



LONNIE SPARKS AND BOBBY JACKSON CHOSEN
"OUTSTANDING YOUNG MEN"

Ray Lee, Jr. 1944-1966 STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT DIES

Ray Lee, Jr., 21-year-old Bible College senior and president of the student body, died Friday night, March 4, during an intra-society basketball game in Nashville.

With a large number of students looking on, including his wife of eight months, the former Jeanne Dukes of Lake Butler, Fla., Ray collapsed on the gymnasium floor during the early minutes of the game. Students administered artificial resuscitation until the arrival of an ambulance, which rushed Lee to the hospital. The doctor pronounced him dead on arrival, probable cause being a cerebral hemorrhage.

The College family and many of Ray's friends, still stunned by the sudden tragedy, filled the College auditorium for a memorial service the following night. Opening with solos by Don Clark, head of the College music department, and Rev. Bill McCuin, Alabama pastor; the student body vice-president, Jimmie Ferrell, spoke, with difficulty, of the excellent example Ray left for his fellow-students to follow. President L. C. Johnson brought the memorial message.

Several students and faculty members attended the burial in Tulsa, March 8. Ray is survived by his wife, Jeanne, and by his parents, recently moved to Houston, Texas, with his sister.

During his college career, many well-deserved honors were bestowed upon Ray. He was vice-president of his sophomore class and president of his junior class. He edited the 1965 College annual and was elected 1965-66 student body president. The faculty this year selected Ray as the most outstanding student in school, a fact that was not to be disclosed until early spring.

Perhaps the most fitting tribute left to Ray were the closing words of Dr. Johnson's memorial message: "Ray didn't cause problems; he helped us solve them."

Two Bible College Alumni, Rev. Lonnie Sparks and Rev. Bobby Jackson, have been chosen for inclusion in the 1966 edition of "Outstanding Young Men of America." This annual publication, now under the direction of Doug Blankenship, past U. S. Jaycee president, is a compilation of the names of 10,000 young men between the ages of 21 and 36 who have "distinguished themselves in one or more fields of endeavor to the point of being outstanding."

Lonnie Sparks, native of Sulphur, Oklahoma, attended the Bible College from 1950 through 1954, graduating with the B.A. degree. He is now serving his second term as a missionary in Ivory Coast, West Africa.

Bobby Jackson, also a 1950-54 B.A. graduate of the College, is a well-known figure among Free Will Baptist people, having served as a full-time evangelist for 12 years. During his stay at the school he travelled extensively through the denomination with the Bible College Gospeliers Quartet.

Past editions of "Outstanding Young Men" have included such notables as Nelson Rockefeller (1941), John F. Kennedy (1946), and Dr. Tom Dooley (1956). The foreword to the 1966 edition will be written by President L. B. Johnson.

COLLEGE TO PROVIDE FOR LARGE CONFERENCE CROWD

The 1200-seat West High School auditorium has been made available to the Bible College for use during the 23rd annual Bible Conference April 3-7. Located one block from the College, each evening service, with the exception of the Sunday night session, will meet there at 7:30.

Cover Story A DREAM FULFILLED

January 16, 1966 - A date which will long be remembered in the minds and hearts of a large group of people gathered to help in the dedication of the lovely new church building in Greentop, Missouri. A dream of a church in their home town where the gospel would be preached as they believe it was shared by the Rev. Alta Mikel and her late husband, Gene, who died October 7, 1964.

Both Mrs. Mikel and her husband were born and brought up in the Greentop area. They retired from the business they founded, the Economy Gas Co., in 1957 and Mr. Mikel then assisted his wife in her pastoral duties. They served churches at Shibley's Point, Green Grove, Graysville, Martinstown and most recently, at Mendota, where she is still pastor. She is a Free Will Baptist who started preaching in 1938 and became a licensed minister in 1948.

After Gene's sudden accidental death, "the Lord whom we serve" directed and led Mrs. Mikel to build this church in memory of this consecrated man of God, and for the purpose of preaching and teaching the Bible, building up the believers and strengthening their faith and winning the lost both near and far away.

Attending the dedication were ministers from many different denominations and many miles away. The principal address given by Rev. Woodrow Matthews of Raytown, Missouri, pastor of Beacon Free Will Baptist Church. The other churches of Greentop sent beautiful floral displays. The auditorium, which will seat 200, was full to overflowing with chairs in the aisles and standing, but most precious was the sacred nearness of Jesus in our hearts as Sis. Mikel gave this beautiful brick building to the Lord in memory of this outstanding man of God, who often said to his wife, "Alta, what can we do to make this wicked old world better?"

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION
OF EVANGELICALS HOLDS
24TH ANNUAL CONVENTION
IN DENVER

Denver (CNS) - More than 1,000 pastors, denominational and mission leaders and laymen will meet here for the 24th annual convention of the National Page 4

Association of Evangelicals, April 19-21, at the Denver-Hilton Hotel where over 50 Protestant denominations will be represented.

Some of America's outstanding Christian preachers and teachers will lead delegates in considering the theme: The Evangelical Challenge - a people-topeople faith at today's Church frontiers.

The three-day convention will feature morning and evening public meetings and daily workshop sessions scheduled by NAE's ten commissions. The NAE affiliated organizations - the National Sunday School Association, the National Association of Christian Schools, the National Association of Religious Broadcasters and the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association - will meet concurrently with the convention.

Addressing the 1966 convention are: Dr. Jared F. Gerig, president of Fort Wayne (Ind.) Bible College and NAE; Dr. Howard P. Courtney, general supervisor of the Foursquare Gospel Church; Dr. Robert E. Picirilli, registrar of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tenn.; Rev. Louis King, foreign secretary for the Christian and Missionary Alliance; Dr. Malcolm Cronk, pastor of Wheaton (III.) Bible Church, and Dr. Harold Fickett, Jr., pastor of First Baptist Church, Van Nuys, California.

Dr. Mariano DiGangi, pastor of Tenth Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, will bring Bible messages each morning during the convention. The Rev. Gilbert Kirby, secretary of the World Evangelical Fellowship, London, England, and Dr. John H. McCombe, executive secretary of the American Bible Society, will also speak to convention luncheons and commission meetings.

A major subject on the agenda for the Commission on Social Concern will be "The Evangelical Faces the Challenge of of the Race Problem." "Federal Grants to Church Institutions" will receive careful study in the Evangelical Action Commission meetings and Dr. Hudson T. Armerding, president of Wheaton (III.) College, will lead an Education Commission analysis of "Academic Freedom on the Christian Campus."

NAE's annual "Layman of the Year" award and the winner of the church architecture design competition will be announced during the Denver meeting.

You see we don't have a Bible in their language so it is quite a problem for our Christians. However, it does prove one thing: If a Christian wants to witness and see souls saved, it can be done in spite of many problems.

We need your prayers desperately that the Lord will give us wisdom as we deal with people here and also that we will learn the Kulango language well.

To give you an example of the problems of working through an interpreter: There is a woman who prayed here. She has three small children but has never been married. She cannot understand a word of French. She can neither read nor write. We dealt with her through an interpreter, a teenage boy, and she wanted to ask the Lord to come into her

heart. Since there is no Bible in Kulango and she could not read it if there were, she must live by what she believes to be right. We know the Bible says "Thou shalt not commit adultery." She does not know that and would not understand the word adultery if we told her.

Since according to their custom, this is an acceptable thing. How does one explain adultery to a woman through a boy interpreter? We have no Kulango women here to translate for us. They don't go to school. They go to the fields.

Do you understand our need to know the Kulango language? If ever a person needed the gift of tongues, it is us because this is certainly an unknown tongue to us.

STUDY --- to KNOW --- to GROW

Does your auxiliary measure up to this slogan? Is it being effectively taught? Is it learning? Is it growing in concept and vision of missions and the individual and group responsibility? Study Course Chairman, this challenge is for you, for your auxiliary can "measure up" if you are faithful in the duties of your office. Be sure that you have the SALLY STUDY Packet. (Order from National Office.) It contains invaluable information - suggested programs, sample study courses, workshop guides, etc.

According to the new manual an A-1 auxiliary has to have only four study courses, the required courses are Manual and Missions. I would urge you to have at least one Standard Course during the year. Use supplementary materials along with the recommended books to make your classes more interesting. Personally, I think a study course chairman should be an avid reader. Magazine and newspaper articles can be used to excellent advantage in presenting up-to-date information, especially in courses in Missions, Stewardship and Christian Living. Use visual aids and skits and plays to add variety to the class sessions.

Be a PLANNER. Make a calendar. Use courses at opportune times. For instance, have a Missions study class in April, our Foreign Missions month - or one on Evangelism just before a revival or vacation bible school time. Advertise - posters, bulletins - and don't forget to use your telephone!

Two study courses that we (in our local group) have especially enjoyed this year, and I heartily recommend, are: "SOUL WINNING MADE EASY." Be sure and order the LP record that goes with the book. Also, for our standard course, we used both "NONE OF THESE DIS-EASES" and "NERVOUS CHRISTIANS." The themes are closely related. Order the skit, "Nervous Christians" too. Have a "problem-solver" time. I think you'll find a marvelous response in discussion time. Other books I personally like are, "The Larger Stewardship," "The Bible Basis of Missions", "In Unbroken Line" and "Prayer - Conversing With God".

Do try hard to be an A-1 auxiliary. But, remember, it's better to have one well-planned, informative and challenging study course than to have four or five that simply do not do the job.

THINK, STUDY, AND PRAY, and you will accomplish your goal - helping your church teach and support missions. If I can assist you in any way, feel free to contact me.

Beverages Are A Curse To Anyone

The Bible says, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise" (Proverbs 20:1). The Bible speaks against social drinking as well as habitual drinking. You may declare, "Oh well, one small drink will never hurt me." But here is a logical reminder: one drink makes you one-tenth drunk however you may feel about it.

To be spiritually, mentally, and physically fit, we must believe in "total abstinence" from any kind of alcoholic beverage in any degree. While the money gluttonous promoters make and sell these beverages, we need to be doing something to counteract their impact upon society by promoting Christ as the elimination or the cure.

God asks, "Who hath woe, who hath sorrow, who hath contention, who hath wounds without cause, who hath redness of eyes?" Then answers, "They that tarry long at the wine. They that go to seek mixed wine." Then He gives warning, "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder." (Proverbs 23:29–32). Although this scripture was recorded approximately 3000 years before this scientific space age, it pretty well describes the blight of alcoholic consumption.

The young person who is "eaten up with liquor" and "burned up with smoking" will naturally be twisted in mind, body, and soul. Take a lesson from nature: The crops that are damaged by fires, insects, and blights will be worthless if they even survive to a mature age. That is true of man too!

Much has been said about temperance, however, it has been misused and misinterpreted. Temperance generally means "moderation." Christians are to be moderate or temperate in partaking of food, in dress, and in other things that are not evil within themselves. There is an area of life, however, where temperateness is not enough. We need to realize that "total abstinence" is to be observed in things that are harmful to society, and one's body.

The consumption of alcoholic beverages has been called a "problem", however, a more correct term is "crime." Crime meaning: "a violation of the law; an offense against morality or the public welfare; wrong doing." It is a crime even though it is legalized. The laws of God make it a crime. It makes no difference if the supposed public norm identifies drinking as an act of social adjustment. It is still a crime and is a personal mal-adjustment which eats away at our civilization. Public norm can be wrong - many times it is wrong - leading to all sorts of crime. Crime is sin! There is a cure for sin: (1) understanding the sin and its nature, (2) finding a cure for that sin, (3) accepting or believing the cure for it, and (4) experientially turn from it. This will solve the problem!

Alcoholism is sin – a crime! Foregoing thoughts, scripture, and definitions have substantiated the crime of it beyond doubt. In fact, seeing the drunk and the blinding side effects in his life helps us understand the crime of it. It is evident everywhere you look.

To understand alcoholism better, we need to learn some basic facts. To get these facts, listen to a few quotes: "If any other disease (other than alcoholism) affected our citizens so much, a national emergency would be declared." Dr. William C. Menninger, Menninger Clinic, Topeka, Kansas: "Eighty million Page 10

adult Americans - 71 percent of the population over 21 years drink alcoholic beverages." Center of Alcoholic Studies, Rutgers University: "Ten percent of the population - 19 million people - are alcohol-dependent, and 5 percent - 9 1/2 million are alcoholics." Life Extension Foundation: "New cases of alcoholism are becoming known at the rate of 200,000 per year, while only 30,000 to 35,000 are being treated with some success of any one time." Dr. Seldon D. Bacon, Rutgers University: "An intimate connection exists between the words 'alcoholism' and 'disease.' Disease exists when any function of the body is impaired. Alcoholism is a self-imposed disease, like addiction to other drugs. It occurs only because the victim, not knowing his or her susceptibility in advance, chooses to take a chance to develop the acute and then the chronic state of alcoholism. The continuous use of alcohol as a drug will in time produce even in strong-willed persons a habit and state of mind extremely difficult to correct." Andrew C. Ivy, M.D., Ph. D., president, National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism: "Although FBI statistics show that women run afoul of the law only one eighth as often as men, drunkenness gets more women in trouble than anything else. About 112,000 of them are arrested for such a condition each year." Vol. 16, No. 6, LISTEN: "Legal liquor sellers thus outnumbered the churches by 101,052." (Year 1964) Bertha Palmer. This figure was taken from the annual report 1964, Internal Revenue Service, United States Treasury Dept. and Yearbook of Churches, 1965. There were 321,768 churches and 422,820 establishments for liquor distribution.

What is the nature of alcoholism? Well, the natural order of it may be given thusly, (1) Morally - religious, (2) Social, (3) Medical, and (4) Economic problems arise from it.

First, may I say, the alcoholic is an alcoholic because he is a sinner. By nature he has the tendency to drink, etc. After having inflamed himself with alcohol, he lowers his moral restraint to lowest types of crime. He deadens his physical feelings and depresses his central nervous system. A person who can't think straight can't go straight in any sense of speaking. As the Christian Civics Foundation of Missouri, Inc., Pastor's Personal Information states, "Alcohol is a narcotic. Like morphine and heroin, it is a depressant acting upon the central nervous system. It puts the brain to sleep...alcohol slows reaction time, thinking time and actually dulls the senses." This, of course, can be and is the cause of much manslaughter on the highways, immorality, profanity, divorce, and lack of child support. This makes it a criminal act too. "Thou shalt not kill" is commanded of the social drinker as much as of anyone else. William Standish Reed, M.D. wrote, "Several important factors create the carnage on the highways today. One is the placing of automobiles of extremely high horsepower in the hands of youngsters who are driving not out of necessity but for excitement and thrills. In addition, there is an increasing tendency for our present society to consider the drinking of beer and other alcoholic beverages as a normal part of life. One or two bottles of beer in the system of a youthful driver in a highpowered sports car spells potential fatality. THE HIGHWAY PROBLEM IS NOT THE CHRONIC ALCOHOLIC BUT THE SOCIAL DRINKER, whether teenager or adult. Alcohol dulls to page 15

For the first time in the history of Free Will Baptists, young people of our denomination will have the opportunity of becoming State winners in Bible knowledge activities, with the responsibility of going on to represent the State of Missouri at the National Association in Little Rock, Arkansas, July 11-14, 1966. The information below refers to the entrance rules for State competition to be held during the Teen session of Youth Camp this year.

BIBLE TIC-TAC-TOE

1. Must be a member of C.T.S.

2. Must be in grades 7, 8, 9. However, a young person 12 years of age in the 6th grade may participate on this team, provided they are in no other competitive activity.

3. Teams shall be composed of not more than four nor less than two members.

4. All team members must be members of the same local church.

 Dress for State competition will be: (Girls, dark skirt and white blouse; Boys, dark trousers, white shirt, black Free Will Baptist Gem tie.)

- 6. Deadline for entry June 1, 1966. Entry must have the names of members and alternates, if necessary. blanks will be mailed to each local church from the State C.T.S. Board.
- 7. Each church may send only one Tic-Tac-Toe team to the State competition.
- 8. Each team must have a coach. The coach may be an individual or a man and his wife. The coach, or an alternate, must accompany the team to the State competition.
- 9. An appropriate award will be presented to the winners.

BIBLE BOWL

The entrance rules for competition in Bible Bowl are identical to those of Tic-Tac-Toe, with the exception that the participants must be in grades 10, 11, 12. However, a 15 year old may participate if they are in the 9th grade, provided they are not in any other competitive activity.

It has been over two months since we published a News Letter and many things have happened in that period of time. We have seen a definite increase in attendance in all of our church activities. We now have about 90 enrolled in Sunday School and are averaging in the nineties in our total Sunday's attendance. have had two baptismal services year - one in January and one in February when a total of eight followed the Lord in Christian baptism. We have several more who are waiting to be baptized - perhaps sometime in March.

I have been very busy as an electrician, plumber, and carpenter this month. We are in the process of building an addition to our overcrowded Sunday School building. We have certainly appreciated the help of Mr. and Mrs. Brown, Helen's dad and mother, who have been a tremendous help in the heavy work load of yard work, painting, carpentering, etc. They will be leaving for Kentucky shortly after you receive this letter. Helen has seen an increase in interest and attendance in her three weekly classes that she teaches. Her Sunday School Class (Adult) has about twenty in attendance; the Religious Education class composed of 20 students from the Waipahu Elementary School meets with her and Mrs. Ralph Coffman at our church each Monday afternoon; the Ladies Bible Class which meets in the members homes on Thursday mornings has grown to an average attendance of fifteen. Brenda has been used of the Lord on the high school campus. She has been elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Future Homemakers of America in the State of Hawaii. We now have a Sunday school class of 15 hi-teens about Brenda's age and all but about three or four are saved. Bobby, our little boy, will be one year old on March 10. He sure is a live-wire - he can't be still even in his sleep. He certainly is enjoying having his Grandpa and Grandma Brown around.

We certainly appreciate your prayer and financial support; however the contributions to the "Land Fund" have been discouraging. With our heavy monthly payments plus our building, repairs, and general operating expenses we have seen a few tight places but God always lays the burden upon someone's heart and we have never been late in paying our bills yet.

We have recently seen four of our military men leave for duty in Viet Nam and we will see two more leave for this "Hot War" area within the next two or three weeks. Pray with us for them, especially for their families - some of whom are still with us.

We were happy to welcome Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Cox and their four children to our congregation this month. They come to us from the Free Will Baptist Church in Charleston, South Carolina.



Dear Friends:

Praises to Him that we're back in the land to which the Lord has called us. The trip was so quick it seemed almost like a dream. We flew Japan Air Lines from San Francisco to Hawaii in five hours. After a quick telephone conservation with Luther Sanders, we flew to Tokyo in seven hours where we were met Page 14

by Fred Hersey and Herbert Waid. After a couple of days of fellowship in their homes, we flew to Sapporo, Hokkaido in one hour. When we saw all the snow down below, we knew we were "home" again.

These few weeks since our arrival have been busy ones. We stayed in the home of missionary friend, Joe Richards, while looking for a place of our own. We do praise the Lord that He has provided an accepatable house in an area of the city where there is no church. It is a typical Japanese style house where the living room is used as the master bedroom. In other words, during the day cushions to sit on are put out on the straw mat flooring around a low table, and at night pallets are put on the floor to sleep on. Aileen says she gets her daily exercise folding these pallets two times a day.

The Hokkaido Association of Free Will Baptists had a very successful meeting January 8 and 9. The three organized churches seem to be doing well. The Koshimizu church is proceeding with the church building and is looking forward to having one of our Bible college students coming as pastor in the spring. Until then, I will be making the two hundred mile trip every weekend by train (8-10 hours one way). At the same time we plan to begin meetings in our home here in the city of Sapporo.

The children are glad they can attend an English-speaking school. They can reach the Hokkaido International School by city bus from our house. They're also enjoying the snow. There is much more snow than usual this year. It's piled up so high around our house that we can hardly see the sun when it shines. There is an 8-10 foot wall of snow all around our house about 6-8 feet thick. So, we are fenced in except for the two entranceways we shoveled out.

We're having our rounds with colds but so far we have managed to stay up and going. Pray for our health.

Thank you so much for your prayers and support that is making it possible for us to be here.

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the reflexes and creates sleepiness, and is far from being stimulant as many people think. Alcohol coupled with tranquilizers, such as miltown and equinal (to mention only two), is deadly. Drug manufacturers warn against this combination in their literature, but few people read what they have to say. As to the remedies - the basic one is to try to stop social drinking. Alcohol in any form has been proved detrimental to the intellectual, spiritual and physical lives of human beings. Those who teach their children to drink, intimating that it will help them from becoming alcoholics, are simply uniformed. They seek en excuse for their own lack of self-control. If people were to obey the laws of the spiritual life set forth in the Bible, not only would the highways be safe but our entire American society would be immeasurably improved." Vol. 27, No. 4, Christian Life. Murder is murder with an automobile whether you do it or the child you have taught to drink does it. To teach a child to drink is a moral sin.

When a society such as ours is given to alcoholic beverages it is in a terrible declining spiritual condition. A poor spiritual atmosphere produces a degrading social state!

Who wants to live in a society of social drunks? Many a young person has fallen into immorality over the beer can - just a social drink. Social diseases, illegitimate births, unsafe driving conditions, juvenile delinquency, filled penal institutions, mental disturbances, etc. are the results of a drinkcrazed society. Alcohol causes the worst sort of social sickness! Social sicknesses cause many medical cases and vice versa. So we must come to the next thought of the deviation from the normal functioning of the body mechanism through the use of alcohol. Abnormity in bodily function is a disease and April, 1966

that is exactly what drunkenness produces...self-inflicted disease! As little as one ounce of alcholo will produce observable symptoms. Less than that will produce symptoms that can be detected by scientific tests. The term "alcoholism" as a name for a disease must cover all conditions resultant from the effect of alcohol on man, from one drink to a score, from daily use to the Christmas-eggnog-once-a-year indulgence, from dietary use to deliberate seeking for drunkenness. Think of drinking and cancer: "Heavy consumption of alcoholic beverages has been linked to the development of cancer of the mouth and throat in a study conducted at three New York hospitals by Dr. Milton Terris, of New York Medical College, and Dr. Andrew E. Keller, of the Veterans Administration. The date, on 598 cases of mouth and throat cancer and an equal number of matched control patients without the disease, showed that heavy drinking was twice as prevalent among the cancer cases.

Drinking and smoking, when practiced together, seem to increase the chances for development of cancer; but, according to the study, each habit also seems to act independently of the other. In the study, heavy drinking arbitrarily defined as the consumption of 1.6 ounces or more of pure alcohol a day, or four or more drinks. It was emphasized, however, that the data probably underestimated the subjects true consumption of alcohol." John A. Osmundsen in New York Times. Use of alcohol lowers the resistance of the body to normally curb any disease. Millions of dollars are spent each year in research centers, rehabilitation institutions, penal institutions, extra law enforcement agencies, increased insurance premiums and payments, etc. because of this damning disease. Much of the cost is to the everyday taxpayer who never touches the drink. You and I help pay for the crime! The price of alcohol was summed up this way in Vol. 92, No. 11, Signs of the Times, "Alcoholic beverage revenues accruing to the Federal Government in the fiscal year ended June 30 (1965) exceeded \$3,500,000,000. Automobile accident costs attributable to the use of alcoholic beverages in the same twelve months totaled \$4,000,000,000. according to the National Safety Council. Expenditures last year for alcoholic beverages (more than \$12,000,000,000) and financial loss caused by alcohol-involved motor vehicle accidents could have furnished eight times the amount of money authorized by Congress for the antipoverty program. This does not include government expenditures for police, penal institutions, or mental hospitals in connection with alcoholism." Isn't this astounding? Alcoholism costs money! The medical problem involved is bad economically.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Really, the only way to prevent alcoholism is getting a commitment of the individual to Christ as early as possible - even during the first trace of accountability in childhood, however, we know many never receive any spiritual training. So you have a grown-up steeped in sin as result of no prevention leaving society with a person to correct in some way. In general terms, we think of broken homes depending on welfare and the problem with drunken drivers. This is hard to deal with. You have to support innocent children. One State penalizes all parties involved drunken driving. "New Jersey, which failed to convince New York State that it should raise its minimum drinking age to twenty-one, has taken drastic action to curb teenagers who drink while driving. Governor Richard J. Hughes has signed into law a measure that "gets off the road" drivers under twentyone convicted of drunken driving. Upon conviction such drivers are barred from driving for at least two years or until they are twenty-one - whichever penalty is greater. A second offense would bring mandatory ninety-day term in jail and suspension of driving privileges for ten years. THE LAW ALSO HOLDS RESPONSIBLE THE OWNER OR AN AUTOMBOILE INVOLV-ED in the conviction of a teenage drunken driver." Vol. 92,

Page 15

No. 10, Signs of the Times. We don't agree with any allowance of drinking any time but this is a good curb on drunken driving.

I feel that we need more men like the late Frank Ernest Gannett, manager of twenty-two newspapers, four radio and three television stations, who said, "I urgently request that no Gannett newspaper, radio or television station or any other media of public information shall ever accept any advertising of alcoholic beverages because I sincerely believe the liquor traffic to be one of the most destructive agents in our civilization. I trust, also, that great care will be used in excluding any other advertising which, in the judgment of the directors, will be injurious to the public. Our advertising should be honest in all its representations so that the public shall not be misled by it." The total elimination of all advertising of alcoholic beverages will help our cause.

There are three ways the Devil tempts young people to drink, etc., namely, (1) "Everybody else is doing it," (2) "Don't be a square," and (3) "It's a natural thing to do." Don't be fooled by the television commercials that make drinking look delicious and exciting. They do not show the effects of drinking, such as broken homes, unhappy homes, lonely children, murders, highway accidents, and other sinful acts that are committed because of strong drink.

Build for success - real success! Don't ever take the first drink!

THE MECHANICS OF REPORTING

Now let's take up some standard requirements. Always remember that the closer you can come to making your letter ready to print as sent in, the better it will be for everyone. Study letters; compare yours with them. (Writing news letters is a bigger job than most people think, so it is worth continual study.) Then, try to observe as many of these standard practices as you can. You can't follow all of them all of the time. Just do the best you can.

Write on one side of sheet ONLY. This is a "must."

Typewrite your "copy" if at all possible, using double spacing between lines. If this is not practicable, be sure your handwriting is legible to a stranger in a hurry. Avoid flourishes and fancy capitals. But PLEASE don't hesitate to send your letter in simply because you cannot type it.

Put your name, address and the date in the upper left corner of the first sheet. If there are more than two sheets, be sure to number them.

Put your church name and city or town next. Be sure to include the <u>state</u>; there are many towns of the same name in different states.

Make each item a separate paragraph. BE CAREFUL ABOUT NAMES. Write them clearly, spell them correctly.

Always give <u>dates</u>, not just "last Sunday," or "the third Sunday in November." Try to be specific. Say when the event took place or will occur.

Tell ALL the news. Don't forget your "Five Ws."

If you want your name printed, sign the letter with your name and title; that is, Correspondent, Reporter, Pastor, Clerk, etc. If you do not want your name printed, sign title only.

If you have an urgent and important news item and time will not permit covering it by letter, use the telephone or wire Page 16

the essential details in a night letter. It will get special attention.

Now, the best of luck to you! Remember, your editor does want the news from your church. Do the best you can and rest assured he will do his best to publish your news correctly and on time.
