





The check has been issued. Thus, Brethren and Churches, we all must strive earnestly and give freely to reach the proposed \$44,000.00 goal in Cooperative giving for 1968. WAS JUST THINKING

Today I was just thinking that its time again for an inventory of ones own self. First I'm reminded of the scripture in St. John 5: 39 where Jesus himself said to "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and they are they that testify of me." As I meditate, my mind goes to I Corinthians 3: 16 which says, "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the spirit of God dwelleth in you?" Romans 12: 1 says, "I beseech you therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service."

"I'M NOT A QUITER. I just turn in my card. That's what I'm supposed to do and that's what I do."

We could only wish that similar spirit of determination would be manifested by the members of our Bible-believing Free Will Baptist Churches in the matter of serving the Son of God, How many times God's people get discouraged and GIVE UP! BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRAM HONORS FOUNDERS

November 23 was set aside on the Bible College campus to honor those who were instrumental in founding the school. The entire day was spent in expressing gratitude and giving honor to people such as Rev. L. R. Ennis, Rev. J. R. Davidson, Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Welch, and Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Goen.

The climax of the day's activities was an evening program depicting events that lead up to the founding of the school as well as highlights from the Bible College's history. Scenes such as the 1942 National Association, at which the demonination voted to found the school, were re-enacted. The ministry of FWBBC alumni around the world was graphically displayed.

Special tribute was payed to Rev. Ennis and Rev. Davidson. President L. C. Johnson presented both men with plaques symbolic of the school's appreciation for their work in its behalf. Rev. Ennis, who was Free Will Baptists' first Executive Secretary, worked untiringly in promoting the idea of a denominational Bible school. From 1944-1947 he also served as Bible College president. Rev. Davidson travelled to Free Will Baptist churches across the country encouraging active support for the

The school officially opened on this site, September 15, 1942 as a two-year institution with 10 students enrolled. President L. C. Johnson, Miss Laura Belle Barnard, and Rev. Henry Melvin composed the original faculty.

The college conferred the first Bachelor of Arts degrees upon five graduates in May, 1951.


