



Black Power or God's Power for the American Negro?

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." (Romans 1: 16) The article you are about to read will probably not be too popular with many of you. No doubt some of my best Christian friends will disagree with some of the statements made. There are some things that I myself won't like to read. You may say, "Then why do you write such an article if you don't like some of the things it contains?". The reason I write this article is because I feel that due to my prejudice and possibly yours, we as Christians are failing the American Negro. I was raised in a Christian home where we were taught to respect mankind, no matter what color his skin was.

(I think this is where some of our parents have failed and are failing). Even though I was taught in this manner I have developed a sinful prejudice in my heart and along with most most of you, I feel I am a little better than the Negro. This prejudice has developed due to the society in which we live, but does this justify us in feeling this way?

An incident recently happened to one of the ladies of the 1st Free Will Baptist Church here in Festus which has caused me to examine myself and see if I, along with many of you, have hindered the work of the Spirit of God in our churches due to our prejudices. This lady of our church was attending school and there were some Negros also in the class. One of these Negro ladies was from this area and traveled to the school with other women of this area. This Negro girl had some serious domestic problems and was in dire need of spiritual help, but due to the problems it might create in offering to her, spiritual help through our church, this Christian had to limit her spiritual help to the Negro woman. Who do you suppose offered her help? There was also a Catholic woman attending the school from this area and she contacted the

priest about the Negro girl's problems and today, this Negro is taking instructions in the Catholic doctrine.

In the present civil rights trouble, one has only to open his eyes to see what churches are making tremendous gains in the Negro population. The liberals have converged on the present situation and are acting as great liberators of the Negro race. The late Dr. Martin Luther King was looked upon by both colored and white as a great civil rights leader. But as they were showing the various programs giving in detail his past life (after his assassination) did you notice where he had received his doctorate and education? Check on these schools and you'll find they are all very liberal. If you'll read in the April issue of Reader's Digest "Martin Luther King's March On Washington" (written before his assassination), you'll see plainly just how liberal he was and how he advocated non-violent civil disobedience and insisted that citizens violate unjust laws. In other words, he felt if you thought a law was unjust according to your way of thinking, you had the moral obligation to violate it. In this same issue of Reader's Digest you should read an article entitled "Is Insurrection Brewing in the United States?", which deals with the issue of civil disobedience. Recently the Methodist church here in Festus united with the colored Methodist. The fore-going incidents are just a few examples of the liberals attitudes concerning the American Negro.

You are probably asking at this point if I advocate integration of our churches. I don't know what the answer is and I'm sure you don't either, but there is an answer I'm sure if we'll trust God for it and not allow our own personal feelings to hinder His will.

Some of you might say, "Let the liberals have the niggers." When you make such a statement you are going against the very principals of Christianity and are directing souls to eternity in hell. Paul

SIX BIBLE COLLEGE STUDENTS NATIONALLY HONORED



PORTLAND, VANCOUVER CHURCHES MERGE

The First Free Will Baptist Church of Portland, Oregon, and the First Free Will Baptist Church of Vancouver, Washington, voted recently in separate conferences to become one body. The decision was made after it was learned that the building in which the Portland Church was conducting services was to be torn down in the near future for a large complex of apartments. The Vancouver Church had been without the regular services of a pastor since Bro. John Staggs moved to California in February.

On April 15, a special meeting of the Advisory Boards from each church met and worked out the necessary details regarding the merger. A combined conference of the two churches was called on April 17 at which time an unanimous vote was cast in favor of the merger and in acceptance of the Advisory Board's resolutions and recommendations.

It was agreed that the church would continue to function under the name of "The First Free Will Baptist Church, Inc. of Vancouver, Washington". All assets and liabilities of both groups would be combined and assumed by the one body.

The organizations of both churches were reconstructed to utilize personnel from both groups as officers and teachers in the church.

Bro. John Postlewaite was elected Pastor and will reside in the church parsonage at 513 E. Fourth Plain Blvd., Vancouver, Washington. Bro. Gene Whittaker was elected as the Associate Pastor; Mary Halliburton was named as Clerk-Treasurer; Raymond Reed and Burl Halliburton were elected Deacons; Gene Whittaker and Raymond Reed were added to the existing Trustee Board of the Vancouver Church, increasing the Board's membership to five. Don and Louise Wagner were elected to direct the Music and Youth Activities in the church. Gene Whittaker was elected to serve as General Sunday School Secretary.

makes it very plain in Romans 1: 14 about us who have the Gospel message as being debtors to all who are lost. As we look at the Scripture, which we opened this article with, we also see the difference between our message and the message of the liberals. Our message is stated in this verse, the liberals' message is that the gospel of Christ is the power of God 'unto morality' or 'unto good living' to everyone who 'finds God at work in society' (good works). They teach Christ as a good example, but they leave out the most important part of His coming to earth, His crucifixion, without which there can be no salvation. (II Cor. 5: 21)

I know we have many militant Black Power leaders who no doubt will cause us much trouble during the coming summer months, and many of the so-called "non-violent" civil rights leaders under the leadership of the liberals will cause us problems also. The question is, "What are we as Christians going to do?" Are we going to do as most of us have in

the past, nothing? Will it cause our prejudices to become even greater than they already are? Or will we think of the American Negro, who hasn't heard the full Gospel of Christ unto salvation, the same as we do the African Negro to whom we send missionaries? I know these are difficult questions to answer, but we need to answer them. As I mentioned before, God has the answer if we'll allow Him to work in our lives. If we fail to do anything about it let's see what Ezekiel 3: 18 says about it. "When I say unto the wicked, Thou shalt surely die; and thou givest him not warning, nor speakest to warn the wicked from his wicked way, to save his life; the same wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at thine hand," SO WHAT IS IT, BLACK POWER OR GOD'S POWER FOR THE AMERICAN NEGRO? The way we answer this question will no doubt determine the eternal destiny of many souls. Read Romans 14: 4-12.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. Who may attend?

Victory Auxiiary

Any young person who is eager to become a better servant for his Lord. Any boy or

girl who likes to play and work will feel at home at the Encampment.

2. What ages may attend?

Pre-Teen children 7 through 12. Younger may attend accompanied by a parent or responsible person. Teens, 13 through 19 years of age.

3. How much will it cost?

Pre-Teens \$9.00 for insurance, board and room.

Teens: \$10.00 for insurance, board and room.

There will be an additional charge for meals \$.50 per meal, on Saturday and Sunday (this applies to those who stay at the camp between sessions).

4. What do I need to bring?

You need to bring your toilet articles, such as soap, tooth brush, towels, etc. Bring a pillow, bed covers, sheets and blankets. Also, be sure to bring some play clothes and shoes, and your Bible, a notebook and pencil for your study work. If arriving before noon Sunday, bring sack lunch.

5. When should I get there?

Pre-Teens: May arrive Sunday, June 16 (if accompanied by sponsor). There will be services Sunday evening, 7:45 p.m. Session begins Monday, June 17, at 8:00 a.m. Teens: May arrive Sunday, June 23. Classes Monday, 9:00 a.m.

The Pre-Teen sessions will close at noon Friday. Teens will close Friday noon.
6. How shall I enroll?

On arrival at camp before being assigned to cabin. All persons attending, including the help, teachers, sponsors and officers must register for insurance. Anyone staying more than one day must register for insurance.

7. Who may get free meals?

Faculty, Dining Hall and Kitchen Help, Commissary Attendant, Recreational Director, First Aid, Youth Camp Board, and One Sponsor from each church sending children to camp.

8. How to get there:

Traveling west (of Lebanon) on Highway 66, go 16 miles to Junction M; go 1 mile east to CC Highway; south 8 miles to Niangua Junction; turn east on M Highway 2 miles east to camp. Going east (from Springfield) on Highway 66, turn right at Highway Junction 38 to CC Highway at Marshfield; turn north 8 miles to

Niangua Junction M Highway, east 2 miles to camp. From Highway 5 to Grovespring, turn west on Highway M, 15 miles to camp.

9. Statement of Youth Camp Board:

Parents may feel sure that proper care will be given all children who come to the camp. They will have strict supervision, good housing and medical care if necessary. (However, your Board will not be responsible for any reoccurrence of any previous illness or injury caused by your child's neglect or activity.) Any child who becomes ill or should need the care of their parents will be rushed to his home immediately.

- 3. No marring of camp property by writing, marking or otherwise.
- 4. No property will be moved from one cabin to another without permission of the cabin owner.
- 5. All who use this camp at any time will be expected to so conduct themselves as to not bring reproach on the cause of Christ.
- 6. List of safety rules given by playground supervisors must be obeyed.
- 7. No one will be allowed to leave the camp grounds without permission of the general supervisor (insurance and safety regulations).
- 8. Attendance at all classes will be required unless excused by the general supervisor. Unexcused absences will take points from your grades.
- Each instructor will give examination. Come expecting to learn.
- 10. No one will be on the playground until the call for "pledge to flags."
- 11. You will be asked to sign an agreement that you will fully observe all rules governing the camp. Breaking of any rules set up by the Camp Board will warrant expelling from camp.



Reports were given and accepted. At a previous meeting we voted to bring items to send to our boys over in Vietnam. They were packed and mailed out.



Total cost of the new construction was \$48,000. It was financed through Executive Church Bonds Inc.





mind went back to about two years ago when I was with Brother Bob in Cape.

Attendance was very small. They were meeting in an upstairs lodge hall and every thing about the work seemed to be discouraging. But we were firmly convinced that it was the will of the Lord for FWB to have a church in Cape Girardeau. We decided to truly test the Lord and prove him. He has more than adequately satisfied our desires. We have a good church in Cape Girardeau, as well as Desoto, O'Fallon, Independence, and soon in St. Joseph.

The State Mission Board has prayerfully decided to start a work in Columbia. Brother and Sister Mark Vandivort will move there in August. This will be another hard work. We anticipate a slow work. But we believe that the Lord wants a FWB

Church in this strategic city, and we believe that FWB across Missouri want a church in Columbia also. We believe the Lord will see us through.

Those of us who have been elected to serve on the State Mission Board feel the heavy responsibility that is placed upon us. We believe that every dollar should be used wisely. We also know that there is no room for failure in the Lord's service. As a board we carefully watch the progress of each mission we establish. We prayerfully consider the needs of the State and the opportunities of each location before deciding where we will start the next church. We have a few rules to guide us. For instance, we will not financially help a group establish a church that comes out of another church because of trouble or strife. We prayerfully select experienced, proven men who feel the call of the Lord to do Home Mission work in Missouri. We do not make donations to churches for building

purposes, but if possible we will loan to them for this cause.

When a church is organized, she becomes the manager of her affairs. She selects her own pastor, and makes her own decisions. But sometimes a church will develope some problems after the board has ceased to help her manage her church affairs. We believe it is the responsibility of the Missouri Board to offer assistance and to urge the church to accept this help in order that the work might go on and not dissolve. Such is the case right now in Marshall, Missouri. There is a need and we hope to be able to assist and adequately supply the answer to the problem.

During the past four years I have served as chairman of the mission board, and during this time, several men have served with me. Men such as Brother Bob Jones, Brother Everett Hellard, Brother Dale Skiles, Brother Leland Horton, Brother Ted Davis, and Brother John Land. I can honestly say that our program has been consistently in line with the thoughts of all these men. We have repeatedly asked the general board of our Missouri State Association to give any criticism or suggestions needed. They have always offered only their encouragement for the continuation of our program. We believe that the hundreds of people across Missouri who faithfully support State missions have also voted their approval of our program.

We see a great need across Missouri. FWB need to establish churches in Sedalia, Sikeston, Hannibal, Nevada, Carthage and Branson in the next five years. This still will leave cities such as Warrensburg, Marysville, Mexico, and Moberly without a FWB ministry. We ask for your continued support. In 1968-69 we need \$1200.00 each month to carry out our projected plans of church expansion. We need \$700.00 in personal and church offerings in addition to at least \$500.00 in Coop. receipts.

In August we will have both Brother Vandivort and Brother Skiles out on Itinerant work. We need consistent support. We need church who will send monthly offerings each month for the duration of the thirty month contract we have with the missionary. Please do not stop your support after one year.

My prayer is that in a few years we will have FWB churches in every city and town in Missouri. I hope to see the day come soon when a family can move anywhere in Missouri and have a FWB church waiting for them. This is your work. This is your program. You never know when you or your children will be moving and will be the recipient of the blessings of our State Mission Program. Please accept the challenge and support State Missions. 


