


"And they shall come from the east, and from the west, and from the north, and from the south . . ." Luke 13:29.

The Harvest Truly is Plenteous

This statement of Christ's was made on the heels of an era in His ministry which involved much healing, casting out the devils, and the raising from death of Jairus's daughter.

He had suffered much persecution and criticism from the Pharisees, who questioned that this power was of the devil (verse 36). But when He saw the multitude, He was moved with compassion. It was not for temporal needs that He had pitied the blind, lame and sick, but rather for a spiritual need. He was concerned because of their ignorance and lack of vision for which they would perish. It was compassion for these souls that brought Him from Heaven to earth and to the Cross.

This same condition prevails today. Spiritual needs are just as great. The most Christ-like compassion we experience is that for lost souls.

Our hearts grieve over the physical needs of the under-privileged, the war orphans, but our chief concern which would please our Lord most should be for lost souls.

It is not our place to condemn sinners, regardless of how fallen they are. They are condemned already. Our emotions should be one of pity and a yearning to help them to know Christ's saving grace. Notice verse 29. Those who came to Christ were dealt with according to their faith. Notice also, how unwearied Christ was in doing good. He had no sooner dismissed the two blind men than he was confronted with the dumb one possessed with a devil. Through these works He performed, the multitude wondered. A few believed, but many marvelled.

Christ's great concern was that the harvest was plenteous, but the laborers few. There was much good to be done, but few to do it. No doubt these people desired good preaching, but good preachers were limited. It is a blessed sight to see people hungry for good preaching, desirous of greater communion with Christ. These people were anxious, leaving their homes and jobs to follow Him, seeking to know more of Him.

Although many times Christ charged them to keep His works secret prior to His crucifixion, He later lifted this charge. The charge could have been issued for various

reasons: (1) To set an example of humility. In doing good we must not seek praise for self, rather for the glory of God. It must be more our endeavor to be useful than to be considered so by men. (2) He could have desired secrecy for His own preservation. The more He was proclaimed, the more jealous the rulers of the Jews became over His growing popularity among the people. (3) Neither did He want His followers attempting to set up a temporal kingdom for His reign on earth (John 6-15). Be as it may, this charge was lifted. Just before His ascension, His final command was, "Go ye . . . teach ALL nations (Matthew 28:19-20).

After His resurrection, the climax of His ministry, His Spiritual kingdom was set up and ready to be published to all nations. The prerequisites to missionary activity are concern, hunger and zeal. John 4:35—Lift up your eyes and look. Look—at the conditions that prevail in our world today. Look—at the restlessness and discontentment among the peoples of all classes.

Are you aware that we are living in a society that is disturbed and demon-possessed? No doubt this twentieth century will go down in history as the century of revolution. There is constantly another uprising or revolution springing up daily, and most of them are of a violent nature. With all the wars, crime, rioting and rebelling that are going on, we are conscious that there is something drastically wrong with the human race. As I listened to a T.V. report on "How to protect ourselves against missile attacks," I was keenly aware of the fear that has gripped the hearts of intelligent men of our government. None are sure of the course to take in order to improve conditions. Science has given us elements for security, yet we are insecure. Materially, we have everything to bring happiness, yet we are unhappy and are witnessing more suicides than ever in history. Yes, I look, and I see the urgency of the hour for soul-winning. I look—and I see that the only secure place is in complete surrender to Christ. If we have dying faith, why not exercise living faith? If God is able in death so is He in life. Those among us who have loved ones who do not know Christ had better become more concerned about their spiritual welfare. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers." (Matthew 9-38).


"And He went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer." Such an example challenges us to pray. How long has it been since you've wept over unsaved loved ones? We must have supernatural power to be a victorious Christian. This is possible only through contact with God in prayer.

James said, "Ye have not because ye ask not." Nothing is too insignificant to pray about. Whatever the need, talk to God about it. Christian women, what would you say to God if you expressed your heart's desire to Him? Would it be for a new home, a new car, money, beautiful clothes or anything of a material nature? Or does your heart desire a closer communion with Him, power in prayer, wisdom and a more fruitful spiritual life. CARLISLE AND MARIE HANNA



Soon after his conversion, Carlisle Hanna recognized that God had a work for Him to do. Not until a year later, however, while in Free Will Baptist Bible College did he yield himself for service in India. "Since that time," he relates, "I have been happy in my service for the Lord. There is a deep abiding peace that I find as I follow Jesus Christ day by day."

Marie Wright accepted Christ at the age of 13 and knew even then that the Lord wanted her as a missionary. Two years later while praying, she recalls, "I told the Lord if He were calling me as a missionary I would go. Immediately it was as plain as if a voice in the room spoke, 'I want you in India.'"

Complete dedication to God's will, coupled with an abiding conviction that India was His choice for them, led

the Hannas to apply for missionary service. Appointed in 1951, they sailed in October, 1952, with infant daughter Sheila Marie.

Heartbreak came in 1953 with the death of Sheila on March 17, but even in this God was continuing to refine His servants for the ministry of patience and understanding which enables them to win many to Christ.

Living in Sonapurhat, Carlisle and Marie maintain hostel ministries among boys and girls attending nearby schools. Preaching points in surrounding villages afford additional opportunities to tell of Christ.

Carlisle was born August 3, 1929; Marie, April 6, 1928; Brenda Kay, June 18, 1954; Donald Timothy, October 24, 1956; and Mark David, July 4, 1960..
