THE EDITOR COMMENTS

The decade of the 60's is past and with it goes the success story as well as the dire problems which many have already forgotten but that influenced our society so much.

In the world of news you may have forgotten that the 60's saw four presidents lead our nation: one who leaves after serving two terms scarely enters the decade; one whose term is shorten by assassination and in completed by a one time country school teacher who in his full term apparently gives up in dispair with the many maniforld problems; and then the present president. Every man had his problems and some of them asked God's leadership.

The 60's revealed a 129.3% increase in the cost of living but with it a greater income was gained by everyone

In the church world, the decade of the 60's revealed the major denominations reporting a decrease in giving proportionally as well as a decrease in mission efforts and a decrease of ministerial students in their theological schools.

However, the reverse seems to be true in the evangelical denominations which showed an increase in membership and giving to nearly every department from the local cause to world-wide evangelization

Our state has advanced in the period with a increase of nearly five times more gifts this last reporting year and compared to our gifts of 1960. Our churches and members are to be commended for the steady growth and giving that has of the Lord's work

With the world growing at such a fast pace (3% yearly) and our population getting younger (50% of Americans are 25 or younger and by 1980 75% of the world's population well be under 25), we must make haste to present the gospel to all people.


The task is going to be hard. More people will bring an increase in famine, violence, roots, stealing and a general falling in morals.

HE bOORBELL rang just as we were finishing supper. There on the porch were two of the college girls we had been taking with us to church. They were giggling and one was holding a box under her arm as I invited them in.

"We wanted you to see our ouija (pronounced wee'juh) board we've been telling you about," they said as they entered.

I could not remember ever hearing of a ouija board until we met these girls and they began telling of the current fad in the girls dormitory at the state college in our town. One of the girls had brought a ouija board from home, and frequently in the evenings after studies were done a group would gather in her room and talk with the ouija, who, they declared, would "talk" to them by moving a pointing device to the various letters and numbers on the board.

Of course, being an educated, twentieth century American, I did not believe in such hocus-pocus, so I invited them in with a view to spoiling their faith in their toy.

They took the board out of the box and placed it on the table. Sitting down on opposite sides of the table, each girl placed her finger tips lightly on the pointer and began asking questions. "They're obviously moving the pointer with their fingers," I thought to myself. "I'll give them a question they can't answer."

GIBEONITE SERVANTS

HEN THE ISRAELITES were ready to enter the promised land, God gave them this commandment; "Then ye shall drive out the inhabitants of the land from before you, and destroy all their pictures, and destroy all their molten images, and quite pluck down all their high places". Numbers 33:52. The commandment was to completely drive out, and destroy all the people, and all their idol gods. These people were evil heathen people, and God did not want his people being influenced by their ways. This was for their own benefit. The warning was, "But if ye will not drive out the inhabitants of the land from before you; then it shall come to pass. that those which ye let remain of them shall be pricks in your eyes, and thorns in your sides, and shall vex you in the land wherein ye dwell". Numbers 33:55. This was God's warning that if they failed to obey him, and drive the inhabitants of the land out completely, that they would bring them trouble, and would eventually be their downfall. We find this commandment repeated in the seventh chapter of Joshua, with the promise of blessings for obedience, and the judgment or curse pronounced upon disobedience.

Now we find that the children of Israel were obedient to God's commandment to begin with, but soon the devil set a trap for them and they fell for the devils trap because they failed to ask counsel from God. The ninth chapter of Joshua gives the record of where the Gibeonites deceived the Israelites, and caused them to make a covenant with them. Now this is what God had told them not to do, but now that they had made the agreement with them they could not break the agreement, so they must let the people dwell among them. They had failed to ask counsel of God, and had failed to obey God. Now that

the Gibeonites were going to dwell among them they said; "We will make them bond-men, and they shall be hewers of wood and drawers of water". How good this looked that they could have these Gibeonites as servants: but God said, "they shall be pricks in your eyes, and thorns in your flesh, and shall vex you". As we read the Bible, we find that God had told the people right, since these people dwelling among them were a continual trouble to them, and eventually brought about their downfall

Now I want us to see a lesson in this story for today's living. God says, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him: and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon", Isaiah 55:7. In Luke 14:33 the Lord says, "So likewise, whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple". The Lord calls upon man to forsake all his sinful ways if he is to be his disciple, and enter the promised land of God's blessings. He has promised us blessings in this life and in the life to come if we will forsake all and follow him.

Now the devil has deceived many people by making them believe they can hold onto some of their minor (if there are any minor) sins and using them as servants. But I believe God's word still stands that, "they shall be pricks in your eyes, and thorns in your sides, and shall vex you". I would like to call attention to just a few of these minor sins that many supposedly good Christian people are keeping back and using for servants.

First, I would like to mention beer drinking. Most of our people will have to admit it is wrong to get drunk, but so many say, "there is nothing wrong with a bottle of beer. That is just a way of

being sociable". If it is wrong to be drunk then it is wrong to do the thing that makes people drunk and it is wrong to be partly drunk. If ten bottles of beer will make a man drunk, then the man that drinks one bottle of beer is onetenth drunk. The Bible says to "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright". Proverb 23:31. This means that when it is fermented and would make a person drunk, we are not to look upon it. Leave it alone. It will separate a man from God, and will eventually become his downfall.

Next I would like to mention the language people use. It is a common thing to hear language on the street that is not fit for a saloon keeper to hear, and many times by people who claim to be Christians. They will say, "Oh I don't mean anything by it", or "It is just a way of expressing myself", I'll agree it is a way of expressing themselves, and it tells just what they are. God's word says, "For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." Matthew 12:34b.

Next, I would like to consider the manner of dress (or failure to dress) that we see today. God's word teaches that women should adorn themselves (dress) as becometh Godliness. Today much of the dress we see of women and of men is far from Godliness. Some use the excuse that it is more comfortable, but the fact is I have seen those that were dressed indecent, that were very uncomfortable that way. The truth is that others dress that way and they want to do what others do, but God hasn't called us to follow the worldly ungodly crowd, but he has called us to, "Come out from among them and be ye separate". He says "My people are a peculiar people". The woman who is known as the mother of min-skirts is

quoted as saying, "Mini-clothes are symbolic of those girls who don't want to wait until dark to seduce men". The ungodly, worldly crowd know the purpose of these indecent clothes that women wear, yet many church people are following this ungodly fashion. I assure you that according to God's word anyone who follows this ungodly fashion will find out (probably too late) it will lead to trouble. If we are to be God's servants and receive God's blessings we must forsake all and follow him.

There are many more sins that people are holding onto but we cannot mention them all here. However, I would like to mention one more, and I know many will not be pleased with my calling it a sin, but I believe it is a hindrance to the cause of Christ and therefore a sin.

The use of tobacco is so common among our church people that it is accepted as all right and no one seems to question it, or to seek the answer as to whether or not it is a sin. If there is nothing wrong with using tobacco, why is it that about the first thing a boy (or a girl now days) starts to slip around and hide to do is to smoke? If it is not wrong why do they try to hide it? The fact is it is wrong, and at that tender age before their conscience has been seared they know it is wrong. Later as they grow older and their conscience becomes seared they begin to feel it is allright. The next reason I want to give why tobacco is wrong is, it enslaves people. Paul said, "Know ye not that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are, to whom ye obey". Romans 6:16a. A person that cannot break the tobacco habit is a servant to tobacco. How can a man be a servant of tobacco and a servant of God? God said, "No man can serve two masters": Paul says, "Know ye not that

ve are the temple of God, and that the spirit of God dwelleth in you?" If we are the temple of God we should keep that temple clean.

It has been proven beyond any doubt that smoking has shortened the life of many people. If we are as Paul said, "Not your own but are bought with a price," and are servants of God, then if we shorten our lives by smoking, we are shortening the period of service God could expect from his servant, and are cheating God or sinning against God.

We as Christians are to be examples to the world. Someone is following your example and my example. What kind of example are we setting for others to follow? If you are guilty of these habits (sins) you are responsible for someone else taking up that habit and possibly being led deeper into sin.




VIBURNUM

MISSOURI SHARES WITH FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

Missouri churches have given 42% toward their goal of \$12,000 to date. \$5,035.56 represents gifts given as of the November report and shows an increase of more than 400 dollars over the equal period a year earlier.

Missouri has given \$17,075.11 toward the college expansion program which places the state 10th of the 36 states contributing to the college which to date has received \$569,574.29.

OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE TO CONSTRUCT ACTIVITIES BUILDING

An activities building for the Oklahoma Bible College was given the approval by the Oklahoma State Association during their annual meeting October 14-16 at Tulsa. The building will consist of a gymnasium, which will also serve as an auditorium for larger campus functions, and a dining hall which will seat approximately 150 people.

The building will be financed through a current gift campaign designated as OPERATION PARTICIPATION and the sale of remaining bonds from a present program.

OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE CHANGES BOARD REPRESENTATION

The Oklahoma State Association has given each of the six surrounding states opportunity to officially represent their state on the OBC board of trustees. This

representation includes voting privileges. The states involved in this action are Arkansas, *Missouri*, Texas, Kansas, New Mexico, and Colorado who will elect its own member for the specified term. The association also increased the representatives from Oklahoma to the board of trustees from seven to nine. The Rev. James Murray is the new board chairman

MISSOURI AMBASSADOR CHURCHES

The National Home Mission department announced the following Missouri churches as ambassador churches: Southside, St. Louis; First, Fredericktown; Macedonia, Monett; Berkeley City, St. Louis; First, Leadington; New Home, Hartville; Central, Kansas City; and Overland, St. Louis. group of Christians who are often attacked, maligned, run down, clubbed over the head, brow beaten and as a general rule unappreciated.

Had you ever looked at them as one of God's special gifts to the church? In 1 Corinthians 12:28 Paul tells us "...and God hath set some in the church ... thirdly teachers," In Ephesians 4:11 we learn "...and He gave some ... teachers." Throughout the Bible God gives to them a place of prominence. They are an important and necessary part of the body of Christ.

It has been my experience that they do about as well as they know how to do. Is it possible that we have failed them in being obedient to the admonition in II Timothy 2:2? Have we been faithful in committing to them that which was given to us? You see, the very fact that the message was first committed to us in an indication that we were assumed to be "faithful men."

How our teachers need our ministry to help perfect them. In Ephesians 4:11-12 we are told, "And His gifts were (varied; He Himself appointed and gave men to us,) some to be apostles (special messengers), some prophets (inspired preachers and expounders), some evangelists (preachers of the Gospel, traveling missionaries), some pastors (shepherds of His flock) and teachers. His intention was the perfecting and the full equipping of the saints (His consecrated people), (that they should do) the work of ministering toward building up Christ's body (the church), (amplified New Testament).

When God's gifts to the church are not regularly and properly exercised, the saints are ill-equipped to do the work of ministering. Trained teachers do a better job of teaching. Their fruit becomes productive. The preacher's load is lightened and problems are eliminated. A body of saints in the process of maturation is not so easily tossed about with every wind of doctrine. They are becoming more Christ like as they are being built up through the exercise of all the gifts to the church, His body.

Trained teachers edify the saints, create fewer problems, are more productive and thus bless the church. We owe them our support, our commendation, our prayers and our ministry of training them. God bless them. Where would our Sunday school be without them?

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
