Pastor Southside F.W.B.C., St. Louis As each new year begins, we hear, and make, a variety of resolutions and promises. Invariably the promise is to "be better, live better, do better than last year." However, actually carrying out these promises is a horse of another color.

I believe it is significant that we can depend on God's promises. From Genesis to Revelation we see His prophecies, His promises, His covenants made and then fulfilled. Many are yet to be fulfilled, and we can rest on the fact that they will be!

Of God's many promises and covenants that were made and fulfilled, perhaps the most vivid example could be found in the two called the Old Covenant and the New Covenant. Let's examine the two and see how blessed we are to be presently living under the new promise. My text is IICorinthians 3:6-11.

January, 1967

When Moses went up into Mount Sinai to receive the Law, God gave him that first copy on tables of stone. That copy of the Law was from the very hand of God—written by His own finger on stone. Later in history, God promised His people that there would come a time when He would make a new covenant with man (Jeremiah 31:31–33; Hebrews 8:7–13). This new covenant would be written in the heart of man. It would be a warm and vibrant covenant reaching down into and touching the heart, not a code of laws written on tables of stone.

THE OLD COVENANT-The Law

Under the law, the stress was upon keeping every jot and tittle in exactness. "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." James 2:10. Therefore if every letter was not kept in its fullness, the offender was guilty of breaking all the law.

The covenant of the law was given to point out man's sinfulness, and to show man how very exceedingly sinful he was. The law was not a way of salvation; it was not a means of righteousness or forgiveness. It was God's way of showing man that his own efforts were futile, and that salvation comes "not by works of righteousness which we have done."

The old covenant was made to emphasize the sinfulness of wicked and unrighteous people. "Now we know that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law: that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may become guilty before God." Romans 3:19. And furthermore, the law spelled impending judgment upon this ungodliness and unrighteousness. It pointed out the real condition of man without God, man without forgiveness. Consequently, the law was a means of bringing the death penalty to man in clear, understandable terms. The final cry of the law was, "And sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death." James 1:15.

THE NEW COVENANT-Grace

After looking at the old covenant - the law - and its purpose, let's see the rest of the picture of God's plan. The story of God's dealing with man would not be complete if we stopped here, leaving man hopelessly condemned and guilty before God.

The law was not sufficient for salvation, nor was it meant to be. God in His love and mercy already had a way of salvation planned-the only Way. Scripture teaches us that before the world began, before the foundation of the world was laid, Christ was slain. And it is through His death, resurrection, and ascension that we see the fulfillment of the promise God made to His people in Jeremian 31:31-33.

Under the new covenant of grace, written in man's heart, and lived outwardly, God has provided all that was lacking in the law written on stone.

When Jesus healed a man on the Sabbath, He was accused of being a Sabbath breaker. In His answer to this accusation, He said that the Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath. His statement sets forth the principle which is the basis of the new covenant. As Paul so aptly says, "...not of the letter, but of the spirit; for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life." II Corinthians 3:6.

Through Christ we can have forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God. That, the law could not offer. Within ourselves, and even with our efforts at keeping the law, we still have only filthy rags of righteousness to offer God. "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags. Isaiah 64:6. But God did the work when He "...made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." II Corinthians 5:21. "And be found in him, not having mine own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ, the righteousness which is of God by faith." Philippians 3:9. "Even the righteousness which is through the faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe." Romans 3:22. Our sins were placed on Him and in return His righteousness was given to us. For when we infaith accept the work that Christ did for us on the cross, without further delay we are given the righteousness of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is placed on our account; we are accounted righteous.

The greatest gift that anyone could receive from a covenant is the promise of life. The covenant of grace that God made with man promised just that. Jesus Fimself said of those who would believe, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my work, and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation but is passed from death unto life." John 5:24. And again Jesus said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." John 10:10.

What a difference there is for man under the covenant of grace! No longer is man bound to the letter of the law, but he is entitled to love and serve God in the freedom of the Spirit. And he can have forgiveness of sin and righteousness placed on God's account book under his name. And too, he is promised everlasting, neverending life with God in heaven.

What blessings are ours for this new year! Thank God for His precious promises, and that we can rest on the fact that every one of them will be fulfilled.

Dear Friend:

In July we made an urgent request for prayer for Sunday school teachers. God answered those prayers in July. A new family started attending our church that month, and we have a Sunday school superintendent and a teacher as a result. Some rearranging of personnel in some jobs gave us another teacher so that we now have enough for our present needs.

After three months of encouraging attendance, we had a crop to an average of 14 in Sunday school in June, and we braced for a summer-long slump. Then in July, because of several visitors on vacation and the new family (of eight) just mentioned, we had the best month we have ever ea, we mad the ever had with an average Sunday school attendance of 30. In August our average was 25 and in Septembe it was 24.

In August the Northwest Association had its annual youth encampment. There were fifty in attendance with thirty-four young people and sixteen adult workers. Nine

of those were from our church. We are very grateful for your prayers and we are very sorthis year. We have a missions emphasis in our mission church also. On October 27 Brother Bobby Poole, Free Will Baptist Missionary to Brazil, will be with us for a service. He is the second missionary we have had here, following Brother Bill

Fulcher last March.

Debbie Austin, a six-year-old girl in our church, has been a special blessing recently. She heard her aunt and uncle talking about the church's need to buy property of its own, and she asked if there was anything she could do. A moment later she asked for a can of pop. Her aunt agreed to give it to her if she would save her pennies in the empty can until it was full and then give them to the church's land fund. She agreed to do that but during the following week she told visitors in their home and her neighbors that she was going to "buy the church" and asked if they would like to help with a contribution! She raised \$19.22 in one week, and in another two weeks she had raised another \$25.90.

We have been able to put a good amount of money in savings each month for our land fund. With what we have put in and with the gifts from our friends elsewhere, we have \$1,590.95 insavings. Almost one third of this total amount has been given by the Oklahoma Woman's Auxiliary, from whom we received a gift of \$294 this week. Of this amount \$228 was given in memory of Mr. Freedom Lane, who died in September. He was the husband of a lady in the church. Several smaller gifts have come from other churches and individuals and we are indeed grateful. Our church itself has been able to put an average of \$127 each month in this land fund in the past three months.

We are happy to see our land fund growingrapidly, but that amount is almost nothing considering the soaring land prices here.

Perhaps many of you are wondering when we will organize here. We are anxious to have an organized church and recently we made plans and set a date for organizing. However, it became clear before that date that the time was not ripe for organization. We hope that time will not be long in coming.

The question of where we will worship after January 15 is becoming a real concern to us. Will you pray with us about this problem? We have a lease on the place we are using until January 15, paying \$80 per month. We would like to lease this place for another year, but the owner wants to sell for \$14,900 and does nottalk encouragingly about the possibility of another lease. He will ask \$100 per month if he does lease it again. We

do not consider the property worth \$14, 900 nor suitable for a permanent location.

Our services lately have been better than usual. There seems to be a greater interest and more concern about the cause of Christ. There are many encouraging developments and we believe God is blessing. Will you continue to pray?

We ask you to remember these services and also pray for them as they travel. Time is so short and it seems that mans hearts are so hard, but God is still on the throne and still saves.




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HOW

YOUR CHRIST?

Acts 4:8-12



Why are people saying such things as this??? I credit the reason for this to the fact that people believe the Christ whom they trust in, is too small. We need to gain a larger conception of Christ in relation to our personal lives. We need to realize that Jesus Christ is very adequate for all the needs of life. As the Bible tells us, "My God shall supply ALL your needs according to His riches in glory." If we have given our hearts to Him then He has a claim on our supreme loyalty, and He deserves to be shared with all the world, but do we share Him?? Let us examine this question, "How Big is Your Christ?" and see what answer we can ascertain.

First of all, "Is Christ big enough to be trusted for your salvation? So many today are trying to gain salvation by themselves. They work in the Church, community and at home and feel this will open the gates of Heaven to them. In the book of James the question is ask, "Can works save you?" Peter testified, "Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life." John 6:68. You can try to work your way to Heaven but in that final day you will be 'weighed in the balance and found wanting', for 'works without faith is dead'.

Again we hear Peter testifying in Acts 4:12, "Neither is there salvation in any

other; for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." The "Name" is the Lord Jesus Christ. He is the one to trust for salvation, not what we do.

Paul confessed, "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He (Jesus Christ) is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day." II Tim. 1:12. This man was one who knew how big his Christ was. Thru all the trials, persecutions and temptations, he still held tight to Christ His Saviour.

A story is told of a Christian man that was suddenly stricken with his mortal death, before dying he was seen, lying still with his hands clasped, his lips moving, and his eyes raised upward, as if engaged in prayer, when all at once he repeated, firmly and earnestly, "And Jesus said unto him, 'Thomas, because thou hast seen, thou hast believed; blessed are they who have not seen and yet have believed.' This man also knew how big his Christ was. If your Christ is not that big to you, as Peter's, Paul's orthis man's, you need a bigger Christ. The fact is, He (Jesus Christ) is that big, and He wants to become that big in your life if you will just Let Him. "Believe on the Lord Jesus and thou shalt be saved". Acts 16:31.

Secondly, is your Christ big enough to meet your need in the time of your severest Trial? When the devil, who knows the hearts of men; feels their pulse, knows their tempers, and so, accordingly, can apply himself and knows what temptation to sow in such a heart, then, is your Christ big enough or do you succumb to the devil's temptations? We know the smallest thing can tempt. John Bunyan once said, that something was tempting him to sell out Christ, if he stooped to pick up a pin the voice said, "Sell him for that! Sell Him for that!" and men sell their honor, their Christ for things as

cheap. A pin will do it; a sweet smile, a fair face; the ruby wine or what-ever-color; the amber-colored beer; the picture shows; the wild sexual dances and such; the love of money, fame and etc. Ah! for what has not man sold his soul! But your Christ is big enough to deliver you from all these temptations.

In Matthew 8:23-27, we see the disciples in the storm on the Sea of Galilee found Jesus was amply able to meet their needs. (as He was in other times past). If your Christ is not this big to you, you need a bigger Christ BUT in reality, He is that big and He wants to become that big in your life.

Thirdly, is He big enough to claim the Supreme loyalty of your life! Christ said, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." (Matthew 16-24). The first disciples gave up everything to follow Him. They forsook their nets, boats and occupation, everything they had, to do the

bidding of the Master. Saul of Tarsus gave up all to follow Christ and this is what his testimony was concerning that fact; "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ." (Phil. 3:7-8). Then further in the same chapter, he said, "Brethern, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus". Martyrs, missionaries, and other faithful Christians down through the centuries gave all to follow Jesus. They had not only gone the first mile, but the second, third and more for the cause of Christ. He wants us to do the same thing. You say, the way is too rough, or the way is too dark but as the poem by A. M. Overton tells us:

My Father's way may twist and turn, My heart may throb and ache, But in my soul I'm glad to know, He maketh no mistake.

My cherished plans may go astray, My hopes may fade away, But still I'll trust my Lord to lead, For He doth know the way.

Tho' night be dark and it may seem
That day will never break;
I'll pin my faith, my all in Him
He maketh no mistake.

There's so much now I cannot see, My evesights far too dim; January, 1967 But come what may, I'll simply trust And leave it all to Him.

For by and by the mist will lift
And plain it all He'll make.
Through all the way, tho' dark to me
He made not one mistake.

Peter, James, John, Paul and others down through the ages know Christ made no mistakes. They forsook all to follow, with no questions asked. If Jesus is not that big to you, you need a bigger Christ. Positively, He is that bit, and He wants to become that big in your life if you will just open up your heart and let Him in. Romans 12:1-2 enjoins us to open up, when it tells us. "I be seech you therefore, brethern, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service, and be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God". Christ can be big in your life.

Then, Is Christ big enough to make you want to share Him with ALL the world?? Some of the very last words of the Saviour were to His followers to be witnesses of Him to all the world. He said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations...." (Matthew 28:18). "And (he) said unto them, Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among ALL nations beginning

at Jerusalem". (Luke 24:46-47). The little word "GO" is a command given from one person to another and it means, "to depart; proceed; move on; pass from one place to another; conduce(which means "to tend to"); be habitually used or said; succeed; be expended. (National Dictionary). This command given by our Lord "to go" is a personal order to each of us and is what He intended it to be. This was His method of getting the message of His Saving Grace throughout the world.

As we think of the matter of sharing Christ with the world, the question arises, "How?" "Go after them". When a man plans a hunting trip, he does not sit at home and wait for the game to come and be shot at; neither does the fisherman leave their hooks in the boat and expect the fish to jump in and get them. He places the hook in the water in a likely place that the fish may be. A salesman doesn't sit in his office and wait for customers to call and tell him what they want, but he goes to where the customers are. So must we as Christians go out in the highways and hedges and share our Christ with those lost in sin. We must give all, time, talent

and tithes, to follow Christ. If He is not that big to you, you need a bigger Christ. Actually, He is that big, and He wants to become that big in your life. Will you let Him??

During a voyage to India, a man sat one cark evening in his cabin, feeling throughly sick. Suddenly the cry of "Man overboard! Man overboard!" came sounding through the night and made him jump to his feet. Hearing the engines stop, the crew trampling overhead, he thought, "What can I do?" Seeing a lantern lying on the table and realizing that He would be in the way if he went topside, he grabbed the light and let the beam shine out the small window on the waves below. In a short time he heard the joyful cry, "It's all right! It's all right! He is safe!" The next day he was told his little lamp was the sole means of the saving of this man's life: it was only by the timely light which shone upon the man that the rope could be thrown so as to reach him. How so like this light could our life be if we let Christ be as big or bigger, as He wants in our life. Our light could shine forth to those that are lost on the sea of sin and we could be the means of leading them to the saving knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Again I ask, "How Big Is Your Christ????" Make Him the biggest item of love and service in your life and enjoy the many promises of God.



TWO YEARS WORK ACCEPTED

Course work completed at the Oklahoma Bible College is now being accepted for transfer toward a higher degree by ten colleges across the United States including the University of Oklahoma, according to Clarence J. Hearron, Academic Dean of OBC.

This means that Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma and neighboring states will now be able to complete the first two years of their college requirements at Oklahoma Bible College, a two year Christian junior college owned and operated by Oklahoma Free Will Baptists, and successfully transfer the credits received for their studies to an institution able to confer a higher degree. Work transferred will be validated when passing grades are maintained at the new institution.

Oklahoma Bible College, which is authorized by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education to operate as a junior college, is able to confer an Associate of Arts degree upon those successfully completing the required two year curriculum. The College is being listed this year for the first time in the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions

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
