



MOORE, OKLAHOMA – High school juniors and seniors from throughout the Midwest are expected to participate in the annual Junior-Senior Day set for April 25-26 on the campus of Oklahoma Bible College.

Launching the event will be the performance of Helen Kromer's play, "Take Any Street," on Friday, April 25, at 8 p.m. The performance will be given at the First Free Will Baptist Church in Moore. Junior-Senior Day will conclude on Saturday afternoon, April 26.

Overnight accomodations for Friday will be available to high school juniors and seniors who are interested in attending OBC after their graduation. It will be necessary to make these arrangements with the College Business Office at least one week prior to the Junior-Senior Day.

The third annual Missionary Conference to be hosted by the college drew seven representatives from both the home and foreign fields for the three-day event March 19-21. College officals termed the program timely and successfully presented.

BIBLE COLLEGE ANNOUNCES SUMMER SESSION, MAY 20-JUNE 6

A strongly Bible-centered curriculum is being offered in Free Will Baptist Bible College's annual Summer Session, May 20-June 6. It will offer, among other courses, the following:

CONTEMPORARY THEOLOGICAL TRENDS (1 hr.) EXPOSITORY PREACHING (1 hr.) MISSIONARY PROGRAM IN THE LOCAL CHURCH (1 hr.) ACTS OF THE APOSTLES (2 hrs.) I AND II THESSALONIANS (1 hr.) BIBLICAL HERMENEUTICS (2 hrs.) ANCIENT HISTORY (3 hrs.) EDITORIAL DESIGN SEMINAR (1 hr.)

Students may earn up to four semester hours of college credit during the 3-week session.

Pastors, teachers, and other Christian workers are invited to attend. High school students who have completed their junior year may also begin earning college credits by enrolling for Summer Session. Expenses for a full-4-hour load will total \$127.50. They are broken down as follows: registration, \$5; tuition, \$64 (\$16 per hr. X 4 hours); room, \$22.50; board, \$36.



BIBLE COLLEGE HOLDS DAY OF PRAYER

Thursday, February, 13, was, for over 350 Free Will Baptist Bible College students, one of those days you never forget. At 8:45 a.m. they opened a season of prayer that was to last the entire day, climaxing in a testimony service that evening at 9:00.

From time to time, it has been customary for the Bible college administrators to call upon students to drop their studies and classes, forget about tests and examinations, and spend a day in dedicated prayer. Such days have had a profound effect on the school, the students, and the Free Will Baptist denomination. Missionaries now in service on the field answered the call on days of prayer. Pastors now filling pulpits yielded to that ministry on days of prayer. And God's will for countless lives has been discerned and accepted.

The Bible college's recent day of prayer was no exception. Scores of students testified in the closing service to decisons made during the day. God's promise to Jeremiah has taken on new meaning, "Call unto me and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not" (Jeremiah 33:3).



ALUMNI SOUNDED ON COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS

In a series of recent alumni meetings, Free Will Baptist Bible College alumni expressed unqualified approval of the current campaign to expand and improve the campus. Five local area meetings, held along the eastern seaboard by President L. C. Johnson and Director of Development Jack Paramore, provided the occasion for polling the opinions of Alumni on the progress of the expansion program and gauging support for furture campaign drives.

Alumni received personal letters inviting them to attend the meeting held in their area. Meetings were held in Raleigh, N.C.; Norfolk, Va.; New Bern, N.C.; Florence, S.C.; and Savannah, Ga. Though it was not intended that the tour be a fund-raising drive, the FWBBC alumni voluntarily contributed \$1,800 to the current Development Campaign.

Following the meeting in Savannah, the Georgia State Association adopted the statement below:

"That the Boards of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists in joint session in Moultrie, Georgia, this February 8, 1969, go on record as expressing complete satisfaction with the progress of the expansion program at Free Will Baptist Bible College, and that we urge the administration and board of trustees of the college to pursue their plans for the beginning of Phase II of the program with the erection of a gymnasium-auditorium and a women's dormitory. We hereby pledge our all-out support for such a program."

NEW RECORD SET FOR BIBLE COLLEGE GIFTS

January Gifts to Free Will Baptist Bible College totaled the largest amount in a single month in the school's 27-year history. Nearly \$16,400 was received by the College for its general fund, exceeding the previous record month, April, 1968, by only \$24.14. According to Public Relations Director Paul J. Ketteman, much of the credit for the new record must go to FWBBC students. Several student music groups have recently toured neighboring states holding services and enlisting support for the Bible College. Also, 24 students returned from the Christmas holidays in January with over \$2,000 they had raised through their own efforts in their local churches.

Gifts to the college's general operation fund are running \$11,000 ahead of last year's total for the same period. However, gifts are still 14% behind what is needed to meet the school's \$175,000 budget. As of January 31, a total of \$92,430 had been received during the current fiscal year. In order to keep pace with the demands of the budget, \$116,500 should have come in during that period. Mr. Ketteman points out, however, that the \$14,000 deficit can be over come during the next few months if Free Will Baptists continue their record breaking response.

January was also a good month for the Bible College's Development Fund. Over \$12,000 in building funds brought total gifts to the Bible College during the month to more than \$28,000.

COLLEGE CHOIR TO TOUR SOUTHEAST

The Music Department of the Free Will Baptist Bible College has announced plans for its 16th annual choir tour, to be held April 10-20. this year the 32-voice choir will hold services in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Alabama.

Their 90-minute program will consist of familiar hymn arrangements, anthemns, and gospel songs of testimony. Special numbers will be presented by the Bible College's men's quartet, ladies' trio, and brass ensemble. David P. Randlett, coordinator of the school's music department, will direct the choir. Also accompanying the group will be Paul Ketteman, director of public relations and Mrs. Barbara Fletcher, assistant to the dean of women.

Note to Free Will Baptist churches:

Keep in contact with your members in military service. They're the same people, just wearing different clothes.

That's the word from Col. Roy M. Terry, deputy chief of Air Force chaplains, Washington, D.C.

In addition to being the same people, church members in military services have the same problems, the same attitudes and the same pressures. And they have some concerns about the issues of the day and their country's future.

Church news letters are read closely; mail is always welcome. Some churches put their young people at home on the church military committee. They keep up correspondence with those in service of their own age.

Chaplains send letters to parents when servicemen arrive at a new base. Parents could help if they would remind their son or daughter that the chaplain is there, just as their minister at home. Chaplains encourage keeping ties to the home church, and provide regular Sunday school and worship services. Classes on denominations are also provided, and the Easter offering in Air Force chapels is designated to home denominations in proportion to membership.

Colonel Terry told about the Air Force chaplains' mission. It is to provide a total ministry to all Air Force personnel, to bring God to men and men to God.

He's optimistic about religion in the Air Force. He says that those ties with the home churches make a tremendous difference.
