

MEET YOUR STATE STEWARDSHIP-PRAYER CHAIRMAN

Much is recorded in God's word concerning our stewardship as believers, so let us take a few minutes and think upon this phase of our auxiliary work.

This office, while separate in National and State levels, is combined with the treasurer's office in the local auxiliary. However, each officer should feel their individual responsibility in promoting better stewardship.

Your study course chairman usually will conduct one study each year on this subject and many good books are available for this - two being "THE LARGER STE-WARDSHIP" and "MY MONEY AND GOD." These may be purchased at the FWB Book Store in St. Louis or the WNAC office in Nashville.

We need to encourage family altars and personal daily devotions among our members. "Depth", a devotional guide, written by the people of our denomination, is available through our CTS office and is a good aid. Order some today if your members do not receive this, and I'm sure they will be a real blessing to your hearts.

Good stewards need to spend time in prayer and this is an area we should guard. Emphasis on prayer should be given each meeting by the local program prayer chairman. She will also conduct the three seasons of prayer at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. In preparation for the season of prayer offerings for State, Home and Foreign Missions, the stewardship and missions chairman may work together.

There are many areas included in stewardship. Normally we think of our money and this is an important part, but only ONE part. What about our time, do we use the 24 hours each day to glorify God? What about our home - is it open to those who need help or comfort? What about our car and other material possessions do they belong to God and do we use them to bring others to services? Yes, all these are included in our stewardship. God has blessed we Americans with an abundance, but he expects us to use it wisely in the promotion of His Kingdom's work. May we prayerfully give our ALL to Him who has filled our cup to overflowing. Luke 16:10a He that is faithful in that which is least, is faithful also in much.

The color of sin is referred to as black. However there are those who are seeking to change its color to a dirty gray. In other words, some things that were a sin a few years ago are considered okay today. Sin is still black and wrong. It has not changed.

There are three sins being committed among teenagers today. They are not smoking, swearing, and stealing, even though I believe these three can contribute. Neither are they drinking, dancing, or dope. The three greatest sins among teenagers are rebellion, sensuality, and wasting time.

Rebellion among teenagers is seen and felt in the latest demonstrations and riots. The main thing I want to warn you about is that all rebellion, whether it be against the government, society, or your parents, is rebellion against God; therefore rebellion is a sin. Sensuality is a fulfillment of the lust of the flesh, particular in the areas of sex. The latest dances, fads, and fashions, and music all play their part in contributing to this sin. What you read and listen to also contribute. The sin of wasting time is seen around the country. The biggest waste of time is the silly ideathat you'll wait until you get older to serve God. Young people, time is quickly running out! "Redeem the time," Paul says.

These three sins, like any other, must be forgiven. Christ can and will forgive you. Ask Him to today. (Read Romans 10:13)

MOTHERS

Exodus 2:1-4

Perhaps one of the most moving stories written in the Bible is the one recorded in Exodus the second chapter. The scripture reads as follows: "And there went a man of the house of Levi, and took to wife a daughter of Levi, And the woman conceived, and bare a son: and when she saw him that he was a goodly child, she hid him three months, And when she could not longer hide him, she took for him an ark of bulrushes, and daubed it with slime and with pitch, and put the child therein: and she laid it in the flags by the rivers brink. And his sister stood afar off, to wit what would be done to him."

The first thing, a very important one at that, we notice about Moses' mother is the fact she had a Godly background. As a daughter of Levi we know that she was taught and knew about God. Her mother, no doubt, had been true to God and trained up her child in the way she should go so when she was old she would not depart from it. Moses' mother in carrying out what her mother had taught her was also honoring God.

Our world today needs mothers who will follow after the teachings of God. Our mothers today are too taken up with the things of the world to even have time to achieve the spiritual training they need. It is common sense to know that someone can't teach someone else something when they themselves know nothing of the matter. Too many of our mothers are out working to help provide for the family. I always had the understanding this was the husband's obligation. I can hear some of you mothers screaming now. "We wouldn't have what we have now if I didn't help my husband provide." I am convinced that you are telling the truth. However, the question I must ask you is: "Is your new house, new car, boat, and other things that important?" Are they so important that to obtain them you fail your children in providing for them the Godly background needed and they die and go to hell? Mothers, this is the most important job you can possibly do. This is a golden opportunity God has given to you. You are with your children more than any other person, at least you should be. Yours is the place to teach your children about God. Don't leave this important responsibility in the hands of some baby sitter, she hasn't the time nor the desire. Even if it means living in a cheaper house, driving an older car, doing without a boat, and other related things, won't it be worth it to know that you have placed Page 8

your children on the straight and narrow road that leads to Heaven and Life Eternal. That road is a much better road than the broad one that leads to hell and eternal death.

Getting back to our story of Moses' mother. She put the right value on her God given child. She realized that this child had something to do or else God would not have given him to her. Mothers, who knows but that God may have a job for your child to do that is just as important as the one He had for Moses. Does not the Bible say that children are an heritage sent from God? Again mothers, I ask you the question, "What is the most important thing you have?" If your answer to the above question was not your children, you need to go to God and let Him open your eyes.

Another important characteristic in any mother's life is her God-pleasing character. Moses' mother counted her own life as nothing to save the child God had given her, from death. She pleased God by simply doing His will. Are you doing God's will by your children? Are you taking them to church every time the church is conducting services? If not, you are not taking them often enough. Furthermore, a child is never to young to take to the House of God. The sooner they are started on the right path the better. Mothers don't fail your children by Failing God.

Moses' mother also trusted her child to God's care. She stepped out on the promises of God and took Him at His Word. More mothers need to do this today. Dedicate your children to God and to His service and God will use them to reach lost and dying humanity. If you do not yield them to God, satan will take them from you and use them to satisfy his own wants and desires. If God calls your child to become a minister or a missionary, please let God have His Way in your child's life. It may be hard for you to give up your child, but remember God gave His only begotten Son to die for you and me. Therefore, isn't it the least we can do to give your sons and daughters to Him and His service? Trust them to His care, then rest assured He will take care of them. Yes, mothers, even better than you can. Moses' mother had done all she could. She then turned her son to God's care. We must do this today also.

Moses' mother even obeyed God before man. Pharaoh had made the decree that all the baby boys born to the Hebrews must

be killed at birth. The mother of Moses chose to not report the birth of her son in direct defiance of the man who had the power to put her to death as well as her son. I am afraid that many times today mothers are guilty of taking man's advice above God's. Many books have been written about how to rear children. Some of them are fairly good. Others are not worth the paper they are written on. Even the best of man's books cannot come close to measuring up to God's book, the Bible.

Moses' mother also acted with Godgiven wisdom. Many times mothers act without consulting God. Many mothers want their children to be popular regardless of the cost. Personal character and virtue are sacrificed many times simply for a few minutes of popularity. Many times this is directly urged by parents. Mothers today need more wisdom than ever before because satan is working harder than ever to gain control of the minds of our precious young people.

This message is supposed to be to mothers, but I can't close without saying a word to the fathers.

Dad, don't put extra pressure on your wife by asking her to help you provide for your family. If necessary, do without some things you want and can't get without your wife working. She has a full-time job on her hands caring for your children. Also, don't shove all the responsibility off on the wife in regards to rearing your children. You are pretty important in the household, too. You do your job, mother you do yours, God will do His part and your children will be a tribute to you and Him as long as they

Mother, if you feel you have failed your children by failing God, just simply kneel right there where you are and ask God to forgive you. He will not only forgive but also give you strength to do that which is right. Mother, put your faith and trust in God, He will never fail nor forsake you.

One last word in closing. Mother, give your children the best you have. Remember they deserve just that. After all, they didn't ask to be born into this world. You asked God for them.

May God bless and keep you is my fervent prayer.

I have a Christian mother and I am thankful and grateful for her guidance and direction. I am forever indebted to her for this. I love her more for this than for any other thing she has ever given me. Your children will, too.

Missionaries like to be clean and healthy too... Never seem to get caught up, always tired. I wonder, is it worth it all? Yet, there's the man at the market and the children in the village. I promised to come back to see them. There's the village grandfather who accepted the Lord last week and the hostel boys. Their dedication to the




A HISTORY OF ONE YEAR

For nearly a quarter century, Free Will Baptist Bible College has stood as a unique institution because of its inflexible loyalty to a single purpose - to provide for every student a fundamental, Christcentered, Bible education.

Subordinating all other things to this one purpose has not been easy. Many modern-day trends in education are in direct conflict with the Word of God, and pressures are being exerted on Christian schools to conform to those trends. But Free Will Baptist Bible College cannot compromise her basic objective.

Since the founding of the school in 1942, when this purpose was first determined, its achievement has reigned supreme in the minds of those charged with administering her affairs. From a student body of 16 to over 300, that basic objective has gone unchanged, because we know what we're here for.

The Bible College has been constantly beset by needs during the past two decades, but never by a student shortage. Since that opening day in 1942, the school has operated at near capacity, and the Lord still sends more students each year. But facilities are becoming increasingly crowded. 
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PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING AND OVERFLOW AUDITORIUM

Capacity: Undetermined Approx. Cost: \$250,000

A physical education building will complete the first phase of the Development Program and become the transition into the second phase. In addition to providing facilities for physical exercise, the building will serve as an overflow auditorium for large crowds. The present auditorium seats 430. In one recent service of the annual Bible Conference sponsored by the College, the crowd reached nearly 1500, making it necessary to rent one of the downtown auditoriums. The addition of this overflow auditorium would be beneficial, not only to the school, but to other Free Will Baptist agencies as well.



ACADEMIC BUILDING

Capacity: 650

Approx. Cost: \$350,000

This 3-story Academic Building is the first unit to be constructed under the current Bible College Development Program. It will provide 15 rooms for classes now meeting in various locations scattered about the campus. Two high-capacity lecture halls and eight teachers' offices are also included in the unit. This building, with a central campus location, is scheduled to be opened during the 1966-67 school year.




WOMEN'S DORMITORY

Capacity: 100

Approx. Cost: \$300,000

Two dormitories on the Bible College campus are now housing the 97 young women enrolled during 1965-66. Only one of these buildings will continue to be suitable for this purpose in the future; therefore, the pressing need for a new women's dormitory is evident. Equipped to comfortably accommodate 100 students, this building will nearly double the present College facilities for women. It will include an apartment for the Dean of Women and a lounge for group meetings among the women students.



MEN'S DORMITORY Capacity: 125-150 Approx. Cost. \$350,000

The second unit scheduled for construction is this men's dormitory. This building will replace the two former apartment houses now being used for that purpose. Approximately 100 men are already being housed on the campus in crowded conditions with limited facilities. This dormitory will provide comfortable living quarters and an excellent atmosphere for study for the future pastors, missionaries, and laymen in training at the Bible College.

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and then she asked, "What makes you folks that have great faith? What is it you have?" You Eleanor, have sinned and cannot save yourself. You must fully realize that you are utterly helpless and lost without Jesus Christ. When you realize this, over half the battle is won. POINT NUMBER TWO: (Your Index Finger) Although, you have sinned, God loves you. "For God so loved the world (Eleanor) that He gave His only begotten son that whosoever (Eleanor) believeth on Him, should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3: 16). POINT NUMBER THREE: (Middle Finger) Because God loves you, He sent Christ to make a provision for your lost soul, Eleanor. "But God commendeth his love toward us (Eleanor) that while we (Eleanor) were yet sinners, Christ died for us (Eleanor) that while we (Eleanor) were yet sinners, Christ died

for us (Eleanor)" (Rom. 5:8). Now, POINT NUMBER FOUR: Because Christ died for us (Eleanor) you can receive Him into your heart. "But as many as received him to them (Eleanor) gave he power to become the sons of God" (John 1:12). And then if you receive Him, Eleanor, you can say, POINT NUMBER FIVE: I AM SAVED!!! "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved (Eleanor)" (Acts 16:31).

You know, Eleanor, I wish we could be around one another more, but anywhere you realize you are lost - whether it's walking down to the nurses' station, going to the grocery store, or sitting in your apartment - you can let or ask Christ into your heart. I won't be seeing you anymore, Eleanor, but I'll be praying for you and so, as I boarded the plane that day to fly from Montreal to Raleigh, North Carolina, I prayed, Help Eleanor, Lord, to see she is lost and cannot save herself and then help her to receive you.
