MISSOURI STATE HOME MISSIONS REPORT December, 1965

We are indeed grateful to the Lord and our churches for the fine response to Home Missions for the month of December, 1965. You will notice \$203.23 designated gifts plus \$326.28 Co-op fund given in December. This is a total of \$528.51. Again we say, "Our contributing churches need to be commended for their faithfulness to this important work."

We are happy to report the work of Cape Girardeau doing fine. In December they had an average of 25 in Sunday School, 27 in morning worship, 14 in C.T.S., and 17 in evening worship. Cottage prayer meeting average was eight. Their total offerings were \$115.66 for the same period. This is a marvelous report from a mission starting with absolutely nothing. Bro. Don Jones is doing a fine work. This mission contributed \$2.59 to State Home Missions last month. Bro. Don says, "We are expecting great things."

The mission in Rolla is doing fine under the leadership of Board Member Leland Horton. Bro. Horton is selling insurance for a livelihood while establishing this mission. He reports, "As a whole I think all is well. We have been having in the Page 3 DL/

Jolt her to a realization of the importance of that first service on Sunday morning, and that first service on Sunday evening, namely the Sunday School and the Church Training service.

We need to remember that Jesus had some scorching words of rebuke in His day for those who were able by the skies to read the coming storms and yet were blind to the signs of the times. Can we read the signs of the times? Are we abreast of the grave situations that face us as believers in the Lord? Surely the hourglass of our dispensation is running out, and our skies flow red with the threatening storms of world distress. There are four peaks that stand out very clearly: First, <u>Spiritual Lassitude</u>, with millions who profess the name of Christ sleeping at the post of duty. Second, <u>Political Servitude</u>, with millions crushed under the heel of communism. Third, <u>Scientific Aptitude</u>, with millions of dollars being spent on man-killing, earth-scorching devices. And Fourth, <u>Moral Turpitude</u>, with millions being spent on anti-crime efforts, etc.

I'm concerned with the first, namely Spiritual Lassitude.What I have done in the past troubles me no more, becuase it has been repented of and is under the blood of Jesus; but what I have not done is the thing that troubles me.

Church, we have dynamite in our hands...the Words of the living God! And it's high time that we lit the fuse and blasted ourselves into a mass attack against the invading iniquity of our day. As long as Jesus tarries His coming, the devil will reign, and as long as he reigns, he must have prospects. Who does he have his eyes upon? Our young people. Not those who are

teens in attendance."

Our budget for Home Missions is \$585.42 a month. We have lacked \$60 - \$100 a month meeting the budget so far. We need a few more churches to pledge support. Will your church be one of those added to the list of mission minded groups next month? Why not help?

\$100.00 a week is being gladly invested in the Cape Girardeau Mission for the support of our missionary Don Jones. We have invested very little more than that in Cape. \$75.00 a month is forwarded to the Rolla Mission for rent, etc. This is not missionary salary, Bro. Horton receives no salary from the state board.

As of January 4, 1966, we have \$3794.68 in the general fund of the Home Mission Board. We have \$8022.65 in the loan fund to be used only for loans to home mission churches.

NEW SUNDAY SCHOOL CURRICULUM WELL ACCEPTED

Sales reach all time high as Free Will Baptists respond to curriculum change. Nashville, Tennessee

The Sunday School Department of the National Association reports that their new curriculum has been well received by Free Will Baptists across the nation. One enthusiastic pastor wrote, "Our literature came the day before yesterday. We sure are proud of it. We think those who are responsible for it have done a mighty good job." Evidently others join in with this pastor in warm reception of the new material as some of the materials have been a "sell out."

The new curriculum comes after several years of research and study. The lessons are based upon Scriptures selected by Free Will Baptists. This is a departure from the International Lesson Outlines. Many complained that these lessons were fragmentary and difficult to teach to children. The new curriculum for Preschoolers, Primaries, and Juniors is prepared with children in mind.

According to Roger Reeds, General Director of the Sunday School Department, many other items were sold out during this shipping period. Sales for the Adult quarterly exceeded 55,000 for the first time. The second best seller is the Junior quarterly and it exceeded 19,500 in sales this time.

The Sunday School Department operates exclusively from the sale of its Sunday school literature. It is a service agency of the National Association and offers a free lending library of filmstrips as well as an extensive program of teacher training and promotion.



INTO THE WORD

The command of Jesus was to go and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. There are multitudes of people in all denominations who make so-called "decisions" for Christ but never reach the baptistry. Others who are baptized are never enlisted in the active life of the local church as a Christian.

THE GREATEST WEAKNESS OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Our problem is not decisions, but discipleship! This can only be accomplished through teaching the new convert the Word of God and it's claim on his life. How many Free Will Baptist churches do you know of that has an adequate follow-up program of teaching? Too often, the first time a church thinks of helping a new convert is when he misses a couple of Sundays. We then go to his house for cake and coffee fellowship and tell him "not to get discouraged even though it is hard to be a Christian."

The Jehovah's Witness cult seldom loses a convert because of its follow-up teaching program is so thorough. It is time we beat them at their own game with qualified teachers, appropriate free literature, and home teaching.

BOOK BORN OF NECESSITY

In one Free Will Baptist Church this has been tried with success. The first year of work saw at Lewis Avenue Church, 125 new church members received into fellowship. This was more than any pastor could work with personally. There were dozens of booklets on the market, but not for Free Will Baptists. The pastor then, of necessity, wrote and mimeographed a study course for new Christians.

It was given to each new church member and convert to study at home. This was a good idea, but only a few would study on their own. This was disappointing, but later it was realized that it was the fault of the church. Many older Christians do not realize that in pagan America most new converts have no Bible background. To illustrate let me tell you of a man I recently talked to who did not know what a simple Bible reference meant, i.e. John 3:16.

He had been reading his Bible some, and when I referred to the book of John he wanted to know if I meant "big John or little John".

THE ANSWER

The answer then is to go to the home of the new convert who has made a decision and teach him personally. The pastor cannot go to all the homes personally. He must train a dedicated group who will take the Bible study to the new convert one or two hours per week. When he has been taught, he must expect to teach others. Some object saying, "but what if the new Christian is not willing for you to come to his home once a week for a Bible lesson?" Then I do not believe he has been saved!

The real problem is getting old church members to prepare and go to do this teaching job. The main reason that church members do not go on visitation is that they do not know what to do when they get there. After small talk of weather and fishing, too often the discussion comes to airing the church problems.

It is the pastor's job to train a group of laymembers to teach the new convert. Then it is the job of the church member to go weekly into that home to teach and if nothing more to guide the study of the new Christian.

After the decision is made, the new Christian must immediately be taught to pray, witness, tithe, read the Bible and accept his Christian responsibility. This can be accomplished by 12 to 15 weekly visits in a guided study and Bible fellowship. The average pastor needs only to compare his list of decisions to his list of disciples to see the crying need of regular, personal home teaching.

This will also strengthen your older members and give them a real purpose as a Christian. It is imperative that the new Christian be taught these things before he finds out that the majority of the old ones don't do them.

LAYMEN SHOULD TEACH

When the persecution came to the early church in Jerusalem (Acts 8), the believers were scattered abroad throughout the regions of Judea and Samaria. "Therefore they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the Word" (Acts 8:4). The Bible plainly says in verse 1 that these were laymen, and that the Apostles did not leave Jerusalem.

Now notice in Ephesians 4:11-12 what the Apostles, Prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers are supposed to do. They are given to the church for the perfecting of the saints, i.e. bringing them to Christian maturity for the work of the ministry. Read the next few verses to see the value of this work, and the consequences when new Christians are not established in the Word of God.

TWO REASONS TO TEACH

The first reason we should teach people is to win them. It is not enough to have an emotional religious experience unless it is based on the knowledge of Christ's finished work on th cross. Too long have accepted conviction for conversion in Free Will Baptist ranks. People need to be taught that the altar is a place of sacrifice, i.e. a place to die! Every mention of an altar in the Bible is connected with death. If people are not ready to die to self and the world, then they should be taught to stay away from the altar of God! This type of pre-decision teaching will not limit the number of your converts, only the kind. Paul said, "knowing therefor the terror of the Lord, we persuade men" (II Cor. 5:11). In the light of the coming judgment it is time we begin to teach men with a view to persuasion.

The second reason for teaching is to keep them. This problem is not unique with any one denomination. C. E. Matthews, late secretary of evangelism for the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, says in his book, <u>A</u> <u>Church Revival</u>, "The most justifiable criticism that can be made of all that Southern Baptists are doing today is their failure to conserve the results of their evangelistic efforts." In 1953 there were 2,460,437 non-resident Southern Baptist church members and 5,425,579 resident. At least 25%, or 1,356,395, of the resident members were inactive. This means of the reported 7,886,016 members, 48.4% of the entire membership of Southern Baptist churches is lost to the cause of Christ.

This is our problem simply on a smaller scale!

DOES NOT HAVE TO BE

There is a series of books being prepared for Free Will Baptist use for personal home teaching. These are offered through our various book stores and the C.T.S. program. Your Adult C.T.S. groups would do well to get these books called <u>"Christian Life Series</u>" and really train some adults to become home study teachers to new converts!

The first book is called "Into The Word" and covers the essentials for the new Christian. The second book available is a survey course of the "Pentatouch" (first five books of the Bible) with character studies of the main Old Testament characters.

Others will be forth coming. You do not need commentaries to study these, only a Bible and a pencil. They are strictly on a simple approach for laymen's use. Contact your Free Will Baptist book stores or the C.T.S. order blank for prices and books.

"Into the Word" is in its second printing and is becoming widely used for study courses and personal home study use. It should be provided free of charge by the local church for all new members and converts.



20 + 8 CAMPAIGN IS ANNOUNCED

Nashville, Tenn. - A special campaign has been announced by the management committee of the National Office Building. Designated as the 20 + 8 Campaign, the purpose of this effort will be to raise \$20,000 to purchase two acres of land adjacent to the present property and to raise \$8,000 for the building which is not covered in the permanent loan. The option on the land expires September 22, 1966, and the \$8,000 is now covered by a ninety day note.

The first major effort of the 20 + 8 Campaign will take place on Sunday, February 20, 1966. At this time, each church member is asked to give one dollar (or more) to help retire this indebtedness. Special envelopes have been prepared for this appeal and will be mailed to each pastor.

According to Samuel Johnson, Director of CTS and chairman for the campaign, the saying "Let George do it" will be the basis of the special emphasis. Mr. Johnson states, "George Washington's picture appears on a one dollar bill. Since his birthday is February 22, we are asking every Free Will Baptist to give one dollar on Sunday, February 20. If every pastor and church will cooperate, we believe that George can do it."

Pastors are urged to announce this campaign early in February and push for at least one dollar per member on Sunday, February 20. "Shares" in the Free Will Baptist future are still available at \$50.00 each. Churches sending offerings in multiples of \$50 will receive proper share credit.

AM THE LIVING

BREAD

"Then Jesus said unto them, "verily, verily, I say unto you, except ye eat the flesh of the son of man, and drink his blood, ye have no life in you." John 6:53

It was Thursday. Jesus had told His disciples to prepare for the feast of the passover. This was to be the last passover. Since that fateful night centuries before when the blood of the lamb was sprinkled on the doorpost to protect against the angel of death, the jews had religiously celebrated this traditional feast. But now the time had come to replace this feast with another of more significance.

The disciples gathered into the upper room and there in the midst of this group of followers Jesus broke the bread, blessed it, and gave to them to eat. He poured the juice of the fruit of the vine, blessed it and gave to them to drink. As each move in the feast of the passover was significant, so each step in this supper was of great importance.

This was the meeting place of law and grace. Every act in the passover meal was a <u>type</u> of this scene now about to unfold. The sprinkling of the blood on the doorpost was necessary because the Jews, God's people, were in slavery to Pharoah. Their captivity was a type of sin, and Pharoah a type of Satan. The angel went through the city killing the first born of every living thing. This is true of sin, "The wages of sin is death." But every house that had the blood of the lamb sprinkled on the doorpost was saved. This lamb is a type of Christ, His blood saves us from the penalty of sin.

"And He took the bread, gave thanks and brake it, and gave unto them, saying, this is my body which is given for you: this do in remembrance of me." Luke 22:19. The bread represented the body of Christ, it did not actually become the body of Christ either at the blessing as the Roman Doctrine of Transubstantiation teaches or when it entered the disciples mouth as the Lutheran doctrine of Consubstantiation implies. It was and is merely a type or representative of the body of Christ. Jesus blessed the cup and gave to them saying, "This cup is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you."

After the meal Jesus proceeded to take a towel and wash the the disciples feet. In John 13:14 Jesus said, "If I then your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one anothers feet." There are people who deny that this is an ordinance of the Gospel, but Jesus here tells us to do this, and he does not tell us we ought to partake of the Lord's Supper. Others would say this was traditional, but again a closer study of God's word will show that this was not a tradition, but Jesus actually inaugurated a new ordinance for our spiritual benefit. Now, of what importance is there in the believers participat-

ing in these two ordinances of the gospel?

First, we reaffirm our faith in the bodily death, burial and resurrection of Christ for the atonement of our sins.

Second, we show a desire to obey the teachings of our Lord. Jesus implies that we should eat of the Lord's Supper, and He definitely states that we ought to wash the saints feet.


Third, my love and appreciation for Christ is revealed in this service. All of us who know Christ as our Saviour cannot help but experience a lump in our throat when we hear the words of Jesus, "Take eat, this is my body, which is given for you."

Fourth, I confess to the world that I'm on the Lord's side. I testify for all to hear that I have accepted the broken body of my Lord on Calvary, the spilled blood of Christ has washed my sins away, and I trust in this Jesus to justify me before God.

Fifth, it makes me happy. Some of the greatest moments of my Christian experience have been mine when I met with a few of God's people to eat of the bread and drink of the cup. Then in deepest humility, bowed before my brother and washed his feet. Jesus said in John 13:17 - "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them."

And last, it causes me to remember to remember the love God has for me; to remember the cost of my redemption; to remember that Jesus has saved me; and to remember that he expects me to keep myself clean and unspotted from the world.





The task wasn't an easy one. The highly educated Japanese, steeped in pagan Shintoism or Buddhism, does not quickly become Christian.

Yet some were saved. Today three churches are established in Hokkaido at Bihoro, Abashiri and Koshimizu. Two other missions are maintained.

During their third term, the Calverys are initiating Free Will Baptist ministries in Sapporo, the capitol of Hokkaido, with a population of more than 700,000 and located in the southwest. The Calverys have two children: Rebecca, born June 3,

1954, and Jonothan, October 25, 1956.

(A word from your National Home Mission Board) THERE IS A LEAK IN THE MOLASSES BARREL By Mark Vandivort

Recently, I attended the Mississippi State Association where I heard an interesting challenge from Rev. M. L. Hollis, pioneer Free Will Baptist pastor in the state of Mississippi. The state meeting convened at the Tupelo Free Will Baptist Church which was the first church established in the state of Mississippi under Brother Hollis' ministry. Brother Hollis testified that he had established 1.3 Free Will Baptist churches in the state of Mississippi which are now strong, progressive churches. Brother Hollis has also been instrumental in establishing several churches in other states.

Brother Hollis drew some interesting observations concerning the current conditions in our denomination. By way of illustration, he referred back to the good old days when Mississippi families relied heavily on the sweet molasses from the sugar cane which is abundant in this state. I know this to be a fact for I have taken some of these molasses back to my home in Tennessee. Brother Hollis explained how the molasses were stored in 50 gallon barrels. When the family needed molasses, they would go out to the barrel and draw a pitcher of molasses for use on the table or for cooking. Sometimes, a leak would spring in the barrel and the molasses would begin dripping away. Whereupon, the man of the house would immediately take measures to repair the leak because the leaking molasses barrel meant that an important source of sustenance for the family was gradually dripping away.

Brother Hollis observed that for the past several years, Free Will Baptist people have been on the move. Basically, they have been moving from rural to urban communities. Many of these people have been lost to the strength and fellowship of our denomination as families move into cities where there are no

Free Will Baptist churches. Some of our people have aligned themselves with other denominations; however, many have neglected their church attendance and have back-slidden in their faithfulness to Jesus Christ. This exodus from our Free Will Baptist churches is still going on and it is a situation that should demand our attention. May God help us to be concerned enough to start doing more about it. It is the interest of our National Home Missions Board to assist whenever possible in establishing a Free Will Baptist church in cities where we do not have a church and where our people are establishing new residences. It is also a primary concern of our Home Missions Board and Church Extension workers to establish a Bible preaching witness in some of the many towns and cities where there is very little witness for the Lord Jesus Christ. It would be virtually impossible, of course, for our National Home Missions Board to establish a church in every town and city where our Free Will Baptist people are establishing new residences.

Actually, the basic responsibility and greatest potential for response is found in the people themselves who are doing the moving. It has been most encouraging during the past several months to receive various reports from Free Will Baptist groups who are congregating together and establishing a nucleus for New Free Will Baptist churches. These groups afford excellent opportunities for church extension projects from the local church or quarterly meeting, or perhaps even the state association. Sometimes, just a little encouragement and temporary financial help will give a new group that added boost which is needed to get a new church established. This also presents a great challenge for a pastor who can supply capable leadership and who may be able to temporarily provide some of his own support.

A great challenge and responsibility rests on the local church to train and encourage their people when they move away to be used of God as instruments in establishing a Free Will Baptist church. It is of eternal importance that families who move away should stay in fellowship with and in active service for our Lord and Master Jesus Christ.

I would like to encourage pastors to be very sure to help families who are moving to learn the address of Free Will Baptist churches in the area to which they are moving. Also, it is important to write to Free Will Baptist pastors, notifying them of the arrival of a new family. This may mean the difference in a family staying with our denomination. It should be of great concern that they continue in faithful service in a good Bible preaching church.

"Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me." (Isaiah 6:8)


