

FROM OUR COLLEGE

These are what we cautiously consider the most pressing needs. Total cost will probably exceed \$1,000,000. And we emphasize that this is an estimated figure.

We could mention the need for a physical education building, additional dormitories, and increased auditorium space. We are, however, concerned in this article only with the initial phase of the development program, providing for the first three units. We have appropriately named this phase the One Thousand Laymen Campaign.

GENERAL INFORMATION

BUILDING

Nothing like this has ever been attempted in the history of our denomination. The magnitude of it is astounding. The National Association of Free Will Baptists, meeting in Raleigh, North Carolina, in July of 1965, unanimously and enthusiastically approved plans to expand and develop the physical plant of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Raising the necessary funds for development is a humanly impossible task, but we believe that God will see us through.

Three units of the total master plan for development are immediate needs. First, we must build an academic building. Classroom space has long been a taxing strain on both professor and student. You will actually have to "see to believe" the conditions under which it has been necessary for students to study. This academic building, according to architectural proposals, will remedy these conditions by providing seventeen or eighteen classrooms and approximately ten staff offices. The cost is conservatively estimated at \$500,000.

Next we must increase our library space. The library, with approximately 15,000 volumes, has been a matter of constant concern for the last several years. Reading rooms, research areas, and stack rooms must be provided for its adequate development. The estimated cost for providing these facilities is \$150,000.

Equally as needful is a men's dormitory to house at least 150 students. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

ONE THOUSAND LAYMEN CAMPAIGN

The One Thousand Laymen Campaign in a nutshell is an appeal for 1,000 individuals to contribute \$1,000 each to raise the first \$1,000,000 of the Development Program of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Women will want to contribute, we realize, and ministers also who are in a position to do so. However, the general appeal, as the name implies, will be to the laymen.

"Impossible!" you may reply. But is it really impossible? Not at all. A staggering goal, to be sure, and the kind of thing never before attempted by Free Will Baptists. But all across the denomination there are clear indications that the people are ready for just such an undertaking, that they have a mind to work. We believe this challenge will be met by those whose hearts God has made willing. We feel it MUST be met.

THE DAYS AHEAD

Now let us share with you our proposals for meeting this challenge.

On February 18, fifty laymen from eleven states met on the campus of our Bible College to help plan and officially launch the One Thousand Laymen Campaign. Similar rallies must now be conducted in every area where there are Free Will Baptists.

The mammoth task of gathering the names and addresses of prospects, who eventually will be contacted and challenged to join the Laymen Campaign, is immediately before us. Pastors can be of tremendous assistance to us in this matter by sending us a list of men in their

Dear Friends:

WHY MORE BUILDINGS? The Need Evident

For years now the Bible College has been bursting at the seams. Its history is one of constant growth and everincreasing demands. But whereas past expansion has been measured in terms of thousands of dollars spent, the future will be measured in terms of millions. If past enrollment has been calculated in terms of millions. If past enrollment has been cal-

culated in terms of tens of students, the future will see hundreds. While past growth has been mostly for the improvement of quality education for ministers and missionaries, the future demands that greater educational opportunities be offered to Christian young people of every walk of life.

Free Will Baptists can no longer be satisfied with the operation that has been possible at minimum expense. When there were 100 students, a 25% increase would change the enrollemtn only to 125; at the present, a 25% increase over our 350 students would add 88 students in a single year! That kind of increase makes dormitories obsolete at a rapid pace.

Once upon a time, a few subjects taught to a few students could easily be handled in the bedrooms and living rooms converted to classrooms. That is no longer possible when individual classes regularly number up to 100 students. We are already far past the critical need for a new classroom building.

The same thing applies to the library. It used to fit well in the garage behind Davidson Hall; then it had to move to almost a whole floor in Richland Hall; now it occupies two floors in the office building. And it cannot stop there. The 6,000 volumes of 1959 have become 15,000 in 1966; and the figure ought to be doubled again. A new library building is a must!

And on and on the story goes. Shall we mention the acute need for increased auditorium space? Or were you one of those who had to be turned away at the last Bible Conference? Shall we mention the music building that is desperately needed? A physical education building? Teachers' offices?

The need is evident, and our people have indicated that they are aware of the need. We believe it is obvious that the best way to meet these needs is by constructing adequate buildings on the present campus. And we believe Free Will Baptists will be quick to respond – as they have always been – when this need is presented.

WHO CAN GIVE \$1,000?

"Not me!" you say. But couldn't you?

You might not be able to give \$10,000 in cash, yet many of us borrow as much or more to build or purchase a home. You might not be able to give \$3,000 yet as much is borrowed to purchase an automobile. You see, the truth is, we usually get what we want. And we make the arrangements to get the money we don't have in the bank. Do you want to be a part of the Laymen Campaign? We be-

lieve that you do. For your benefit we are listing several methods of giving.

The outright gift is, of course, the simplest method of giving. Perhaps God has blessed your business, your crops, or a recent business deal. You have made a good profit. A thousand dollar gift at this time would hardly be missed. Or you might have left an account to accumulate over the years, and now a nest egg has been created. You are looking for an investment. Why not invest in the youth of your denomination and the Kingdom of God? You will realize eternal dividends from a gift through the Laymen Campaign. You might even be in a position to give \$5,000, \$10,000, \$25,000, or more. We must have some large gifts somewhere along the way if we are to reach a truly large figure without stretching the campaign out over many

But you just simply might not have a thousand dollars on hand. We realize that everyone who will want to make a gift at this time will not be able to do so. In such cases, we make no apology in boldly suggesting that you consider borrowing the money. A few have already intimated such a desire. We believe that God's people (who are willing to borrow for cars, homes, furniture, and almost anything else they desire) will be willing to borrow to quarantee the college the buildings it needs to provide our young people the education they need.

We further suggest that to break your gift in two parts, \$500 now and \$500 a year or so from now, might fit your situation better, and you are the best judge of that.

Yet another method would be for you to sign a checkbook with us covering either twelve or eighteen months. Payments for twelve months would be \$83.50 per month; for eighteen months, \$56 per month.

If none of the methods stated thus far seem to fit, you might join with another individual, or two, and together make a unit gift of a thousand dollars.

Many will be able to give through the match gift program. We have a list of nearly three hundred companies in the United States who participate in matching the gifts of employees to qualifying educational institutions. Free Will Baptist Bible College qualifies and has been the recipient of a few such gifts in the past. For a gift of \$500, you could join the One Thousand Laymen Campaign through this program, since these companies match dollar for dollar any notable gift.

So it is quite evident that anyone with a reasonably good income could help in this campaign. In cases where both husband and wife work, the family income would approach ten or twelve thousand dollars, or perhaps even more. Even if the couple does not have the money in the bank, they can give \$1,000 by making their plans to do so during the course of the coming year.

What it all amounts to is dedication. God will enable us to do all we are responsible to do for His work. Free Will Baptist Bible College is a part of His work. The challenge of building a greater Bible College will reveal the depths of our denomination's consecration.

THE APPEAL

With the moral let-down of our day, with the corruption that has invaded college campuses across America, with the need for trained Christian workers in the office, hospitals, classrooms, pulpits, and mission fields facing us today as never before, can we turn a deaf ear to the Development Program of Free Will Baptist Bible College? No, we cannot and will not. We need an immediate response from you. Do something today.

You can do one of three things as you lay this tract aside.

1. You can ignore the whole matter, and Free Will Baptist Bible College will be hindered in her great work. Our youth will suffer for lack of adequate facilities.

2. If you are in a position to do so, you can send us a check for \$1,000, and we will be that much further along in the journey to success.

3. You can commit yourself to a method of giving other than the outright gift. Let us hear from you that we might know where you stand.

Yet our hearts are always stirred by the dear souls who cannot read or write but with all their might learn verse after verse to store in their hearts. What a glorious privilege is ours to teach the precious Word of God to such eager people.

MEET YOUR STATE SECRETARY-TREASURER

While each local Auxiliary will have several projects or activities during the year that are not listed on the annual report, it is necessary to report only the activities or projects listed on the annual report forms as these are the only information that will be used by the National Recording Secretary or Treasurer.

Other activities or projects of interest could be shared with other Auxiliaries by sending a report to the Woman's Page editor of the GEM by the Corresponding Secretary of the local Auxiliary.

Records and reports are not made just to take up time, be filed away and forgotten. Good records are a history of the Auxiliary to be used for future references and comparisons, and are a guide post of the present accomplishments and goals. The new Woman's Auxiliary Manual should be read frequently as a reminder of the methods and duties of each office. This manual and the necessary record books and report forms can be obtained from the WNAC office at P.O. Box 1088, Nashville, Tenn. 37202.

flew to three of our bush churches to preach and say farewell to the Christians there.

About ten minutes after we arrived at Kohlo a man came speeding in on a bicycle asking the plane to take a very sick young woman to the hopsital at Mseleni. She had been in obstructed labor for six days and was dying. Josephine continued with our service and I flew the man about five miles away where we found a field near the hut of the woman. Many people had gathered around her by this time and I first preached to the crowd of about 150 heather. I had prayer for the woman and we loaded her into the plane. The baby was born! I was quite overcome by joyful handshakes and the loud shouts of praise by her family and friends. I soon crawled into the plane to return to Kohlo but the plane refused to start. I was dumbfounded for this was the first time this had happened in 13 years of flying. After repeated effort it seemed and my family was stranded many miles from the mission. The Africans were quietly standing nearby sympathizing with my predicament and one man stepped forward and suggested that I pray again for this problem. We did and my

first push on the starter brought roaring response. The people just shook their heads in amazement. As I flew away I must confess that the missionary was equally amazed.

I slipped inside the thatched church at Kohlo as Josephine was saying: "Be not afraid...remember the Lord" from Nehemiah 4:14. It gave us real pain to hear their distress at our departure and their fears of the future. They have no resident pastor and Alice Mlambo, fine uneducated woman, is their leader but not knowing how to read is unable to help them a great deal. They presented Rebecca with a wooden handmade dish and two wooden spoons, Josephine a basket and beaded stick, me with one rand of money...\$1.20...to buy food on our journey. Then others brought roasted peanuts, cooked green corn, a roasted chicken, two live chickens to later be cooked for our journey.

You can well understand how we have two hearts these days ...one desires to remain here and the other to see our family and friends in America.

There is much one could say but we shall not waste paper when we shall soon see you.

Ken's Corner

Rules and regulations are a natural part of our society. It is always necessary to have a standard to live by. This is why there are stop signs, policemen, and even radar. The law of mathematics will always be two plus two equals four. The same principle applies to the Christian. There must be a standard to guide us and to inform us when we do wrong. This standard is the Bible. However, the standard of the Bible is no good unless you apply it to your own individual life. In other words, you yourself must have a standard or convictions to live by. It is shocking that so great a number of Christian young people have no convictions about what is right and wrong. The trend today is that everything is okay as long as you control it. This is a dangerous philosophy. Let me ask you this question: If everything is right, tell me what is wrong?

I am still convinced that there are wrong for the Christian. To give a list and name sins would vary among each of us. Let's put it this way: If your behavior or actions separate your fellowship and relationship to God it is wrong. Let's also remember that the Bible tells us to "flee youthful lusts". However, the trend today is not to flee the lusts, but rather to follow it. What kind of convictions do you live by? Check yourself. Another principle of the Bible is that if putting off certain things will make us a better Christian we should be willing to do so. This is what Paul was saying when he said "strive for the mastery." In other words, become the best possible. Set your goals high and press toward them, never looking back. "Don't let people look down on you because you are young, but let them look up to you because you are an example." (I Timothy 4:12)

Dear Friends,

We are grateful for the response to our initial effort on behalf of the 20+8 Campaign. Receipts as of May 31 totaled \$8,515.00.
