

ARKANSAS PASTOR MOVES TO MISSOURI



MISSOURIAN ADDED TO STAFF AT OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE



Moore, Oklahoma - Additions to the administration and staff of the Oklahoma Bible College include one native Missourian according to a recent announcement by Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, president.

Joining the staff are the Rev. Eugene Workman, formerly of Springfield, Missouri, and his wife, the former Marjorie Hinton, a native of Bailey, North Carolina.

Mr. Workman will come to the college as registrar, supervisor of mens dormitory students and a teacher of Bible and Speech. He attended Southwest Missouri State College, Springfield, and was graduated from the Free Will Baptist Bible College at Nashville, Tennessee. For the past two years he has pastored the First Free Will Baptist Church at Glasgow, Kentucky, and served as City News Editor of the Glasgow Daily Times.

Mrs. Workman will serve as supervisor of women dormitory students and as secretary to the president. She will also assume some teaching duties. She, too, was graduated from the Free Will Baptist Bible College.

NORTH CAROLINA ALUMNUS DIES IN COLLISON

Rev. Ernest Bowen, 22, a 1966 graduate of the Bible College, was killed on July 15 in a head-on automobile collision near his pastorate in Belvoir, N.C. A native of Durham, N.C., Bowen apparently lost control of his car on the rain-slick highway and died instantly in a collision with an approaching vehicle. His wife of four months, Vicki, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Lonnie Graves, survived the crash.

Funeral and memorial services were conducted by Rev. Ron-Page 4 ald Creech in Belvoir and Durham. Large crowds were present at both services.

Members of the Belvoir Church said that during the three months Bower had pastored there, great strides forward had been seen. It was reported that 11 decisions had been witnessed on the Sunday prior to the pastor's death and that his hopes were high for a community revival.

Bowen is the second member of the 1966 graduating class to die in the past five months, following the death of Ray Lee last March.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION APPROVES \$135,000 BUDGET FOR BIBLE COLLEGE

A \$135,000 general fund gift budget has been adopted by the National Association for the Bible College's 1966-67 school year. An increase of \$15,000 over last year, the new budget represents a step-up of 12 1/2%.

State gifts to the general fund totaled over \$108,000 last year, more than has been received during any previous year in the history of the school. In addition to general fund gifts, the Expansion Campaign brought in over \$60,000 in cash donations to the building fund, also reaching a new high for the school.

In the light of the above record, Dr. L. C. Johnson, president, said, "We feel that this year's operation has been one of the highlights of all the years in the history of Free Will Baptist Bible College." Concerning prospects for next year, he said, "The 25th year, which we plan to celebrate appropriately, faces us with the greatest challenges we have ever known. These responsibilities do not depress us because of their magnitude, but rather challenge us because of their prospects.

EXPANSION CAMPAIGN REACHES \$135,000

Gifts of \$67,017 in cash and other assets, combined with \$67,981 in commitments, bring the mid-year Expansion Campaign total to \$134,998, according to Campaign Director Jack Paramore. In the six months since the drive officially opened, twenty-four \$1,000 gifts have been made to the Bible College, and seven gifts in excess of \$1,000 have been received.

Funds to expand the Bible College facilities have come from many sources. A check for \$100 was received recently from Cofers Chapel Free Will Baptist Church in Nashville, Tenn. It was their Vacation Bible School offering which the children felt should be sent to the school in order to "help train the mission-

aries." A \$500 check from a North Carolina youth camp came as the result of promotion work done by the Expansion Campaign's North Carolina representative, Rev. Bill Robinson.

Robinson's own church, Shady Grove, in Durham, N. C., recently sent the Bible College a check for \$1,445, including several match gifts yet to come. Another check, for \$1,520, was presented to Dr. Johnson by Rev. Johnny Eason from his church, Davis Free Will Baptist Church, Davis, N. C.

With a number of other gifts reported during the month of July, it is estimated that the campaign total has reached

\$150,000.

BIBLE COLLEGE ENROLLED 354 STUDENTS LAST YEAR

Three hundred and fifty-four students enrolled at the Bible College last year, stated Dr. Robert Picirilli, registrar, in his report to the National Association. A break-down of this record enrollment revealed that 203 men and 151 women attended the school. Ministerial students numbered 120, with 50 students registering as missionary candidates. Students came from 30 states and two foreign countries.

from page 9 BIBLES FOR COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA?

Lubbock, Tex. (MNS) - "Moscow has gone into the Bible publishing business," says an article by Leo Heiman in The Missionary Crusader (July, 1966). The Bibles are with commentaries which turn them into propaganda tools for the Communists.

The report continues: "Milton Obenge, a young African from Kenya who arrived in Nicosia by Olympic Airways, en route to Athens and Rome, disclosed that Communist-front booksellers and magazine dealers in East and West Africa are now peddling three re-written and 'updated' editions of the Holy Book. 'The True Bible' printed in English, French, Swahili and Portuguese by the publishing department of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, purports to debunk, unmask and expose the lies and falsehoods of the Christian Bible disseminated throughout Africa by European missionaries over the past 150 years.....

"The True Bible," which copies the format and printing method of standard missionary Bibles, goes on to explain how Christianity was forged as an instrument of reactionary and feudal classes, who stole the ideology of Jesus and corrupted it for their own nefarious uses...." Christian missionaries are viewed as those who spearheaded the colonization of Africa and Asia by European imperialist powers. Page 10

"The Illustrated Bible" is directed toward illiterates and primitive semi-literates. It contains illustrations implying the same accusations against Christians.

The third book being circulated is entitled "Stories from the Bible" and also depends heavily on cartoons to attack the West. Cain, for example, is depicted as an American soldier who kills a Vietnamese "Abel."

Soviet cultural attaches in East Africa deny that "The Illustrated Bible" has been printed in the USSR or distributed by Soviet agencies, Mr. Heiman says.

WHY THE LACK OF STUDENT VOLUNTEERS

Philadelphia, Pa. (MNS) - In the current issue of the Evangelical Missions Quarterly (Summer 1966) Charles H. Troutman discusses the shortage of missionary candidates under the title "What

Really Keeps Students from Volunteering for Missions?"

At the top of the list of reasons for slow response he notes "the psychology of the closed door" which he says "has so permeated missionary thinking that it is now taken for granted."

Mr. Troutman says the student is asking whether there will be any doors open for him when his training is completed. He needs more than newspaper headlines and the "closed door" approach to help him respond to God's call.

"The presence in the United States of so many able-bodied ex-missionaries" is viewed by Mr. Troutman as a bewildering matter "that never seems to be explained satisfactorily to potential candidates." It causes them to wonder what their chances are of "a full life of missionary service."

"Another obstacle to enthusiastic missionary volunteering is the faulty impression given of the relationship between the missionary society and the national church," Mr. Troutman believes.

The subtle, often unexpressed feeling of the student that missions are not doing the right things, to meet today's situation is described as the obstacle of "Non-revolutionary Missions."

In the rather lengthy article Mr. Troutman explores a number of areas of concern related to the problems outlined in the major divisions mentioned above.

REVIVAL! IS IT POSSIBLE?

Are you real sure of the need of revival? If you are, why are you so sure? Understanding the need should make each one pay the price for it. If you're not sure of revival need, you certainly need one! At any rate, we should beyond doubt see the urgent need of the hour.

Indifference is widespread. Formalism has robbed our power. Ceremony has become our service. Tradition has become our goal. Atheism, communism, and the philosophy of this age has hounded us. The ecumenical compromise of many citywide minister's meetings, etc. has hindered the fundamental stand of many of our ministers. This is a fact to be traced from community to community over America. It tells a sad story - a story of backslidings and apostasy. None of us are immuned!

There is a great company agreeable to the present false prophets of this earth. Most religion is going with the crowd the crowd of popularity and compromise. In the midst of this, it is increasingly difficult to sift through the perpetual propaganda of today and decipher the truth. One of the most damning lies being polished and believed today is "it makes no difference what you believe, who you believe, what you join, what you propagate, whom you align with, etc., so long as you are sincere about it and it is religious." This is a concoction of the devil and has already led many ministers, churches, and governments astray. Ecclesiastical pride, men's admirations, official aspirations, and sectarianism has kept us from the call of personal evangelism and true bible preaching.

There is a great drift from the Bible. It is dangerous to leave the book. A preacher is to be "holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers" (Titus 1:9. It is easy to make shipwreck in the hustle of the world. There is a great religious hustle. You may attend church services regularly while making shipwreck. Going to worldly gain churches, listening to false prophets, and reading Christ denying literature all contribute to the shipwreck of many a good sincere person. For example: It is an alarming fact that liberal minds in the clergy should go on record as approving "deviate sexual acts 'privately and discreetly engaged in between competent and consenting adults' should no longer constitute a crime." In contrast, what did God say about it? "Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived: neither fornicators, nor idolat-Page 14

ers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind" (I Cor. 6:9).

The theories and ever present blinding effects of the 'new' morality, musical madness, sex deviates, sorcery, television trends, increasing alcoholic and narcotic problems, street demonstrations, cheating, espionage, political boasters, theological revolution and the rise of the liberal modernisticsocial church institution playing politics and hands with everything should also present the need of a real revival for survival. Yes, we need revival to survive physically, financially and spiritually!

One of the most chilling statements which we have heard in recent days is attributed to Guss Hall, the number one communist in the USA, taken from the pilgrim torch, April 1961, and which was first given by Guss Hall before the 8th National Convention of the Young Communist League in New York in May, 1937, then later repeated in early 1961 at the funeral of communist Eugene Dennis, who was then chairman of the communist party.

Guss Hall said, "I dream of the hour when the last congressman is strangled to death on the guts of the last preacher – and since Christians seem to love to sing about the blood, why not give them a little of it? Slit the throats of their children and drag them over the mourner's bench and the pulpit, and allow them to drown in their own blood; and then see whether they enjoy singing these hymns."

Doesn't this further describe the need of old-fashioned revival to change the minds and hearts of devil bent men? Yes! And all this is alarming. It places a demand on each of us; either we turn further away from God in backslidings or nearer to him in revival to unadulterated Christianity. The pressure is on! We must become so dedicated as to be wreckless for the cause of Christ.

Revival! Is it possible? Yes it is? Not everybody will be revived but we need people revived to take a stand in the face of danger – increasing danger. Do you want revival? If you do, seriously ponder the following simple way to receive it.

"Elias was a man subject to like passions as we are, and he prayed earnestly that it might not rain: and it rained not on the earth by the space of three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth brought forth (revived) her fruits," (James 5:17-18).

In II Kings 2:1-16, we understand Elijah had ascended - gone to God. Had God departed too? Or does he still work

among men of the earth? Your answer is quite obvious! What mighty men have passed on to their reward but God is not dead and his cause still lives on. He is here and anxious to give revival in this sin-torn world.

We talk about revival in this manner too many times: "The good ole days," "The good times," etc. and sign "The revival times have passed – you never see it any more—the world is too wicked" etc. But remember revivals are not dependent on 'the good ole days' and 'the old folks' and 'the good ole times' and neither is the world too wicked or God too weak, or, neither is he dead! God is still here and His people are still here. God has given Christian men a commission to preach and this preaching was to borne out of a close walk with God which produces a compassion for sinners. Love covers a multitude of sins.

Let's think of the God of revival, Elijah's God, the God of yesterday. The bible says he is "the same yesterday, today and forever." This makes Him present now forward. God presently does three things for His children: (1) God is the God who hides His people. "In the time of trouble He shall hide me" (Psalms 27:5). Ahab sought Elijah's life and God said, "Go hence and turn eastward and hide thyself..." (I Kings 17:3). The devil would defeat us but God hides us behind the cross; (2) God is the God who provides for His people. "Thou shalt drink of the brook; and I have commanded the ravens to feed thee" (I Kings 17:4). The devil would spiritually starve us but God feeds us of the bread of life; (3) He is the God who guides His people. Every step Elijah took was by divine direction. "The word of the Lord came unto Elijah" (I Kings 17:2). The devil would mislead us but God guides us by the way of the cross. What was the secret of Elijah's revival?

The "God is dead" issue is sickening to us. We detest it. We know God is real. We know where he is. We know what he is doing. But where is God's Elijah? This is the more important question. This is the man we are looking for. Yes! God is real. We need Elijah pastors, evangelists, and leaders. Fine! Good! But what we need most is some 'praying', 'obeying', 'staying' Elijahs!!

Wherever you find God's Elijah you will find a man who prays, obeys and stays with the Lord and His word: (1) a man who prays. Elijah was preeminently a man of prayer. Behold him out on Mt. Carmel praying for God to send fire to consume the sacrifice. See him praying

PLACE THE **PASTOR** THE

REVIVAL

The pastor of a church must never underestimate his place and his responsibility in order to have a revival in his church. Revival comes from God but only after the church has come to the place where they are willing to pay the price for revival. Confession of sin is necessary when sin is present in the church. There must be a genuine love among the brethren. The church must become a burdened church for lost souls andthen prevail in prayer till revival comes.

What place does the pastor have in a church that is experiencing revival? The pastor is in a place of leadership and must lead the way if the church is to experience revival. I doubt that a church could rise above an unconcerned pastor. The pastor's enthusiasm must be great enough to become contagious, or his church will not be moved to work for revival.

I know that many of our pastors are handicapped as to the amount of time they are able to spend in pre-revival effort. Prayer meeting and visitations are essential. The pastor must enlist every member of the church help in the revival effort. Success or failure of the revival certainly is influenced by the willingness of the church to work with the pastor for revival.

Sometimes the church may call a man as evangelist that might not be of the pastor's choosing. He may have had his favorite preacher in mind for the meeting. But unless he is willing to work with the evangelist, regardless as to whose choice the evangelist may be, the revival will be hindered. The pastor must stand in the gap and with the help of God and the leadership of the Holy Spirit prepare the way and when the evangelist arrives, stand behind the evangelist for the success of the revival and the salvation of souls. God will reward the pastor for his faithfulness, not for his likes and dislikes. May he never become envious of the evangelist. During the revival it is easy to preach when the power of God is moving and souls are being saved. Don't let Satan get in your heart, dear pastor, when the church may be giving the evangelist the credit for the success of the meeting, just praise God and work harder for more souls. Work on good pastor, that when the meeting has come to a close, the revival will continue on in your church.

seven times for rain. Hear James say, "Elijah was a man of like passions with us and he prayed"...pray, pray, pray! We all agree we need to pray more. What makes prayer effective? Prayer is effective from: (2) a man who obeys. God works through men - not animals, things and gadgets. We so often limit God by our unwillingness to obey him. Elijah's willingness was wonderfully tested. Take the command to go to the valley brook. The king might find him. It wasn't far from the palace. But "He arose went." Take the command to go to the poorgentle widow's house when the brook failed. Would he live off of a widow? But "He arose and went." Take the command, "Go shew yourself to Ahab." Would not Ahab kill him? "But he arose and went. You just don't pray when you fail to obey! We can't expect God to answer a prayer we don't try to answer ourselves. We have something to do too. (3) You find a man who stays when you find God's Elijah. He stood on God's eternal word. His motto was "No surrender." He believed God in all circumstances. When God placed him there he stayed until God said move on. God said it. He believed it. September, 1966

That settled it. "Stand" implies so clearly: Stand - hold your ground - obey; obey - take your ground - pray; pray and pray and pray until you get the answer!

We have a great God but our God needs a people who are great - mighty to pray mighty to pray through.

This is the way to revival. I believe it. "O Lord, help me to have it."

PASTORAL CALLING

One of the most touchiest subjects that I know about is our thought for this month: that is PASTORAL ELECTION.

Basically a lot of this is my own thinking, but after you read it I believe you will have to agree it is practical and true.

In our area we have two methods of electing pastors.

1. The annual call.

2. The indefinite call.

First, look at the annual call each year. I am not saying this method is wrong, but it sure has a lot of disadvantages. If a church or pastor uses this type of electing a pastor there must be a close relationship between the church and the present pastor. Every year when it comes time to elect a pastor the usual race is on: Churches will run two or three, sometimes four ministers and the best man will win. This is wrong. What pastor would take a church under these circumstances? Some do.

Generally, when this takes place the usual politicking starts (and the preachers are no exception).

A minister should not talk to anyone unless they are sent by the church, or the officials of the church.

Some sorehead who doesn't like the present pastor goes out on his own and asks several preachers if they will accept the church. Generally this is not the feeling of the majority of the church.

I don't think preachers should work against each other, but yet they do. Several years ago I made this my policy, when a group comes to me relative to pastoring their church, I want to know what the feeling is of the present pastor. We should go to him and if he feels his work is not finished, I will not run against him.

This does not apply if the preacher is not sound or is preaching something rather than our doctrine. I read in a book recently, "The Minister's Mission", the following statement: Our men in in Congress in Washington, D. C. could learn a lesson in politics from preachers and the way they operate. This is a shame.

The members of churches are guilty of politicking sometimes weeks ahead of election time. I know what I am talking about, they sow discord among the members, go out and gather up people who haven't been to church for a year or more and get them to yote for their man.

When it is all over these people are never seen, never pay, or take any part, and the pastor is with people who have been Page 16

faithful and the backbone of the church who never voted for him.

Also, people will go out and get members to send in their vote. This has its disadvantages. We are not in a popularity contest to get churches.

So many people say our pastor is a good mixer, fine personality, etc., but he can't preach a lick.

Friend - this man has missed his calling.
God calls men to preach - not to be a gin hand.

2. The Indefinite Call. Every pastor who has the work at heart has some definite plans and goals to achieve as he takes over his new work. He cannot hope to get this done in a year's time, as he barely becomes acquainted with the people. So here is the advantage of the indefinite call. By this we mean, a pastor is not elected for any specific time. There is an understanding between him and the church relative to changing pastors. Some churches have a 90 day time to inform their pastor if they want to change, or if he wants to leave. Some have 60 day limits. Someone has said it would be hard on a church to inform their pastor they wanted a change. Two thoughts are to be considered here: 1st, both pastor and church must let the Holy Spirit direct them. If a pastor is not preaching sound doctrine or his character is being questioned, they should dismiss him. 2nd, if a pastor feels his work is finished, I believe the church will feel the same way, hence no hard feelings either way. A pastor should always leave a church on a harmonious note. The indefinite call to the Pastorate eliminates this year after year business. The pastor uncertain as to staying or the church unhappy also. A pastor should definitely feel led of God to accept a church. He should not let salary or friends or even a big church influence him. To me pastoring a church is serious business and we must have our work at heart if we accomplish anything. I have often thought when a church wants a pastor, do they pray and seek God's leadership, or do we let personalities influence us? By the same token do we as pastors ask God if he wants us to pastor this church? One thing is certain God will surely lead both parties right. Read Acts 13:1-4.
