

A few years ago, a little old woman was seen hobbling along the road. Though she had come many, many miles, she said she would go ANYWHERE WITH JESUS. She knew, "MY GOD IS REAL, so WHERE COULD I GO that I would not have VICTORY IN JESUS?" WALKING WITH JESUS, she knew she was NEVER ALONE. "EACH STEP I TAKE," she said, "I KNOW THE LORD WILL GUIDE ME." Finally she reached the top of a hill and looked down and thought, "Why, this must be just like heaven. Oh, HOW BEAUTIFUL HEAVEN MUST BE." She thought the PEACE IN THE VALLEY with the people STANDING BY THE RIVER was about the prettiest sight she had ever seen. She thought, "IT really TOOK A MIRACLE for God to make such a place." But she knew that GOD HAS THE WHOLE WORLD IN HIS HANDS.

As she started on down the hill toward the town she had been traveling to so long, she thought, "WON'T IT BE WONDERFUL THERE," for she was going to see her son. He was the pastor of one of the big churches in town. The little old woman thought of howtired she was and how many miles and days she had been traveling, but yet she had JOY UNSPEAKABLE, and she knew that if she would ONLY TRUST HIM, He WOULD CARRY HER THROUGH. As she started in to the town, she saw some beautiful lilies beside the road and thought of Christ and how HE IS THE LILY OF THE VALLEY, so she picked a few of these flowers and went on the LAST MILE OF THE WAY.

She happened to get there just as the church service was about ready to begin, so she walked up to the church door and went in and up towards the front. She thought she would just sit and rest there a few minutes before Johnny, her son, came out and the service began. Before she had hardly sat down, though, a gruff woman in a big flowered hat came towards her and started to speak. But before she said anything, the little old tired lady told her, "I've brought some flowers for the church. Could I please put them up there where Johnny could see them while he preached?" The woman told her, "No, indeed. We have quite enough." And then she turned to another woman standing by her and said, "Can you imagine putting such flowers in the front of the church - why they are wilted and their yellow color would surely detract from the florist's arrangement. Why after we've spent good money to get flowers for this church, we're sure not going to spoil it all with that old woman's weeds." But the Mother, who was a little hard of hearing, didn't hear this conversation and had gotten up in the meantime and put the flowers in the front - right by the pulpit - so her Johnny could smell them while he preached. When she returned to her seat, before she could even sit down, the big woman said to her, "You can't sit here. This seat is reserved. You'll have to go to the back." The sweet Mother looked up at her and said, "I've come so far and am so tired, and DOES JESUS really CARE which

seat one sits in?" But the woman simply repeated again, "You'll have to sit in the back." The lady sadly rose and went to the back and took her place. She had so wanted near the front, so she could hear Johnn'ys sermon, but now she was afraid that she wouldn't be able to hear. But as disappointed as she was, she knew her flowers were on the pulpit for Johnny, and even if she couldn't hear him, she would be able to see him, and she knew those lilies would bring back PRECIOUS MEMORIES. She thought, "Why, SOME GLAD DAY I can truly say I SEE JESUS just as I'll soon see Johnny. Why, I don't want to let this little thing spoil my day. I NEED NO MANSION HERE BELOW - no good seat - to be able to COUNT MY BLESS-INGS. If I can't hear, at least I can sit here and think, "WON'T IT BE WONDERFUL THERE when Johnny and I can WALK THE STREETS OF GOLD. I WOULD NOT BE DENIED of that opportunity for all the good seats in the world."

But just then, Johnny walked up to the pulpit and began to preach of the LOVE OF GOD. The poor little Mother wasn't able to hear the whole sermon, but she could hear alot of it. She heard Johnny tell of the SILENT NIGHT, HOLY NIGHT when the BEAUTIFUL STAR shone down upon the LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM and Christ was born. Johnny told of the BLESSED ASSURANCE Christ gave while he was here on earth. The Mother thought, "My, what a fine boy I've raised. How strong he is and what truth he tells. Why, if Johnny knew I was here he'd just be tickled to death."

But, Johnny was going on with his sermon telling now of the Lord's death and resurrection and THE BLOOD THAT STAINED THE OLD RUGGED CROSS. Johnny said, "HE INCLUDED ME - and you, too, and, why, by just seeing these beautiful yellow lilies laying here on this pulpit - that reminds me of my sweet Mother and her love for Christ. Were she here today she would be able to tell you that NOTHING CAN COMPARE with the Lord's love for his children. She is, I'm sure, BOUND FOR THAT CITY, and though she's old and tired out, she knows that JESUS IS A WONDERFUL SAVIOUR - OH WHAT A SAVIOUR - and WHERE HE LEADS we should follow. Sunday School and Church Training Service Convention

August is State Association month. For Missouri Free Will Baptists it should be a highlight of the church year; and apparently it is, for each year more members seem to attend and to take a greater interest.

There seems to be increasing interest in the Sunday School and CTS Convention, too. The Convention always precedes the State Association and will be held this year at the First Church

in Monett on Monday, August 16 and Tuesday, August 17.

The Monday session of the Convention will begin at 7:30 P.M. and will feature Dr. Umbelina Landera, a Cuban refugee now living and teaching in Marshall, Missouri. Dr. Landers, who came to the United States to escape the Communist-dominated island in 1962, describes herself as "a genuine product of Home Missions in Cuba."

A Southern Baptist, Dr. Landera was active in her denomination in Cuba, for seven years as president of the Woman's Missionary Union of the West Baptist Convention. In her capacity as president of the WMU she traveled throughout Cuba, to the United States on several occasions, and to the Baptist World Alliance in Rio de Janerio in 1960.

Dr. Landera, who holds a doctorate in education from the University of Havana and who has studied at three colleges in this country, is looking forward to her speaking engagement in Monett. "To speak to Christian people," she says, "is always a blessing."

The Tuesday morning session of the Convention (which begins at 9:30) will, as in the past, be devoted to activities especially tailored to involve young people between the ages of nine and eighteen. The winning essay and declamation in the essay and declamation contests, both of which are already com-

pleted, will be presented.

The Sword Drill will be limited this year to Adventurers for Christ (ages 9, 10, and 11). The winner will be presented an award and may be eligible to represent Missouri at the National Sword Drill in Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1966. Mr. Eddie Altis, a member of the Sunday School and CTS Board, will conduct the Sword Drill.

A new feature of the Tuesday morning program will be the Bible Bowl, patterned after the nationally televised show "College Bowl." The Bible Bowl, conducted by acting chairman Albert MacFarland, will consist of questions taken from the Bible. Contestants, who must be in the Heralds or Crusaders for Christ age group (12-17), will not be permitted to use their Bibles or any other aids during the competition.

There is no limit on the number of contestants that each church may send in either the Sword Drill or the Bible Bowl. An annual report form from the Sunday School and CTS Board has been sent to churches throughout the state; any young person interested in entering either contest should contact his pastor to make sure that his name is included on the report form before it is returned. (Contestants who fail to have their names submitted may still enter, however.)

The report forms are a very important source of information to the board. Each clerk and pastor should make every effort to return the forms as early as possible. Any church that has not received a copy of the report form should write for one to Hubert L. Harral, Route 2, Cabool 65445.

The Sunday School and CTS Board members devote a great deal of time and effort to the Convention each year, but it cannot be a success without a fair representation of churches from every part of the state. Plan now to attend.

Rev. Tommy D. Carlson Pastor of Willow Springs Church Mtn. Grove, Mo. I used to have a little dog that would bark viciously every time someone would come to the door. To hear it bark you would think it could tear off a leg if it could get to you. Actually the chihuahua was about five and one-half inches tall and weighed a little more than four pounds. But it could sure put on a BIG FRONT.

I am afraid this is the picture of many so called Christians, who put on a show or a "Big Front" when actually their Christian testimony is about five and one-half inches tall and carries

a little more than four pounds of weight.

In Acts 5:1-12 we read the story of Ananias and Sapphira. It seems at this time among the new Christians there sprang up a kind of holy rivalry. Everyone was eager to place his means at the feet of the apostles. Ananias and his wife were in the crowd. But wait! as the others gave their all, these two gave only a part and acted as though they had done as much as everyone else. They were putting on a big front, a show before mankind. They had not fooled God.

Where did all this get them? Did they enjoy the luxury of the extra amount they had kept? NO! They could not hide from God.

They lost their life because of their hypocrisy.

When Moses came before Pharoah with the message of God, the ruler laughed and said, "No, Israel can not leave." Moses performed before Pharoah as God has commanded him. Pharoah established a big front with his sorcerers and their enchantments.

God began to work and move through the leaders of the children of Israel. The Lord sent plagues upon the Egyptians until the big front was broken down and the children of Israel were permitted to leave Egypt.

Oh listen today people, relying upon a front can get you no place with God. For he sees and knows all our nations.

Matt. 23:27 says, "Woe unto you, scribes and pharisees, hypocrites! for ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead men's bones, and of all uncleanness."

In our life today we find people who are in church on Sunday, some even teach, but through the week they are found in drive-in-picture shows, pool halls, half dressed, and still calling themselves Christians. Is this not a picture of the verse in Matt. 23? When with Christians or the family, some are acting out a big front but inwardly full of uncleanness.

The Bible tells us that man looketh on the outward appearance but God looketh on the heart. People dress up outwardly to please men with a big front. But until individuals do away with this front and get into reality, humbling themselves before

God; they are doomed.

Take a picture of your life right now. Then look at it. Are you inwardly "full of dead men's bones, and full of uncleanness?" Are you outwardly putting on a "Big Front?" Remember, "God seeth the heart."

on God's demands for effective service. Near the end of our study when David felt impressed to have a few minutes of special prayer the hour that followed hearts were broken and amid many tears from eyes estranged to this precious dampness many things were made right with God and men. Evidence of the reality of these decisions is obvious each day. His mercies!!!

Soon after the Bible Study was over we left with the men for our Annual Pastor -Missionary Conference, where about 75 gathered. There our Mseleni Pastor, Rev. Ephraim Mbonamb, was Chairman of these meetings and the blessing received at Mseleni was carried over here and each of the six days were filled with victory and blessing. Four men who had obviously come to cause confusion left defeated after two days. So His mercy was most evident again.

On May 28th I was returning to the mission in my Land Rover at 6:30 in the night and five miles out I came over a little knoll and straight into the bottom of an upturned truck heavily loaded with five tons of building material. The driver, who had been drinking, turned it over two

hours earlier, completely blocking the road and left no worker to warn of the danger. There were three Africans with me and none of us were seriously hurt even though my big, almost new, Land Rover was damaged beyond repair. One of the African boys was knocked unconscious but soon recovered and another had a knee injury. I was not conscious of it but the mercy of instinct provided by the Lord was sufficient to save my eyes. My right forearm shielding my eyes took the beating on the jagged edge of the windshield. There were minor cuts on my

This true story will not influence you to change cigarette brands, but will definately put some "fighting blood" in your spiritual veins.

King Nebuchadnezzar created hanging gardens in Babylon and surrounded the city with a wall on which chariots could race. The proud king began to boast amidst all the glories that surrounded him: "Is not this great Babylon that I have built by the might of my power and for the honor of my majesty?"

So the king decided to pay honor to his god when he claimed had given him so many riches. He had a great image erected - covered with gold. It was ninety feet tall, about as tall as an eight-story building. Some think the image, which was in the fomr of a man, was the likeness of the king himself; others believe it was the image of their greatest god.

At the time of the uncovering of the great statue, Nebuchadnezzar made a grand festival, attended by all the dignitaries of his empire. The people were gorgeously robed. Soldiers and musicians were dressed in fine array. In the very center of the dazzling grandeur King Nebuchadnezzar commanded everyone to bow down to the golden image at the sound of music. Every person who refused to bow to the image would be cast into a burning, fiery furnace.

Thousands of gaily dressed dignitaries

stood waiting for the burst of music. And...suddenly...it came! The crowd fell low to the ground - but not everyone. Standing straight and tall were three young men - Shadrach (shād'rāk), Meshach (mē'shāk), and Abednego (à běd' nē gō). Some Chaldeans told the king what the three had done.

Nebuchadnezzar was full of fury. In fierce anger, he commanded his servants to heat the furnace seven times hotter than it was heated before. After Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were bound by the strong soldiers, they were cast into the burning furnace.

But something amazing took place in the furnace. The three young men just walked around inside it. They had no fear of what would happen to them. They knew of a certainty that the God in whom they had complete confidence and for whom they had taken their stand would take care of them. Then they walked out of the fire with not even a blister, nor a scorched hair, nor even the smell of fire on them.

Shadrach, Meshack, and Abednego said by their actions, "We'd rather fight (or stand) for what's right than switch (or conform) to the things of the world. Just because everybody else is doing it is no reason for us to join in."

Were these fellows "sissies"? No! They were courageous. It takes more courage to be a Christian than it does not to be. They were strong fellows. There's strength in unity. Remember, three refused to bow. You and your friends should stand together for Christ and be strong in Him.

Dare to do right even if you stand alone. Dare to do right if you have to die for it - to die is better than to sin. It takes real courage to do right, but God always gives courage to His children.

God needs fighters instead of switchers. Ask God to help you be a fighter for His sake. "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me" (Philippians 4:13).

forehead which six stitches fixed up. There was quite a hole, about the size of an orange, in the bottom of my forearm which produced a considerable flow of blood until one of the African fellows, Phillip, tied me up and corded the arm. He then washed my face with water from the radiator so I wouldn't scare Josephine so badly. Fortunately the drunk man returned to his truck in about 45 minutes and took me to Mseleni. Dr. Vos took the stitches out of my arm and forehead two days ago and I feel much better now. "His mercy endureth forever."

These are Women's Bible School days at Mseleni and of course Jo is very busy with 99 women in here for three weeks. This means accommodations, lights, water and food, as well as all the teaching and preparation. Jo has been busy getting some pictures and I am sure that a special Bible School letter will follow with pictures.

Do <u>PRAY</u> for two months of special tent meetings which a young African evangelist, Hebron Vilakazi, is holding in several places in our area...June 1st - July 31st. To date there have been 18 decisions for Christ!

His mercy has also been evident in the past ten days as I have been showing the Billy Grahamfilm, "The Heart Is A Rebel" to little groups of white traders, government officials and farmers within 150 miles of the mission. There have been at least 20 conversions among these white people.
