The past three months of working with the GEM have been most educational. As I mentioned in the beginning, this is a new experience with me. May I take my space this issue to offer some random thought, say "thank you," and offer some few words of explanation?

First of all, may I say the "Thank you's"? I appreciate all the kind things you have all written. I don't get time to write to each of you to say so, but I do just the same. But, even as I accept your notes of thoughtfulness and consideration, I must be honest. Most of the work of putting the GEM into its attractive format is done by the Printing Division of the National Sunday School Department in Nashville. Our GEM is published there. I receive the materials you send, type it up in what I hope will be an acceptable form and hopefully grammatically correct, offer any suggestions I might especially like to see included, then send it to Nashville. The lay-out and all the technical work is then done there. Your GEM is even mailed from Nashville unless you have a Springfield address, then it comes through the Springfield Post Office

because the office of publication is my address there. If you continue to like the way the GEM looks, say so. I'll appreciate and will pass the word on to those who work hard to make it so. If there is something you don't appreciate about the *GEM*, or suggestions you think would improve it, please take time to write and let us know that, also. Constructive criticism written in honest Christian love will be received in the same way.

Now, for the explanations. The one thing which seems to need explanation worst of all is billing statements, address changes, and lagging in getting your GEM to you. The billing statements you expect and they do not create any major problems except when they do not arrive at the time expected. This part of the *GEM* work is time consuming and I have been at some loose ends in figuring out another system and putting things into one of my own. The system used by the former editor was good and without error, but just as it would be difficult for me to dress in his clothes, so is my working with that which served him well. I have things organized my way now, which is not necessarily the best way, but this problem is now at an end. Changes of address and new subscriptions are slow in coming to you. I realize this causes some concern, however, we ask your patience. After we receive them they must be typed and sent to the Nashville offices. This takes approximately a month before they can all be forwarded. The printers, then, must make plates for their addressing equipment which probably will loose another month, so that two months is about the fastest these changes can be made. All of us concerned work as fast as we can. National magazines to which you subscribe such as Time, U.S. News, etc. print notices in their magazines warning are ing you that three to six months may be required to make such changes. We work a little faster than that. Up-to-date Church Plan lists will be mailed to each church as soon as this can be accomplished. It is gradually getting done. Pray for us and be patient.

And, the random thoughts. The New Year will be well into its first month when you receive this issue of the GEM and more than likely the stride with which you shall walk through 1971 will have already been set. I trust it is a stride that will include many things for God and His work. I sincerely hope there is room in that stride for you to take time to make the GEM your personal paper. I am especially pleased with the churches who have been sending in news-it needs to be in by the 15th of the month.

EING A YOUNG CHRISTIAN who is true to God is a lot more difficult today. This is my own personal opinion, but most people of the older generation would agree with the statement—"It's harder to be a Christian than it was a generation ago." Many Christians spend their money on themselves instead of God's work, indicating they are more concerned with earthly things than heavenly possessions. Christians of all ages are guilty of practices such as this. Their actions are a very poor testimony for what they are supposed to believe. No wonder many young people, saved and unsaved alike, are becoming disillusioned with the church of today.

The youth of a church is that church's most valuable asset. There are so many things wrong in our world today that many young people, when planning their careers, are likely to throw up their hands and say, "What's the use of trying to help out this world of ours? It won't make any

difference anyway." Sometimes we don't realize the purpose of our lives, so they are lived carelessly. But most of the young Christians I know are usually willing to dedicate their lives to God and His church. They are more concerned with giving something to the world than getting something out of it. A person who accepts Jesus at an early age has his whole life before him. He can, then, plan his vocation according to God's will. A person coming to God in his later years already has many things "set" in his life. Reaching young people for God just means they can do more for God. This should indicate that we need to influence young people to become Christians and encourage them to listen for God's will for their lives. In short, the churches should be more interested in young people.

Young people have some new ideas that might help their churches, but they must be encouraged to present their opinions by someone who will be willing to listen. The person who is not yet twenty has his best fifteen years ahead of him. That isn't my opinion, it is an accepted, proven fact. Surely these "best" years should be effectively utilized through the wise leadership of mature Christians.



It is good to bring you greetings from the state of Vermont. We are now located in Newbury near the Connecticut River on the New Hampshire border. Newbury is one of the oldest villages in Vermont.

In the area in which we moved to organize a Free Will Baptist church, there are no gospel preaching churches at all. Newbury, along with several other towns in the area, has no Bible-believing church of any kind. We wish to thank the National Home Mission Board for their recent decision to continue to support us in this new Home Mission Project in the state of Vermont.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT . . .

Copied from the "Newsletter" Trinity Baptist Church. Thank you Brother Spurgeon. The largest attendance ever recorded is expected at the 35th session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, July 12-15, 1971. Meeting in Nashville, Tennessee, where the National Association was organized in 1935, the annual convention will draw pastors, delegates, and visitors from most of the 40 states where Free Will Baptist churches are located.

In order to lay a solid foundation and give a renewed spiritual thrust for a decade of church growth, the convention theme is "O Lord, Revive Thy Work."

All sessions will be held in the Nashville Municipal Auditorium, except for some youth activities. Plans are being laid to entertain 5,000 representatives from across the nation and several foreign countries.




