Fersonal from the Editor

W E FACE PROBLEMS, today, in every direction. One could not begin to list the many that currently present themselves to us. And, of course, a sampling of the thorny issues that confront us wouldn't bring an answer anyway.

Christians believe that "Christ is the Answer" to all problems. By this they generally mean that if the Gospel were preached to all men, and if all men came to a saving knowledge of Christ, there would be no more problems.

All men, however, will not respond to the Gospel. Experience shows that fewer accept the Truth than reject it-so that Christians will always be a minority in society. Society, in other words, will never be "converted" as a whole in our day, so the necessity of our remaining faithful to His ministry of spreading the Word, the Good News, is every day a dire pressing responsibility.

But let us consider the opposite and that all men became Christians, we would still have problems, for Christians are seldom perfect. Look at the church at Corinth! Look at your own church! Look at yourself!

Does this mean that Christians are to give up the struggle so far as a concern for the unconverted majority is concerned? I think not. I believe God wants His people always to be an influence for good. I do not believe He wants them to give up teaching Sunday school, witnessing, doing church visitation, singing in the choir, or otherwise actively serving Him in order to engage in civic or social service. I believe, however, that He wants us to be informed citizens who exert influence in the right direction as we serve to lead not only men to Christ but also the community in the proper direction.

This is how "Christ is the Answer." As you note, He is the

Answer only as we apply, to the problems of our time, the principles He advocated and used-the principles embodied in God's Word, the Bible. The more these principles are applied to conditions today-even by unbelievers-the better off society will be.

It is apparent that the mood of our time has created a mass depression and it is necessary that the Christian life be geared in it's every facet toward a spiritual up-lifting and bring the mood and mode of life to a higher plane. And brethren this means we have a job, in Christ, to do. We don't have time to split theological hairs which waste our hours and influence away, while multitudes perish in our town and cities near us as well as in distance lands. Everything is in the Christians favor when you put it in the proper light. To name a few of our worst enemies and to expose them in the light of the Bible is meaningful. Communism as an idealogy no longer impresses the world because it has failed to bring "the good life" to the Soviet Union and China. Poverty increases with population growth and food supplies dwindle with more than half the world hungry today. Christ gives us a fill that is both bread and drink. Historically nations that have been strong in the faith have always been fed and those who have forgotten Him have suffered. With drugs, drink, we see crime increasing rapidly, but Christ is the answer to each and we are His messengers to that teen or adult eager to receive an aid to meet his need and usually ends with an acceptance of Christ.

I was recently in St. Paul, Minnesota with Home Missionary Robert Francis. He stated that his own daughter related that all but five of her fifth grade class smoked and some were drug users already. The past has taught us that youth respond to the message of Christ at early ages. Let us gear our message to reach them at a young age to prevent a messed-up life before them.

With half our population being 25 or under we must bridge the spiritual gap to reach the reachables. Want a challenge? As a Christian you have one, for one-fourth of all people who have ever lived from all of times past to the present, live today. That is our mission field. More to reach in the best possible method God can give us as long as they point men to Christ!

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THE **CHALLENGE** OF THE 70'S

n May 4, 1970, four college stu-dents were shot to death as the students of Kent State University were fighting with National Guardsmen. As a result, 136 colleges and universities of our nation were closed because of riots. On May 9, college students from across America converged on Washington in a protest march. Several days later more students lost their lives. In response to these riots, President Nixon appointed Dr. Alexander Heard, Chancellor of Vanderbilt University, to serve as communication director between the President and the youth of America.. Apparently, the youth of America is the challenge of the seventies. They desire

change because the present system doesn't seem to be working. At least this is what they feel. Why all the rebellion and the lack of communication? I feel there are three areas in which we Christians must realize that the youth in our 1970 is the challenge of the Seventies.

FIRST, I feel there is definitely a gap between parents and children. Recently, a survey revealed that most young people in a certain church would not go to their parents because the youth thought their parents were too old-fashioned and would not listen to them. I believe this is a valid argument. Why? When was the last time as a parent you communicated your love and your desire to understand your child? When was the last time you had a "heart to heart" talk with your child without going into a raging fit or openly condemning everything he does? What kind of example are you to your children? Do you daily seek to live before your children as you do before others? Do you pray with your children? What kind of Christian example do you offer? I have found when young people come to me, nine out of ten cases reveal hypocrisy in the life of the parent. This is what concerns me. We condemn them and yet we offer them no real solution. We preach Christ and live like the devil. What kind of training are you giving your children? Are you stern or permissive? Are you prone to give in? Do you let them do as they please? Do you have a happy home? Do you and your wife fuss all the time? These are questions you must ask yourself, and by all means be honest in evaluating what kind of parent you are. The home is God ordained and as parents you are responsible for your children. Read Genesis 1:27-28; Proverbs 22:6; Deut. 6:7; and Ephesians 6:4.



SECOND, I feel there is a gap between the church and the youth. Analyze the program in your church. What kind of youth program do you have? Is it challenging to them or is it something just to occupy their time? Do you seek to help them learn spiritual truths and apply them to their life or do you just teach with really no aim? What are the qualifications of your Sunday School Teachers? Do they help or hinder your cause? Do you constantly condemn your youth or do you teach them the wrong way and the right way? Do you really seek to get them saved or do you always tell them they are going to hell? After they become Christians, what do you do with them? Do you seek to get them involved? Do you seek to help them grow spiritually? On and on one could go, but how about it? What effort are you putting forth to really train the youth in your church. Sunday School and CTS are not enough. They are only the beginning. As a pastor and leader of today you must seek to enfill the leaders of tomorrow with Christ. You must not only teach them John 3:16, but you must also get them to see the meaning of John 3:16 and how it applies to their life.

THIRD, I feel there is a gap between Christian youth and youth. We become so swallowed up in our piousty that we forget all about other youth. What kind of testimony do we live before other youth? Do we seek to lead them to Christ and show them the joy that is in our heart? Or are we like the Pharisee who thought he was better than the Publican? What are we doing to help other young people see Christ? What do we do to help and encourage youth who turn to Christ? I feel we as Christian youth have failed those of our generation who are not Christians.

These thoughts I hope will challenge parents, the Church and other Christian youth to become aware of the challenge in the Seventies-YOUTH.

"The 57th State convention was one of outstanding preaching with a wholesome spirit throughout the meeting," states the Rev. Bill Evans, the newly elected Clerk.

The convention met with the Trinity Church of Bridgeton, Missouri and was cared for very well in their beautiful new building. The pastor, Rev. Russel Spurgeon, and the entire church worked hard to meet the needs of the delegations from over the state and visiting areas.

National Convention Highlights

FREE WILL BAPTISTS DEFEND LEADERS, APPROVE \$2,400,000 BUDGET

Both the general board and the voting delegates of the National Association of Free Will Baptists came to the defense of their denominational leaders at the 34th annual convention here July 13-16, passing resolutions that absolved them from charges of "moving toward heretical doctrine" and leaning toward "neo-evangelicalism." Voting delegates also approved national department budgets totaling nearly \$2,400,000, elected 11 new board members and re-elected four National Association officers during the four-day meeting.

A resolution coming from the executive committee to the general board Monday, July 13, got easy passage after minor additions, and was presented to the national body on Wednesday as part of the general board's report.

The resolution defended denominational leaders from attacks charging the leaders with theological compromise and softness toward liberalism. It named among the attackers of the denominational leaders, "particularly...Bobby Smith, Billy Baugham, Bob Jones and Bob Jones III.

Bob Jones and Bob Jones III are the president and vice-president, respectively, of an interdenominational university in Greenville, S.C., Smith and Baugham are graduate students in the university and both are Free Will Baptists.

Among those leaders specifically mentioned in the resolution are the heads of the denomination's national departments, Free Will Baptist Bible College officials and World Vision International President Dr. W. S. Mooneyham. Dr. Mooneyham is a former moderator and one-time Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists:

The statement reaffirms the delegates' "wholehearted commitment to the fundamentals of the Christian faith in general and to the Free Will Baptist denomination in particular, and likewise our stalwart opposition to all forms of false doctrine, including Modernism, and to all philosophies which soften resistance to false doctrine, including Neo-evangelicalism."

Dr. Robert Picirilli retained his position of moderator of the National Association, and Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, assistant moderator, Waldo Young, clerk, and Jerry Dudley, assistant clerk, were also re-elected. Picirilli was widely praised for his "superb job of moderating the convention."

Eleven new board members were elected to fill expiring and vacated terms of the standing boards. Chosen to succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees of Free Will Baptist Bible College were Marvin Howard of Virginia, Damon Dodd of Georgia, and Luther Gibson of Missouri. Gibson has been on the board since 1948. Ted Wilbanks of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, was elected to the Board of Church Training Service, John Edwards of Dothan, Alabama, was elected to the Board of Home Missions; and added to the Board of Foreign Missions were Gene Rogers. of Oxnard, California, and James Murray of Oklahoma City. O. B. Everson of Georgia remained on the Laymen's Board; Galen Dunbar of North Carolina was elected to the Sunday School Board, and Ernest Harrison of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Bill Evans of Farmington, Mo., were placed on the Board of Retirement and Insurance.

About 3000 persons attended the convention, representing six foreign countries, two territories, and about 45 states. Visitors, ministers and delegates were able to view 21 booths of displays of Christian ministries. The large exhibit hall near the auditorium provided ample space for the crowds. The Del Webb Townehouse one block from the Convention Center was the convention headquarters.

The National Association will con-

vene in Nashville next July. Officials are expecting five to eight thousand persons to attend. The 1972 convention will be in Fort Worth, Texas. Delegates this year voted to hold the 1973 meeting in Macon, Georgia.

BIBLE COLLEGE HIRES NEW TEACHERS AND STAFF WORKERS

Free Will Baptist Bible College administrators have recently announced the employment of several new workers for the approaching school year.

Three new teachers have joined the faculty and four workers were added to offices of student supervision.

Henry Oliver, Abe Baerg, and Jerry Griffith, Jr. will be teaching this year. Mr. Oliver, an ordained Free Will Baptist preacher with 30 years of experience in the field of education, has joined the faculty as professor of English and education. He has held offices in the Nashville public school system ranging from teacher and principal to Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Baerg, who has taught voice in both high schools and college, has joined the music department. He has degrees from Tabor College and Wichita State University. Mr. Griffith from McArthur, Ohio, will teach Spanish for the Bible College. He has taught in high school and has done extensive work with the Ohio State Youth Commission.

Mrs. Bert Tippett has been named Acting Dean of Women. She has taught women's physical education at the Bible College since 1967. She is a 1962 FWBBC graduate and wife of the school's Director of Publications, Assisting her as dormitory supervisors are Mrs. Shirley Turner and Mrs. Sandy Goodfellow. Both are Bible College alumni. Also working with students this year will be Charles Branch. Mr. Branch will be dormitory supervisor among the men in Goen Hall. "When I consider Thy heavens, the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars which Thou hast ordained: what is man that Thou art mindful of Him or the son of man that Thou visitest him?" Psalm 8:3, 4

Many ask today, "Is it reasonable to believe in the existence of a living God without being able to see or hear Him?" Forgive the oversimplification when I answer flatly, "Yes." In spite of all the debates and denials of a real God which you read, convincing evidences abound. The wonder is not that people believe in God, but that they don't.

The Psalmist said he heard God's voice in the wonders of creation. "The heavens declare the glory of God...!" Science tells us that our earth is part of a solar system that occupies an area estimated at some 7,000 million miles in diameter! However one may be it is hard to absorb that. But astronomers confound us even more when they relate that the galaxy of which our earth is a part of is but one infinitesimal member of 500 million more systems of equal or greater size!

What about the vastness of the universe? Does it tell us anything about ourselves? Does it tell us anything about God? Yes it does, for it would take a God of infinite power to create it and a God of infinite love and detail to pick, as it were, a single grain from the seashore of infinity and people it with intelligent creatures capable of knowing, loving and serving Him.

With the aid of the mighty 200-inch Hale telescope at Mt. Palomar, California, astronomers have acquired even more staggering data. There is such a density of stars 4,000 million times 6 billion miles from the earth that individual suns can scarcely be separated or distinguished. One of the largest of them, Betelguese, is estimated to be 400 million miles in diameter!

One of the most fantastic discoveries of astronomers is that, no matter in which direction their research is directed, the distant galaxies are all traveling away from us. The more remote the galaxy, the more rapid its rate of retreat. These star systems are moving away from us at the speed of light-186,000 miles a second! Where are they going? When will they stop? I must say with the Psalmist, "Such knowledge is too wonderful for me... I cannot attain to it."

Many men say they cannot accept God's greatness as fact, yet they accept the observable facts of the universe. Is it because they accept only what they want to accept? Is it because a probe of the universe upsets the program they have mapped out for their lives?

What then about the human body? The Psalmist speaks of his ingenious construction. "I will praise thee, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made" (Ps. 139:14).

The eye has about a million light-sensitive rods and cones, sending impulses to the brain through 338,000 nerve cables. The ear has no less than 24,000 strings which vibrate. Compare this with a grand piano which has only 240 strings and is a million times larger than the human hearing apparatus!

The heart expands and contracts 40 million times a year and uses 400 million berrylike structures in the lungs for collecting oxygen and discharging impurities. Do you see why I say the greatest wonder of all is the person who, confronted with these facts, insists that there is no God?

It is reasonable to assume that God would want to communicate with the intricate, intelligent beings He created. Man is given certain abilities denied lesser creatures, one of which is the ability to communicate and fellowship with Him. The Holy Scriptures tells us the first man had no barrier between himself and God—until disobedience marred that relationship. The result was that Adam and his progeny became subject to decay and death. Thereafter sin passed hereditarily upon all men (Romans 5:12). But God, still mighty in mercy, opened a channel back. In the Old Testament the return was emblemized by animal sacrifices, forshadows of the coming Lamb, God's own Son, who would die on Calvary to atone for the sins of the whole world.

Centuries before Christ appeared on the earth the Greek philosopher Socrates said that if God were to ever influence the affairs of men it would be necessary for Him to become a man. God wasn't following Socrates' advice when He sent Jesus into this world; it was His well-laid plan before the foundations of the earth (Rev. 13:8).

Paul put it this way: "But when the time had fully come, God sent forth His Son...." (Gal. 4:4). John adds: "The Word (Jesus) was made flesh..." (John 1:14). Here we see God entering the mainstream of human life, identifying Himself with man and exemplifying Himself before man through the Person of His Son.

He established His deity by-changing water into wine; feeding more than five thousand with a small boy's lunch; walking on the water; calming storms; bringing life to the dead. The Gospels team with eye-witness accounts of the blind being given sight, the deaf hearing, the dumb speaking, and the demonic restored to rightful thinking. Even at His death a Roman centurion was moved to say, "Truly this was the Son of God!"

Why did Jesus have to die for us? The unamplified answer is: So God could pardon us. Ask yourself: "Has my every thought been pure, my every act for God's glory, and my every decision entirely selfless?"

Only Jesus Christ ever passed that test; that's why He came to this earth, lived up to all of God's righteous standards, and then offered Himself, a willing sacrifice on the cross, becoming a divine Substitute for a race of men that deserved to die in that place and in that manner. This is what is meant by the substitutionary work of Christ. It is God dying in our place, bearing our sins. It is God proving Himself to be not only the Creator, but also the Redeemer of mankind.

FREE WILL BAPTIST MINISTER KILLED IN VIETNAM

Sgt. Derrell Keith Dickey, 20, was killed in action in Vietnam on July 23. According to information given the family he was killed in a combat operation when a booby trap detonated. He had been in Vietnam three months and was stationed near Bien Hoa in the First Cavalry Division.

Sgt. Dickey was born Feb. 11, 1950 at Arcadia, Kansas, the son of Elbert R. and Thelma Dickey of rural Arcadia. He was married December 30, 1969 to Miss Brenda Nichols the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Cletus Nichols pastor of the Cuba Church. Rev. Dickey held membership in Oskaloosa Free Will Baptist Church, was a licensed minister and was pastoring the Waggoner Church near Stockton when he was called into the service on May 20, 1969. 
