

IS AS IMPORTANT AS CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

R ead the above statement again and then think about it for a few moments. It is a true saying in its broadest sense. I'm sure there are many in this world today who would disagree with such a statement, but if you are a born again Christian I trust you will agree with it.

In the Sunday School, Church Training Service, and other auxiliaries of our churches we need to always keep in mind that we are imparting Christian Education to those who are present.

Christian Education in the past was a family responsibility, but in this day and time when everything is so rush-rush; not too much, in most cases, is being done in the homes. Therefore, the church is being relied upon to provide Christian Education for families. We can say then that Christian Education in the local church has never been as important as it is today.

Because of this, Bible Colleges are turning out, more than ever before, candidates for positions as directors of Christian Education in the local church. This is a wide open field (especially in our own Free Will Baptist Denomination) of service in the Lord's work for young people to dedicate themselves to and prepare for. The call to this field of Christian service should be looked upon just as the call is recognized to go into the ministry or missionary field.

Many of our fine Free Will Baptist young people across the United States feel a definite leadership of the Holy Spirit to dedicate their lives to full time service for God. And yet, they do not feel, for different reasons, they want to enter the pastorate or go to a foreign missions field. (This was my own personal experience a few years ago.) To these young people the field of Christian Education, and the position of Director of Christian Education, should be considered instead of having the feeling that there is no place for you to serve the Lord in His work.

In times past, a young person didn't enter our Free Will Baptist Bible College unless he was going to be a minister; or unless he or she was going to prepare for missionary service. I'm thankful that now, more and more each year, our youth are

Read the above statement again and then think about it for entering the Bible College with the desire to be used in other examples. It is a true saving in its broadest sense. I'm capacities.

Many Free Will Baptist Churches are experiencing a tremendous growth. When the Church membership reaches a certain point it becomes impossible for the pastor to keep pace with the required work by himself. This is where the need for an additional worker becomes a necessity, regardless of what the title he may be given.

Have you ever given any thought as to how many different titles your pastor could have?

Other than his pastoral duties such as preaching, counseling, and visiting; he is a secretary, Sunday School teacher, director of Christian Education, pick-up and delivery man, janitor, and I have known some who have been their own choir director. Now, if the church expects good sermons two or three times a week, faithful pastoral care (visiting the sick, absentees, prospective members, counseling), then he must be given the time to do it. The minister should be relieved as much as possible from these other jobs.

This is where the educational director fits in. He relieves the pastor of many of these side jobs, and then the pastor can devote his full time to the preaching and the proper pastoral care of his people.

Of course, we must realize that most of our churches are not financially able to employ a full-time worker other than the pastor. In this case, these side jobs should be delegated to carefully selected people.

The words of Christ, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few" (Matthew 9:37), should be challenging words to all of us who claim the name "Christian." There is much to be said about the field of Christian Education. But, first of all, let's all learn as much as we possibly can about the the things of God; and then give out all the Christian Education we possibly can to those who are lost and need God in their lives.



Dear Editor:

I have recently enjoyed some wonderful itinerary services in West Missouri and in the Kansas City area. I also attended the first quarterly meeting of the Mission Association at Mountain Grove, Missouri. I was very encouraged by the good spirit and the testimony for the Lord in these services.

While I was on itinerary I was pleased to meet with the Missouri State Mission Board for the purpose of setting up a cooperative missionary project at Cape Girardeau, Missouri, with the Missouri Mission Board and the National Home Mission Board. I would like to urge the Missourians to be much in prayer for God to supply a worker for this project.

During my itinerary, I visited with several recently-organized churches and missions, including Eldon, Missouri, Marshall, Belton, Northside Springfield, and I visited with Brother Irish from Jefferson City. I also visited with Rev. and Mrs. Carl Thompson who have recently moved to Sedalia, Missouri. The Thompsons moved by faith, loading their belongings in a U-Haul trailer and driving from Albuquerque, New Mexico to Sedalia, trusting that God had a ministry for them in Sedalia. Anyone wishing more information or wishing to support one of these new ministries may get in touch with the Missouri Mission Board.

I recently received a letter from Rev. and Mrs. Johnnie Postlewaite who are former Missourians. Here is an excerpt from their letter. "We had our first service in Portland last Sunday, February 14. We had 20 in Sunday school, 22 for morning worship. We have a fine group of young people to start with. Our number in CTS was 18. We are renting a Lutheran church building, which is in good condition and is a nice respectable place in which to get started. We are Page 8

paying \$20 per week rent. The church here in Vancouver, Washington, is helping us for literature this quarter and gave us an offering of \$14 to apply on the rent of the building. We are real encouraged with the prospects of a good church in Portland, Oregon."

HINDI BECOMES OFFICIAL LANGUAGE FOR INDIA

New Delhi, India - The Indian Constitution which took effect on January 26, 1950, decreed that Hindi would be the national language but that for 15 years government business would be conducted in English. The deadline, when English ceased to be the official language, was January 26, 1965.

No drastic changes were expected to occur, since the Parliament in 1963 passed a law continuing English as an "associate" language indefinitely.

It is believed that only in the pure Hindi-speaking states of Bihar, Madhya and Uttar will English be supplanted. Correspondence between the Federal Government and non-Hindi states will continue to be in English, it was reported here.

Hindi is more or less the mother tongue of about 190 million Indians, according to <u>The New York Times</u>. The numerical strength of other languages is: Marathi, 40 million; Telegu, 36 million; Gujerati, 21 million; Tamil, 34 million; and Kannada, 24 million. There are an additional 50 languages used by sizeable segments of the population.


INDIA GETS THREE-LANGUAGE COMPROMISE

New Delhi, India - India's bitter split on the question of a national official language appears to have been solved by a "three-language formula" which has been announced here. Under this formula, all candidates for the national civil service would be tested on their knowledge of English. Native speakers of Hindi would also be tested on their knowledge of some south Indian language, and non-Hindi speakers would be tested on their knowledge of Hindi.

The compromise appears to assure the continuation of English as an alternate national language indefinitely.

More than 60 persons lost their lives during recent violent demonstrations before the compromise was reached.

Geared to the needs of missionaries on furlough and accepted candidates, the Summer Institute of Missions has gained in appeal each year with worldwise participation.

Dr. Hoke serves the Japan Christian College under The Evangelical Alliance Mission. He will teach a two-hour course on Biblical Ecumenicity during the first term of the Institute and will coordinate the Missionary Leadership seminar.

Courses offered for the Intersession part of the Institute (June 8-18) include the Gospel of John, taught by Dr. Merrill C. Tenney, dean of the Wheaton Graduate School, and Missionary Anthropology, by James O. Buswell III, of the college faculty.

Other Institute courses include Missionary Writing Today, by James L. Johnson, executive director of Evangelical Literature Overseas, and Psychological Counseling, by Dr. James Dolby of the college psychology department.

Conducted in cooperation with the Interdenominational Foreign Mission Association, the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association, and the Commission on Education of the National Association of Evangelicals, the Institute offers courses for both graduate and undergraduate credit. Earned credits may be applied toward a graduate or undergraduate degree.

SUBJECT: ESSAY CONTEST

With the coming of April we suddenly become aware of the approach of summer and the church activities that go with it -Youth Camp, National Association, and State Association among many others. Also, at a rather late date, we become aware that adequate attention has not been given the Declamation and Essay Contests.

Only passing mention shall be made here concerning declamations since they shall be discussed in some detail next month. However, we wish to remind you that the topic is "Missions" so you may be finding material. It is hoped that with the cooperation of the Youth Camp Board, the Declamations Contest may be held in conjunction with Youth Camp this year. But that is another subject and will be discussed next month in full.

This month we are specifically interested in essays. We hope that many young people will be interested enough in the Essay Contest to create some stiff competition. The essay subject - "The Worth of the Family Altar" - is a pressing issue that should be of vital interest to Free Will Baptist young people. It is hoped that the worth of family altars might become so real, not only to our youth but also to adults, that this essential part of worship might be strengthened among Missouri Free Will Baptists. We trust that many young people will write, and encourage the youth leaders in our churches to lend their support and encouragement.

As to form, an essay is an impersonal, logical discussion of a given subject. Personal references may never properly be included. By presenting facts in a reasonable and logical way one hopes to establish a point of view or express an idea. In developing your essay some points to include might be the scriptural basis for family altars, the place of the family altar in family relationships, or the effect of the family altar, or the lack of it, on the individual congregation and ultimately on the world-wide mission of the church. Suggested points, however, are not in any way an attempt to assign what must be covered. We are interested in original work demonstrating the clear thinking which we feel is characteristic of our Christian youth.

The Sunday School and C.T.S. Board, suddenly faced with

the responsibility of sponsoring the youth program, recognizes and appreciates even more keenly the work done by the Women's Auxiliary. We trust the Women's Auxiliary will observe with friendliness the fact that we are taking advantage of their experience in using their rules governing the Essay Contest as a basic outline for the rules this year.

ESSAY CONTEST RULES - 1965

1. The essay must be on the assigned subject - "The Worth of the Family Altar."

2. The essay shall be 400-600 words in length for ages 9-13 and 800-1000 words in length for ages 14-18.

3. Only the essay placing first in the State shall be sent to the National Chairman.

4. The first place winner shall be notified by letter, and this essay shall be read as part of the program of the State Sunday School and C.T.S. section of the State Association and a suitable award presented.

5. Essays shall be judged on the following points:

- a. 50% on subject matter
- b. 25% on neatness and style
- c. 25% on grammatical construction

6. Not more than 25% of the essay may be quoted material. All such quoted material should be so indicated with proper credit given.

7. Essays shall be typewritten. No essay shall be returned.

8. Essays shall be submitted by May 1, 1965 and should be sent to:


"WINTER WONDERLAND"

`HE LIVES'

I Corinthians, Chapter 15

By Rev. R. B. Spurgeon Pastor: Trinity Free Will Baptist Church St. Louis, Mo.

On April 14, 1963 practically every Protestant congregation in America will stand and gloriously sing "He Lives." Thousands of choirs will movingly render "He Arose." Hundreds beautifully portray that garden scene of the empty tomb and the Risen Christ. Then, tragedy of tragedies, in many churches Christ will be dead for the next fifty one Sundays!! The resurrection will be shoved aside as a once a year item on the church agenda.

Yet Paul considered the resurrection so important he devotes the entire fifteenth chapter of I Corinthians to it; along with numerous other passages. In fact, Paul says in the first five verses of I Corinthians fifteen, that the gospel he preached was the death, burial, and RESURRECTION of Christ.

We sometimes marvel at the spiritual vigor of the early Church - perhaps it was because their Christ was ALIVE fifty two weeks a year!

In our imagination let us go back nearly two thousand years and to the land of Christ.

See a small band of men - faces aglow, bodies pulsing with life. Follow them from king's thrones to caves in the hills and to the catacombs of Rome. And from their lips came one glad cry, "Good News." There was no obstacle too great, death couldn't stop them. They were men with more than a purpose, they were possessed with a passion to tell others of the Risen Christ.

Hear them as they say, "We are pressed on every side, yet not straightened; perplexed, yet not to despair; pursued, but not forsaken; smitten, but not destroyed."

There they are - beaten bodies, tattered and torn robes, tired faces; but we stand and admire them, marvel at their courage, and are amazed at their accomplishments.


How could these men even in prison rejoice? How could they face dungeon and death with a spirit that could not be conquered? It was because they believed Christ was alive and with them. They were not alone! He was not a tradition handed down to them from their fathers. He was not some sort of drug to dim the the sharp barbs of reality. He was not some pet theory that fitted into their logic. He was not some imaginary fulfillment of their imagination.

He was alive and they knew Him and He was with them. He was the Alpha and Omega. Why should they have been despondent or discouraged? Christ lives!

This fact has stirred the hearts of men of all ages and nations, and made them soldiers of their faith.

Governor Bradford of Plymouth Colony in the days of early America said, "The whole country full of woods and thickets, represented a wild and savage hue. If they looked behind them, the mighty ocean they had passed, and was now as a main bar and gulf—. What could now sustain them but the spirit of God and His grace? May not and ought not the children of these fathers rightly say, 'Our fathers came over this great ocean, and were ready to perish in this wilderness; but they cried unto the the Lord and He heard their voices, and looked on their adversity. Let them therefore praise the Lord, because He is good and His mercies endure forever'."

In the Dachau concentration camp on Christmas eve, 1944, as Martin Niemoeller starts to deliver a sermon to his fellow Page 14



prisoners he recalls the name of Jesus, Imanuel, God with us. His voice carries new strength as he says, "We are not alone amid the horrors of these years, cut off though we are from the outside world. We are in the hands of God - the God of Jesus Christ, who is with us—."

Can we know what this can mean to us? We, who live amidst material abundance? Everything else will pale into insignificance when we realize God's great gift.

Let every heart rejoice - "Christ lives."

Another thing that filled the hearts of the early Christians was that because of the resurrection there was a triumph of the cross.

On the day of the cross all of the forces of evil and hell had been joined to win a victory over righteousness.

"They nailed Him on a cross and thought that they had won, That love was lost and goodness dead and truth forever done."

But they forgot it was God's world! God spoke! Christ arose! He lives today! Some one once said, "Truth cannot be nailed to a cross, love cannot be buried in a grave, and goodness cannot be covered over in a wooden box." This was the faith of the early Christians and must become ours also.

Even though the cause of evil prospers, in the end it will be God alone who shall stand. We must make this truth ours. While rival forces struggle for our allegiance and confusion reigns in the hearts of countless millions, we can live victoriously for Christ if we will realize He is a living Saviour.

Another thing that filled the hearts of the early Christians was that the resurrection meant that death was swallowed up in victory. Death was not an end, but only a beginning. Even if the gates of hell should rise up against them, the victory would still be theirs.

When the storms of life darkened the skies and cut off the sunshine of life's ease, they could still capture a vision of the New Jerusalem and say with John, "and I, John, saw the Holy City." Let us catch this vision that life may have meaning every moment of every day.

Our labour will not end at harvest time, but we shall merely go to work in the heavenly vineyard.

Our struggle will not end in defeat.

Our sacrifice will not be lost.

Christ lives! His is the victory!

FIFTY THOUSAND FAITHFUL STEWARDS

Every layman in our denomination should be a faithful steward, not because he is a Free Will Baptist, but because he is a Christian; the charge to be faithful is to our members no less than to the Christians in any other churches. A steward is one who is hired to manage, to supervise the affairs of his employer. As Christians we are required to be faithful in the affairs of our Master. What are the affairs of our Master? They are to spread the gospel to everyone, that the world through Him might be saved.

The account of an unfaithful steward which Jesus gave to His disciples (as told in St. Luke 16:1-12) is surely just as applicable to twentieth-century disciples. That steward, you will recall, was accused of wasting the goods that belonged to his master. The goods were not his to do with as he pleased; instead, he had been hired but for one purpose: the faithful and productive management of his employer's goods. Jesus concludes His account of the wasteful steward with these words, "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon (money), who will commit to your trust the true riches?"

If we are not faithful in the handling of money, of possessions, of time, of abilities (which are not ours but the gifts of God), how then can we expect Him to commit to our keeping His spiritual gifts, the "ture riches"?

One of the purposes of the Master's Men is to concentrate the work that the laymen of the individual churches are doing so that throughout the denomination men are working toward a common goal. That common goal during the current year is to emphasize true stewardship. Through this emphasis we are first to learn what Christian stewardship really is and, second, to be faithful stewards of the things that are entrusted to us.

The steward of a wealthy man is in a position of power; he has power at his command primarily because he represents a man who has even greater power. As members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, we have power because we represent a God who is omnipotent, and His power is given us through the Holy Spirit. Jesus promised His disciples that they would have "great power" after the Holy Spirit came upon them. This promise was fulfilled when "they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and...spoke the word of God with boldness...and with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all."

What power do we have? We have the power of prayer, the power of influence in our community, and the power of money at our disposal. There are over fifty thousand laymen in our churches in this country. If all of these fifty thousand were organized into local chapters of the Master's Men, they would all meet once each month, at which meeting they would pray together. In addition, they would all learn what specific needs exist, not only in their respective churches but throughout our denomination as well. They would learn more about the work of April, 1965 our national officers, the work of our college, and the work of our missionaries. And for the work of these departments of our denomination, they would be encouraged to pray daily. If each of our laymen could be led to pray just ten minutes each day, the work of our churches would be supported by more than fifty thousand hours of prayer each week.

If fifty thousand laymen were organized and really made aware that their daily lives as farmers, foremen, clerks, school teachers, mechanics, government employees, and businessmen amount to the greatest testimony to Christian living that they can give, what a contribution to the leavening of the whole lump they could make! Fifty thousand men, working together toward a common cause, can turn whole communities upside down. This power of influence would, of course, be much greater if all were working together rather than individually. To realize that one is a part of a greater whole is to achieve a dedication to Christian conduct and daily witnessing that one alone can never know.

How much money do our fifty thousand laymen have at their disposal? Whatever the amount, it is not theirs, but God's, and if our fifty thousand are not faithful in managing that amount, they cannot expect God to commit to their trust riches of much greater value. If our laymen each gave one dollar more each month, would contribute in a year's time an amount almost double the budget of the Bible College or of the Foreign Missions Board - or more than one-half of the annual budget of the entire denomination!

The smallest church can have an active chapter of the Master's Men. If your church does not have a local chapter, you can help get it organized. Show that you're interested and it can soon be done. With each new chapter, the ideal of faithful stewardship in our churches comes closer to realization.
