

(Genesis 1: 1) God the maker of all (Luke 24: 38, 39) (Acts 1: 6-9) So

(Genesis 1: 1) God the maker of all things had the first vision of missions. He had the master plan, the plan of salvation, even in the very beginning. His vision and plan started even before His first creation. He could see the generations ahead down through the ages, even unto this very day, even unto the end of time, when He shall speak the word and Jesus shall descend in Glory to take His people home. Yes, God, the Great Creator, the Beginning and the End truly had the first vision.

(Luke 2: 11) Thus it was that Jesus was born. Only a baby, but what a great and marvelous baby. A very miracle Himself, born as any child, flesh and blood, but being the Son of God.

(Luke 2: 40) When Jesus was twelve they went to Jerusalem for the feast of the passover and you remember that when Mary and Joseph left Jerusalem Jesus was not with them. Mary and Joseph journeyed back to Jerusalem in search of their boy and when they found Him in the temple He was much surprised at their concern. (Luke 2: 49)

We know how Jesus withstood Satan's temptations, how He gathered His disciples, and of all the miracles He worked, of His teachings and parables, each one with a significant meaning to mankind. Luke 6: 47, 48) And so it was that Jesus' life continued to about the age of thirty-three, until the plan so carefully laid out for our salvation came to pass.

They laid Him on the cross and drove the huge nails in His hands and feet. We know how it feels to prick our finger with a needle. Think of the anguish and pain of having a spike driven through one's hand. Many of us have known people who have suffered a great deal of pain. Take that and multiply it ten times ten and more for the suffering of Christ. For His pain was to cleanse a world of sin, to cleanse each person who believes in Christ and asks His forgivness, to give you and me life eternal. Thus, it was that Jesus died and was laid in the tomb, but glory to God, on the third day he arose. After He had risen He talked with His disciples.

(Luke 24: 38, 39) (Acts 1: 6-9) So it was that the greatest mission was accomplished.

(Acts 1: 8) Every child of God has a mission today, that of spreading the gospel, of telling others about Jesus. Some have a greater mission, some have been called of God to preach and become missionaries. We as Christians have a responsibility, that of helping the missionary in every way possible. They need funds. Money to spread God's word to the far corners of the earth. Yes, we need to do all we can and this concerns more than money, this concerns our prayers.

Let us stop here and think a moment. How content we are here in America with our lives, in our nice comfortable homes, with our electric lights, our running water, our soft beds and our good food, where our daily problems consist of just what we will fix for dinner, or perhaps it's getting Herman to wash his ears before going to school, or maybe we're upset because we don't have the money to buy a new car when the Jones right next door do. We really do have big problems don't we. But what of the missionaries? An article from the August, 1965 issue of HEART-BEAT entitled "Is It Worth It?" tells us some of their problems. "Isolation, no running water, no flush commode. Missionaries like nice things too. . .everyone seems hungry, scarcely enough rice for ourselves. Missionaries need to eat too ... And the dust, no place to take a shower, wonder what's in the water. Boiling kills the bugs, but out in the villages they don't always boil things too well. Missionaries like to be clean and healthy too. . . Never seem to get caught up, always tired. I wonder, is it worth it all? Yet, there's the man at the market and the children in the village. I promised to come back to see them. There's the village grandfather who accepted the Lord last week and the hostil boys. Their dedication to the Lord shames me. At least we aren't completely alone out here. The Lord's with us, and He knows our needs. Folks at home, remember us in prayer. . Is is worth it? You know the answer."

SUBJECT: Perseverance Of The Saints.

Someone once said that "a Saint was one who makes it easier to be a Christian by living the Bible teachings." A saintly life will let salvation issue forth into service and character, and with these qualities there will be a Holy concern for the salvation of others.

Perseverance Means Stick To The End: Don't stumble or staggar over the promises of God. Walk all the way with Jesus, to give up or quit is no profit or joy. I know some who say that you do not need to put forth any effort to walk with God, once you are saved you will never be lost. These ideas of men may sound good but are terribly dangerous.

We Free Will Baptist Believe that the truly reginerated will persever unto the end and be saved through the power of divine grace which is pledged for their support, but their future obedience and final salvation are neither determined nor certain, since through informity and manifold temptation they are in danger of falling; and they ought therefore to watch and pray lest they make shipwreck of their faith and be lost.

Jesus Said: Matt. 10:22: "He that endureth to the end shall be saved." I am sure that our Saviour knows the frality of humanity and the dangers of temptation in this present world for all of us or He would not have left this message for us. He was so sure of these dangers that the Holy Ghost inspired Matthew to again record this Holy warning in Matt. 24: 13.

It is just as easy to fall from the top of a ladder as it is from a middle or lower rung, if we allow our lives to become unlike that which our Saviour expects and examplifies we cannot expect an invitation to share that sinless city. This Christian race is neither to the strong or swift but to the end. Again Jesus speaks in Luke 9: 62: "No man having put his hand to the plough, and looking back is fit for the Kingdom of Heaven." Here Jesus shows our own lack of skill or ability and need of self denial and the opposition and temptations that must be overcome. We must keep plowing till Jesus says it is enough. Read each of the excuses offered to Jesus in the ninth chapter of St. Luke and you will find that there is no doubt as to the demands of the Kingdom of God upon our lives.

Paul Wrote The Galatians — In Ch. 1: 6, of his feeling toward their backsliding, saying: "I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the Grace of Christ unto another Gospel." Here the apostle deals with a very great need in a church that has committed (Apostacy) blacksliding. Apostacy July 1968 means to revolt, stand off, to turn away from. We read again in Gal. 4: 9: "After ye have known God, or rather are known of GOD, How turn ye again to the beggarly elements."

This great apostle seemed to have a great deal of trouble in the churches that he had labored to found on the matter of backsliding. Read with us again from the Word of God, Heb. 10: 38: The just shall live by faith: but if any man draw back my soul shall have no pleasure in him." I am sure that this expresses the feeling of every pastor who has seen souls shipwrecked on some of today's modern theology.

Jesus Was Not Careful To Remind His Followers Of The Cost of Discipleship. Jesus reminded others that they, "must forsake all that they have and take up their cross and follow Him. Jesus' call was always and still is a call to come and die. We are to die to ourselves, the old self must die so the Christ transformed person can live.

Jude verses 5: 7 gives historical instances of Israel's sins. As an example to New Testament Christians. Hear him in verse 5, "I will therefore put you in remembrance though you once knew this, how the Lord, having saved the people out of the land of Egypt, afterwards destroyed them that believed not." Jude goes even farther to say in verse 6 "The angels which kept not their first estate" — notice it was their choice to sin, they were not willing to stay in their place. "But left their own habitation". He hath reserved in everlasting chains under darkness." Jude again cries out the woe of those who went after the way of Cain and ran greedily after the error of Balaam for reward, and perished in the gain saying of core." All these examples were preached to the early Apostolic Church.

Are we more perfect than those which Jude preached and wrote to? In this day of riots and rebellion, do not men still need the lesson of the Bible on Cain or Balaam who thought pollution of the righteous seed of Abraham. Do not our people need to know that the rebellion of Korah and Dathan and Abriam was not pleasing to God, and neither is ours? Does not the Bible still say He that knoweth to do good and doeth it not to Him it is a sin? Is it not true that to God a lie is still a lie, and murder is still sin, and drunkenness is something more than a disease called alcholism?

Oh that men, even Christian professors would realize it is not what you were, but what you are now that assures our eternal hope!

NEWS FROM OUR BIBLE COLLEGES

13 STUDENTS AWARDED AT OKLA. BIBLE COLLEGE

Thirteen students were awarded Associate of Arts degrees from Oklahoma Bible College in graduation exercises May 31. The graduating sophomores hold the distinction of being the first class to complete their junior college degree on the present campus having entered in September, 1966 while the existing buildings were in the final stages of construction.

Mr. Edwin Bowden, Booneville, Arkansas, was the recipient of the Outstanding Student award which is presented annually by the faculty to the individual who, because of his "academic ability, leadership ability, attitude, and general achievement in the area of relationship in regard to the faculty and other students" merits such distinction.



LETTER FROM SANDERS' IN HAWAII

Dear Co-Partners,

It has been several months since we wrote to you - not because we did not want to keep you informed but there has been so much activity that we did not know how to write a News Letter. First let me give you a brief statistical report: We are averaging well over a hundred in Sunday School and during the past month we have had 11 decisions, 13 new members and baptized 3.

The Lord has blessed in so many ways in providing for our needs - let me start at the beginning. About three months ago we bought a 36' x 100' six months old building valued at \$60,000.00. We obtained this building (which was equipped with two rest rooms, four rows of florescent lights from one end to the other, and several other items of furnishings) for \$3,000.00. It is costing us \$7,000.00 to move the building, have it posted, etc. Things seemed to be going our way until we tried to get a permit to build. City Hall refused to grant us a permit because they said they planned to put a road through our property at the exact spot where we wanted to put our new build-July 1968

ing. As if this was not enough they told us that they were going to "buy us out" and build a city park in this area. Well, if you ever saw a group of people pray with a burden these people did. We had the Free Will Baptist Bible College, The Free Willl Baptist Headquarters Staff, and Bob Jones University. (Also BJU broadcast the prayer request over their two radio stations in Greenville, S.C. and Atlanta, Ga. joining us in prayer). I prepared a letter of protest to be given to the members of the City Council stating why we did not want to sell. After numerous conferences and telephone calls, we were invited to take our case to the Public Works Committee.

The situation really looked dark because we know of three other churches who have recently lost their property to the City and State. I had contacted a few government officials but there was no one willing to stick his "proverbial neck" out and take a stand with us against the City Planners and Parks Departments. On Friday, April 19, a few members of the church gathered for prayer; then we all went to City Hall to make ourselves heard in the meeting with the Public Works Committee. I do not think any of us quiet expected the Lord to work as He did. Our case was the first to be heard and it started with the Assistant City Planner placing his large map on the board and pointing out where they were going to put a road through our property. The Chairman of the Committee, asked him if the road had to go that way and he, after much stammering, said it could be changed. Then the Chairman showed him where he thought the road should go which would miss our property completely. The Chairman of the Committee was the Councilman from our District and was familiar with our area. Then the representative from the Parks Department put his map on the board and the beauty of the proposed park was breath taking. Then he said in a very dignified but stern manner to the City Planners and Parks Departments, "You have enough land without interrupting the good work of this Church. You are instructed to issue their building permit." The Parks official removed his map and said, "Very well, I to page 11

We wish to thank each of you for your prayers and we feel that God intervened in a very special way, relieving her of much suffering. she is now at home and about her normal activities.


