THE CHURCH ANDITS CRIPPLERS

"Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone.

(Matt. 23:23)

"Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver."

(II Cor. 9:7)

Knowing how to give and where to give is of great importance. First, we must know how to give. This may be hard at first because some have been brought up from youth, with selfish motives and desires. But, I think Paul found the secret when he led us to believe it was a grace or a disposition created by the Holy Spirit inside of the individual. In contrast with the law which declares giving as a divine law, Christian giving is voluntary and will show our sincerity and love; not only for God but also for one another and for God's work.

Knowing where to give. God has always had a plan of support for His work. Many think because the Law of Moses included the plan of tithing and that Christ came to fulfil the law, that the plan of tithing was destroyed. But it was in existence long before Moses.

I know of no place where it was first given but in Genesis 14:20 when Abram was returning from the battle in which he delivers Lot, his nephew. He was met by Melchizedek to whom he gave tithe of all; therefore, the giving of the plan of tithing was in Abram's day or before. The law only gave strength to the plan and adopted it as the best possible means of support for God's work. I don't think man is capable of introducing a better plan. If God could see it to be an effective plan, surely you and I cannot surpass the knowledge of God.

I know there are a great many radio and television preachers today that plead and beg for support and beyond a doubt need some support, but not the tithe. Malachi saw two complete plans of giving, one the tithe, the other the offering, each has its own importance. We may give an offering to whomsoever we may desire, it makes no difference if he be saint or sinner, but, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, to receive it." (Mal. 3:10) If we live where we ought in God's love, then we can tithe the tenth.

From this reading we gather that the tithe is to be presented December, 1965

to the local church. From our pulpits come the cry to give and support the local church, and surely it does need support. But the plan goes far beyond the needs of the local church today. Some may have you believe that after the tithe has been given to the local church that we should not be concerned with it any farther; but we should be concerned with what the local church does with the tithe. From Numbers 18, we gather that the tithe was to be a plan and not to stop with the local church, but the church was to tithe right on to the higher authority.

Our organization of Free Will Baptist is a carefully planned organization and should function as such, each part dependant upon the other. Now, if one part fails to function properly, it causes great hindrance. (It's crippled.) Now we know that a crippled church or a crippled association is greatly handicapped. If the plan of tithing is to be carried out to accomplish it's purpose it must be put to full use. If we as individuals tithe to our local church and our local church to our local association and to the State and the State to the National, God's plan will function properly and all the needs of God's work will be met in abundance. If we fail in one part, that part is going to be crippled and therefore cannot render good service to all concerned.

Most all of us are looking back over a year that God has blessed in abundance. God has met every demand of the flesh. The material has been supplied in abundance. God has met every demand of the Spirit. The spiritual necessities have been supplied in abundance. We have been made to rejoice because of God's blessing and presence many times.

But in many instances, the financial support for the church has come short, many projects have been hindered because of the lack of funds. Can we say that God's plan is not working? Can we say that God has failed to prosper us so that we can give? Or do we have to say that we have failed in the past year to give of the abundance that God has blessed us with having.

Let us turn now toward the New Year that we are entering soon. Let us call upon God that we might abound in the grace of giving. Let us ask Him that He might prosper us so that we

can exceed the tithe and give an offering now and then. Go to your local church and ask your pastor to help you to work out a plan of tithing for yourself. Ask him if the church under his care tithes to the local association? Ask him why. Ask him if the local association tithes to the State? And if the State to the National? Let us look to the year of 1966 as the greatest year and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough for Free Will Baptist that has ever been. Let's all push a little in the next year and on't cripple God's work. Faith, mercy, judgment are weightier matters but don't leave the others undone, is our prayer for you.

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MILEY TRAVEL FUND

During the 52nd annual session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists which convened in Monett during the week of August 16, Dr. and Mrs. Laverne Miley spoke at two different services. Dr. and Mrs. Miley are our medical missionaries to Ivory Coast, Africa, now on furlough to the United States. The general consensus of those who heard Dr. and Mrs. Miley was that their appearance was the highlight of the annual meeting.

Some of our missionaries on furlough have recently been faced with deficit accounts; except for special collections taken at the last minute for that purpose, they would have been unable to return to their field at the scheduled time. Determined that Dr. and Mrs. Miley would not be placed in such an embarrassing position, the delegates to the State Association adopted a resolution directing the moderator to raise \$1,200.00 through the local associations to help pay the cost of their return fares to Ivory Coast.

In an effort to raise the amount, requests have been sent to the moderator of each quarterly meeting that special offerings be received at each quarterly meeting until the goal is met. Since there are many members who are unable to attend the quarterly meetings, an opportunity is being extended to anyone who wishes to contribute to send his gifts directly to the state promotional secretary.



A REPORT FROM THE WHALEYS

Dear Christian Friends:

Greetings in the wonderful name of our Lord and Savior who said, "And you shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." Since our last newsletter in May we have encountered many changes which we wish to share with you.

On Sunday, June 6th, we had a very encouraging day in the Lord. In the morning service a young man, who is a Puerto Rican with a Catholic background, was saved. In the afternoon I performed our first Free Will Baptist Baptismal service to be held in Fairbanks for what we thought to be a two month furlough in the south 48 states. We arrived in Jacksonville, N. C. on Saturday night, thirteen days later. We found several open doors for our mission services, for which we praise the Lord. The response and interest shown in these services have been most encouraging. On July 1st our mission account at the Home Mission office was more than \$1,400.00 in the red. By the last of August this deficit had been cleared up by the generous giving of those who attended our services. I want to thank each of you who had any part in making this possible. As many of you will remember, in July, 1964 Ethel became very ill with a kidney disorder which has continued to give her trouble since that time. After arriving in the south this condition grew worse until it was necessary for her to be admitted into the hospital for treatment and a complete physical checkup. She spent fifteen days in North Carolina Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, North Carolina. On August 12th, just at the time we had made plans to depart for Alaska her doctor advised that we not return until there was an improvement in her physical condition. Also, I was advised by Brother Willis, the director of National Home Missions, that several members of the board felt that our furlough should be extended for a longer period of time. We had our car packed and were ready to leave when we were confronted with this sudden change, naturally, it put the whole family into a state of confusion. I met Brother Willis in the missions office on August 19th and he advised that I continue to do deputation work in the states until after the October board meeting. The Lord wonderfully went before us and we were able to rent a house near Ethel's mother in time to get the children in school on its opening day.

During the first week in October the mission board met and discussed us and the work. The following decision was made by the board: "That he be paid \$200 per month until May of December, 1965

1966 and that he follow the leadership of the Lord as to what he should do during this time and any monies received in Missions services be placed in his account. In the event that any money is left in his account when his contract terminates that it be transferred to the Alaska account. This is to be the maximum responsibility of the National Home Missions and Church Extension Board." The Lord has led us in obtaining the services of a returned medical missionary from Africa as Ethel's physician, who is a man of vision, passion, and has a tremendous medical skill. In a recent conference with him he assured us that he has high hopes for our continued missionary ministry, therefore we are making tentative plans to return to Alaska in June. Please pray with us as we fervently seek God's will and leadership.

Our young, tender church in Fairbanks is carrying on in our absence. God has given us a nucleous of Free Will Baptist from the South 48 states who are leading in the mission work. Mr. and Mrs. James Sullivan and their daughter, from Florida and Millie Hall and Dixie Myers. Dixie and Millie are employed at the University of Alaska and the Sullivans are with Civil Service. We do so much appreciate all you have done through the years in standing by us in prayer and financial support. Some of you have been with us from the beginning, since we pioneered seven and one-half years ago. "God bless you abundantly for every prayer and gift you have given." We have endeavored to be faithful in service and the appropriation of every dime that has been committed to our trust. In these days of testing, both for us and the work we are undertaking, I trust that you shall continue to keep this ministry before you as you have so faithfully done in the past. While we are here we are continuing to promote and push missions, so if you have not had a missionary service with us, we will be happy to schedule one.

Betty Jean, our little seven year old Alaska native girl who was added to our home in April, is adjusting to the change very well. Her time in the South 48 states is proving to be very educational to her.

If you have the opportunity, please drop by to see us while we are in this area. May the Lord bless you real good as we continue as "Laborers together with God."



CHRISTMAS

We wonder how we might describe Christmas to someone who has never known of it? Could we describe it in color or taste or sound? There is the beautiful lights of many different colors and the glittering things that we put upon the tree. There is the turkey, fruit cakes, candy, pumpkin pie and all the other good things we have to eat. Then there is the sound of ringing bells and the beautiful Christmas carols and the music of the organs and choirs. All these wonderful things and yet they all do not bring the wonderful Christmas feeling that we share at Christmas time.

Yet, are we sure that what we have is really the feeling of Christmas? If we would stop to analyze our seasonal happiness, many of us would realize that it is not. Christmas, as the widely held belief, gives us the right, once a year to be just plain "EXTRAVAGENT!" We go to extremes in buying things we can not rightly afford, often going in debt just to give more than we expect to receive, or maybe we want to climb up a little higher in society with our boss or other higher, up-to-date people. Then we go to the extremes with our meals. Overeating and making a glutton of ourself and overdrinking and making a drunkard of ourself. Brethren, these things ought not to be.

CUBAN EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND REACTIVATED AS 50,000-300,000 REFUGEES EXPECTED IN MIAMI

Nashville - The Board of Foreign Missions acted in special telephone conference October 11 to reactivate CERF (Cuban Emergency Relief Fund) in face of an expected renewed influx of Cuban refugees into Miami.

Several hundred refugees have already arrived in Miami by boat following Castro's new open door policy allowing all who desire to leave Cuba to do so.

A massive exodus is expected as negotiations between the U.S. State Department and Cuba are completed.

Exiles in Miami estimate that 50,000 persons are ready to leave Cuba. But sources in Havana say the figure could run much higher, depending on how long the open door policy remains in effect.

Florida Governor Haydon Burns estimates the eventual number could run from 300,000 to a half million.

The Reverend Benito Rodriquez, pastor of the Spanish Free Will Baptist Church in Miami and editor of Spanish publications for the board, will direct the reactivated CERF operation. The building used during the last mass exodus from Cuba has been cleaned and repaired for the new emergency.

The Center will operate at least four hours per day giving relief to refugees who arrive in Miami without clothes, personal effects or money. Yet the main activity of the Center will be to give spiritual counsel to those seeking assistance.

General Director Reford Wilson said, "Our ministry is a spiritual one, not merely humanitarian. Our main purpose in operating a refugee center is to give these needy friends the gospel. Naturally, it would be hypocritical of us if we were not concerned about their physical needs as well. Thus, we plan to disseminate clothing and food as these are made available to us by our people."

The Center in Miami is urgently in Page 10

Individuals and churches desiring to be of assistance are urged to send clothes and similar supplies directly to CERF, 232 S.W. Eighth Street, Miami, Fla.

Approximately \$400 per month has been allocated to operate the Center. There is no budget provision for these funds, and individuals or groups are urged to make special contributions to CERF in care of the foreign missions office. Funds should be clearly earmarked for CERF and sent to the Foreign Missions Department, Box 1088, Nashville, Tennessee 37202.

MEETING THE CHALLENGE NOVEMBER

Dear Friends,

Greetings in the lovely name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Truly we can say with the psalmist, David, "The Lord has done great things whereof we are glad."

For the next few months our letter will be dedicated to your getting acquainted with our students, workers and teachers. We will begin with the third year students.

Juanita Lugo or Juana, as we call her, is from our church in El Canelito. She is 17 years old and an excellent student. Juana was saved at the age of 14. She

was brought to the Institute by one of her uncle's when she was not a christian. She only came because of obedience to his wishes. During the 1962 convention she was saved and has lived a very dedicated life ever since. She is studying at present, besides her Institute classes, First Aid with the Red Cross. She has completed her book studies and is now working two afternoons a week to put into practice what she has learned. She can continue studies with the Red Cross and become a practical nurse. This is her desire so that she can return to our church in the mountains and help her own people. There isn't a doctor or nurse within 50 miles of this village. Juana is also a member of the girls trio at the Institute.

Ruth Rodriguez - Ruth is from Piedras Negras and came to the Institute in Sept. of 1963. She, too, is 17 years old. Ruth comes from a family of very religious people. She was not raised a Catholic but of another cult. I don't know what they are called in the States, so I will not try to name it. As soon as school started and she began to hear the gospel in all its truth, she was convinced that she had not been taught the truth. When school ended and her father came for her, she went home for the summer. When they found out that she had learned another doctrine and would no longer go along with them, she suffered many things. When school began in Sept. of 1964 we did not know whether to expect Ruth or not, but she arrived, all alone. When school this last year had ended, she refused to go home. Truly Ruth has left father, mother and all to serve Christ. She, too, is studying at the Red Cross. Her only real desire is to serve anywhere and in anyway, her Christ. Ruth is a very good singer and does solo work. Pray for these two girls as they better prepare themselves for His service.

Raul de la Rosa - Raul was among some of our first converts in Mexico. Seven years ago he was only 11 years old. As the years have passed we have December, 1965

seen Raul grow from a boy into young manhood. Also we have seen him grow spiritually. Raul entered the Institute in 1962 but due to financial problems at home, had to leave before school ended and work. Again the following year he entered, but had the same problem. Again last year he entered and was determined that nothing was going to keep him from studying God's Word. Many of you met Raul personally; he sings the lead in the school quartet. Mexico requires every boy 18 years old to fulfill military service. They must spend every Sunday for one year of training in camp. We have four boys at the Institute that must fulfill their military service beginning in Jan. 1966. Raul is one of them. He needs your prayers for strength during this coming year.

Each month you will be meeting other students. We trust this will better acquaint you with our work and perhaps you can pray more effectively for our needs and prayer requests.

Arthur is still in the States. He is in Florida at present, but should be home by the 23rd of this month. He has been gone so much this year that I'm almost always alone. We do need your prayers as there are many decisions to be made daily and problems to be faced with their solutions. God truly gives strength when it seems there is no strength.

Since this is Thanksgiving month in the States, we truly want to thank each of you who has so faithfully stood with us during these past years. We have been in Mexico seven years the 17th of this month. You, our dear friends, have made this possible with your financial help and prayers. May God richly bless each of you is our prayer. May He give us many years more to work together in His vineyard in Mexico.

Churches Should Pay a Minister a Fair Salary

OST PEOPLE want to be fair. Perhaps Christians, especially, strive to be fair. Congregations are often perplexed when they try to establish a fair salary for their minister. What criteria can they use? Where should they start?

They should NOT start by making a comparison to other ministers salaries for ministers are poorly paid. Consider that there is no other vocation as important as the ministry, that few occupations require as much education, that none have as much responsibility.

But how should the congregation proceed? Here are a few suggestions:

The Bureau of the Census in a June, 1965, report stated that the median family income rose 5 percent in 1964 over 1963. Did your minister's salary rise 5 percent in 1964? or in 1965? How much will it rise in 1966?

From 1954 to 1964 the median family income rose 57 percent, the Bureau of the Census reports. Did your congregation raise your minister's salary 57 percent in that period? If it did, you "kept pace."

But did you start at a fair point? More important, are you at a fair point now? And how do you judge?

The median family income in the United States in 1964 was \$6,600 (half the families received more; half received less). With the responsibility that a minister has, fairness would demand that he get more than the median. As a bare minimum it would seem that he should get the \$6,600, plus the rent-free use of the manse.

Families with their head "a year around full-time worker" have a median income of \$7,720. Those with a "professional, technical or kindred worker" as their head have a median income of \$10,469. Many of the latter do not require the education or experience of a minister; some do not even require a college degree.

When you make comparisons, consider the free manse and the cash salary of the minister as income. But to be fair, other expenses paid by the church cannot be treated as part of the minister's income. The car allowance, conference expenses, the church's share of pension payments, or professional book allowance are properly church expenses.

Comparisons to national averages will often lead to improper conclusions. The minister in a large city where the cost of living and the average income are higher should, out of fairness, receive a higher salary than the minister in a small town where costs are less, and incomes are substantially lower.

Incomes vary according to the section of the country too. The Northeast is \$274.00 above the national average; the North Central is \$142.00 above; the South is \$970.00 below; and the West is \$825.00 above.

Incomes in your city or community are still more important. The Census Bureau published income · data for every county in the United States after the 1960 Census. This material is a good starting-point. The median income has gone up 21 percent since

Maybe the minister doesn't need a fair salary. Maybe he should be so dedicated that he should not be concerned. Maybe money should not be important to him. He should be dedicated; and so should every other Christian. Maybe money should not be so important to any of us Christians. But excusing poor stewardship of the church members by saying that the minister should be dedicated is bad practice for the church. The dollar the church member keeps in his pocket because the minister is dedicated and uncomplaining is not helping the work of the Kingdom.

Christian fairness demands that we pay the minister a fair salary. If the membership would be as dedicated with its money, its time, its talents as the minister (or even half as dedicated), there would be sufficent funds to pay the minister a fair salary. And, more important, the money available to the church's benevolent programs would be two-, three-times, or even ten-times as great as we now spend to spread the Word of God through the world.
