S I WAS SORTING OUT some materials this week I ran across a speech delivered by General of the Army, Douglas A. MacArthur on May 12, 1962. The speech was given to the Corps of Cadets at the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. The reason I am including these very poignant words in lieu of anything I might write are two: General MacArthur is addressing a body of soldiers, I am writing to soldiers of the Lord, and what I would like to say is so much more capably said already. Once again it may be especially emphasized that goodness and righteousness are always in good taste.

"Duty-Honor-Country. Those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be, what you will be. They are your rallying points: to build courage when courage seems to fail; to regain when hope becomes forlorn. Unhappily, I possess neither that eloquence of diction, that poetry of imagination, nor that brilliance of metaphor to tell you all that they mean. The unbelievers will say they are but words, but a slogan, but a flamboyant phrase. Every pedant, every demagogue, every cynic, every hypocrite, every troublemaker, and, I am sorry

to say, some others of an entirely different character, will try to downgrade them even to the extent of mockery and ridicule. But these are some of the things they mold you for your future roles . . . They build your basic character ,... they make you strong enough to know when you are weak, and brave enough to face yourself when you are afraid. They teach you to be proud and unbending in honest failure, but humble and gentle in success; not to substitute words for actions, nor seek the path of comfort, but to face the stress and spur of difficulty and challenge; to learn to stand up in the storm but to have compassion on those who fall; to master yourself before you seek to master others; to have a heart that is clean, a goal that is high; to learn to laugh yet never forget how to weep; to reach into the future yet never neglect the past; to be serious yet never to take yourself too seriously; to be modest so that you will remember the simplicity of true greatness, the open mind of true wisdom, the meekness of true strength. They give you a temper of will, a quality of the imagination, a vigor of emotions, a freshness of the deep springs of life, a temperamental predominance of courage over timidity, an appetite of adventure over love of ease. They create in your heart the sense of wonder, the unfailing hope of what next, and the joy and inspiration of life. They teach you in this way to be a soldier and gentleman."

The true duty of man and the true honor that a man owes demands a great deal, but makes for true greatness. I am fully aware that a man can be good, be a good soldier and not be a good Christian, but I was very forcibly struck with the similiarity of the characteristics General MacArthur maintained were necessary for a good soldier and those for a good Christian soldier. May God help us be good soldiers!!

of a Man

MAY I CALL your attention, for just a few minutes, to the idea "What determines the True Size of a Man." We tend today to be very sports conscious both on the local and the national level. Right now most of us are involved in football. Some of us are players, some are cheerleaders, and some play in the band. All require the development of skills.

As a football player, I discovered there are things the coach *does not* want us to do. Do you know any of these things? Cigarettes, late hours, and eating too many greasy or sweet foods are a few among many. Why does a coach want a boy to give up these things? How long do they keep up this training? Until the end of the season. If a boy does not obey the rules he will not be a good player. Isn't that so? We always want the best players we can get, don't we?

I discovered, also, that giving things up is not all they expect of fellows in training. They have to take good stiff exercises and work out every day in order to keep their muscles hard so they can stand all the knocks and kicks and falls they will get in the game. They study hard to learn a set of rules so they will not foul and bring a penalty on the team. They, with their coach, sit down and figure out runs and passes, and plunges so they reach the goal in spite of the opposition. There is considerable work even in play. Almost any game you can think of takes work—the bigger the game, the harder the work.

Coaches look at many things in a boy. Some coaches look first at the size, but good coaches discover there are many things as important in determining the true size of a man as his stature. Coaches look for speed, endurance, obedience, courage, will, and determination to win among other attributes. Many small boys are often champions and larger boys are losers in the game. Then, too, the coach is so important.

Will you think with me for a moment about the big game which every one of us has to play, whether he wants to or not? It is the game of life. Some are good players, while some are poor. Christ is a wonderful coach in this game of life. He wishes the people on His team to train so they will be the best of players. There are some things He asks them not to do. He asks them not to be evil-minded, not to envy, and not to steal. He asks them to exercise daily in purity, in faith, and in prayer so their spiritual muscles will be strong. He asks them to study His rule book, the Bible, so they can know how to win in spite of the opposition.

Some people lose in the game of life because they will not train.

The assistants to the Head Coach are the church and parents. The field of training is the home. Just as the athelete has his uniform to identify himself, so the child is uniformed in character as supplied by the home.

An American who spent his vacation in England recounts that while he was there he visited an English farm where he noticed an extremely fine flock of sheep. "You have a fine flock of sheep," he said to the shepherd, "will you tell me the secret of raising them so well?" "Well, Sir," the weatherbeaten shepherd replied, "there isn't much of a secret, except I always give special care to the lambs."

That's the secret of good homes, too. The early years of childhood mark us and we carry that influence through life. The greatest privilege of a mother and father is to "give special care to the lambs." The Old Testament prophet said much the same thing, "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old he will not depart from it." Here character traits are learned that will eventually determine the true size of the man.

One of the attractions for tourists in Japan is the dwarfed trees. The Japanese accomplish this by cutting the taproot and the tree must live off the surface roots alone. The trees live, but they do not grow. Men are like that. When a man neglects religion, he cuts the taproot of life. He will not attain the measure of the stature of the true size of a man of God in Christ Jesus.

This is what C.T.S. has done for me and is doing for you. As an athelete is trained, our youth must be trained. Remember the poem, "The Old Bent Tree"?

The tree was old and ugly and bent

With knots about its trunk;

It's market value-not a cent

It was only fit for junk.

But when the tree was but a sprout Just shooting from the earth,

Had it been staked and straightened out What might it have been worth?

How much the old bent tree portrays, One's life that's spent in sin

Who is old and full of wicked days And never lets God in.

Who might have been a stalwart man So strong and great in truth

If only he had sought God's plan Back in the days of youth.

Oh, parents of our land today, Help start the children straight

By teaching them to watch and pray

Before it is too late. By helping them to seek the Lord Who saves by grace sublime And holds for them a great reward Beyond the shores of time.

The true champion knows what he is aiming for—his goal. The true Christian says with Isaiah, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings as eagles. They shall run and not be weary and they shall walk and not faint." Just as the athelete must lay aside certain habits, "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith." Then, remember this: the size of a man should be measured by value or worth; Not by his height, nor his weight, nor his girth; His measure of strength that will stand in a trial; Is the weight of the load he can bear with a smile. Whenever the Lord has a big task to do; He looks for a man who is big from God's view; One wise as a serpent and kind as a dove— The really big man gets his strength from above. These things



Free Will Baptist Bible College began its 29th year of operation recently with an enrollment of 408 students. There were 157 new students who joined 232 returnees for a day-student enrollment of 389. Nienteen evening school registrants brought the total of 408.

Ministerial students number 120 and 32 others are training for missionary service.

There are 233 men and 156 women studying at the Bible College this year. By classes, they number 145 freshmen, 127 sophomores, 62 juniors and 36 seniors. Nineteen students are classified as Special Students.

The information came from persons within the movement itself-persons who said a target date of 1973 has been set for a nation-wide revolutionary take-over. It gave instructions about shooting, sabotage, Vietnam, discrediting the police, etc. Every Christian must become vitally concerned with the greatness of our responsibility and the urgency of the hour in which we live. "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his soul?" "We must work the works of Him while it is yet day, for the night cometh when no man can work." 
