ersonal from the Editor

ACH YEAR since 1940, the Gallup Poll has been sampling the population of the United States to measure church attendance. In their most recent survey they asked how many had attended church the week of the poll. To such, 43 percent questioned replied that they had. The figure was down 2 percent from the previous year, and down 6 percent from 1955, when an all-time high of 49 percent replied that they had attended church.

Perhaps surprisingly, church attendance was highest among college graduates (47 percent) and lowest among grade school graduates (41 percent). Also, church attendance was highest in cities over 50,000 population (44 percent) and slightly lower (42 percent) in smaller cities, towns, and rural areas. It was highest in the East (46 percent) and lowest in the West (32 percent).

One of the more significant questions in the survey had to do with the impact of religion on life today: "At the present ime, do you think religion as a whole is increasing its influence on American life, or losing its influence?"

Eleven years ago. 69 out of each 100 people polled thought the influence of religion was increasing. This last year, only 18 out of each 100 were of that

Eleven years ago, 14 percent of all persons interviewed gave as their opinion that religion was losing ground. In the latest survey, the figure was 67 percent-almost five times a high.

Set over against the view that organized religion is losing influence in modern society is the fact that of those questioned in the most recent survey, 98 percent reported their belief in God and only 2 percent stated that they did not believe in God, thought it was impossible to say whether God exists, or declined to give an answer.

THESE ARE THE FACTS based on a sampling its authors believe to be so selected as to be representative of the entire population.

Cause for concern? Yes.

Cause for alarm? Probably not.

On the face of it, there is an obvious distinction between confidence in organized religion and belief in God. It

may be granted that much of what is professed as belief in the existence of a Supreme Being is empty of real content. The discrepancy between 98 percent who say they believe in God and 43 percent who trouble themselves to go to church at least once a week is too great for any other conclusion.

It is quite impossible for most of us to "get outside our skins" and think ourselves into the place of those who have no connection at all with any branch of the Christian enterprise. If we could we would not find it hard to see what the outsider must think about "churchianity" in America today.

We would remember, for instance, the storm aroused by theologians in church-related seminaries and universities who made the headlines by proclaiming that God is dead.

We would be influenced by the fact that most religious news that make the pages of the secular press is news that comes from seemingly frantic efforts to save the Church, not to evangelize the world. We would still be left wondering if putting two or more half-dead organizations together could possibly make one live one.

But whether the image of the Church at large improves or continues to decline, we must still recognize that multitudes who have little or no concern for "religion" still have a vital hunger for God and desperately need what only the risen Redeemer can bring into their lives.

We should love and be loyal to the church that has brought Christ to us. But we go out to witness and preach, not religion or churchianity, but the living Lord, who alone can make it possible for us to meet the demands of

The influence of religion will wax or wane in society dependent on a score of factors, some of which are completely beyond our control. But the gospel of Christ to which we witness in the Spirit is still the power of God to salvation to everyone who believes.

The future of religion may be discouraging at the moment. The future of redemption is as BRIGHT AS THE PROMISES OF GOD.



DO NOT ERR-BRETHREN

SOME SEEM to think they can live just as they please, but James chapter 1 verse 16 warns, "Do not err." In verse 12 of this chapter he says, "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation" but doesn't finish the thought until he says, "Do not err, my beloved brethren." Notice the prize, "For when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life." The Lord has made some great promises but notice who the promises are to: "which the Lord hath promised to them that love him."

WHAT CAUSES US TO ERR? "Temptations"? Yes, but where does it come from? James in verse 13 said, "Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man." God has no part in unrighteousness. Grace be with thee. Amen." If we listen to everyone's idea of doctrine we will soon get involved in a lot of nonsense. I believe we need to preach the whole





PSPCHOLOGICAL EVOLUTION IN REVERSE

HE WORST ENEMY of the Bible and Christianity has abounded for one hundred and eleven years. It is a movement with many disciples. It is a movement that has become accepted by people down through the ages; by people of all walks of life. Those who do not accept it factually accept it psychologically.

This movement was first advanced by Darwin in 1859 and revised by many others down through the ages including Einstein and Clark in our century. It is the well known "Theory of Evolution".

Some leading Bible theologians have caught the drift and now we have a revised theory called "Theistic Evolution". These men in an effort to compromise have linked the Theory of Evolution with the Bible and claim that God created life in a simple form and caused it to evolve into the present forms.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

Psychological: Something that is imagined or held sometimes without the knowledge of the person involved.

The Theory of Evolution is so popular that children accept it automatically. They often refer to man as the *higher* form of animal life. They automatically refer to the monkey or ape as an ancestor. The Theory of Evolution is so common that people accept it without realizing it. Psychologically speaking our minds have ac-

cepted the theory in varying degrees.

Evolution in Reverse: The theory of Evolution is the theory that man advanced or evolved from the lower forms of life. The theory that all animals (including man) are in some way related.

Evolution in reverse refers to a "Deevolvment" of a species or the process of a species going back to its original state.

Since we are dealing with "Psychological Evolution" (something imagined) the de-evolvment or going back to the original actually takes place only in the mind.

THE THEORY APPLIED

II Timothy 3:1-5 "This know that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy. Without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good. Traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away."

Our society has become so hostile that the minds of many people are being affected. Note in verse six, "... captive silly women..." refers to a condition of the mind trapped by an invisible force. Verse thirteen states, "But evil



men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived."

Verse seven further summarizes the feeling. "Ever learning and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth."

War, riots, communist infiltration, air pollution, drugs, alcohol, disease, atomic destruction, population explosion, the draft, Vietnam, Loas, or some other field of battle. People, especially young people, facing these perils have adopted a "Care Free" attitude not caring if they live or die.

Now the minds of these people are warped into believing that they came from the so called "Lower" forms of animal life and many people have lost their desire to go forward or even to live at all. Acutally they begin to go backward psychologically.

THE EVIDENCE

Notice verse three, "Without natural affection..." We see the beards, unkept stringy hair, nudity, lewdness, free love, mutual dwellings, unkept dirty clothes, filth, and life without purpose. All these things point to the fact that society is moving backward trying to look like the animal they think or imagine they evolved from.

Notice the idols of the so called "Mod" generation. Even the names of the rock and roll groups speak of evolution in reverse. The Animals, The Monkeys, The Beatles and etc. They rise in popularity because they are symbols of what certain people imagine them-

Notice the actions of these people. Animal-like dances and movements are always associated with their weird sounds. They live, act, eat, and look like the animals their warped minds tell them they have evolved from.

THE ANSWER

"This is the generation gap," you say? Well, since this all started as a movement of Satan as he polluted the minds of these people (verses six through eight) by some strange hypnotic power and since we have determined that this is psychological evolution in reverse, I doubt if there is a generation gap in the first place. Anything moving backward from a given point also leaves a gap.

This gap has been bridged and the answer to the problem is a simple one. Since Satan started the whole thing in the first place by corrupting the minds of the people making them captive to his "Theory of Evolution" there is only one thing that can free the captive, corrupted mind. When Christ comes into the heart and cleanses the soul He sets the mind free and points us to the knowledge of truth. "... And ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free". John 8:32.

We encourage the Free Will Baptist people who live in driving distance of the youth camp to come and share the evening services from night to night.



OVERLAND HAS SUNDAY SCHOOL CONTEST

There was a good response to the revival and on September 23, 1954 the Lynn Street Church was organized.


The church today average 50-60 each Sunday.
