday School superintendent and teachers, C.T.S. Directors, and many other things. It gives suggested ideas and devotionals for the opening assembly of Sunday School and the opening assembly of C.T.S. If you are looking for variety this will help you.

LESSON CHANGES - Beginning in 1966 some changes will be made in our Sunday School materials. You will be informed of these details as they come available. After this year our lessons will be based on outlines prepared by the National Sunday School Department rather than on those presently used in the uniform series put out by the National Council of Churches. This should greatly improve our material and the disadvantages can be easily worked out.



A LOOK AT C.T.S.

This is a good name that well describes what we are trying to do, and I like it. Of course many of us still slip up and say "League" which will continue for a while, but soon the name C.T.S. will come naturally. C.T.S. requires a lot of effort but it is worth it. Remember, the T.N.T. magazine mentioned above will help you have better programs. If you don't already do so, order one with your materials next time.

YOUTH MEETINGS - Our new youth program really looks good. I hope by now you have gotten familiar with it, and explained it to the young people. I believe they are going to like it once they get acquainted with it. If your church doesn't have C.T.S. you can still have a youth program and regular weekday meetings. Programs for these meetings will be found in the C.T.S. books used on Sunday.

ESSAYS AND DECLAMATIONS - The young people are reminded that the essays and declamations will follow the same rules for 1965 as in the past. Further announcements will be made later about changes for 1966. The declamations for 1965 will be judged at Youth Camp in June. Those who are writing essays should send them to me (James Raper, 601 Buckley St., Flat River, Mo.) by May 1, 1965. If you have further questions write me.

SWORD DRILL - At the State Meeting in August we will have two sword drill divisions instead of one as in the past. The Junior division for ages 0-11, and the Junior High 12-14. We are making plans for this to be a highlight of our meeting in August and outstanding awards are to be made to the winner. A later article will reveal more on this.

ANY QUESTIONS - If there are ways the Missouri State Sunday School and Church Training Service Board can aid you please feel free to let us know. We are happy to render whatever service possible for you within our ability.

BOOKS ON EVOLUTION BACKED BY TEXAS EDUCATION BOARD

(Austin, Texas) - Three high school biology tests, opposed by some churchmen who charged that the books taught evolution as a fact instead of theory, were approved by the State Board of Education. Two other books on biology, which caused no controversy, were also approved. Opposition to the three books came largely from Church of Christ leaders and other fundamentalists. Dr. James Morgan of Fort Worth Baptist Church said he regarded the texts as "playing into the hands of the communists" and downgrading faith in God.

"MEDIAN" ANNUAL SALARY FOR CLERGY ONLY \$5,158

Salaries of Protestant ministers in the United States tend to range far below those of other professional or executive workers, below salesmen and public school teachers, and only slightly above the pay of clerical and factory workers. The addition of about \$1,200 in "bene-February, 1965

fits" - parsonage, utilities allowance, fees for weddings and funerals - brings the total to \$6,358. The first practical result of the survey is a 20-page guidebook entitled "How Well Do You Support Your Minister?" It is designed to help local church officials establish fair compensation standards for their ministers. Dr. Charles N. Forsberg, director of field services of the Ministers and Missionaries Benefit Board of the American Baptist Convention, supervised the survey.

Of the 15 groups in the study, the United Presbyterian Church reported the highest median cash salary, \$5,669; and the Church of God in Anderson, Indiana, the lowest, \$3,750 - as against the median of \$5,158.

Salary also tends to increase with years of service, but not markedly. The median cash salary for men in their first four years in the pastorate is \$4,514; for 30 years and up, \$5,282.

We beseech all of you to pray much for Darrel, our church and all our unsaved loved ones.



REMEMBER

LIFE TIME

Luke 16:25

"But Abraham said, son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented." (Luke 16:25) Remember in thy lifetime. These words should stop every person for a though of their life.

Jesus gives a free choice to each one of their lives what we

choose in this life determines what we shall have in eternal life, for Jesus said, "If thou will enter into life, keep the commandments." (Matthew 19:17)

The first thing I would like for us to notice is that this man had come to the end of his life, and found that his life was spent in vain. In hell he lifted up his eyes in torments. (Luke 16:23)

Let us look at the word torments. This means more than one torment. First, he was tormented in flames. (Luke 16:24) Second, he was tormented because oft the knowledge he had for his family at home. (Luke 16:27-28)

In this life is the only time we have to make preparation to live after death. This is the only life that fathers and mothers can teach and train their children in the way of the Lord. If we fail in this life we have failed in eternity. This man prayed for someone to be sent back from the dead, but his answer was, "Remember in thy lifetime." The duty of each parent is to give their children a Christian father and mother and a Christian home. Ecclesiastes 12:13 says, "let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. Those who reject God's commandments are rejecting eternal life, for Jesus said, "Not everyone that saith Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of God, but he that doeth the will of my Father." So you see, we as parents have a great responsibility.

Proverbs 22:6 says, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." When children are young is the time they should be taught. Many people seem to think that young people should wait until they are older or until they have tried sin to see if they want to be a Christian or not. But friends, that isn't what the Bible says. Chapter 12, verse 1 of Ecclesiastes says, "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them." Let me say to every young person that the more sins you indulge in the more difficult it is to become a Christian. Remember Jesus now, while your sins are few.

Some may ask, "What age does young people become sinners?" James 4:17 says, "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good and doeth it not, to him it is sin." So we see that age does not determine the state of our spiritual life, but our knowledge of our sins and what we have done with Christ. Jesus said, "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of God." So God welcomes all children into his Kingdom. The call of Jesus is "whosoever will" (Revelation 22:17).

Now, let us look at the question James asked. "What is your life?" That is a question that can only be answered by YOU. Is it a life that is dedicated to the Lord, to the church, and to His work?

"Remember in thy lifetime," is the only time that mercy can be obtained. After death it is too late. In Luke 16:24 after the rich man died, he prayed for mercy, but it was too late. The answer was, "Remember in thy lifetime". Mercy's door was closed. He prayed for someone to go back from the dead to his father's house and warn his five brothers lest they would come to this place. (Luke 16:27-28) But it was too late. His prayer was in vain. So you see, it wasn't so much that he chose to die and go to hell, but the truth was he did not choose life. Deuteronomy 30:15 tells us, "See, I have set before thee this day life and good, death and evil. This is for you to choose. So remember in thy lifetime it is important what you choose.

TRUTH SEEKER

The story of a rich young ruler is not confined to the pages of the New Testament nor the youth of America faced with the Gospel. But here in India the pressure is often from without. Rev. John Mukal Mondal, one of the two ordained preachers, turned in a report on such a young man the other day. (I have left it essentially as he wrote it so you get the 'feeling' of it. I have edited it slightly to make it more intelligible.) D. C.

There is a young man, named Abadhendra Pande. He is a Brahman in caste, (the name also reveals he belongs to the traditional Hindu priest cast), who was very fond of reading novels.

One day one of his friends bought a booklet "Sermon on the Mount" about Jesus Christ, from a group of Christian people selling gospels in the Kishanguj market. (Some of our people.) The same friend of Abadhendra met him and saw him reading a novel. Then his friend said to him, "What you mean reading novels only? See here, I've got a booklet from a group of Christian people the other day and have only paid five paisa (1 cent) for this. You should read this book and know something about


other religions too, and if you give me six paisa I will give you the booklet." Immediately he paid him and took it from him. (What do you think of a Hindu desiring to regain his penny loss, selling a gospel to recoup his penny and thus becoming a gospel

book seller? With spiritual results!)

Having received the booklet he went home rejoicing. The same night about 1 A.M. he read the booklet and then went to sleep. In the same booklet he found an address of a Bible Institute (a correspondence course on the gospel) where he wrote letter twice but no answer came to him. He was so anxious that he could not keep silent. Finally he started asking his friends if there is any mission or missionary here in Kishangunj. Somebody told him about our mission and about Rev. Cronk. He came running to him and asked to be taught about Jesus. Mr. Cronk also sent him to me. Since then he came regularly to us. He accepted Jesus by my witness. Of course we don't see him now in Kishangunj but hope and believe he has found Christ as his Saviour. (I am not sure why he used 'of course' here. But the young man was soon hustled away by his family - at least it is peculiar he has disappeared like another High caste Brahman who accepted Christ and then was sent away by his family.)

Her physician here in Fairbanks advised that she remain at least another month in the south, so as to give herself a chance to build up her resistance and to give the extreme cold weather here, time to break. As you can see, we were minus a wife and mother for the holidays, but our Lord filled much of this vacancy with His Divine Presence.

I am sure many of you have been wondering what Christmas is like in an extreme artic climate. First let me give you a bird's eye view of the outside scenery. This has been an unusual cold winter, with our daylight hours just a little over three hours long from sunrise to sunset; at Christmas time. Since Thanksgiving our temperature has gone above zero, only a few hours at the time. The temperature range has been -20 to -60 degrees below zero most of the time. At the writing of this letter the weatherman says, "The temperature has not gone above 50 degrees below zero for several days. For the last 48 hours the temperature has been 55 degrees below zero at night and the highest during the day has been 45 below zero." However, during this extreme cold weather, there is something very beautiful about the scenery. Everything is covered with several inches of snow and icicles, several inches in length, hang from the houses. The heavy ice fog, which makes visibility a hazard, has accumulated on all the trees making them look as though someone has sprayed

them with artificial snow. As for the Christmas customs, they are carried out in much the same way as they are in the south. Many of the houses are decorated with lights, and have Christmas trees in them. People are rushing here and there doing Christmas shopping. There is the exchanging of gifts, the singing of Christcarols, and the Christmas programs at the churches. There was even a Salvation Army Booth set up in front of the Post office, with a man all wrapped in fur, ringing his little bell.

As we compare the Christmas season in various places, where Christ is known, we find it very much the same. I think the reason for this is that there has been only one Christ Child, born to be our Lord, Saviour and Redeemer.

If I may, I would like to share one of our holiday experiences with you. My boys had asked that I take them to Anchorage during the second week of the holiday season, as they were anxious to visit the church and old friends again. The temperature had warmed up to 40 below zero so we started on our journey on Tuesday, December 29, and arrived in Anchorage late that night. We enjoyed the next two days of warmer weather, visiting the church and old friends and attending a watch night service on New Year's Eve. On New Year's Day, we left Anchorage, with a -15 degrees below zero for our journey back to Fairbanks. The Lord blessed in giving us safety of to page 15

Forty-five adult missionaries received either full, partial, or designated support through our office this past year. Twelve went into self-maintaining ministries during the year, and ten new workers were sent out, in addition to four being sent to a different field.

The budget was not met; however, more than \$14,000.00 were raised over the previous year, which means our giving has almost doubled in the past five years for home missions.

Eight states exceeded their suggested quotas in giving; three states gave more than \$10,000.00 - North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Tennessee.

Our advancement into some fields of ministry has been delayed due to the failure to raise the additional \$17,445.31 of the proposed budget. It has been a good year, and we are grateful first to the Lord, then to you, our board members, office staff, and missionaries for making it so.

About Your Jocial Jecurity

Under recent amendments to the social security law clergymen will have until April 15, 1965, to elect to have their earnings covered by social security. These amendments extend social security protection to clergymen who have not previously chosen social security coverage.

The previous deadline for the election of social security coverage by persons in the ministry for two or more years after 1954, had expired on April 15, 1962. After that date, social security coverage was open only to those just starting to perform ministerial services.

To obtain social security protection for himself and for his family, a clergyman needs to take the following steps:

- Obtain a social security account number card, from the nearest social security office—if he does not already have one;
- (2) Fill out Form 2031, obtainable from his District Director of Internal Revenue.
- (3) File the Form 2031 with the District Director of Internal Revenue for the district in which he lives.
- (4) Report his earnings from the ministry and pay the social security taxes on them to the District Director of Internal Revenue for the taxable years 1962, 1963, and 1964.

Clergymen who have been reporting their earnings from the ministry, but who are not certain that they have filed a valid waiver, should get in touch with the nearest Internal Revenue Service office so that any remedial action can be taken within the time limits. A receipted copy of the waiver certificate, Copy C, is evidence that a valid waiver certificate has been filed.

A clergyman is by law excluded from social security coverage unless he waivers his exclusion by filing the waiver certificate. After filing this certificate, he reports his earnings from the ministry as a self-employed person—even though he may be an employee for other purposes—so that the church or religious organization which he serves will not become involved.

Once a clergyman elects coverage, he may not withdraw from the social security program. The filing of a waiver certificate obligates him to continue to pay social security taxes for each year in which he receives \$400 or more in net income, any part of which comes from the exercise of his ministry.

Clergymen can obtain information about social security coverage by contacting the nearest Social Security office or social security representative.

Did you know that last July at the time of the National Association there were over 52,000 adult laymen in our denomination in approximately 2,000 churches? Did you know that among these 2,000 churches there were only 102 active Master's Men chapters, with a total membership of only 1,500 laymen? But did you know that in the last four months of 1964 there were 36 new chapters organized with a membership of 500?

The men of our churches are apparently on the move, and 1965 promises to be the greatest year to date. But the fact remains that if the laymen of a church ever work together in a full concerted effort, it will probably be up to the pastor to lead them.

What has been your attitude toward the Master's Men in your church? Have you supported the movement enthusiastically, or have you considered it just another time-consuming appendage that never really does anything worthwhile? The laymen of a church will seldom do more than their pastor expects them to do.

The 1965 emphasis of the Master's Men is devoted to stewardship. Each program and each project during the year is designed to stimulate support for genuine Christian stewardship. Could your church use such organized support? Or are you satisfied with what has been?

If your church does not have an active Master's Men chapter, why don't you call the men together to organize one? Act as moderator of your group as they select a president and a secretary-treasurer. (The other officers can be elected later.) Then fill in the application for charter that appears on this page and send it, together with \$1.50 for each copy of Attack, the quarterly program publication, that you want your men to receive, to The Master's Men, 3801 Richland Avenue, Nashville 5, Tennessee. You also ought to order several copies of the Handbook for Master's Men at six for \$1.00. The Handbook will give you further information about the organization, the officers and their duties, and the constitution and by-laws for your local chapter.

Around 8:30 P.M. we arrived at Big Delta, which is a hundred miles from Fairbanks and the last intersection, learning that the temperature was 62 below zero. I knew the dangers we faced, if we were to drive on to Fairbanks. There was a possibility that the gas line would freeze up or perhaps we might have a flat tire or any other kind of trouble, which would put us in the same position as a sinking ship, however, we considered our Good News Bible Club on Saturday and our Sunday services and decided to continue on our journey. We arrived in Fairbanks at 11:40 P.M. with cold feet and grateful hearts. I thanked the Lord for His protecting care and to be sure I was very grateful to our little Falcon bus for its faithfulness in bringing us safely home.

On Sunday the Lord blessed us with a very rich service; there were two new families who attended and four people who made rededications.

January 1st marked our first anniversary in Fairbanks. During this year I have learned to appreciate and admire the Alaskan native more than ever because they have survived these artic winters hundreds of years and until recent years they had only their bare hands with which to provide their livelihood, and had very little communication with the outside world.
