ables us to reach people who would otherwise be without a Gospel witness.



MEET YOUR STATE ASSISTANT SECRETARY, LEONA THOMPSON

In John 9:4 we find it says "I must work the works of Him that sent me while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work."

Since I am the State Assistant Secretary and the Chairman of the Credential Committee, I have charge of the achievement charts.

If all requirements are met, your auxiliary is classed as an A-1 auxiliary; if 8 are met, you are classed as B-1; if only 6 are met you auxiliary has a C-1 rating.

(1) Meetings - You must have 12 meetings a year with an average of at least one-half of the membership present. Meetings must be held each month and not two one month and perhaps none the following month.

(2) Membership Increase - The active membership at the first of the convention year must have a ten per cent increase during the coming year. The vice president is responsible for this point.

(3) Gifts - The Co-labor offering plan is the financial plan of the WMAC. Each month an offering should be sent through the proper channel which would be sent



through your State Secretary. The treasurer who is stewardship chairman is responsible for this point.

(4) Increase in Tithers - To reach this point you must have a ten per cent increase in the number of tithers. The treasurer is also responsible for this point.

(5) Membership Fee and Reports to Officers - Once a year all active members should pay thirty cents membership fee to be used for promotional work. The recording secretary and treasurer are responsible for these reports.

(6) Denominational Periodicals - One-half of the families of the auxiliary should subscribe to one or more Free Will Baptist periodical. The corresponding secretary

is responsible for this point.

(7) Special Prayer Seasons - There are three seasonal weeks of prayer, they are the seasons of prayer preceeding Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas with an offering for missions. The Easter offering goes for National Foreign Missions; the Thanksgiving offering goes for National Home Missions; and the Christmas offering goes for State Home Missions. The program prayer chairman and her committee lead in attaining this point.

(9) Personal Service Evangelism or Benevolence Activities - The members of the auxiliary should actively engage in some type of planned benevolent activity in the community at which it is a part or participate in directed soul winning efforts. The personal service evangelism chairman is responsible for these activities

(10) Missions - There should be a special missions emphasis at each monthly meeting of the auxiliary. The missions chairman is responsible for this point.

I have enjoyed being your assistant secretary and working with you. There is nothing I like better than being in the Lord's work. If I can be of any further help to anyone, feel free to write me and

I will do my best to help. Remember Article 7 in last years resolutions reads, "We recommend that all achievement charts be mailed to the assistant secretary, Miss Leona Thompson, Greentop, Mo. 63546, one month prior to the state meeting date." If for some reason you can't, or don't want to, mail them to me, be sure and have them to the state convention early and hand them to me. Will be looking for you and all your charts.

Setting: Courtroom

Action: The Prosecuting Attorney, determined to prove that the Woman's Auxiliary was a needless waste of time and a social club that takes wives and mothers away from their families and home responsibilities, called the officers of the Auxiliary to the stand. The officers, in defense of the Auxiliary's purposes and goals, entered various exhibits explaining their offices and duties in an effort to prove that they were attempting to answer the heart's cry of the missionaries on the field by supporting them in prayer and in many other ways.

Although the Prosecuting Attorney harassed and abused the defendants, and although the officers admitted that they had failed to do the job they should have done, they remained firm in their conviction that the Woman's Auxiliary was a necessary and vital part of the church.

The trial was not going well for the Auxliary and the ladies were fearful of the judge's verdict - but then a favorable and unexpected turn of events followed. A spectator in the courtroom volunteered to come to the assistance of the Auxiliary by being their defense attorney and his plea in behalf of the Auxiliary was most effective. Then another piece of evidence

At the close of the reading of this letter, the judge gave his thoughtful analysis and review of the case and then pronounced the Woman's Auxiliary completely and totally innocent of the charges brought against them and encouraged them to continue in their work.



Brief Reports from the National Association

Nashville, Tenn. - A spirit of unity was evident as some 3,000 delegates, ministers and visitors saw new highs reached at the 30th annual convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists in Little Rock July 11-14. The meeting was termed by spokesmen the most successful in the denomination's history as spiritual inspiration prevailed and major expansion programs were launched.

Messages by four outstanding Free Will Baptist ministers centered around the theme, "The Christian Imperative --World Evangelism." Dr. Robert Picirilli, moderator of the National Association and Registrar of Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, set the tone of the convention in an opening address in which he encouraged the assembly of laymen, ministers and missionaries to focus their attention on denominational integrity, the development of spirit-filled ministers, world evangelism and the edification of Christians. The convention speakers included the Rev. Ronald Creech of Durham, N. C.; the Rev. Russell Spurgeon of St. Louis, Mo.; the Rev. Wade Jernigan of Jerome, Idaho; and the Rev. E. E. Morris of Oklahoma City, Okla.

In business sessions, the national body approved a new all-time high budget of almost \$1 1/2 million and adopted a construction proposal for a Sunday School Department warehouse in Nashville.

In other business deliberations, the first phase of a multi-million dollar expansion program was announced by officials of Free Will Baptist Bible College. A men's dormitory and a classroom complex totaling \$1 million will be completed by the fall of 1967 on Richland Avenue, Nashville. The classroom building will accommodate 600 students, 10 teachers' offices, and a science laboratory.

The highest award offered a layman by the National Association of Free Will

Baptists went to Travis Ray Carter of Winfield, Ala. Chosen for his dedication and contribution to the denomination's work on local, state and national levels, Mr. Carter has been active in Christian work for 23 years. The 42 year-old father of two is a Sunday School teacher, secretary-treasurer of the Alabama State Home Missions Board, and the president of Alabama First Finance Company.

All four of the Association's officers were re-elected for another term during the meeting: Dr. Robert Picirilli of Nashville, moderator; Rev. Billy Melvin of Nashville, Executive Secretary; Rev. Malcolm Fry of Tucson, Arix., clerk; and Rev. Wayne Smith of Knoxville, Ass't. Moderator.

Other major highlights of the four-day meeting included the national premier showing of an evangelistic motion picture filmed in Brazil under the sponsorship of the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Board. "Carnival of Pretense" is the story of a search for reality in a world of make-believe, and points to Jesus Christ as the only way to true peace. The film is part of a "strategy of penetration" utilizing literature, radio and motion pictures for maximum outreach in South America's largest nation, Brazil. A Spanish edition foruse in Spanish-speaking Latin America is planned. The English edition will be used throughout the United States in teen evangelism and missions promotion.

Youth contests, a function of the Association's Church Training Service Department, resulted in two victories for Missouri teams in the two major Bible quizzes. One hundred and thirty-five youths participated in the various declamation and Bible contests.

Eleven foreign countries and 45 states were represented at the convention. The quarter-million member denomination has 2,500 churches in the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii.

Bro. Harry Beatty, who is usually with us at our quarterly meetings, was unable to be withus at this time and he was truly missed by all.

The next quarterly meeting will be held in September at the Belton FWB Church in Belton, Mo.




"MR. & MRS. YOUTH CAMP FOR 1966"

you as a thief.

Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober."

We live in a world of great expectations today. Through the mediums of communication we have seen and heard the orbiting of man around the world, and we expect to land a man on the moon by the end of this decade. We are constantly barraged on every side by that which we can expect to happen in the fields of transportation, medicine, science, etc.

What a tragedy that so little is known about the greatest expectation of the Christian, the second coming of Christ! Misconceptions are rampant concerning His coming because of an ignorance and lack of Biblical teaching. Because of wild tangents that some have enlarged upon in regard to this greatest event of all, there has become a dearth of preaching on this great event. In truth, I am afraid that many Christians go for weeks at a time without ever really thinking about the fact that Christ may return today. In view of this I feel strangely compelled to speak to you concerning three things on Christ's coming again: The fact of His coming, the manner of His coming, and the indicators of His coming.

Many today have discarded, as obso-

lete, the theory that Christ will literally come again. Perhaps some of the most surprised people at His second coming will be many religious leaders. If Christ come not again, then He is the greatest liar of all, for He told His disciples, "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

At the time of His ascension, when Christ had given His apostles their final commission, as the cloud received Him out of their sight two men in white apparel said to them, "Why stand ye gazing here, ye men of Galilee; this same Jesus shall come again in like manner as ye have seen Him go".

After the day of Pentecost there are over 150 references to the fact of the literal return of the Lord.

We who loudly boast of our belief in the authority and the infallibility of the Word of God would do well to allow this important truth become our motivating factor of life in an age that is characterized by grasping after those things which appeal to the five senses of life.

From the practical side, the second advent is not the mighty spiritual force it should be in the lives of professing Christians because they have lost sight of its imminency. We cannot live just any kind of life, nor remain indifferent regarding the need and the peril of lost souls around us if our hearts are truly gripped by the fact that Christ may come today.

As Jesus' going away was personal, so shall His coming back be personal. In the text of the sermon we have heard the words, "The Lord" will return. In the parable of the absent householder in Mark 13, the householder HIMSELF returned to bring into account his servants. In the parable of the talents the Lord HIMSELF returned to ask for an accounting from his servants

When a relative goes away, we say,

"Come again soon". One day they come back to your home. You don't just imagine it; you don't just feel it - they come in person.

Jesus said, "I am coming again". His coming will be sudden. "For as the lightening cometh out of the east and shineth even unto the west, so shall also the com-

ing of the Son of man be".

I Thessalonians 4 portrays His coming

as that of an avenging king leading his army with sudden descent into the enemy's unprepared camp, to rescue those who are his. A day of joy and liberation to his own; a day of tragedy and travail to his enemy.

Thought about the advent of Christ in glory immediately turns one's attention to the times and signs involved, and the question comes, "Is the day of the Lord foreknown?" The answer to this is that by unbelievers it cannot be known. Such are in darkness. For them, the day of the Lord will be unexpected.

I Thess. 5:2 "For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night."

II Peter 3:10 "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up."

Rev. 16:15 "Behold, I come as a thief. Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments, lest he walk naked, and they see his shame."

Unbelievers shall be caught off-guard and unprepared, just as the wicked steward was unprepared for his master's coming and as the foolish virgins were unprepared for the coming of the bridegroom.

Not only to unbelievers unexpectedly but also suddenly, for "when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them..." I Thess. 5:3.

A false sense of security will be drawn by ungodly men from world organizations, defense organizations, and international covenants. Those who put their trust in these are described as the children of darkness. They are those who seek pleasure, wealth, power, indulgence, and satisfaction from the things that come from earthly security. They will be among those whom Peter referred to as mockers: "...all things continue as they are...". They are those whom Jesus described as "...eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage...". They will be like the people of Sodom in the days of Lot. The coming of the Lord shall come catastrophically and finally. I Thess. 5:3"...then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child...'

However, the situation for the believer is not to be the same. As is indicated in the text of the sermon, he is not to be ignorant of the time. Christ tells us that His return will be marked by certain signs but the exact hour and date are unknown by any man. But there is a definite scriptural teaching that the believer is to be aware of the era of time in which the Lord shall return.

Just as the scribes and Pharisees, through close scriptural study, could have known the era of time in which Christ aws to come the first time, so is the church today to be aware of the signs that are indicators of the second coming of Christ. Jesus Himself said that when certain things begin to happen, lift up your eyes, for your redemption draweth nigh. We are not to live in darkness. On the contrary, we are to be looking for His coming. THIS IS THE MARK OF A TRUE BE-LIEVER. We must take seriously the biblical teaching and promise of the Lord for we are told, "the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world; looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour, Jesus Christ."

The writer of Hebrews says, "...unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time without sin unto salvation". As signs of His coming are fulfilled about us, believers are to lift up their eyes. What do we see? Do we see world evangelization? Do we see the return of Israel? Do we see the building up of the Russian confederacy? Do we see the apostasy from biblical Christianity? Do we see indulgence in sex, immorality? Do we see an increase in travel and knowledge? Do we see the conquering of the universe by atomic power?

If so, let us note that these things August, 1966

point to the near-coming of the Lord. Paul encourages and exhorts us to be alert. Phillips translates it, "We men of the daylight should be alert, with faith and love as our breastplate, and the hope of our salvation as our helmet".

It is an abnormality for Christians who are looking for the coming of Christ to be walking in carnality as the world walks in darkness and in sin. The attribute of a believer is that he is awake, that he is watching, that he is living with radiant joy and expectation of the greatest event in the history of the world.



Although this is a Layman's Breakfast we hope you'll bring your Pastor along. We'll be looking for both of you!





REGAN TO SPEAK AT SUNDAY SCHOOL-CTS CONVENTION

"Why should I go to church? If I want to know the Bible, I'll read it, not go to church. Churches don't teach what's in

the Bible, anyway."

This was the answer a non-churchgoer of my acquaintance gave when asked how he happens to know the Bible so well but doesn't attend church. I would grant the truth of his first assertion – one can learn the Bible without going to church; I would further grant the truth that he implies, namely, that it is important that everyone read the Bible well enough to know it.

Now, what about his final statement that churches don't really teach what's in the Bible anyway? Most of us, I suspect, would get just a little riled and say it isn't so! But I'm not so sure. How well do you know the Bible? How well do the highschool students in your church really know the Bible? Did the young people who graduated a year or so ago know it well enough to remain faithful to their commitment to God? Do all of the people who grew up in our churches still attend, or did they decide that church didn't really have anything important to teach after all? Thousands of young people, reared in the church and in Christian families, know very little about what the Bible has to say on specific subjects and very seldom turn to it to find an answer to the demands of everyday living.

Our CTS program is designed to remedy this deficiency, not only among our young members, but among our old ones as well. One of the highlights of our church year in Missouri is the State Association, which meets this year in Lebanon. The very first program (August 22, 7:30 p.m. DST) is sponsored by the State Sunday School and Church Training Service Board; that program is our annual Sunday School and CTS Convention.

The convention program, limited this year to the single session on Monday evening, will include the usual fine songs, choruses, and presentation of awards.

The real attraction of the convention, however, will be the Rev. Nelson Reagan of St. Louis. I've heard him, and I think he's terrific! I'm not going to tell you what he does (frankly, I'm not just certain

what name to give it), but I can warn you not to miss it. I think you'll say Nelson Reagan gives the most impressive, highly original presentation of a Christian subject you've ever seen - or heard. You come on out and see him, hear?

This could be the beginning of a new emphasis in your life and in the life of your church. Let's begin to learn - and to teach - what the Bible really says. Nothing else is important enough to take all that time we spend at church.
