

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The month of August has been a very busy month. I attended the Indian Creek Association Aug. 4-5, hosted by the Joplin First Free Will Baptist Church in their beautiful new church located on Connecticut Street. Time was given for our Missouri Cooperative program during the business session.

Our Southeast Missouri yearly meeting composed of Madison County Quarterly Meeting, St. Francis County Quarterly Meeting, and St. Louis District, convened Aug. 6-7 with Flat River First Free Will Baptist Church with each district represented by letter and delegates. Seventy-five per cent of these churches support the cooperative plan of giving regularly. We experienced good spiritual services in each yearly meeting attended. August 16-19 our Missouri State Association convened with Indian Creek Association at the Monett Church. In every respect this was one of the best state associational meetings that I have ever witnessed. Every department of our state work rendered a good program, beginning with the Sunday School and Church Training Service Convention, followed by the Women's Auxiliary Program, featuring as speakers Rev. and Mrs. Miley. And the State Association proper was permeated with a real evangelistic spirit with the word of God preached by every speaker.

Missouri churches exceeded the suggested quota of \$25,000.00 in Cooperative giving last year. As our state proposes a new goal of \$35,000.00 for 1966 through cooperative giving, brethren, let us join forces statewide to reach it. We solicit and urge every church in Missouri to adopt the cooperative system of giving. Thus, try the Lord! and see what He can do through this worldwide

ministry of the Word of God. Aug. 28th Lynn Street Free Will 0 Baptist Church hosted the Laclede County B Quarterly Meeting. REPORTS from the STATE ASSOCIATION

STATE ASSOCIATION ONE OF THE BEST

The Missouri State Meeting was one of the best that has been held in the 52 year history of Free Will Baptists in the State of Missouri. The Sunday School and Church Training Service Convention started the successful meeting off with Dr. Umbelina Landera doing the speaking.

On Tuesday night, Rev. Harry Beatty, Promotional Secretary for Missouri, challenged the hearts of the approximately 400 persons present with a message entitled, "Yielded Unto God that Grace May Abound".

Wednesday morning, the Women's Auxiliary took charge of the meeting and their speaker for the eleven o'clock service was Dr. Laverne Miley. Dr. Miley presented an inspiring message that helped everyone present to have a greater desire for missions. Wednesday evening, Dr. Miley again spoke, using as his subject, "Yielded unto God that God's Presence May Be Manifested". The attendance was well over 600 with the church This program was also overflowing. broadcasted later that week. Also, an interview was taken of Dr. and Mrs. Miley and family by Bro. Hubert Harrel and Rev. Bud Hill and broadcasted on the local station.

Thursday monring, Bro. Gene Norris spoke and Thursday night Bro. Don Jones brought the message. Both of them were messages that brought an incentive to work.

The highlights of the business session was the adopting of a state budget of \$35,000.00. This is the largest budget that the state has ever had. The placing of Rev. Don Jones of Okla. has a full time state Home Missionary to the city of Cape Girardeau, Missouri. The officers for the coming year are: Moderator, Rev. O. T. Dixon, Springfield: Assistant Moderator, Rev. O. T. Allred, Cabool; Clerk, Rev. Frank Giunta, Leadington; Promotional Secretary, Rev. Harry Beatty, St. Louis; and Editor of the Free Will Baptist Gem, Rev. Bud Hill, Monett. The host pastor for the meeting was Rev. Bud Hill.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Be it resolved that we give a October, 1965

standing vote of appreciation to the Monett Free Will Baptist Church, and the Indian Creek Association for their fine hospitality in hosting this fifty-second session of the Missouri State Association, and to those who graciously have opened their homes to provide sleeping facilities for visiting ministers, delegates and their families, and visitors.

2. Be it resolved that all churches affiliated with this body sending delegates to the Missouri State Association, send in the names of such delegates on forms provided by the Missouri State Association to the associational clerk one (1) week prior to the sitting of our Missouri State Association.

Be it further resolved that the Associational Clerk send such forms to the local associational clerks no later than March 1st.

- 3. Whereas much of our State and National work is dependent upon cooperative giving, be it resolved that our churches give ten percent (10%) of their income through the Co-operative program.
- 4. Be it resolved that the General Board be prepared to be represented in person with a prepared statement of the views of this body on the issues contrary to our religious beliefs and practices at the Missouri State Legislature.
- 5. Be it resolved that the Executive Committee of the General Board work closely with the promotional man to coordinate, facilitate and accelerate the work of the State.

Be it further resolved that each department or board furnish the Executive Committee and the Promotional Secretary with complete information of plans and progress of their work.

6. Be it resolved that we pray that God will call forth from our midst young people to prepare themselves for full time Christian service, and that we encourage them to take advantage of the educational opportunity of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

Be it further resolved that the General Board appoint a committee of five (5) to examine the feasibility of having a Bible centered liberal arts Junior College in the State of Missouri.

We would suggest that the committee include the Moderator, the president of the Women's Auxiliary, and the chairman of the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board.

- 2. Whereas, the GEM paper is the chief means of communication among our people, we recommend that all of our Free Will Baptist people in the State of Missouri give consideration to the subscription of the GEM paper, either individually, or through the church family plan, and that more correspondence with the GEM on the part of our people be considered, including news items, articles of interest, Sunday School averages, etc., and that our GEM editor, Rev. Bud Hill, and the editor of the Women's Page, Mrs. Peggy Davis, be commended for their outstanding work with this publication.
- 3. We recommend that our people patronize our Free Will Baptist Book

BIBLE SCHOOL OPENS

Oklahoma Bible College began registration of students for the new school year on September 7. According to the president, J. D. O'Donnell, enrollment of full time students was the highest in the history of the school.

Because construction of the school's physical plant is still in the planning stages, the college once again is holding classes in the Capitol Hill Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma City. Students are being housed in temporary dormitories until the new dormitories are completed.

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REV. DON L. JONES APPROVED AS MISSIONARY

The Missouri State Association approved the hiring of Rev. Don L. Jones, by the State Mission Board, in the 52nd Annual Session held with the Monett Church August 16-19, 1965.

Rev. Jones was born and reared in the Tulsa, Oklahoma area. He was saved in the New Home Free Will Baptist Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma. His first pastorate was in Okmulgee, Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Church. He continued this work until entering the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee, at the age of 23 years. While in bible college he pastored the Rock Springs Free Will Baptist Church near Nashville. He graduated in May of 1962 with the B.A. Degree in Bible and related pastoral subjects.

In February of 1962, prior to graduation, he accepted and assumed the pastorate of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Guymon, Okla., where he remained until the acceptance of the mission work in Missouri.

During the year of 1964-65 Bro. Jones led the Guymon Church to contribute \$1,698.00 to the State Cooperative Plan of Support and other agencies of our entire denominational work.

Most of all we know him to love the Lord and preach the gospel, for he challenged our hearts with the closing message of our recent session of the State Association. For those interested, Bro. Don has never been to or worked in the Nogales, Arizona Academy.

Bro. Jones is married to the former Beverly Ann Nickens and has two boys, Timothy Ray, 9 years old, and Mark David, 5 years old. They have one son dead, Don Randall, born August 9, 1955, passed away the same year. By the time they arrive in Cape another child will be born to their family.

Mrs. Jones has completed the work for the Christian Workers diploma and the E.T.T.A. Teachers diploma receiving them in 1959.

WHAT MAKES THE DIFFERENCE?

Recently I asked a group of young people in Oklahoma this question: What makes the difference in teenagers? Why is it that some make it while others seemingly fail? The answers were interesting and varied? All the answers fell into one of four categories. One difference is thinking. Teenagers who learn to think before they leap usually make it. Where the rub comes in is what you think about. Most of us at one time or another think, but we need to learn to think on those things that are pure and clean. (Phil. 4:8) Oft times teenagers are guilty of substituting amusement for thinking. The second difference is environment. The crowd has a powerful tug and many times you are drawn by this power. Here again the crowd in itself is not wrong, but the type crowd you run with. Choose those who will help your character, not hinder it. Your family is important too, and has a lot to do with your success. Learn to appreciate them more. The third difference is energy, or ambition. It is tragic, but a lot of teens have no ambition or purpose in life. Take the advice of your fellow teens who say those who make it have ambitions. The fourth difference is a need for God. Here is the real secret to success. Your basic need is a spiritual one. Someone has said, "If you know how to live, you'll know how to make a living. Only God can help you live and be a success. Take the first letter of each difference you'll find the word TEEN. A well rounded young person is one who thinks, one who controls his environment, one with energy, or ambition, and one who has discovered his need for God. Are you properly balanced?

- b. And that this Board be responsible to obtain a representative, elected by each Quarterly Meeting, to assist in arranging itineraries among their churches;

- c. And that each church try to arrange for itineraries or conferences this coming associational year.
- 2. a. That each of our pastors approach their church business meetings and individual members with the challenge of at least \$10.00 regular monthly support to Missouri State Home Missions;
- b. And that each church or interested individual respond to this challenge.
- 3. a. Whereas the cost of transportation to and from the mission field is increasingly high, and this cost must be met by the missionaries account, and Dr. Miley is a native of this State, we recommend that the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists raise \$1,200.00 to be applied to the expense of the Mileys return to Africa.

Missouri State Women's Auxiliary:

Greetings in the precious name of Jesus. We think of you often, but seldom get around to writing letters. We do want to send along our thanks for the contributions from the women of Missouri. I note that you sent in through WNAC \$343.38 in May and \$120.15 in June. I cannot find and I do not think we got a statement for March and April. I have the one for January and February, but none were listed on that one. We certainly appreciate what you have done and want you to pass our thanks on to the women at your state meeting. Do please give our greetings to all the folk there.

This is the time of year that we need

a road. Our monsoon is really here. It has been so dark all day that I have been working by candle light. Many of our village roads are completely closed and will be until the end of October or November. The road from our house out to the main road is all but impassable now. I have done what I could do to the existing trail to try to drain it. That has helped, but then when the rain comes down, it is like a river. The road is filled with water just like the rice fields on either side of it. It is no higher than the fields.

Marie is in Mussoorie, a thousand miles away, with the children. school term was over on June 4. Brenda Kay and Don both well in spite of the fact that they were in school only four months out of the nine month term. Marie taught them on the ship as we came out and then here on the station until the school reopened in March. They came home for the school holidays June 6 to June 25. The new school term began on June 28. Mark has just started. I think he could well stay home with me another year! Don is excited over the work in his new class - third grade. His teacher is very good. She is a Canadian missionary with Ceylon and India General Mission. Brenda Kay thinks her teacher is the best in the school. She is an American, with American Mid Baptist Mission, School closes on No. 9 for their long holiday and will open again on March 3. Needless to say, we look forward to those days together at home here in Sonapurhat.

The food situation here is very difficult. Rice is three times the normal price and is not readily available. The food I bought for my school children on Tuesday is not really fit for human consumption, but what to do?? The Controller of Food and Supplies told me they had gotten no new stock of foods for three and one half months. Fair price shops help considerable in the cities, but do not seem to reach our backward village areas. Many of our Christians are hungry. Even Muslims have been here asking for help. We cannot expect relief until the rice crop is harvested in December and January. We ask your prayers for our people and for us as we face them, knowing their need, day by day. Pray for us that we may ever have His own enabling for the task which is before us. As you pray, you help Him to make us the missionaries HE wants us the missionaries HE wants us to be.

May the Lord continue to bless your service there for Him is our prayer.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

That we walk a separated life that distinguishes us from the world; that we abstain from all appearances of evil and that all we do shall glorify the name of Christ.

II Corinthians 6:17--"Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you."

I Thessalonians 5:22--"Abstain from all appearance of evil."

I Corinthians 10:31--"Whether therefore ye eat or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."

2. Inasmuch as there is an alarming tendency on the part of both Ministry and Laity to become lax in our attitude of what we once considered wrong, may our attitude become Christ-like toward the following: (1) Alcoholic beverages, (2) Dancing, (3) Card playing, (4) Movies, (5) Tobacco, (6) Observance of the Lord's Day as a day of worship, (7) Immodest dress, (8) Television, (9) All things that hinder our Christian testimony.


