# the Editor

HE CHRISTMAS SEASON is upon us. In fact, in most towns of any size it has confronted us since Halloween. I can recall when the general public was shocked at the appearance of Christmas commercialization immediately after Thanksgiving. Times may change; emphasis may be misplaced; but the basic principle shall always remain the same: Jesus, the Son of God, came to dwell among men. May we who claim Christ keep this first in our minds and hearts.

The commercialization of Christmas has caused many to forget the Person whose birthday we celebrate. Caused them to forget that the adoration of men of low estate and high, and the singing of praise-these simple things-are still just as important and still just as much in place in the 20th century as they were at the birth of the first century.

Permit me to borrow from the words of another to express my Christmas wish to you.

I salute you: There is nothing I can give you which you have not; but there is much, that, while I cannot give you, you can take . . .

No heaven can come to us unless our hearts find rest in it today . . . . Take Heaven . . . .

No peace lies in the future which is not hidden in the present. Take Peace . . . .

The gloom of the world is but a shadow; behind it, yet within our reach is joy. Take Joy . . . .

There is radiance in the darkness, could we but see-and to see we have only to look. I beseech you to look. Take Radiance . . .

Life is so full of meaning and purpose, so full of beauty-beneath its covering-that you will find earth but cloaks your heaven. Courage then to claim it, that is all! But courage you have, and the knowledge that we are pilgrims together, wending through unknown country home.

And so, at this Christmas time, I greet you .... with profound esteem and with the prayer that for you, now and forever, the day breaks, and the shadows flee away.

This Christmas greeting written by Fra Giovanni in the year 1513 still expresses what I feel to be the epitomy of Christmas: The hope, joy, and peace of heart and mind that Jesus brings. That peace, that joy, that hope is my Christmas wish to you.

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## What Do You Want For Christmas? (Romans 12:6-12)

HAT DO YOU WANT for Christmas? The answers which people will give to this question depend upon their wants, their fears, their hopes, their aspirations. A good many of us will say, "I want to be home for Christmas." The soldier far from home and loved ones might say, "I want a discharge." The man at the factory or office might say, "I want a promotion." The man with a sick child will say, "I want help for my child." The man with great inner tensions will say, "I want peace and relaxation." This list could go on forever, of course.

In Old Testament times, God didn't have to ask His faithful servants what they wanted most for Christmas. Abraham wanted the time to come quickly, when from his seed the Messiah would be born. Isaiah wanted the time to come quickly, when "the Righteous One" would lead His flock like a shepherd. These men knew what they wanted, and God knew what they wanted. In His own time, loving as He does the world of men, God satisfied this yearning when the fullness of time had come, God gave His Christmas Gift to the world: His Son, Christ.

To evaluate this Gift and to cherish it properly, we cannot separate God's giving at Christmas from the giving on Good Friday and Easter. God knew that in spite of the wants and yearnings of men for fellowship with Him, still His Son would be despised and rejected of men and at their hands would become the Man of Sorrows, acquainted with grief. Not just the Baby in the manger, but the Man on the Cross—He was God's Christmas Gift to man. And each Christmas we stop to rejoice in both the Gift and the Giver.

But Christ is not the only Gift which God offers us, now is Christ the only Gift which God wants us to ask for. He wants us to seek also a wide variety of gifts which are appropriate for a soul which has already been given the Gift of a Savior.

The Apostle Paul reminds us that even as God has given us the greatest Gift of all, His own Son, He certainly feels free to give us many other gifts of a lesser nature. God is pleased when we ask Him for blessings which complement our faith in the great Gift which he has given us. Paul displays to us a choice of gifts which we may well ask for. And what better time to do so than at Christmas? We would not all ask for the same gifts. Our selections will vary, depending upon our needs. Now these gifts the Apostle enumerates—which of them do you want most for Christmas? Would you, like Paul, like to understand yourself and your actions better? Paul says that he cannot understand himself; he cannot understand why he sometimes fails to do the very things he loves, and finds himself often doing the very things he hates. Would you, like Paul, like to understand yourself and your behavior and thus be prepared to improve the quality of your life? If so, you might turn to verse 16 of our scripture and ask God for wisdom about yourself, so that you need not be "wise in your own conceits."

Do you sometimes feel dishonest? Do you ever feel like a hypocrite? Then turn to verse 9 and ask God for the gift of genuine love. You may want to qualify this and to say, "Let me love my wife better than I do; let me love my children better than I do; let me love my friends better than I do. Let me be honest in all my behavior toward those people whom I want to love."

Are you sometimes depressed and discouraged? A gift that you might well ask for is to be found in verse 12—the gift to be able to rejoice in hope. Rejoicing in your hope implies a more joyful and sustaining faith. It implies looking not only to the present but to the future as well. It conveys a reassuring thought concerning those who have gone before into death. It implies the delight for reuniting with them again in our Father's house. To ask for this joy is to ask for some thing good for Christmas.

Have you been feeling sorry for yourself this past year? Or perhaps feeling a bit rebellious because as you see it, God has not treated you as well as He has treated your neighbor? Has someone gotten a promotion you wanted? Has someone gotten the assignment you desired? Has illness plagued you or your family? Are you a bit angry with both God and man about this? A wonderful gift for Christmas would be patience and the wisdom it teaches.

Have you from time to time this year felt guilty about your private and public worship? Have you felt you did not always worship with the heart? Have you felt you have been negligent in sustaining and improving your faith? Ask the Lord to help you be "instant in prayer." Ask Him to give you that discipline of mind and heart which true worship of God requires. This is an excellent gift. Being a part of the twentieth century society imposes problems that it seems the world has never before experienced. Perhaps we should ask for gifts which have to do with meeting the unusual needs and the human relationships of our times. What can we do about Paul's exhortation: "Outdo one another in showing honor." This is not always easy to do. What do we do about the divine guidance which says: "Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly?" Obviously, ours is a constant need to have skill in creating and managing human relationships that are true, and right, and just. Would this not be a good gift for which to ask? Jesus, in His teachings and by example, has this gift to give us. He himself developed it in a spectacular degree.

An important factor in our salvation is that our Lord, the Creator of human life, came to share the human life after it had become tainted and sickened with sin. He rejoiced with a Roman captain in whom He had found faith greater than any which He had found in Israel. He wept with Martha and Mary at their brother's grave. He was sorrowful when the rich young ruler left Him. He wants to share this gift with us too; to help us rejoice with those who rejoice and to weep with those who weep. Paul knew this isn't easy. To rejoice with the man who has received honor may remind us too much of our own failures, or of the failures of others toward us. To weep with those who weep means trying to understand another man's problems and miseries. To rejoice with those who rejoice and to weep with those who weep requires that we will be alert and sensitive to our fellow human beings, no matter who or what they are. In a sense, it means that we have to become their servants. This is a splendid gift to ask for-so splendid that few men really possess it.

Paul suggests another gift—the ability to forgive. This is particularly appropriate at Christmas time when we remember that to win forgiveness for us was Christ's primary purpose in coming. In the past, our nation has forgiven its former enemies and has tried to help them. But national forgiveness and individual forgiveness are two different things. As Christian citizens of a nominally Christian nation, we may well ask for the gift to forgive. Our fellowship with Christ, the Christmas Savior, can never be complete until we learn to forgive as He did. The gift can be a deceptive one, as Jesus Himself reminds us. He tells us that forgiveness cannot be mere formality; it must be from the heart. Christ came to work out man's forgiveness and to plead with men to accept it. He also pleads with men to accept and to exercise the Christlike ability to forgive.

We have not exhausted the catalog of God's gifts. There are many more. Choose from them those which you think are the most important to you, those which meet your needs which Paul titles *victory*. He says, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." Jesus came, not only to give us the victory over death and the grave. He came also to help us lead victorious lives—lives which are not overcome by the evil of the world but which overcome the evil with good. Ask for victory in your daily living.

All of these gifts which Paul lists are excellent ones, but none of them would be fully available to us, and none of them would have any true meaning for us if Christ had not first given Himself to us. That He came—we remember especially at Christmas. That He keeps on coming with an endless supply of the gifts of life we dare never forget—ever!

The purpose of the rally will be to share with the laymen the school's plan for further expansion and enlist their help in carrying the burden for an improved Bible College to their churches and friends.



Because of a very great contribution to the Free Will Baptist work in the state of Missouri the GEM sidesteps an accepted policy and gladly prints this Memorial Notice of one who won the hearts of many because he loved the Lord so well.

"And I heard a voice from Heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them."

On Oct. 8, 1970, Rev. W.T. Turnbough, (better known as Bill) after a brief illness, departed this life at the age of 47 years. He is survived by his wife, Elva, and son, David of Perry, Florida; his eldest son, Ted of Valdosa, Georgia; his mother, Mrs. Grace Turnbough of Potosi, Missouri; two sisters; Wilma Brakefield, and Mariam Willhite of St. Louis, Missouri.

Bill was a veteran of World War II. His ambulance corp. was the first to set foot on Normandy Beach on that historical D-Day. While driving an ambulance, surrounded by fighting and bombs, he promised God to serve Him if He'd bring him safely home.

It took the words of a dear Aunt to help the Holy Spirit to unlock the closed door of his heart and bring him face to face with God of his promises. So, in the fall of 1947, shortly before the birth of his first son, he came back to God.

He united with the Berkeley Free Will Baptist Church, Berkeley City, Mo., and it was here that he surrendered to the call of the gospel ministry. Bill started a mission in March 1953, which today is the Fourth Free Will Baptist Church of St. Louis, Mo. He pastored Free Will Baptist Churches in Leadington, Mo.; Sesser and Chicago Heights, Ill.; Wichita, Kansas; Pleasant View, Tenn.; Eau Gallie, and Perry, Florida, where he was pastoring the St. John's Free Will Baptist Church at the time of his death.

It has been said that, "Sickness brings out the best or the worst in a person." Those who had the privilege of being near Bill in his last hours will surely agree that the messages he preached by his patience, love, and concern for the welfare of others surely equals any message he had ever delivered from the sacred pulpit.

Less than a week before his death he told this writer that the only thing he asked of the Lord, was that his boys would serve the Lord, and his wife would be taken care of.

His last words to his dear wife were, "I am finished....Let's go home." They somehow remind me of the final words of His blessed Saviour, "It is finished."

I want to encourage every God-called minister to preach the Word just a little harder, and be just a little more faithful. Be "a vessel to honour." (II Tim. 2:20.) Bill is gone, but the Bible he preached, and the God he loved still lives on.

We extend our thanks and appreciation to every one who has reached out loving hands in any way to the family at this time. May God reward you.

It has been some time since we have taken the opportunity to share with you news of our work here in Minnesota. Please permit me to take a few moments of your time to bring you up to date on what God has been doing here in St. Paul.

Miss Sue May spent the summer with us serving as a summer missionary. Miss May, from Arkansas and a Senior at the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, worked primarily with boys and girls in this area. She held a number of 5-Day Bible Clubs in the back yards of this inner city area. She shared with them the "Good News" of Christ in song and flannelgraph stories. Many of these boys and girls came to know Christ as personal Saviour. Her ministry in this area had an impact for God that will long be remembered. #### Bible College Approves ETTA Courses For College Credit

In a recent policy statement issued by Dean, Charles A. Thigpen of the Free Will Baptist Bible College it was announced that college credit would be allowed for ETTA courses taught by holders of the ETTA Teachers Diploma.

The stipulations for such transfer of credit are as follows:

- 1. The ETTA Courses must be taught by those who have earned the ETTA Teachers Diploma from Free Will Baptist Bible College or one of the member schools of ETTA.
- 2. The student must present to the College a registered Credit Card signifying completion of each ETTA course.
- 3. The student must meet all basic enrollment requirements and satisfactorily complete one semester (at least twelve semester hours) as a full-time student before he will be given credit for ETTA Courses.
- 4. Three Semester hours will be allowed for the Preliminary Certificate Course and Three Semester hours will be allowed for the Advanced Certificate Course for a total of Six Semester hours.

According to H.D. Harrison, Director of Teacher Training for the Free Will Baptist Sunday School Department, this means that any person earning ETTA credit cards on the local church level under the instruction of a holder of the ETTA Teachers Diploma is eligible for transfer of such credit according to the above provisions. This applies to courses already completed as well as those to be completed. Any present or future holder of the ETTA Teachers Diploma is eligible to teach such courses for credit which may be later transferred as college credit. This will enable a prospective Bible College student to earn six semester hours of credit subject to his enrollment and completion of at least 12 semester hours at the Bible College.

This should become a strong impetus to the nearly 400 Free Will Baptist ETTA Diploma Holders to teach such courses on the local church, community and institute level throughout our denomination.

This does not prohibit any pastor or certified layman from teaching these courses for *ETTA* credit subject to previously published standards. Any ETTA courses taught for credit on any level must be reported to the Sunday School Department in order for credit cards to be issued. Inquiries should be directed to H.D. More Free Will Baptist churches participated in this campaign than any previous one. The increases in attendance also set new records. 
