

ADVENTURE IN REAL LIVING.....

The May issue of <u>Contact</u> magazine contained a complaint in Mr. Louis H. Moulton's monthly column, "What's Your Problem?" It is, I suspect, a complaint which one would hear more if our members voiced their honest opinions on tithing.

The reader who submitted the question complained that he had never before heard so much "stress" placed on giving for "missions, Christian education, and other things." (He failed to mention that in the past our denomination had little if any missions, Christian education, and several other things that it should have had.). He ended his query, "What has happened to this new generation of preachers? I've been here a long, long time and in years gone by we didn't have tithing and stewardship constantly preached to us."

Mr. Moulton in his reply quite correctly pointed out that by their silence on tithing and stewardship many of our leaders in past years had simply "failed our people and in turn failed God." He concluded his reply with the suggestion that the reader review what God has to say about stewardship, tithing, and one's attitude toward material things.

KEN'S KORNER

During this year of 1965, half of the population of the United States will be under age 25. Even more startling, 40% will be under age 20. You as a teenager have a very definite responsibility, and position, in the world today. Some of the biggest companies in the world are aiming their business and products at you. Coca Cola plans to spend \$70,000,000 in advertising, most of it aimed at you, the teenager. There are also evil forces that are using you as their target. Perhaps the greatest evil force out to captivate you is pornographic literature. The more correct word is smut and filth, rather than literature. Fifteen million smutty magazines are printed and distributed each month among the local newsstands. It has been said that one company spends \$20,000 for postage alone each month. Almost without exception, such filth gives the wrong and false side of love and sex. God ordained sex, and the devil is constantly trying to make it evil. One is almost tempted to say he is achieving his purpose. The tragic thing about this is that a lot of you read such garbage and believe it to be true. What you read will eventually begin to be the way you think. Take your stand against vulgarity. Read good clean literature, and your mind will be more Christ-like. Read the Bible for daily spiritual strength. It is high time that God's teenagers arise to their responsibility and lead their generation back to God. You are an important person? Christ died for you? The least we can do is live for Him.

ning somewhat below last year despite our much larger denominational budget) and that three of the feature articles in that issue of Contact were about Christian finances.

The giving of money is not the only giving that a Christian is expected to do, of course. There is also the giving of time – in worship attendance, in prayer and study, in visitation – and the giving of ability.

The Parable of the Talents (Matt. 25:14-30) is a familiar story and can be correctly applied to our abilities, or talents, although the word "talent" as it is used in this parable did refer to money and not to ability. The Greek word talanton meant a weight as well as a monetary unity. A servant was paid for his ability to perform certain labor, and the term gradually came to the ability for which a man was paid and not to the pay itself.

The Christian cannot, then, know really abundant living until he is actually giving himself away – losing himself for the Gospel's sake. And the servant who hid his one unit of money which he had been given may be compared to the Christian who will not use the ability that he has, the church member who always excuses himself from any work in the church as if his ability were his own and not given by his Lord.

That unprofitable servant is the man who will not sing in the choir when he is capable of it, or who is so unreliable that he sings only when he's in the mood; he is the Christian who absents himself from attendance for no just reason; he is the church member who will not go on visitation; he is the qualified person who will not teach a Sunday school class; he is the member who gives only half-hearted support to the church and its program and whose every-day living is largely unaffected by his connection with the church. His Lord called him a slothful servant, and the slothful, said Solomon, is brother to the waster.

Real living is to be found in following Christ. Following Christ is more often than we realize, a full-time job that affects our every moment of life and denies us the right to all that we are and all that we have.

A MORE ABUNDANT LIFE THROUGH REGULAR CHURCH ATTENDANCE

The happiest time of my life is when I am in the house of the Lord. Not only should Christians be glad to come to church they also have the duty. The Apostle Paul wrote in Hebrews 10:25, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another and so much the more as ye see the day approaching."

God's people must assemble themselves regularly in the house of God for several reasons. And I would like to discuss a few of these reasons with you tonight.

Reason No. 1 For Worship

The Psalmist David said in Psalms 111:1, "Praise ye the Lord. I will praise the Lord with my whole heart, in the assembly of the upright, and in the congregation."

And in Psalms 107:32 we find this commandment, "Let them exalt him also in the congregation of the people, and praise him in the assembly of the elders."

So in order to have a more abundant life we must assemble ourselves regularly in God's house for worship.

Reason No. 2 For Christian Fellowship Let us compare the church with the home. In order to have fellowship with one's family the logical place to go is to one's home. And the church should be the home of Christians so the logical place for Christians to go for Christian fellowship is to the church. In I John 1:7 we find these words, "But if we walk in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin."

And in Matthew 18:19-20 we find this promise, "Again I say unto you, that if two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

Sometimes there is a greater task than one person can do alone, but by assembling ourselves together, calling upon God and working together the great task is done.

Reason No. 3 The Winning of Souls

This is the greatest reason for regular church attendance. What greater place to win someone to Christ, than in the house of God. Let us again compare the home to the church. If one has a friend whom he wants to introduce to his family one would take this person to his home. And likewise if one wanted to win someone to Christ he should bring his friend to the house of God. What better place to become acquainted with God that in his house.

When we ask someone to come to our house we usually do this with a purpose. For instance a girl might ask another girl to come to her house to see the new dress her mother just made for her. Or a boy might ask another boy to come to his house to see the new motor his dad just bought for him to install in the old car. But Christ promised something better than a look at a new dress or a new motor. He promised us a new life. He said in Matthew 11:28, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest."

In summary I would like to read you one of my favorite verses which should express all Christians feelings about a more abundant life through regular church attendance. This verse is found in Psalms 122:1. "I WAS GLAD WHEN THEY SAID UNTO ME, LET US GO INTO THE HOUSE OF THE LORD."

EVANGELICALS ELECT OFFICERS

Minneapolis - Dr. Jared F. Gerig of Fort Wayne, Indiana, was retained as president of the National Association of Evangelicals at their 23rd annual convention meeting here. He begins the second year of a two-year term.

Dr. Gerig, now in his eighth year as president of Fort Wayne Bible College, returned earlier this year from Israel where he served as visiting professor last fall in the American Institute of Holy Land Studies in Jerusalem. The Bible college, founded in 1904, has made significant progress in all phases of its educational program under his leadership.

Dr. Gerig is a graduate of Fort Wayne Bible College; Malone College, Canton, O.; Fenn College in Cleveland, and Arizona State University and has done graduate work at Indiana University and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Other officers re-elected by the Association were Dr. Rufus Jones, general director of the Conservative Baptist Home Mission Society, Wheaton, III. - first vice president; Dr. Arnold T. Olson, president of the Evangelical Free Church of America, Minneapolis - second vice president; Dr. Cordas C. Burnett, president of Bethany Bible College, Santa Cruz, Calif. - secretary; and Mr. Robert Van Kampen, business executive of Wheaton, III. - treasurer.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION LEADER WARNS TEEN DROPOUTS A SERIOUS PROBLEM

Minneapolis - The serious youth "leakage problem" existing in evangelical churches today and measures to curb this all-too-prevalent problem were discussed April 28 at the 23rd annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals meeting here.

Dr. Roy Zuck, executive director of Scripture Press Foundation, reported that a recent survey conducted by the National Sunday School Association showed one of every six teens in evangelical churches

is a dropout.

"There is a real leakage problem," he said. "We are going to have to begin retaining the youth we have as well as reaching new young people."

The survey was conducted in 604 churches representing 25 denominations and 42 states. Questionnaires were filled in by dropouts and their pastors. The answers revealed the following facts: 60% of the dropouts come from Sunday Schools with attendance of 150 or less; 50% were from suburban churches; 56% said they were Christians; the average previous church attendance of dropouts was nine years; 50% of the dropouts started attending church regularly in their pre-school years; and 14 to 18 is the key dropout area with the most common age 16.

"We readily admit our results may be inconclusive," said Dr. Zuck. "We have over 300 replies. Results might have been different with, say, 3,000. But a similar survey among Lutheran churches produced much the same results. I feel the trends are worth noting."

The dropouts were those who had quite all church activities and not just certain portions. Why do they quit? The kids listed 21 reasons. The pastors listed about 17. The following are the top four as listed by the dropouts with the pastors' ranking in brackets:

Not enough youth activities in church (12);

2. The adults are inconsistent in their lives and not interested in the kids (4);

Church is boring (13); and
Lack of parental cooperation (1).

"I think it's interesting to note the apparent lack of rapport between the pastors and the kids," said Dr. Zuck. "The kids blame the church and the people and the pastors blame the kids and the parents. It shows a real need for self-analysis on both sides."

What do the teens want? The answer

seems to be -- more activity and total church involvement; acceptance by peers and adults; and answers to their basic problems from God's word. The teens blamed many things for their lack of interest. They said the sermons were uninteresting and often irrelevant, the services were, surprisingly, too informal, the people were unfriendly, the Sunday school teachers didn't know their material and the activities were usually poorly planned.

"We find that young people from dedicated Christian homes tend not to drop out," said Dr. Zuck. "A major contributing factor to dropouts is when the father or both parents fail to attend. An answer to halting the rise in dropouts is total family involvement. Parents must be concerned and encourage their children, not force them to attend church.

"The young people of today seem to be echoing the old saying, 'use me or lose me.' They say, 'I'm here but you're not getting through to me.' Adults must take interest, not fake interest. We need youth leaders who understand teens, are interested in them and have time for them."

INVOLVEMENT IS KEY WORD OF NAE CONVENTION AT MINNEAPOLIS

Minneapolis - The 23rd annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals held April 27-28 drew more than 1,000 leaders and, laymen of Protestant churches and organizations for approximately 65 workshop sessions and major meetings at the Leamington Hotel.

Significant resolutions adopted by the convention included a call for the control of obscenity and a ban on a U.S. or presidential envoy to the Vatican. The body deplored violent means to achieve or to prevent achievement of civil rights. Delegates recognized workers have a responsibility to share the costs of services secured for them by union negotiation, but asserted in no case should a worker be compelled to pay any part of dues to be used by the union for political or other activities not directly related to negotiations with management. They also affirmed the public school's duty to recognize the essential place of the Judeo-Christian tradition in the American heritage and called for freedom for Christian teachers to teach from a Christian view-point.

Delegates spoke out against federal aid to private education, whether to the school directly or to the student, and stood strongly for new legislation which Free Will Baptist Gem

would strengthen and protect the free exercise of religion in public life. Another resolution called for positive action by families, legislators and evangelical Christendom to restore a biblical morality to the American society. They also commended the government for "every evidence of resistance to Communist efforts to extend its enslavement of free men." Other resolutions supported the national origins quota system, a cessation of tax supported transportation for parochial school students and effective measure to assure freedom of the air waves.

Fort Wayne Bible College President Jared F. Gerig will continue to serve as president of NAE for the second year of his two-year term. Distinguished educator Dr. Stephen W. Paine, president of Houghton (N.Y.) College, was named "Layman of the Year." The premiere showing of the new NAE film - "Anything Can Happen" - put evangelicals to the severest possible scrutiny in a probe of attitudes and actions of American church members today to launch a major program thrust.

Dr. Richard C. Halverson of World Vision and Fourth Presbyterian Church, Washington, D. C., stirred the delegates with a climactic concluding address. "We have tended to pull men out of the world," he said, "preempting for the program of the institution instead of sending them out in the world equipped to witness and serve for the glory of God....The church is not so much like an army marching with banners flying - but more like a small task force engaged in guerilla warfare - infiltrating and penetrating every structure of society." This is what convention means to NAE and all evangelicals in 1965.

Minneapolis - An outstanding educator was named Layman of the Year here April 28th at the 23rd annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals.

Dr. Stephen W. Paine, president of Houghton College, Houghton, N. Y., was cited for his Christian service at the convention's evening rally. He was presented a plaque by Dr. Robert A. Cook, president of The King's College, also in New York.

Mr. Paine is a former president of the NAE and has been associated with Christian higher education since 1933. He taught classics, was dean of his college and professor of Greek and became president of Houghton College in 1937.

An outstanding author, administrator and teacher, Dr. Paine holds an AB degree from Wheaton College, master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees from the University of Illinois and has an honorary LLD from Wheaton College. He is the father of five children.

The Layman of the Year is chosen on the following criteria:

Christian commitment and character;

a tangible relationship with NAE, including agreement with the NAE statement of faith;

lay leadership in evangelical activity and thought;

strategic support of evangelical work in general; and

public recognition in a leadership capacity.





Approximately 200 people attended the cornerstone laying for the new office building of the National Association of Free Will Baptists on April 7, 1965. Rev. Billy A. Melvin, Executive Secretary of the association, and Rev. John L. Welch, member of Board of Trustees and first moderator of the association, placed the stone which climaxed a four year period of planning and work. Occupancy of the new building is expected in May, 1965.

Six departments of the association will be housed in the new building. They are: the Executive Department, the Foreign Missions Department, the Home Missions Department, the Sunday School Department, the Church Training Service and the Women's National Auxiliary. In addition to these departments of work, the building will provide space for Randall Book Store, Executive Church Bonds, Inc., conference rooms, storage and mailing facilities.

The contemporary style, buff brick structure contains 14,500 square feet of floor space. Construction cost ran approximately \$11.50 per square foot. The building is located on a 2.3 acre tract at 1134 Murfreesboro Road, in the immediate vicinity of Nashville's jet-age airport. The association has under option an additional two acre tract of land which it expects to purchase by September, 1966, at the purchase price of \$20,000. Churches and individuals are urged to send designated gifts to assist the association in the purchase of this additional property.

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND C.T.S. CONVENTION

The new Church Training Service General Manual provides for a district as well as a state CTS rally; the district rally is to meet quarterly and the state rally annually. The district meeting is to be organized to include all churches within a quarterly meeting or an association – or yearly meeting, as some are called. (If your quarterly meeting or association does not conduct a district rally, refer to page 19 of the General Manual for further information.)

In Missouri, the State Sunday School and Church Training Service Convention functions as the state CTS rally. The purpose of the convention is to promote both the Sunday schools and the training program throughout the state and, in the words of the General Manual, to provide "a time of unusual inspiration and challenge to both youth and adults." The convention, which is held each year on Monday evening and Tuesday morning preceding the state association (August 16 and 17 in Monett this year), is planned and produced by the State Sunday School and Church Training Serivce Board, whose five members are elected by and who are responsible to the state association.

As part of the convention's efforts to provide the "unusual inspiration and challenge," the Monday evening program usually features a well-known speaker. Last year the address was by the Rev. Robert Shank; contacts are presently being made to secure a speaker for the 1965 convention.

The Tuesday morning program this year will consist largely of competition among the children and young people of churches throughout the state; the competition will include a sword drill and a Bible bowl. Information will be sent to each church in approximately a month and a half although general details were presented on page 8 of last month's <u>Gem</u>. Pastors and CTS directors are reminded that they are responsible for publicizing the sword drill and Bible bowl in their own churches; you should certainly begin eliminations now if you have not already begun to select contestants from your church. In addition, winners in the essay contest, which is already concluded, and in the declamation competition to be conducted at Youth Camp will be presented with their winning entries.

In most instances the winners in our convention competition will be sent to the next national association to represent Missouri. One obvious difficulty is the fact that our state association meets after the national association, and this year's winners at Monett will have to wait almost an entire year before representing our state at the 1966 national association. The only logical solution, of course, would be to change the date of our own state association so that it precedes the national meeting.

Interest in the state convention has been increasing during the past few years. It cannot really promote Sunday schools and training programs in the state, however, unless a great many of our churches are represented when it meets in Monett next August.

GODATESTHESENNGS

We know the devil "is a liar and the father of it" (John 8:44). We often meet people who have joined him in his design of falsehood. God came into action against the devil and his children, in these words, "God is angry with the wicked every day" (Psalms 7:11). We are well acquainted with the declaration "thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor," and to break it is to transgress the very law of God. It soweth "discord among the brethren." In Proverbs 6:16-19 we read, "These six things doth the Lord hate" etc.

The Lord hates "a proud look." Pride, as defined in this message, is the start toward "sowing discord among the brethren." A wicked pride always has it's blinding effect to the proud in their relationship to others. They can only see themselves as good and others as bad. Proud has two meanings that shall be discussed: The first, "To exalt self; to lift up self." Remember the Pharisee's prayer? (Luke 18:9-14) He felt himself better than others. He lifted his head to God and looked down his nose to the publican in the place of worship. He strolled down the streets of the city with his head high above the receipt of custom where the dishonest publican sat collecting taxes. Because of his very position and prestige in an outward pretended honest religious sect, he imagined himself better than those who were willing to admit or confess their frailities and sins. The second meaning is defined "to be presumptous and self-willed." The young rich fool described in Luke 12:16-21 was so self-willed and sufficient that God was a luxury to him. He could get along without God's will, power, and plan for his life. It is often easy to become so self-willed and self-sufficient that we entertain the notion "that God thinks more of us and will let us by with sin" because of our religious state and activity. When people come to this condition, it leads to "a lying tongue" explaining their righteousness above the sins of others.

The Lord hates "a lying tongue." Lying is to tell an untruth; also to cheat. Thus it speaks of action with speech. "And many shall follow their pernicious ways; by reason of whom the way of truth By Bob L. Jones Pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church Fredericktown, Missouri

shall be evil spoken of" (II Peter 2:3). Our speech and action may be such that the world will speak evil of the Truth of God! The word tongue usually means "an instrument of speech" but is phrased in this context as "a fork of flame to destroy." James 3:6-8 describes it this way, "And the tongue is a fire....it is an unruly evil full of deadly poison." Potipher's wife told a lie to destroy the lad Joseph because she couldn't use him for her selfish pride. After the tongue has taken it's toll, the hand of powerful pressure is revealed!

The Lord hates "hands that shed innocent blood!" Hands! Open hands which signify power! Didn't God say it is even an abomination for open hands of power or advantage to suppress and hurt the innocent and helpless? The apostle Paul was assaulted and assailed by former religious friends. He was delivered to Festus, Agrippa, and Caesar, being followed by the same religious crowd to every court. They tried to hurt him! They wanted him out of the way! They wanted his very life taken from him! Their pride called desperately for his murder! When hands of advantage have taken their course the imagination of evil begins.

The Lord hates "An evil heart that deviseth wicked imaginations." The "heart" refers to the will and intellect of man! "Deviseth"....practice secretly! "Wicked" means vain or vanity! "Imaginations"....inventions! A proud mind imagines great things. It works overtime. It invents evil things and finally in its desperate state of hate it breaks forth to swiftness of mischief!

The Lord hates "feet that are swift in running to mischief." Mischief denotes spoil; to do evil; to do harm. Actually, it is malice! It has been studied in the imagination and now there is the deliberate act of wilful evil. Could it mean that we shouldn't run to tell some imaginative trash? Should we listen to such trash? No! The Lord does not will that we should listen or believe evil report that ruins the reputation and influence of others? When heard from the swift foot

it is easily duplicated.

The Lord hates "a false witness that speaketh lies." This word is different than the foregoing "lying tongue" or the devised lie. The witness is to duplicate! Repeat a report of trash! It may be the truth but still trash. Passing on what has been said or devised by the lying tongue! A rumor spreader! A gossiper! A backbiter! Each of these hold the guilt of the liar. "And withal they learn to be idle, wandering from house to house (telephone); and not only idle, but tattlers, also busybodies, speaking (duplicating) things they ought not" (I Tim, 5:13). Duplicating lies soweth discord among the brethren!

The Lord hates "he that soweth discord among the brethren." Soweth is to spread out; to broadcast; to send forth. Thereof a necessity be a sower. Brawlings and contentions define discord. "Among" as between as to cast asunder. The brethren are related through the blood of Christ. To tell tales among brethren throws suspicion and distrust among the best of friends. Finally, it leads to discord, interruption, and life-lasting divisions that splits many church organizations.

What should be our attitude toward such discord? Paul answers, "Now I beseech you, brethren, <u>mark them</u> which cause division and offenses contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned; and <u>avoid them</u>. For they that are such, serve not the Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good works and fair speeches deceive the hearts of the simple" (Rom. 16:17-18). "He that justifieth the wicked, and he that condemneth the just, even they both are an abomination unto the Lord" (Prov. 17:15).

WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT IT? "Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and he shall lift you up. Speak not evil one of another brethren? (James 4:10-11a). All sin is in his sight; confess it! Become humble enough to admit your sin and He will renew a right spirit within you? Then place a close guard on your life, in the light of God's word, with honest prayer!!!
