

WILL BAPTIST ASHAMED?

This is a statement that has been bothering me in the last few months. As I have visited the hospitals and saw how many of our Free Will Baptist people do not state on the hospital records that they are Free Will Baptist it has put me to wondering about this question, "Are we ashamed that we are Free Will Baptist? I feel we have a doctrine that is second to none. Why don't we be proud of this fact. Do we train our people to witness to the fact of what Free Will Baptist believe or is the reason for this lack of letting people know who we are due to the fact we can not tell them what we believe. This is something to stop and consider.

Not only is it the people that go to the hospitals, but it is many others. Recently, two of the young ladies from the Grant Avenue Free Will Baptist Church went through approximately 1800 religious preference cards of Baptist students at South West Missouri State College and out of these 1800 cards, they found just three persons who had written that they were Free Will Baptist. Are we ashamed? or lazy? I wonder which it is? Or are we ashamed to let people know we are a Christian?

In Luke 9: 26, the Bible says, "For whosoever shall be ashamed of me and my words, of him shall the Son of man be ashamed, when he shall come in His own glory, and in His Father's and of the holy angels." If we are ashamed to say we are a Christian, then Christ will be ashamed of us. We, as Free Will Baptist, need to take our stand for Christ. What does the Bible say concerning this fact? II Corinthians 6: 17, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you." We need to be separate from those who would tear down the Bible and take our stand against them.

If we are going to be Free Will Baptist, let us be Free Will Baptist and not pretend that we are. Let us go along with all the doctrine and not just part of it and this includes all of the ordinances, not just two. Let us as Free Will Baptist put to practice at all times the following:

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Jesus Christ, and adopted the Word

of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solenm covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to provide things honest in the sight of all men.

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship, and by selfdenial, faith, and good works endeavor to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able, promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

In closing I would like to urge every Free Will Baptist to be proud of the fact that you are a Free Will Baptist and let others know about it by telling them and living for Christ.

We ask each team or individual who enters the competition to pledge to attend the National Competition in Oklahoma City, this year, should they become winners in their division.



HOME MISSIONS TREASURER'S REVIEW

Nine states exceeded their quotas for National Home Missions giving. These are Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Maine, Missouri, New Hampshire, Oregon, and Tennessee.

Tennessee gave \$22,859.77 and the runner-up was Oklahoma with \$19,367.17. Third place in giving goes to North Carolina with \$13,213.39 and fourth place was Missouri with \$11,929.26.

Thirty-three missionaries and their families served the church as home missionaries with new works started in Nova Scotia and the Virgin Islands.

Total giving was short of the proposed budget due to our November "Thanksgiving Offerings" not being as good as in past years.



I am looking forward to this change in curriculum. Several years ago our National Association voted to make this curriculum change and this is finally being culminated. The real proof of the success of our own curriculum will come seven years from now. How will we be able to tell? Sales will prove the success somewhat but the real proof will come from higher Bible I.Q's. If we fail to increase your Bible knowledge then we have failed. We don't intend to fail!

Plans were made to provide refreshments for our young people's Valentine party at the church February 14, 1968.



(Romans 5: 5) "And hope maketh not ashamed; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." (Gal. 5: 22,23) "But the fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against such there is no law."

THE CHECKBOOK SYSTEM OF BIBLE COOLEGE SUPPORT

Reverend L. R. Ennis, the first executive secretary of the Free Will Baptist National Association and an early pioneer in the Christian education movement, initiated the checkbook system for the support of Free Will Baptist Bible College. The arrangement was simply this: Individuals were asked to sign twelve checks provided by the school for any amount they wished. These checks were then cashed, one each month, until the year expired. If an individual, at any time, felt that he could no longer afford to continue his monthly gifts, all remaining checks were returned to him at his request.

This same system has continued to find supporters throughout the denomination down to the present day. More than 300 Free Will Baptists currently have checkbooks being held in the Bible College business office which amount to nearly

\$1,500 per month in regular gifts. The ease of this system should make it attractive to hundreds of other Free Will Baptists who feel a personal concern for the support of the school.

A recently purchased Burroughs Check Encoder will enable the College business office to imprint the bank routing code, as well as the personal checking account number, on all gift checks. This purchase was made in compliance with the recent Federal Reserve ruling requiring it. This machine will eliminate many of the porblems that have confronted the school regarding the checkbook system of support. Reverend Paul Ketteman, the Bible College's field representative, feels that the convenience of this system will add many more to the current number of monthly checkbook givers.

Architectual plans for the new men's dormitory have been given the approval of the Oklahoma Bible College Board of

The four-story dormitory will contain 15.800 square feet of floor space and will ultimately house 68 men students. The building, which was designed by the architectural firm of Fritzler, Knoblock, Furry and Associates of Oklahoma City, will also contain a counselor's apartment, a student lounge, a recreation area, laundry facilities, storage areas,

and a maintenance center. The approximate cost of construction will be \$225,000.

The new structure will be of crisp contemporary design to compliment the existing campus buildings. The red brick exterior will be accented with white caststone ribbons and vertical strips of solar gray glass. Free standing columns at the entrance will accentuate the height.

Bids will be let in late February with construction to begin in mid-March. The completion of the building is scheduled for late August.

"Today's long-haired, tight-trousered young men, whom elders tend to regard as hopelessly undisciplined, are turning out to be some of the most highly disciplined soldiers of current history, and the Army Chaplains who minister to these young men are adding a new dimension to the term 'Soldiers of God'," said Chaplain (Major General) Francis L. Sampson, Army Chief of Chaplains, in an interview following his recent 30 day tour of the

Chaplain Sampson's itinerary, which included Vietnam, Thailand, Okinawa, Korea, Japan and Hawaii, enabled him to visit commanding officers, chaplains and individual soldiers at each manuing of the story colding in the field, Commenting on the young soldier in Vietnam, the Chief of

Chaplains added, "I will never in my life again prejudge our Chapianis adder, time when heavy demands are placed youth, because time after time when heavy demands are placed yourn, pecause shoulders, they've made the pessimists and cynics on their young shoulders, The United States soldiers. on their own words. They are better motivated, more They accept it is indicated in their acceptance of hardships, in committee. The people (the Vietnamese) who are caught in a their care situation, and in the many voluntary extensions of duty in that war-beset country.

"One reason the morale is so high is that they know they must be there for only one year. Also, they know if they are hit they

will get immediate aid, evacuation and treatment.

"Hot meals are provided for them in the most amazing places. We ate delicious hot chicken and drank ice tea at an outpost right next to the Cambodian border."

During his trip, the General talked with more than 300 Vietnam ca-

sualties receiving medical care at Army hospitals in Okinawa, Japan, Hawaii and San Francisco. He said that his purpose for visiting these men was to comfort and encourage them, but he himself received inspiration and encouragement from the patients. Their morale was unbelieveably high. Not one of the wounded soldiers whom he met was bitter or disgruntled.

The war in Vietnam is producing not only a new-type soldier, but also a new-type Army chaplain, according to the General.

Through his travels, Chaplain Sampson found that today's chaplain does not wait at the chapel for the men to come to him. Chaplains are going into the elephant grass, the swamps, and jungle to hold services for as few as five men at a time. "Services are short, spontaneous, to the point and sometimes as many as 12 or 14 are held during a day. They are held outdoors, in the battle areas. The men are not as attracted to the institutionalized, rigid, chapel services," he said. Because the chaplain is taking the church to the servicemen rather than the servicemen coming the church, the chaplain learns to know the men better.

"There is a much more intimate relationship between chaplain and soldier than has existed before because the U.S. Army Chaplians in Vietnam have made religion a man-to-man ministry,"

said the Army's top chaplain.

When asked about the tactical situation in Vietnam, the Chief said that the chaplain is not a tactician. "That is not his mission," he stated firmly, and added, "So long as this world puts men on crosses, the church must put crosses on men. So long as there is conflict, there must be courage. The church must be where the issues are faced. On the battlefield, the chaplain is the church. To go with these men to their battle stations and to their places of watchful waiting and vigilance is a great privilege and almost overwhelming responsibility. The chaplain goes with them not as a hawk or a dove -- but under the aegis of the American Eagle and in the inspiration of the Holy Paraclete. We, too, are soldierssoldiers of America and soldiers of God."

The Army has more than 350 chaplains in Vietnam, Chaplain Sampson talked with 331 of them during his visit there which extended from the Delta to the DMZ and from the Cambodian and Laotian borders to the South China Sea. Every one of these chaplains could be replaced with volunteers from stateside Army

Known as the "paratrooper padre," the general made several combat jumps with airborne units in World War II and one in Korea.

He was captured by the Germans after jumping into Normady on D-Day in 1944, where he volunteered to remain behind with American wounded as the enemy counterattacked.

He was wounded by the Germans but escaped and returned to his

He jumped into Holland in December 1944 and was again captured at Bastogne in 1945, spending the rest of the war in a German POW camp.

Among his many decorations, Chaplain Sampson wears the Distinguished Service Cross, second highest U.S. award for bravery, awarded for his staying with wounded soldiers in Nor-
