

In every era there has been some faction of society that has attempted to get rid of Jesus. With remarkable ingenuity our present society is doing what it can to devise ways to do away with him also. And, youth, we too, join the mad throng shouting, "Let Him be crucified!" by our silence. You say, "He disturbs us, He annoys us, He shames us, He challenges us!" To keep from sounding off I think it well we look at how we really do stand with God. To "Examine yourself, and see if ye be in the faith." We are much like the Sadduccees and the Pharisees. For you see in every era He is present and no matter what the world does He still makes His impression on lives. He convicts, but He cures. He condemns, but He saves. He shows us what we are, but He tells us what we may become by His grace. Stop being a phoney and without shame walk tall for your decision in Christ might be the only right decision you will ever make.

Since this is the day for youth, and since the young people have more impact today than ever before, seniors should give much thought to what they can do to bring the gospel to others. I heard it said recently by a minister, who is very much concerned about young people, that there are enough Christian youth to stage a religious revolution. At the age of eighteen, a person should be able to make the choice for himself as to whether or not he wishes to attend a Christian college. However, at this age a person is still forming his ideas and philosophies of life and therefore should be taught at a place that shows him the right concepts.

The graduating senior should take many things into consideration when choosing his career. He has his own capabilities to consider; also, he should take into consideration the means of his family; and, most important, he should take much time in thought and prayerful consideration about what God would have him to do with his life. It may be anything from being a social worker or a foreign missionary to a housewife or a businessman; but whatever it is, if you let God rule your thoughts and actions while you are taking part in it. God will reward you for the word you have done in His name.

Some of these things may seem rather far off now, but the senior who is graduating this year is just starting his life; and if he can make it mean the most to him by starting now to build a life that will glorify God. He will, perhaps, make a contribution to the world that will not soon be forgotten. And if this man has lived a good Christian life, people will look back and say, "The man that did that—he was a real man of God."

If a child fails to develop physically or mentally, the parents become concerned.

Paul said, "When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child," This was to be expected. It was the normal thing for any child. It is the thing that can be expected of any normal child today.

There are also different interests that vary with age. Paul knew this. God knows this. God expects children to be children. God expects boys to act like boys. God expects girls to act like girls. And I believe God expects grown people to act like grown people. Paul said, "When I became a man, I put away childish things". I think God expects us to grow up when we reach a certain age. It always makes me feel bad to see a grown man that has taken the responsibility of a wife and children, and still acts like a child, or still wants to run around with a group of boys and have what he calls a good time, when he should be at home with his wife and children. It also seems bad when a girl has taken the responsibility of a husband and home, and still wants to run around all the

time, and her husband has to come home from work and there is nothing cooked to eat. I feel that if a boy or girl doesn't expect to accept the responsibility of a family, that individual shouldn't marry. I believe God expects them to grow up and accept that responsibility.

Paul in writing to Titus, in the second chapter of Titus gives as requirements of the aged men, and the aged women that they are to be examples for the younger ones.

Now we are hearing a lot about the generation gap, and how it can be narrowed down or bridged. I say it doesn't need narrowed down any. It is already too narrow. This idea of trying to narrow down the generation gap is a scheme the devil is trying to use to lead the old folks astray. I know the devil is using every scheme he can to lead the young away from serving the Lord, but this is a trick to trap the old to keep them from being an example for the young. When grandma tries to look, dress, talk, and act like her teenage granddaughter, the gap is already too narrow. God expects us to grow up. When we are older, God expects us to act our age.



GENERAL BOARD TAKE STAND OPPOSING ATTORNEY GENERAL

The General Board of the State of Missouri has taken an official stand against the public use of funds to aid teachers who would be given the permission to teach in parochial schools without charge to those schools through state assistance, according to recent correspondence by the Rev. Andy Lay, State Clerk, who released the unanimous decision of the board.

The Board sent the following resolution to Mr. Hubert Wheeler, State Superintendent of Instruction; the Missouri State Board of Education; Governor Warren E. Hearnes; Missouri Attorney General John Danforth; and President Richard M. Nixon: "We, the General Board of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists, wish to go on record as favoring the present policy of the StateBoard of Education in using public funds and public school teachers for public schools only, in accordance with the Missouri supreme ruling of 1966. We stand firmly for maintaining separation of church and state, as presently provided for in our State and Federal constitutions."

"This resolution was especially intended to counter Mr. Danforth's 'official opinion' that the state supreme court's ruling of 1966 on the matter was incorrect. Mr. Danforth apparently favors the permitting of public school teachers being used to teach some classes, such as speech and art, in parochial schools with charge to those schools. That would no doubt open the door for further state assistance for parochial schools," Rev. Lay adds.

O'FALLON HAS EASTER DEDICATION SERVICE

Pastor Dale Underwood, of O'Fallon, dedicated the baby of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hickey on Easter morning. Rev. Underwood climaxed the service with, "Jerome Patrick Hickey, I dedicate you to God and His service in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit." 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TWENTY-SEVEN AND ONE HALF ACRES DEDICATED TO THE LORD

The Free Will Baptist Youth Encampment grounds was conceived with the 1945 state association when plans were laid to purchase land for a youth camp. The land was purchased and the Dining Hall and two cabins built in March of 1946 with plans for the first encampment to be held that summer. But an epidemic of measles that was wide-spread caused the first encampment to convene in the year of 1947. Since that time more than 1900 youth have come to know the Lord Jesus Christ as a personal Saviour. Many have become pastors, wives of ministers, missionaries and hundreds have become faithful members of our churches as well as many other denominations I'm sure. It is not known by this editor how many persons have attended over this period of time but it is elating to know that thousands of youth have come and went away from these grounds with a dedicated desire to live for Christ.

Many changes have been made since the first buildings in 1946. Today the camp has a home for the camp superintendent, dining hall, large tabernacle, swimming pool, a new concession stand and two new teaching rooms connected to the new first aid building which will be named the David Parrott Memorial Building, and 40 cabins, of which three are presently under construction, which are owned by either individual churches or associations for their youth. Besides the structures the grounds have two ball diamonds, playground room and a prayer haven.

Last year 799 youth from all over Missouri came for the pre-teen and teen camps sessions. This year will probably break this record of last year.

Yes, these twenty-seven and a half acres nestled in the beautiful Niangua country side has been dedicated to God.
