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

THE **BEST** THAT **I** HAVE

To do the best you can with what you have. This creed seems to sum up my attitude toward life. And with this idea I will attempt to write my testimony to the power of God. The dates and circumstances of when and where I first experienced the power of God seem to be unimportant. But what is important is that I have found that Christ does satisfy a thirsting soul and can give a purpose and meaning to life.

Before I accepted Christ there was little chance that I would amount to anything. God can give each life a purpose to strive for high goals. Through my teens I had a hard time in school, and I just didn't seem to fit because I didn't want to adjust myself to my circumstances. Not until my late teens did I realize that God wanted me to accept my circumstances and try to adjust myself to them. People are not going to adjust themselves to me, rather it is I that need to adjust myself to others. It was with this new attitude that I started to better apply myself. And when I did people were more ready to help me for people are kind and are always ready to help others help themselves. It was suggested to me that I try to write as a means of finding something to do with idle time. The first writing that I did was a short paragraph about finding God, and was published in a newsletter. That was my first taste of writing and I liked it. My parents and teachers were pleased with the discovery that I could write.

It was not until years later when I was pondering what I was going to achieve with my life that the idea occurred to me that I could write. Besides, writing is a ministry, too, So I started to set my goals toward writing. This pleased my parents so much, especially Daddy. Even now when I go home Daddy just devours my writings. And when Daddy reads something other than his newspaper, thats something! Sometimes I get frustrated with my writings when I am trying to write a perfect paper and it turns out a mess. I think that I have wasted several packets of typing paper trying.

I know that it is God's will for me to write. I will have to apply more elbow grease but I will do it! God never expects the impossible—just the possible at our best.

The one thing which is so downgrading to me is pity. I hate the subject for I have seen what it can do to a life. Pity is something very harmful and dangerous for one to indulge. True, many times one hears my making wisecracks about my handicap. One of my favorite jokes is about c.p. Jello. We are often served Jello at the workshop. One day I was trying to eat Jello when it ended up on the floor. Then the thearapist helped me with it. I made the remark that it must be affected by cerebral palsey, too, because it is so shakey and unstable. So now we always have fun with c.p. Jello as they feed me to prevent it from falling on the floor.

I am sure that some of you would be horrified if you could hear what goes on during my therapy sessions. Instead of gently saying, "Don't fall down because you might hurt yourself," the physical therapist says, "If you fall, I will beat you; besides, I hate the sight of blood on my clean floor." Actually I love people like this and have more respect for this type of person because it gives me the feeling of being human and not just something to be pittied. Personally I feel that God judges people on their ability to reason and understand rather than in the physical realm. I feel that pity in any form is wrong. It is better to look on the bright side of life than to always be looking on the gloomy.

Psychology tells us that it is not natural for a normal man to find life pleasant and satisfying all of the time. Sometimes one cannot help but despair. The Bible tells us that Jesus also had moments of despair. Yes, I get frustrated over seemingly small things. For instance, too many errors on a composition will send me into a fit of tears. It is on these occasions that Isaiah 26:3 means so much to me. I am thankful that when I do despair I seem to be reminded that I am in God's hands and He takes care of those who are trying to serve Him.

When young people reach eighteen they are usually through school or it is just too bad. In my case it was just too bad, for I was just entering the seventh grade. I didn't feel that I was ready to quit school yet for I was determined to get through high school. So my sister Maxine protested and got a private tutor for me. She was a very good teacher. Within two years of study under her I was able to grasp enough basics to pass my high school entrance exams and get into high school classes at the workshop.

My parents and I discussed the reasons why I should to a place for the handicapped. We could see how hopeless the situation was getting to be. I was becoming a vegetable with the lack of stimulation. I could see as I grew older that something must be done before I got worse and wouldn't even have the desire to better myself. Often during these months I prayed that God would give me the strength to leave home. Many months passed of correspondence to various places for handicapped adults. Then we found the workshop where I could work, go to school and get therapy. Questions about living quarters were soon settled, and I started to pack for the unknown. I was very frightened for I never managed my own affairs and had never thought that I could.

I came to Seattle only to find what I thought was a very detached world. I was scared of the dark, gloomy basement workshop. (We have since moved into our new facilities). It seemed that I was the only outsider and I felt utterly alone. I remember sitting by a window and wondering where God was. To say that I never doubted God would be a lie. Here I was unable to communicate with any one, and I thought that the situation here was just as it was at home. Where did I get the crazy idea to leave home? I asked myself many questions and all had a negative answer. So with all the utter hopelessness I just decided to go home, and when I got old they could cart me off to an institution. It was a very defeated attitude.

During the first week of my arrival I met Lloyd and Betty. I could communicate with them with the use of my letterboard. I told them that I had decided to go back home. They seemed to be so disappointed that I was giving up. Betty and Lloyd seemed to have a confidence in me and forsight that made me think. I can't explain it but their faith in me really did something. I started to gain confidence in myself and really make an effort to apply myself because Betty and Lloyd had faith in me.

The next six months I tried harder, knowing that they had faith in me, and we prayed that God would help me to apply myself better. Things started to fall in place now. I was moved to the South Wing where the kids were and where the nurses had experience with handicapped people. One of the first things that they did was to place my typewriter on a sturdy table where I could get at it better. Then I started to concentrate on my writing and to read again. The only way that I knew how to settle down was to start doing things that I enjoyed doing and make this my home. I prayed that God would help me apply myself as He would have me to do.

Carolyn is a wonderful Christian girl who is a victim of Cerebral palsy. She was converted at our church in Anchorage, Alaska and is now a member of our church in Seattle. She cannot speak but is very gifted with a brilliant mind.

THE BURDEN OF OUR HEARTS

I can not recall a time in my ministry when I have not seen and had a burden for the needs of lost souls in large cities. I suppose being reared in a large city, St. Louis, Missouri, had something to do with this burden. Every time I have the opportunity to drive through a large city, it seems that I am irresistibly drawn to the downtown sections and there, as I look upon the multitudes of people, I see them as "sheep having no shepherd" and I cannot escape the words, "but the laborers are few".

Not being able to escape the words, "the laborers are few", and realizing the need of and having the burden for souls in the large cities, God spoke to my heart in a very real and definite way. It was in 1966 during the missionary service at the National Association in Little Rock, Arkansas. The call was simple. "Why don't you do something about the needs of the souls in large cities?" The call was an abiding one and still remained with me in 1967 when I spoke to Brother Homer Willis about it at the National Association in Jacksonville, Florida. It was in 1968, after a conversation with Brother Bob Shockey, that I yielded and told the Lord I was ready to go if He would show me where he wanted me to go.

I wrote to several large cities where there were no Free Will Baptist churches requesting information and began to pray and meditate about where God would have me go. After much prayer, I felt led to the city of St. Paul, Minnesota. We met with the Home Mission Board in November, 1968, and presented our burden for this work. We were approved and authorized to begin itinerary work to raise our financial and prayer support for this work.

The St. Paul – Minneapolis area offers to us a great opportunity. The Twin City Metropolitan area has a population of over one and a half million people. St. Paul is the capitol of Minnesota and sits in the center of the state. The state of Minnesota is bordered by at least three other states—North Dakota, South Dakota and Wisconsin—and as such is strategically located. There is a liberal influence in the area and the need for a fundamental evangelical witness is great.

May God grant the desires of your heart, pleasing to Him in 1969.



As I sat down to write this article, I said: "What can I say about Stewardship and Prayer that everyone hasn't already thought of?" Then my little boy came up with a six-year-old suggestion: "Tell them not to stew, but instead to pray." Crudely worded maybe, but he does have a thought. How many of the problems that we face individually and as a nation do we "stew" over instead of pray about? Too many, I'm afraid. As we approach the World Day of Prayer, this would be a good time to stop "stewing" and start praying.

As a suggestion for observing the World Day of Prayer, why not make paper globes and pass them out with the reminders of the Lord's words: "Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not" (Jeremiah 33:3). Little things to take home from monthly meetings are great ways to help remember the special requests. Prayer partners help too. You can get together over the phone or in your home, and share requests. As the chorus says: "Pray, pray everyday. Never, never cease. Praying is the touch with God, that brings to us sweet peace."

But when to pray is something else. Some of my greatest times with the Lord have been in hot water . . . and not the trouble kind of hot water. As a minister's wife and mother, about the only two times I really have to myself are in the bathtub and doing dishes. So this is my usual prayer time. The Lord didn't say where, but to always be ready . . . anywhere.

Stewardship involves a word which we usually would rather not discuss. The word is money. But remember that in giving, not only money is involved, but everything about you: your time, talent, and just plain you. Make giving a blessing. Don't be like the Christian this poem discribes:

Once there was a Christian He had a pious look; His consecration was complete, Except his pocketbook. He'd put a nickel in the plate And then, with might and main, He'd sing, "When we asunder part, It gives us inward pain." Make giving interesting. Get involved in a project and learn about it. Our state project is "Help Build a Fort for the Vandivorts". Draw a fort and cover it with money. Make clever blanks to take home for those pennies, nickels and dimes you find here and there. Or try saving a penny a meal for a month.

Bulletin boards make wonderful places to let people know what you are doing as an auxiliary. You may be surprised at the support you have from non-auxiliary members. You may even get some new members when they see that you are really interested and working.

We can get so carried away in working and doing that we forget the real reason behind our working. Remember to give God the glory in your prayer life and giving.

The life that costs is the life that really counts for Christ. "Whatever you lose and cannot find again in Christ, is better lost."

Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings from your missionaries in St. Joseph! We are certainly happy to be back in Missouri. In the fall of 1959, we loaded up our 1951 Ford and moved to Nashville, Tennessee to attend the Bible college. With the help of my dear wife, I graduated in the spring of 1965. In the fall of that same year, we accepted the pastorate of the Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Columbus, Georgia. We served there until we accepted the work here in St. Joseph.

Both my wife and I were members of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Kirksville, Missouri. I was saved there and answered the call to preach at the Youth Camp in Niangua, Missouri. Thank God for Youth Camps! Although we enjoyed southern hospitality, we are happy to be back in our home state. The Lord did bless us in the South though. Two Maggarts left Missouri but four came back. Our little boy is five years of age and our little daughter is nine months old. We so much about our history.

We have been in St. Joseph for three months and the Lord is already opening doors of opportunity for us. We have purchased some property in the northern area of the city. Our property is near two new sub-divisions. A third sub-division is now being developed only eight blocks from our church. Our property is more than an acre in size. It has a nice five-room house with a full basement and central heating. We are using the entire house for the church. When our congregation becomes too large for the house, we have room to build on the same lot. We paid \$11,500 for our property. Compared to other tracts we looked at, we feel that this was a reasonable price. We are in an excellent location, the opportunity is great, and the fields are ripe unto harvest. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into his harvest." (Matt. 9:38)

We held our first service in our new property November 24. We had 28 in Sunday school and 35 for preaching. Our Sunday school attendance is presently running between 20 and 30. We enrolled 10 in Sunday school the last two weeks. Last Sunday two children were enrolled who had not attended church in over a year. This is a real ministry!

As I write this article, I can look out the window and see numerous homes which house the unsaved and unchurched. Every day I see precious children missing valuable Christian training because of materialistic minded parents. Daily we are reminded of the power of the adversary. The great majority turn deaf ears to our witness and counsel; yet we go from door to door searching for hungry hearts. This work takes patience faith, prayer, determination, and a burning heart. We must have your prayers! What the Lord accomplishes here will depend a great deal upon whether you pray or not. "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much" (James 5:16b).

Why are we establishing a Free Will Baptist Church in St. Joseph, Missouri? It is because God has raised up Free Will Baptists in these last days to join with other fundamental denominations in heralding forth the truth. Free Will Baptists are not great in number, but we are great in the eyes of God because we preach and teach the infallible Word of God. Recently I had a conversation with a pastor of another denomination. This man is pastor of a large church in one of our southern cities. This co-called pastor made the statement that the doctrine of the Virgin Birth was not important. Another pastor in still another denomination recently made this statement in a well-known southern newspaper: "If you are tired of the old time religion, we have the answer for you." We live in a day when cardinal doctrines are being forsaken in favor of the ideas and concepts of men. So-called religious leaders are advocating the unimportance of doctrine. They would have us become "less radical" about such doctrines as the Virgin Birth, the Resurrection, and the Atonement, and join in the effort to have a world church. We as Free Will Baptists will have no part of it. We will continue to preach and teach Divine truth. Our God changes not! His Word changes not! There is only one way whereby man may escape the justice of God. He must repent of sin and receive the risen Savior by faith (Luke 13:3, Ephesians 2:8). There must be a Free Will Baptist Church in St. Joseph because we simply herald forth the truth.

Thank God! There is a Free Will Baptist Church in St. Joseph. It exists because of the financial support of Missouri Free Will Baptists. Let me encourage you to give liberally and regularly to the Cooperative Plan of Support. NATIONAL HOME MISSIONS DEPARTMENT HAS RECORD RECEIPTS AND RECORD APPOINTEES

Nashville-Reverend Homer E. Willis, General Director of National Home Missions and Church Extension, reported today that gifts to the Home Mission Department for 1968 set an all-time high.

Twenty-four states gave more than they did in 1967 with the total increase in offerings of more than \$13,000.

Ten states exceeded quotas: Alabama, Arizona, Colorado, Georgia, Indiana, Maine, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio and Tennessee.

Four states gave more than \$10,000. Tennessee was first with \$21,915.96. Oklahoma gave \$20,672.77, followed by North Carolina with \$16,523.87, and Missouri with \$15.036.23.

In 1968 eleven missionaries were appointed.

In reporting the increase in missionary appointments and the gifts Mr. Willis said, "I am thankful that we still have men who will offer themselves for this pioneer work and I am grateful for the support they have received."

As an observer, I attended the special Treaty Study Committee meeting held in Nashville, December 2 and 3. Clerk Andy Lay, one of our Missouri delegates, will report their decision to the *Gem* paper. However, I do express my appreciation for the unanimous conclusion of the elected representatives in their final vote to recommend to the National Association an appendix page of five paragraphs to be inserted in the current treaty.

As we look back in retrospect to 1968, we observe that we are running below our monthly average in cooperative giving. The past five months we averaged \$3633. We needed \$3833 to reach the proposed budget. Thus, we are below our suggested quotas to the Bible College and Foreign Missions, due to some decline in anticipated designated monies to each.

However, we are out front in National Home Missions giving, perhaps due in part to the joint effort in Columbia and St. Joseph, Missouri. Please observe that Belton Church and Columbia Mission both adopted the cooperative plan in December.
