A LOOK AT OUR CHURHES


The First Free Will Baptist Church of Monett was organized following a revival which was begun on Thanksgiving night in 1931 by Rev. Winford Davis and Rev. O. T. Allred.

A total of 94 conversions and renewals were witnessed in the meeting and 66 united with the church as it was organized on February 10, 1932 at the close of the meeting. The church worshiped for a number of years at 3rd and Bond Street but sold in 1954 and erected the above church building at Central and Sycamore. The congregation built a brick three bedroom parsonage in 1961, also; all of which are debt free.

Rev. O. T. Allred was the first pastor from February, 1932 to 1944. Nine other men have served the church, namely, C. B. Dees, W. K. Weston, Noel Greenway, Cecil Campbell, James Davis, Luther Sanders, Tommy Day, Bud Hill and James A. Franklin.

This church is now giving over \$100.00 per month to Missions besides the 10% to the Co-operative Fund.

Rev. O. T. Allred is the present pastor.



ersonal m from the Editor



ELIGION IS a personal and private matter. According to the first article of the Bill of Rights, Congress cannot set up a national church, lay taxes to support one church or all churches. It cannot compel people to attend church or punish them for not attending. Although it appropriates money to support chaplains and rabbis in the armed forces and for a chaplain to say prayers for Congress, this is not regarded as an "establishment of religion."

The juror swears with his hand on the Holy Bible and ends with the words, "So help me, God." To a great extent, America was colonized by men and women who sought freedom from religious persecution. The celebrated "Mayflower Compact" was drawn up "in the presence of God and one another."

Our Declaration of Independence states that men "are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights" and places "a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence." Every State Constitution assumes that religion is essential to the well-being of the community.

Our national songs are essentially religious, and our national motto, "In God we trust," appears on all of our coins. Abraham Lincoln said, "I find myself often going to my knees in the certain conviction that there is nowhere else to go." World War II gave currency to a great truth: "There are no atheists in foxholes."

The most skeptical recognizes that "the laws of Nature do not account for the origin of the laws of Nature." Practically on his deathbed, Woodrow Wilson said, "The

sum of the whole matter is this, that our civilization cannot survive materially unless it is redeemed spiritually."

The before going statements only reflect a small part of what we Americans have going for us which have been established for us by our forefathers who desired an opportunity to worship and to keep the freedom every man desires. Over against this great Constitutional privilege of ours are the foes of religion and free government. What, if any, have we done as Christians or churches to oppose these forces that are invading these established rights of Christian Americans. It appears that nearly every Christian right is being attacked. The scripture reading in schools, prayer in public places and even now the right to take Sunday off from your job. The latter statement was made since many of the largest chain stores such as Penney's and Sears are already beginning to stay open on Sundays which force many of the smaller businesses to open also on the Lord's Day causing many church members to work because of their already suffering incomes due to overbuying and inflation, and the end result the suffering of the church due to poor attendance and lack of support by the soon cooling members who will "depart from the faith."

It is time that the church (that means its members) stand for these rights now ours or as someone recently stated, "either the church gets involved in making change or it will be changed out of existence."

Our nation and the world is not perishing for the want of clever or talented or well-meaning men. It is perishing for the want of men of courage and resolution who, in devotion to the cause of right and truth, can rise above personal feeling and private ambition long enough to promote the only real cause that can save us, our church, the cause for which Christians must stand, and finally our nation.

To the average member today the church appears to be a burden always asking of his time, resources, and ability. But Christ has never been a burden to any honest soul nor has this judgment been forced upon us who know Him by experience.

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What Constitutes

Accountability

HEN IS A child old enough to receive Christ and be saved? No doubt, that question has run through the mind of everyone who has ever dealt with children in Sunday School or Bible School or had anything to do with Child Evangelism, as well as every Christian parent.

There seems to be erroneous views on the subject in both extremes. On the one hand, there are folks who say a child must be twelve years old. Others on the same end of the controversy would not even consider giving the opportunity of receiving Christ to a child before he has reached the Junior Department in Sunday School (9 through 12 years old.) On the other extreme are those who would contend that any child who would simply repeat a prayer after someone, asking Christ to come into his heart, could have a salvation experience.

It is my opinion that the Bible teaching on the subject lies somewhere between these two extremes.

Though the term "age of accountability" is not used in the Scriptures, most evangelicals would agree that somewhere between infancy and adolescence, a child reaches the point at which he is capable of becoming a Christian. Before that time, most evangelicals believe, he is "safe" should he die, since Christ's atonement covered every sin of the human race except rejection of Jesus (Romans 3:19-26). After that point is reached, though he be a child, he is under the condemnation of God, and will be eternally lost should he die without Christ (John 3:18). Certainly that fact should motivate us who deal with children to find out when a child is capable of receiving Christ, and to confront him with the Gospel and the opportunity of receiving Christ at that time.

But now we are back to the title

question, what constitutes accountability? Someone says that accountability is reached when a child knows right from wrong. But there are many degrees of the knowledge of right and wrong. A 10 or 12 month old infant may know that it is a "no-no" to pull the doily off the coffee table, while on the other hand, a young man of 18 may not realize that it is a law of our land that he must register with the Selective Service Board, and to not do so is "wrong." Surely, no one would hold the absurd opinion that the infant had reached the age of accountability, or that the 18 year old had not. Accountability is not just knowing what we glibly call right and wrong.

Accountability in its simplest form is the knowledge of certain facts bearing upon salvation:

- 1) The child must have some idea of lostness. He need not be able to explain sin, its cause and effect, in systematic order, but he must have the knowledge that he has displeased God by his sinning. This is a pre-requisite for exercising saving faith.
- 2) He must know that God is able to meet his need that Jesus' death and resurrection somehow is sufficient to bring him into God's family.
- 3) He must possess the knowledge of how to become a Christian. He must know that Christians are those who trust in Christ to take away their sins and receive Christ into their hearts as the Lord and Master of their lives.

At what age, then, may a child possess this knowledge and exercise this simple faith? I would not presume to suggest an age, but I note that Jesus referred to a "little child" in Matthew 18:2-4 as an example of the greatest in the Kingdom. In verse 14 of the same chapter Jesus implies that a "little one" may be lost.

The age at which a child comes to

this knowledge may vary according to mentality and training, but I am convinced that most normal children capable of doing regular elementary school work can comprehend these truths when simply taught, and many will comprehend them even younger.


The fact that a child may not have to be persuaded to give his heart to the Lord, or that there may be little evidence of a change brought about in his life as a result of his conversion, or that his decision is accompanied by little or no emotion, by no means indicates that his salvation experience is any less genuine or glorious than that of an adult. Jesus said adults have to become like children, not that children have to become like adults, to be saved.

A child may not have as great an understanding as an adult has about all that Christianity involves for him, but faith and virtue preceed knowledge in Peter's list of Christian graces (II Peter 1:5-7). More often than not, a child's simple, unwavering faith will far outshine the new adult Christian's.

So as we consider Jesus' words in Matthew 18:14, "...it is not the will of your Father which is in Heaven, that one of these little ones should perish," may we pray for wisdom to "uncomplicate" salvation, and capture the many opportunities afforded us in our homes, our churches, and our communities, to point the little ones to the Saviour.

The Reverends Leroy Forlines, Dean Moore, and Milton Worthington will speak at Free Will Baptist Bible College's annual Bible Conference, March 15-19, administrators have announced.



Mr. Forlines, a native of North Carolina, has taught at the Bible College for 13 years. He serves as professor of Bible-Theology and is the school's Dean of Men. He graduated from FWBBC in 1952, has earned degrees at Winona Lake School of Theology and Northern Baptist Theological Seminary, and is presently working on his ThM degree.



Mr. Moore, pastor of the First FWB Church of Richmond, California, attended the Bible College in 1949-50. He is a graduate of Western Baptist Bible College and is presently working on his Master's Degree at California State Teacher's College. He served four years as president of California Bible Institute, now California Christian College.



Mr. Worthington, also a North Carolinian, pastors the Tupelo FWB Church, Tupelo, Mississippi. He is a noted evangelist and conference speaker and is a graduate of Columbia Bible College. Other pastorates include churches in North Carolina and Florida.



"I recently was saved when attending church with my girlfriend. My parents, who are not Christians, made me attend their church which isn't a Bible-believing church. My spiritual life is getting colder but I can't rebel against my parents since I'm not old enough to make my own decisions. I want so to continue in the joy I have. What can I do?"

First, you can pray. Prayer has no limitations nor boundries held by doors or walls. You can pray for your parents and your own spiritual growth.

Second, you can enlist the support of your girlfriend in praying for you and that of the church where you were saved.

Thirdly, you should start (if you haven't already) a time of Bible reading. "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." The same faith which caused you first to believe will likewise "keep you from falling." The Bible says, "Thy Word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin against God."

May I ask you first, have you been a real good example of the Christian life before your parents? Do they know you were saved at your friend's church? Have you gone further in this experience by being baptized? These acts are public and should have been brought to the attention of your parents and by so doing help them to know more about the Christian way of life. Secondly, have you talked to them about your desire to attend the church where you felt Jesus Christ and the Word of God was being preached? Your sincere desire to serve the Lord will influence more than you will realize. If your parents are hard to deal with, pray that the Holy Spirit will speak to their lives by seeing a real Christian testimony in your life.

"I have very strict parents who never miss church and always take me and encouraged me to go. But recently I was invited by the best player of the football team to a school dance. I didn't want to miss the opportunity to date this 'handsome guy' that I accepted. I thought we could just sit as everyone else danced. But he thought I was just being silly for not wanting to dance so he chided me into dancing with him. It didn't take me long to see this 'handsome' boy was dirty inside. I asked him to take me home before the end and now he has told many I am a dead beat and not an interesting date. What can I do?" WHAT WOULD YOU TELL HER?

ALL OF US are plagued by the malignancy of mediocrity, aren't we? It invades our educational pursuits. Instead of a disciplined striving for the fullest mental utilization possible, we, too, often are satisfied just to get by. A recent issue of Education U.S.A. contained an article entitled, "Students Demand Right to Cheat." It read as follows: "The London Observer reports that a 'new and ludicrous phase of student anarchy' has reached India — a demand that students be allowed to cheat on tests."

The same tune is played in our world of work, of church going, of teaching, and even in preaching. Though we do not cheat in the sense we often use the word, we do not give our best. The end result is our own lack of spiritual growth. This "get-by-itis," this malignancy of mediocrity, will not help churches to grow or souls to be saved, but it continues because of the lack of getting serious with Christ and His cause.

Are we Christians slowly but surely selling our birthright for the cheap and the utilitarian, forgetting the excellencies that have made us great? What's happening in our lives? Is the center of gravity the excellence of Christ or the expediency of this world?


It will not do for Christians to remain aloof from the misery of an anxious and troubled age. For our own sake, as well as for others, we must bring help and healing to the disillusioned and despairing, the perplexed and the lost of the earth.

Amid all the needs of the church and the world, there is yet a strange disquiet in our hearts. We know that in the world people suffer from ignorance, famine, disease, the terrifying scourge of war, and the hungering of souls both for food and salvation. In our own areas the lost rely on the church for the salvation they desire but wait for the Christian to tell him. Will the Christian tell him?

In the midst of our enjoyment, gathered about our prosperity and festive tables heaped up with good things, can we honestly bow our heads and pray for world peace, for enduring brother hood of men, and not do our best in presenting the Gospel to lost men anywhere and everywhere?

Coolidge said, "Nothing in the world can take the place of persistence. Talent will not — nothing is commoner than unsuccessful men with talent. Genius will not — unrewarded genius is proverbial. Education will not — the world is full of educated derelicts. Persistence and determination alone are omnipotent."

I believe that if we are faithful in teaching, example, and witness, Christ will bless what we try to do, if not immediately then ultimately, in the lives of those He has entrusted to us. The Church is the greatest influence in this world of ours to overcome the present tendency toward greed. Let not the member have greed or else the church where he belongs will soon have greed however slowly. But the Real CHURCH, which is Christ, and found in the hearts of men, cannot be found with it.



Sometime ago I wrote on the subject, "Does Your Church Tithe?", and have been asked by several of my Christian Brethren for another writing.

I have thought many times of the many departments of our denomination and the many ways of individual support. To me, the most important plan is through our state co-operative plan of giving, and this plan is sanctioned by several churches throughout the state. These churches give ten percent, or the tithe, of all monies received in offerings.

The church is the storehouse of God.

Malachi 3:10... "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in my house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it..."

I like the first two words of this passage of scripture and think of it as a command of God. "Bring ye..." God is asking for each individual to bring his individual tithe into the storehouse. Under the co-operative plan the storehouse, in turn, gives their tithe to the support of God's work.

Now, back to my subject, "My Tithe and I."

As I enclose my tithe, in the small envelopes provided by my church, my mind pictures the many missionaries on the fields, sacrificing their all to take the gospel to those thousands upon

thousands of souls that are without Christ. And I breathe a prayer, "Dear Lord, may this offering be used in such a way as to bring glory to thy name. May it be used to reach out to those fields that are white already to harvest." And in my heart I know I've done my part to provide for our missionaries.

And when my tithe is turned in each week to the storehouse of God, I know that eventually it will be allocated to the various phases of our denomination.

Since I serve our church in the capacity of treasurer, I realize the many needs of the local church, and they are many. But I also know the needs of our denomination. Can we, as a church, hold on to all of the offerings received for local use, when we have missionaries who have sacrificed so much for the salvation of all those precious souls? May God forgive the church that does not . . . "Give of their means".

Each week my tithe is laid apart from my earnings before any of the remainder is used. Since all things are given us by God, it seems such a small amount to turn back to Him who gave so much.

"Bring ye" your tithe to the store-house.

I am truly thankful for the blessings of my God as I give my tithes unto Him. If you have not experienced the opening of the windows of heaven and the outpouring of His blessings when you "bring ye your tithes into the storehouse", then may I recommend to you

that you try God's plan?

If we, as Christians, would follow God's plan of giving, there would be no special offerings made to support our local church. There would never have to be a plea for special offerings from our missionaries, from our Bible colleges, from our denominational work. All these various departments would automatically be taken care of through the co-operative plan.

Have you ever felt, as you drop a meager offering into the plate, that you have done your best for God?

In II Corinthians 9:6 we find these words, "But this I say, he which soweth sparingly, shall reap sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully, shall also reap bountifully."

Or do you have a feeling of humbleness as you drop in your tithe and know that you are giving cheerfully to the storehouse of God?

"Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give, not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver." II Corinthians 9:7.

Before closing, I would like to go back a few years to that memorable day in August, 1946, when the annual state association was held at Fredericktown, Missouri. Those of you who were there remember the bountiful blessings of God on that day.

As I remember, Rev. Damon Dodd brought the morning message, a message on the glories of Heaven. Surely, the very presence of God was felt by all. There were shouts of joy and tears of thanksgiving.

In the business of the afternoon the co-operative plan was proposed to the delegates of the state. And it was adopted. In the years since, thousands of dollars have been given through the plan and it has proven to be the one way to support our entire denomination.

My prayer is that all churches in our state of Missouri would go on record and adopt this plan.

"My tithe and I", we work together in the upbuilding of God's kingdom.

"Chosen by Christ to Bear Fruit". What a Challenge!

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




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
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
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
