WAKE UP AMERICA

AM CONCERNED that so many of the American people are unaware of what is really going on in our great United States today. Even our people in power seem to be floundering around seeking an answer to the ever increasing chaos.

Some feel that education and more public works are the answer. These are not effective because there is a missing link which is indispensable. Without that link all the high-minded impulses to legislate, to educate, and to reform become sounding brass.

That missing link is love, and only God can supply a feeling of love and understanding for one another.

Man by nature is contaminated with an unconquerable human greed, and we as a nation are growing farther from God's plan for our lives. We took prayer out of schools to avoid treading on someone's civil rights and have exchanged it for rioting and destruction of our institutions. Where do civil rights start and stop? One of the chief cornerstones our republic was built upon was the idea "that every person should have complete freedom of expression, so long as he does not interfere with the rights of others." This means that every person should not only have equal rights in voting and governmental affairs, but equal opportunity to develop himself as an individual to the fullest extent of his capabilities. This also includes the belief that limitations should not be placed upon anyone because of his color, religious beliefs, or financial status. The only true barriers to further development are those natural limitations he possesses or unwillingness to work for advancement.

Looking back over the one-half century that I have enjoyed living in this wonderful country, I can see a large number of changes. Those of us who had to walk several miles to and from school each day in both good and bad weather, who carried a cold lunch of fried potatoes, and biscuits, or whatever was left from the breakfast table; who crawled out of bed way before dawn in order to get the cows milked and numerous other chores done in time to walk to school, who received treats such as nuts, candy, or oranges only at Christmas time, and who looked forward to



the 4th of July picnics because that was the one time we could afford the extravagance of an ice cream cone -- those of us in this class wanted better things for our children and grandchildren. Consequently, in many families both the mother and father went out to the public works in order to give our offspring better than we had.

We have provided increasingly better schools; we provided hot lunches, furnished buses to carry them to and from school, and we have seen to it that they have an abundance of good things to eat as often as they desire. We have broken our necks to keep abreast with society in having all the electrical devices and appliances in our homes and at least two cars per family. We now have ice cream and all the mouth-watering delicacies that we hungered for as children.

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We have seen to it that our children have much more time to sleep and play than we did. But by doing so, we have been compelled to spread ourselves so thin that there is very little of ourselves left to give to our children. Thus, many of our children have grown thin, not physically, but spiritually and morally. We do not have the time for the Bible reading and prayer in many of our homes as did our parents. Consequently, love has diminished to a degree, and many of these homes have broken up and many others might as well have.

Now that we have given materially to this generation of children, we have sacrificed that all important ingredient, that basic need, love. I doubt seriously that where love is barren, respect flourishes. As a result of our over-indulgence, we have reared some very disrespectful and frustrated offspring.

These are coming from prosperous and above average income families as well as the poverty class. Hence, my argument is that poverty is not our major problem. There is more restlessness and frustration among our youth of today than in any other period. They have had more, materially, than history has ever known, yet they come from among the intellectuals as well as the unlearned and under-privileged. When has America known greater educational advantages and more students attending and completing college? Greater education alone will not correct the ailment.

Let us take a look at the core of this ulcer. A few years ago a political leader stated, "America cannot be defeated by war from without, but must fall of decay from inside." This frustrated number in our populace was the choice element to drop the foreign ideas into. Ideas promote greater changes than any atom or hydrogen bomb.

We often hear an expression of sympathy made in regard to the youthfulness and innocence of this minority group, but what we are failing to see is the wheel behind this group that motivates their behaviour. This treacherous power will use any means, in anyway, to divide the American people. The major targets today are race, religion, labor, politics, and education. For example let us look at how race is being used presently. Actually, neither the black or white race is really responsible for this racial disturbance. If we look carefully we will find some of both races being used. The real purpose behind the scene is to create race hatred and it is proving effective. If we are not careful, we are going to have more racial prejudice instead of tolerance and understanding toward one another, and find ourselves eventually in a civil war.

Can we not look at the other countries and recognize our own ailments? Yes, I am talking about the force of communism. What can be done about it? First we need to turn back to God, nationally, that we might be able to claim His promises. We need to pray for God's infallible leadership for both ourselves and our leaders. We deny the right to teach about God in the schools, but the atheistic views are still being promoted. How can we expect national blessings from God?

It is time for us to awaken from this lethargy and take a stand against the uprisings which are destroying the rights of all the American people.

When our generation was in school, students were expelled on far less grounds than the antics prevalent in our schools and colleges today. Rather than have a minority group cause havoc and cripple the ability of other students in securing an education they should be expelled.

Is it fair to allow a minority group to stay in school, gain momentum and continue to destroy what we have worked to provide for them? Certainly not! There are many boys in Vietnam who would be happy to have the privilege these students object to so violently. If they are so eager to fight, why not replace the boys in service who desire an education, with those that do not.

I would like to express that by all means we need to be conscious of the work of communism and oppose it with like diligence for "United We Stand, Divided We Fall."

In the near future we hope to establish several home Bible study groups. Pray that many will come to know Christ through this witness.

January Enlistment Time

As a new year approaches, Mrs. Auxiliary Member, you are as busy as can be. Thanksgiving is just past; Christmas is just ahead, a new year right on its heels.

As January rounds the corner, Mrs. Vice-President, your job is spelled out for you — enlist the unenlisted, re-enlist former members, and reactiveate laggard members. Big job? Sure! But it can be done. How? Plan the most enjoyable, stimulating enlistment dinner in the history of your auxiliary. Mrs. Vice-President, this is your job.

I. PLAN

Plan time, place, and date of your dinner. The place might be the church fellowship hall; or a basement, large family room, or recreation room of a member's home. Perhaps you prefer to make this a luncheon rather than an evening meal. Make your plans according to the preference of your auxiliary.

Plan theme. Use "Laborers together with God", I Cor. 3:9, as the theme, posting it in large letters in the focal point of the room.

Plan the program. Build your program around the theme. A skit such as "Introducing the Woman's Auxiliary" (order from WNAC) is ideal for depicting the purpose of Woman's Auxiliary in an interesting way.

Plan for special recognition of each guest, and give each one the opportunity to join your auxiliary if she wishes. Handle this part of the program carefully. I have seen women who had no intention of joining the Auxiliary reluctantly consent when asked publicly to do so. Guests should clearly understand before the dinner that this is a special effort to entice them to join. You want every woman who genuinely wants to join with you, but those pressured into joining your Auxiliary will not be an asset to your group. So plan wisely for this aspect of the program. Present each one who joins a current *Co-Laborer* and a *Woman's Auxiliary Manual*.

Plan a time for laughter in the program. Use amusing anecdotes, a brief story, or even a humorous skit.

Plan a spiritual boost. Cap it all with a stirring spiritual time, such as a dramatic reading, brief pageant, special music or testimony.

If you wish, ask your Program-Prayer Chairman to be responsible for the entire program, or specific parts of it. Give her some ideas as to what you want, the time limit, etc.

Plan the decorations. A committee should be given charge of decorations. Encourage them to use ingenuity and spare nothing to make the room very impressive. After all this is a once-a-year affair and the biggest social event on the Auxiliary calendar. By all means use the Auxiliary colors, lavender and white, for the color scheme.

Plan the meal. I suggest that each Auxiliary member bring a casserole, a salad, and a dessert; and that the meal is

served buffet style. However, you may prefer to place your Social Chairman in complete charge of the meal so that she can make the plans.

Plan for a friendly atmosphere. The most successful enlistment efforts are those which lend an air of friendliness and cordiality. The decorations are beautiful, the theme and program planned in every detail, the meal delicious; but the Auxiliary members sit together, eat together, talk together. The result -- guests feel left out. The solution, use place cards to designate who sits where. This encourages conversation among all the women. No one is left alone. Everyone has someone, or several, with whom to talk.

II. PREPARE

Prepare yourself. Even though your plans seem perfect, prepare yourself for a few letdowns. Remember that some people choose to be criticial, rather than helpful. But remember also, that most of the Auxiliary members are behind you and are supporting you.

Prepare the Auxiliary... for hard work! Auxiliary members must be genuinely interested in recruiting new members for the enlistment dinner to be a success. Solicit their complete support and effort in inviting the guests. You might decide to use the "Twin Sister" idea each woman brings a guest who is designated as her "twin". The guest may be any woman who is a prospect for active membership in your Auxiliary. Any of the many other plans for inviting guests may be used. Consult your vice-president's guide, page 11-16, for further ideas.

In addition, the Auxiliary must expect to cooperate with you and assist you. I have mentioned the work of various committees previously. A successful enlistment dinner cannot be a "one-man-show". Each Auxiliary member should feel that she is helping to enlist new members through her part in the preparation for the dinner.

Prepare thoroughly. Meet with all the committees a few days before the dinner; double check every detail. Leave nothing hanging in the air. Tie all loose ends together at this meeting.

III. PERFORM

This is "zero" hour! If the planning and preparation have been conscientiously taken care of, the performance should go beautifully. Remember, Mrs. Vice-President, you are the coordinator and the hostess. Your job is to see that everything is well planned. thoroughly prepared, and finally, that the dinner itself is hosted well.

In conclusion, there are other ways to enlist new members, most of which are less laborious and require less ingenuity. But those are also less successful. Don't forget-nothing can top food, fun, and fellowship. To women, these are irrestistible!

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

TEN PERCENT
OF BIBLE COLLEGE
GIFTS TO AID
STUDENTS

The administration of Free Will Baptist Bible College has announced that the school has designated 10 per cent of \$175,000 general fund quota for 1968-69 to be placed in a loan fund for financially handicapped students. This will place more than \$17,000 in low-interest loans at the disposal of students who might otherwise have to drop out of the Bible College because of financial problems.

For some time loan funds sponsored by various groups and individuals in the denomination have been available to qualifying students, but the amount of capital in these funds was severly limited. By making more money available, the College administration and Board of Trustees hope to make it possible for many students to complete the training God has called them to begin.

OVER \$10,000 RAISED FOR BIBLE COLLEGE FURNISHINGS

Several months ago, a number of contacts around the denomination were made relative to the adoption of projects to buy furniture for the new buildings on the Bible College campus. Since that time Sunday school classes, CTS groups, auxiliaries, churches and even entire associations have gotten involved in the effort to equip the school's new dormitory and classroom building.

Over \$10,000 in pledges and gifts has come in so far. The projects are receiving wide-spread approval from Free Will Baptist people, so that those who have completed one project are pledging themselves to complete another.

A Heralds CTS group in Birmingham, Alabama has given \$200 to buy new furniture for a Bible College student. So has a young people's Sunday school class in Wheelersburg, Ohio. A church in Columbia, South Carolina has made a large gift in memory of a serviceman from their church. (The Bible College will provide a commemorative plaque for any gift of \$200 or more designated as a memorial.)

Projects range in size from \$16 for a single desk to several thousand dollars for lounge furniture and laboratory equipment. Information on the adoption of projects may be obtained by writing the Office of Development, in care of the Bible College.
