"Thou shalt not covet..." (Exodus 20: 17) This is the tenth commandment. To covet means: "To wish for with eagerness or have inordinate desire for." This has been a sin of the human race ever since its beginning. THERE IS NO SIN harder to ferret out than COVETOUSNESS. For one thing its chameleon-like quality of evasiveness makes it difficult to recognize. It is not a specific act as killing; it can not be pin pointed in one definition as adultery; but it does eventually advertise its presence.

Jesus said, "Take heed and beware of covetousness...(Mark 12:15b)Covetousness is a hidden desire of the heart so subtle that even its possessor sometimes seems to be deceived. "For from out of the hearts of men proceed evil thouthts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blaspemy, pride, foolishness; all these evil things come from within and defile the man." (Mark 7:21-23) Just because a person is not found guilty of them all it does not make the sin of covetousness any less evil. Just what is the nature of this sin which plays hide-and-go seek with the heart so successfully? COVETOUSNESS three main faces namely: the love of money, the love of praise and the love of prestige or power. The inspired Apostle Paul defines Covetousness as IDOLATRY. (Colassians 3:5) The work IDOLATRY brings before our minds the bowing down before man-made gods or images. This is simple idolatry. But we are dealing with SUBTLE idolatry, which is a secret love for any earthly value above heavenly value. I becomes IDOLATRY the moment it assumes a larger place in our lives than God intended it. The Psalmist said: "Incline my heart unto thy testimonies, and not to covetousness." (Psalm 119:36)

We all know that the Scriptures say, "The love of money is the root of allevil." We don't dispute that. But we forget "that the heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked." A love or desire to gain wealth may masquerade as "good business" the desire "to get ahead for a rainey day", "initiative and energy", "prudence or even "benevolence." Many are the professed motives which duper the soul by obscuring the master motive lurking behind. Many a COVEROUS heart is camouflaged bheind a white washed front of big promises and intentions concerning the work of the Lord--tomorrow, when God prospers my next big business adventure. March, 1967

Let me ask you this question: What are you doing with what God prospered you with today? If you are not using what you have to the glory of God today, He knows you are lying when you say you will use what He gives you tomorrow.

Admittedly, it would be wrong to deliberately beat a person out of something, but what if that person got into a hard place and had to sell it? Would it be wrong or just "good business" to make him an unfair offer? Absolutely, it would be wrong. You might argue but I was helping him by buying it. Let us let Ezekiel answerthis: "And they come unto thee as the people cometh, and they sit before me as my people, and they hearmy works but they will not do them; for with their mouth they show much love, but their heart goeth after their COVETOUSNESS." (Ezekiel 33:31) Beware and take note of the man who is always BOASTING of helping someone by buying something or one who is always finding a BARGAIN. "And they covet fields and take them by violence; and houses and take them away; so they oppress a man and his house..." (Micah 2:2) Most bargain hunters are those who watch and then connive in some way or use some unchristian principle to come into possession of that which he desires. That person has a COVETOUS HEART! If a possession cannot be purchases to the glory of God or if there has been evil conniving in any way - it is of the devil.

THE LORD'S TITHE

What about the man (or woman) who uses his own pocket as God's storehouse and doles out the money according to his own selfish desires? This is where a heart is also COVETING after PRAISE OF MEN, POWER OR PRESTIGE. Let's find out what God's Bood says about it: "Bring ye all the TITHES into the STOREHOUSE, that there may be meat in MY HOUSE." (Malachi 3:10) Do you think that God would call a man's bill fold HIS STORE-HOUSE? And would He command to store HIS TITHE there? No, indeed! It must be taken to God's storehouse (the church) You may use your own money to help others but not the TITHE. THE TITHE IS THE LORD'S! No where in the Holy Bible can it be found that it may be used for a selfish motive. People may think they are getting by when they are not obeying the Word of God but they are only deceiving themselves. "Be not deceived, God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth; that shall he also reap." If we use God's TITHE to buy power or prestige or any otherfleshly lust unto ourselves we will of that fleshly desire reap CORRUPTION! It not WHAT WE THINK that counts but WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS that will stand

If all of God's money (THE TITHE) that

is deposited in the banks of our land in Man's name was realeased and put into the coffers of God what a victory there would be! Not only would there be sufficient funds to finance God's cause throughout the world, but also, the COVETOUS HEARTS that have loved and held this money for so long would be set free from the terrible penalty that awaits them. "Go to now, ye rich men, weep and howl for your miseries that shall come upon you. Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are moth eaten. Your silver and gold is cankered; and the rust of them will be a witness against you and shall eat your flesh as it were fire." (There's no use telling me the COVETOUS hearts are going to have a happy time.) "And the cries of them which have reaped are entered into the ears of the Lord...") (James 4:1-4) Some of the cries will be those of the missionaries and ministers and of little children who have been deprived of many necessities of life WHO HAVE REAPED DOWN YOUR (spiritual) FIELDS (or the fields where you should have reaped) while the COVETOUS MAN (or woman) lived in plenty and heaped together riches for the last day--when it shall condemn you and cause you to go into a devil's hell. O, may God help us to wake up, confess up and pay up-before it is too late.

Covetousness is not just an inordinate desire for something we do not have but it may show its face in an excessive desire to "cling" to that we do have. In this category we find the "tight wad" or "miser" who will not give anything into the Lord's work. "But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For the love of money is the root of all evil; which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows." (I Timothy 5:9-10)

Then there is that person who claims to have given GOD'S TITHE and has become guilty before God as did Anninias and Sapphira but spiritually they are just as dead. "For all liars shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone! (Revelation 21:8) "For this ye know that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, NOR COVETOUS MAN which is an IDOLATOR hath any inheritance in the Kingdom of Christ and of God." (Ephesians 5:3) The sin of COVETOUSNESS is so terrible that Hebrews 13:5 tells us: "Let your conservation be without COVETOUSNESS: and be content with such things as ye have..." It seems to imply here that is is a sin that is too bad to talk about.



The Leadington Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary enjoyed several activities the past two months.


On December 14, they met with 14 ladies and enjoyed their Christmas meeting.





COVETOUSNESS. There could possibly be no difference among these three "ugly faces" mentioned namely: the LOVE of POSSESSIONS, the LOVE of PRAISE and the LOVE of POWER and PRESTIGE. Each of them comes forth from a HEART of COVETOUSNESS which is the breaking the tenth commandment, "Thou shalt not COVET..."

Again we state that COVETOUSNESS is an inordiante and excessive desire; and when it takes possession of the heart it has become SUBTLE IDOLATRY and an individual will go to any length to obtain what "self" desires. Many individuals have been duped by desire to have PRE-STIGE above others and POWER to rule. We have an illustration of this in the Bible. The apostle John wrote about a character of this type in the church. "I wrote unto the church but Kiotrephes, who loveth to have the preeminence (superior) among them, receiveth us not. Wherefore, if I come I will remember his deeds which he doeth, prating against us with malicious words; and not content therewith. "(III John 1: 9-10) What minister has not had to deal with this type of individual in the church? We realize that when we encounter a malicious worker of this type in the church that we "Wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." We cannot fight with carnal weapons as with malicious words or evil deeds as they who fight against us: "For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God God to the pulling down of strongholds."

The COVETOUS heart is straining his ear to hear of some good thing spoken of him or the glory of some deed attributed to him. Those who have spent money on some cause to accomplish this may become very angry and cantankerous because it is not forth coming. They often use the carnal weapon (the tongue) and try to tear down the influence of those whom they are angry at. None of us would likely be guilty of setting a literal fire in our community yet many "tongue arsonists" are in our midst, they may claim to be christians but are they? Let us allow the Bible to answer if for us: "If any man (or woman) among you seem to be religious and bredleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart; that man's religion is vain." (James 1:26) James goes on to say"...it is set on fire of hell." (James 3:6b) Jesus gets at the root of the matter in Matthew 12:24 when He says: "O, generation of vipers,how can ye being evil, speak good things? For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." There is no need of anyone being deceived with this March, 1967

type of person. However according to the Word of God they often deceive women. "Thus know that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves COVETOUS, boasters, ...false accusers, incontinent, FIERCE, despisers of those that are good. "For of this sort are they which creep into houses, and lead captive silly women laden with sins, led away with divers lusts." (II Timothy 3:1,2,3,6) Also Jesus teaches that of this sort are they; and He said of them: "Woe unto you scribes, Pharisees, hypocrites! For ye devour widow's houses, and for a pretense make long prayer; therefore ye shall receive the greater damnation....for ye compass sea and land to make one proselyte (a concert to your opinion, system or party) and when he is made, ye make him twofold more the child of hell than yourselves." (Matthew 23:14-15)

Jesus met with great opposition with the Pharisee in His day. In Lude 16 when He was giving the parable of the unjust steward and because His words condemned them the Bible states: "And the Pharisees also, who were COVETOUS, heard all these things: and they derided (laughing with contemp and mocked) Him. And He said unto them 'Ye are they which justify yourselves before men; but God knoweth your hearts; for that which is highly esteemed among men is abomination in the sight of God." (Luke 16:15-16) Is there any wonder that they hated Him and sought to put Him to death? His Gospel brought them down to their natural size and deflated their egotism until they were angry beyond words.

We see the selfsame spirit the Pharisees has; manifested many times in these last days, namely; "If I cannot have my way I will wreck the boat." Then they use the power they think they have to get the job done. But Jesus told this class of people: "Ye make clean the outside of the cup and of the platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess....ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but within are full of dead man's bones.... Even so ye also appear righteous unto men, but within ye are full of hypocrisy and iniquity,...ye generation of vipers, hwo can ye escape the damnation of hell? Wherefore I send unto you prophets...and some of them ye shall kill and crucify; and some of them will ye scourge in your synagogues, and persecute them from city to city. "(Matthew 23: 25,27,28,33,34)

We would become frustrated at times by the work of the wicked one in the lives of people if Jesus had not told us: "Remember the work that I said unto you, the servant is not greater than his lord. If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you: if they have kept my saying they

will keep yours also. But all these things will they do unto you for my name's sake, because they know not Him that sent me. (John 15:20-21) Then He goes on to say: "These things have I spoken unto you, that ye should not be offended. They shall put you out of the synagogues: yea the time cometh, that whosoever killeth you will think that he doeth God's service." YOU MIGHT ASK "How could this be?" Let us go with Paul to the second letter to the Thessalonian church and it will help us to look into the events of the present day fulfillment of the scriptures. Paul says to the church at Thessalonica: "Now we beseech you brethren, by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, ... That ye be not soon shaken in mind, or be troubled, neither by spirit, (even though John tells us there are many false spirits gone forth--but Paul says, 'Be not shaken by them') nor by word (regardless of what these false teachers say unto us we are not to be shaken by them) nor by letter, (no doubt many of them would try pt shake your faith by letter) As that the day of Christ is at hand. Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition; who opposeth and exalteth himselfabove all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God, sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that He is God. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusions, that they should believe a lie; that they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness." (II Thessalonians 2:1-4,11,12) Let us stop to analyze these scriptures more thoroughly. Let me ask you: Have you ever seen a time when the real child of God is meeting with more opposition than He is today? Why? Because Jesus told us if they persecuted Him they would they would also persecute us. If we do not compromise with satan we are sure to meet with opposition sooner or later. We, as chuistians, need not be frustrated by it. Then I also ask: Are we not living in the time of the falling away? Is not the wicked one (satan) being revealed in lives that we one time thought were christians? Are not those who at one time in their lives seemed to be chrisitans, but because of some of the things we have mentioned in this article have now fallen away?

Throughout the Gospels Jesus reveals to us the things that are happening again to-day. "Many flase prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many. And because iniquity the love of many shall wax cold." (Matthew 24: 11-12) That is why they have fallen away. It is sad to see those who have been deceived by the unfruitful workers of darkness. If they have gone beyond

## Your Church—One in a Thousand

JANUARY 1 was set aside as official launch date for the second phase of the Bible College Development Program. As the One Thousand Laymen Campaign appealed to individuals for \$1,000 gifts, the One Thousand Church Campaign will request a like commitment from a thousand Free Will Baptist Churches.

For example: A rural Tennessee church votes to give \$1,000 out of the church treasury. A congregation in North Carolina borrows \$1,000 and repays the sum through prayer meeting offerings. A pastor leads his congregation in observing College Day and raises \$1,500.

And so, even before the campaign is officially launched, churches, eager to participate, have responded in various ways. No single plan will work in every church, but a common interest is already drawing many responses.

The Layman Campaign has yielded nearly a quarter of a million dollars, which is commendable, but we have only begun. Three million dollars is a staggering sum, and to raise the full amount will require the involvement of every good Free Will Baptist across the denomination.

A thousand churches are needed to raise a million dollars. Could yours be one in a thousand?

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# Teaching A Sunday School Lesson

By GAYLORD TAYLOR

As a teacher you should have as your purpose to teach in a way that will cause your pupils to put into action in everyday life the truths of the lessons.

Expose your students to the basic truths of the Bible. Assume they are as "babes" with regard to even the most simple truths. Many do not believe because they have never heard. The heathen nations are a good example of this. 2. Many readily accept when they once hear of God's love.

Repetition is one of the best ways to learn. Advertisers make use of it to sell their products. We should use it to sell the unsaved on the hope we have of eternal life through acceptance of God. Take a few minutes every few Sundays to ask questions on men, places, events, and verses of the Bible. These need not necessarily be connected with the day's lesson but are those things the students should know and remember.

As a teacher you should "practice what you teach." Believe what you are teaching strongly enough to stand on it and for it. The best way to stand is firm when your Christian convictions are involved. You will not always be popular when you do this. As Jesus said to those who would follow Him in His day, "Ye shall be hated of all men for my name's sake." Yet we have the assurance God gave to Jeremiah when he said, "Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee" (Jeremiah 1:8). However, be sure that your convictions are based on solid Biblical truth and not on tradition or your own ideas.

Learning is based almost wholly on interest. Students learn what they

want to learn. The hardest part of teaching is keeping students' interest. There is no answer any one can give as to how to keep their interest. However, having yourself prepared would be a must. Learning is always based on need. Gear your lessons to the needs of the students. If one of them has a question or problem, don't just say, "Let's pray about it." This is not always appropriate. In explanation I believe there are many times when you should first talk with and to the student about the problem or question and then pray about it.

Planning and Preparing the Lesson In our present day, time seems to be at a premium. As a teacher of the Word of God, you must have a definite time for study. Begin early in the week to study the following

Sunday's lesson, no later than Monday night. Go over the lesson at least twice more during the week. Waiting until Saturday night is not nearly enough and only studying on Sunday morning is almost a mockery of the sacred job of teaching.

In order for a teacher to fully prepare he or she needs certain materials. The minimum would cost approximately twenty dollars. For this reason it might be feasible for the Sunday School to furnish all or part for the teachers. The following books should be in every teacher's library:

- 1. A Bible Dictionary
- 2. A Bible Atlas
- 3. An All Bible Commentary
- 4. Bibles A King James Version and a later translation
- 5. A Sunday School Lesson Commentary.

The teacher's preparation of himself is extremely important. It takes a lot of prayer to be a good teacher. If you leave God out of the lesson, you have no lesson. Daily prayer is a must. You also need to be prepared physically as well as spiritually. Get a good rest on Saturday night. Then, get up early enough on Sunday morning to have the proper attitude when you get to church.

As you plan the lesson, think of your class members one by one and try to determine what they need most that can be obtained from the lesson. If no one in the class has a drinking problem, for example, and the lesson is on temperance, don't spend much time on prevention but more on what could they do as non-drinkers to alleviate the present problem. Select a lesson aim and build around it. Make notes to be used during presentation. It is too easy to forget important points unless you have them written

down. I have tried various methods of preparation. I would like to mention two of them. One week I made out a list of discussion questions and sent them to all class members and some who did not attend church. This requires some time and expense. However, a list of questions could be prepared and given to each student on Sunday for the following Sunday's lesson. The other method which I have used extensively is to go over all the lessons for a month or six weeks at a time. Underline important points in the commentary. Tape a piece of paper in the commentary for each lesson and jot down important points and six to eight discussion questions.

the point of where they have been turned over to delusions they shall be damned. II Peter 2: 18-19 tells us: "For when they (the false prophets and deceivers) speak great, swelling words of vanity, they allure through the lusts of the flesh, through much wantonness, (Marked by arrogant recklessness of justice, of the feelings of others, or the like as wanton cruelty---willfully malicious or desire to hurt others) those which were cleaned escaped from them who live in error. While they (the deceivers) promise them liberty, they themselves, are the servants of corruption; for of whom a man is overcome, of the same Page 14

is he brought into bondage." It is a sad and pitiful sight to see good, honest hearted people who have "sold themselves out" to these servants of corruption. Sometimes a good man, when in need, is deceived and "sells out" to these deceivers for money to help him out of the crisis. When this happens he will be able to get along nicely so long as he does not "cross their path" or oppose any of their unrighteous acts. But the moment that he does--look out! If you do not do (as the one you are in bondage to) desires you will either be ostracized or murdered by the power of the tonque. James says no man can tame the tongue, but the christian can, by the help and power of God, control it. If he doesn't, James says: "Man's religion is vain." It is not WHAT WE THINK about a thing but WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS, that counts.

Ifeel greatly the need of this message in these days because people are being deceived upon every hand. "Remember ye the words which were spoken before of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ; how that they told you there would be mockers in the last time, walking after their own ungodly lusts. These be they who separate themselves, sensual, (which means gratification of the senses; sight, hearing, feeling, and et cetera) having not the spirit. These are murmurers, complainers

(not satisfied with what others are doing—"big I" and "little you" attitude) walking after their own lusts; and their mouth speaking great, swelling works having men's person in admiration (or desiring to bring them under bondage to themselves) because of advantage." (Jude 17,18,19,16) They COVET their following that they (the deceivers) may achieve POWER and PRESTIGE.

Thanks be unto God: "The Lord knoweth how to deliver the godly out of temptations, and to reserve the unjust unto the day of judgment to be punished. But chiefly them that walk after the flesh of uncleanness, and despise governments. Presumptious are they, self willed, they are not afraid to speak evil of dignities." (the quality of those who are esteemed, as ministers) The Pharisees were not afraid to speak evil of the dignity of our Lord and Saviro, neigher is the false accuser afraid to speak evil of people of esteem today.

If you will notice in this scripture it said they despised government. The reason is very easy to be deagnosed because they want to have AUTHORITY and POWER. This type of individual will gather together a group of people, most always asmall group, because they can rule them--taking unto themselves the praise and honor that is due unto God. It also said they were "sensous". They are looking for some outward "words" or words that are pleasing to their ear and will attribute unto themselves "self glory". Generally they have within their power the physical assets of the group so they can "rule or ruin." In other words their attitude is: "If you don't want to play marbles the way I play marbles, you can take your marbles and go home. I'm boss around here." Sometimes the offenders are ostracized because they did not do as the "false leader" approved. They do not have the souls of people at heart. Is this what the Bible teaches? Let us see: "Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre but of a ready mind. Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples of the flock." (II Peter 5:2-3) I think this scripture plainly teaches that we are not to try to over power them. If we use money we must give it unto the Lord with a "hands off" policy and never to gain power or prestige to ourselves. It IS OF THE DEVIL if we do, for it is done to satisfy A COVETOUS HEALTH. "...there shall be false teachers among you....and many shall follow their pernicious ways; by reason of whom the way of truth shall be evil spoken.... and through COVETOUSNESS shall they with feigned words make merchandise of you." (II Peter 2: 1-3) Yes, evil work-March, 1967

ers cause "the way of truth to be spoken evil of" because the unsaved want no such form of religion. They will make merchandise of you because they will cause you to "sell out" to them to accomplish their selfish purposes.

May God awaken us to this terrible SIN OF COVETOUSNESS which is plaguing our ranks today. It is much worse than I have pictured it. James 2:10 tells us: "For whoseever keeps the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." "Thou shalt not covet..." is the tenth commandment of the law. Perhaps it is the "root" of all sin in the human heart in this twentieth centruy in which we live.

The love of POWER and PRESTIGE is a great temptation of men today. Even Jesus was tempted in the wilderness with it when satan said: "All these things will I give thee if thou will fall down and worship me." But Jesus said: "Get the hence, satan; for it is written, thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and Him only shalt thou serve."

When a person is seeking after anything except to glorify God he is not serving the Lord but his own self. The apostle Paul said, "Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think anything as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God." (II Cor. 3:5) Paul showing that his sufficiency was of Christ and man has nothing of which to boast said this: "For we dare not make ourselves of the number, compare ourselves with some that commend themselves; but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise. But we will not boast of things without measure, but according to the measure of the rule which God has distributed us, (the Bible) a measure to reach even unto you." (II Cor. 10: 12-13) This should certainly bring each one down to his proper size since we cannot be measured by what we think of ourselves nor even of what about us, but only by the Lord's standard. If a man had whereof to glory. Paul did, but he said in II Corinthians 12:6, "For though I would desire to glory (or be tempted to glory) I shall not be a fool..."

We close with this admonition: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatso-ever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." If we from a COVETOUS heart seek after possessions, praise of men, power and prestige over men--we may reap some of these things but we shall in the end reap eternal damnation. "They that do such things shall not inherit the Kingdom of God..." (Galatians 5: 21b)
