



WE CAN CONQUER fear. Fear is a creature with a thousand faces. It comes as the Psalmist says, "as an arrow, a pestilence." Today an arrow is a plaything for a small boy. Pestilences are robbed of their sting by the antidotes scientists have discovered. But we still have threats—greater than ever—nuclear bombs, missiles, Apowered submarines. So we still have fear. It is abroad everywhere in the world. It is the dominant element in the lives of multitudes of men and women today.

The Bible has much to say about fear. In 1 John we read: "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casteth out fear." Any good concordance gives two full pages of references to *fear*.

There are three types of fear which we commonly experience:

1. The ghost-story kind. We amuse ourselves by telling each other weird, far-out stories. Sometimes these produce a second-hand kind of fear. In this consideration, we can safely leave this kind of fear to one side.

2. Then there is the instructive kind of fear. This provides a protection for us from possible harm. It is said of the famed English naval hero, Admiral Nelson, that he did not know the meaning of fear. He would stand on the deck of his flagship and see ships cracking all about him, yet he would not acknowledge defeat. Most of us, however, are not as fearless as Admiral Nelson. Most of us learn quickly to shield ourselves from harm as the fear instinct operates to protect us.

3. Then there is the nagging, persistent, soul-defying fear of a dread event that may come in the future. Such dread takes all the troubles of tomorrow and puts them into the world of today. It is of this kind of fear that Jesus

said, "Take no thought of tomorrow."

In the first chapter of the book of Deuteronomy is a remarkable analysis of fear. The Israelites had just come out of slavery. Their backs were bent by years of servitude. They were now in the desert under the hot sun of the day and the cold of the nights. Under Moses they had received divine law as well as the report of the spies in regard to the Promised Land. Then the corrosive action of fear began to do its work.

What was the basic cause of their fears? Was it not that they shifted their attention from the known causes to the unknown consequences? As a result they neglected their ultimate goals.

There are difficulties to overcome in every life. So often we forget the resources available to overcome these obstacles. When this happens our magnified fear comes in great crushing waves. We see no open roads ahead. We shift our attention to difficulties rather than goals. Ought we not hear the words of Moses? He turns our attention to spiritual solutions. "You have no trust," were his words to the Israelites.

In the Christian life the basis of utilizing all of Gods resources lies in that one idea, "trust." It shifts one's eyes from the human plane up where one can look into the face of God. God is the one source of power in our lives and world, to help us overcome fear. To the Christian, there is promised divine strength for every testing. Hear the world of Isaiah: "Thou shalt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee." Why do we not employ this amazing promise of God? It is usable at any time.

In Deuteronomy we have this antidote to fear: "The Eternal God is thy dwelling place and underneath are the everlasting arms." Paul's observation that "perfect love casteth out fear" is the language of faith. It is the expression of certainty that our lives were given to us by a God who is rich in wisdom and able to keep us in any situation.

Paul suggests: "Whether we live unto the Lord, or whether we die unto the Lord," is not of supreme moment; "we are the Lord's." If we are in the hands of a loving God, we are secure. That is all we know—and all we need to know.

"Through Christ who strengtheneth" we can conquer fear.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST GEM

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457 ENROLLMENT LARGEST EVER FOR BIBLE COLLEGE

A new record enrollment of 457 students was set as Free Will Baptist Bible College began its 30th year of operation recently. The 186 new students joined 271 returnees to set the new record.

Within this year's student body are 148 who are studying for the ministry and 44 preparing for missionary service. Of the 266 men and 191 women enrolled, 333 are single students and 124 are married.

Four Missourians are among those new students enrolled this fall: Wesley Bigelow, Raytown; Deborah Hendershott, St. Louis; Linda Stephens, DeSoto; and James Ward, St. Louis.

Free Will Baptist Bible College recently announced plans for the school's annual Missionary Conference, November 15-17. Speakers for the meeting will include layman missionary Paul Robinson, who ministers in Uruguay, and the Reverend Eddie Payne, on leave from Ivory Coast.

The Reverend Reford Wilson will speak on behalf of the denomination's Foreign Missions Depart-

ment during the Conference and the Reverend Homer Willis will represent the Department of Home Missions. The Reverend Leroy Forlines, FWBBC Bible professor, and Dr. Robert Picirilli, registrar for the school, will also speak during the meeting.

The Bible College's recent appeal for \$25,000 to erase the school's indebtedness met with a generous response from Free Will Baptists. The drive, termed *DEBT RETIREMENT DAY: August 31*, resulted in more than enough response to clear the building campaign debt and pave the way for further campus expansion.

Jack Paramore, Director of Development for the Bible College, expressed deep gratitude to those Free Will Baptists whose generosity in this drive made victory possible.

Things are Happening at Hillsdale.

As you have already noticed, we have changed our name since last year, from Oklahoma Bible College, to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. "Oklahoma" was removed from the name because the Oklahoma State Association voted to make Hillsdale a regional school, rather than a state school. The board of trustees is now composed of representatives of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas as well as Oklahoma. The words "Bible College" were removed from the name because Hillsdale is committed to a Christian liberal arts approach to education, rather than the Bible College approach. Of course, Hillsdale is no less Christian, and no less Biblecentered than before. We are simply attempting to fill the Christian education gap that exists in our denomination by providing a place where our young people can get accredited liberal arts training in a Free Will Baptist institution standing firmly upon Bible standards.

Speaking of accreditation, that's another thing that is HAP-PENING AT HILLSDALE. This past April *Hillsdale College was*

granted accreditation status by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. That means that credits received by a student at Hillsdale can be transferred to other colleges and universities in the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, with full academic respect.

HAPPENING? Recent personnel changes give us both regret and anticipation. Long time friends of the school noted with regret the resignation of Dr. J. D. O'Donnell from the presidency of Hillsdale, though we, in the state of Missouri, can rejoice in that his leaving Hillsdale brought him to our state, as pastor of the Grant Avenue Free Will Baptist Church in Springfield. We view with eager anticipation, however, the future of Hillsdale under the leadership of the newly elected president, Mr. Bill Jones, a 10 year veteran of missionary service in Ivory Coast, Africa.

But all of these things that are HAPPENING AT HILLSDALE are but shadows compared to what is HAPPENING in the lives of the students who attend there. Knowledge gained . . . skills attained . . . spiritual lives deepened . . . bodies disciplined . . . social lives developed . . . all for the express purpose of enabling Christian young people to carry out the Great Commission more effectively. Some as occupational Christian workers. Some as lay men and lay women. All as ambassadors of Jesus Christ, "approved unto God," alert, eager, effective. That the best thing that's HAPPENING AT HILLSDALE.

HAPPENING? Things are HAP-PENING AT HILLSDALE. But the things that happen don't just happen. Some one makes them happen. One wise man said 75% of the people do not know anything is happening. 20% of the people observe what is happening, but 5% of the people make things happen. REFLECTIONS OF A HOST PASTOR

on the State Association

HE QUIET of the night and the stillness of the atmosphere causes a moment of reflection over the last year. The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists have invaded, conquered and left Waynesville never to be the same again. Months had gone into the planning and some tireless days of labor along with much prayer but it was all over now; or is it? Can anything so much labored over and prayed for be over in just four days? Can 1,000 people flow through a town in four days, stay in motels, hotels, eat in restaurants, and sandwich shops, walk through markets, dress shops, and men's wear; fill parking lots to capacity, leave tracks and testimony behind and the town or community be the same as before or no better? This pastor thinks not. In 1969 he came to Waynesville looking for the will of God for the life of family and self not really sure that this was the place of God's labor for him. After some time it became apparent that the Church must be enlarged to meet the needs of the growing congregation. The sanction of God seemed to be on the union of pastor and congregation. As the new Church building began to take shape there came to the mind, "Could this small "group of believers,' (some forty on the books, but as in most cases not all active) host such a giant as the State Association?" Talk began to humm, minds began to spin, "Could we?" The question became a challenge! Dare we try? Was it the will of God? Would God honor and bless such an endeavor? The local Laclede County Association said they would like to try and help bring the State to the area. A vote was taken and unanimously agreed to ask.

Then came the 1970 session meeting at Trinity Baptist in Bridgeton, Missouri, such a great crowd and such a large beautiful Church, dare we ask? Too late, the letter from the Laclede County Assoc. was in the hands of the State clerk and the request had been given to the General Board representative, "Bring home the State!" Many God fearing, Christ honoring, Church interested men wondered, "Is it wise to try such a venture in such a small community and congregation?" (I thank these men for being prayerful enough to consider the idea and invitation for some three months.) At the fall General Board meeting the Board granted the invitation contingent upon the High School auditorium being available. It was available after checking as high in politics as the State Attorney General for a ruling on the use of School property for such affairs.

Now, place yourself in the shoes of this pastor, you have just gone past the point of no return and suddenly you realize there are a multitude of things—loose ends that need to be tied to get finished and prepared before the Church is ready. You began to think, "... after all of the things you have done it had better be good when the State convenes." In June at the Youth Camp a new idea was conceived and at the National in Nashville, Tennessee it became more than an idea it became a challenge. Youth *must* have a part in the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists. Again the fears, doubts, "...will it work...will they come...will the pastors and churches be interested?" We must try!

Reflecting from this point and recaping the statistics, Monday night the Sunday School Board and C.T.S. presented Reverend Frank Giunta to a filled sanctuary of people. God blessed with His presence and the State meeting had begun. Tuesday morning brought a new challenge, the church basement was flooded with 2 inches of water-the devil works hard and overtime to stop that which will bless the children of God. Preachers, deacons and friends pitched together to remove the hindrance the devil was defeated again! Mrs. Willey was scheduled to be interviewed on the local radio station along with Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, and after talking to Sister Willey only a short time the interviewer decided to make another session available for Dr. J. D. O'Donnell and make two interviews available rather than one for two different days-God honored and the full results of the interviews are still to be seen, but results have already been seen. Mrs. Willey spoke at the 11:00 Worship hour for the Ladies Auxiliary and the heart of each worshiper was touched and drawn to a new level of consecration. Mrs. Cleo Pursell from the National Auxiliary office gave some recaps from Nashville-and some of the women received a "double blessing." During the afternoon devotion Bro. Wesley Calvery and family along with John Yasuda moved the Ladies session into a Spiritual high to really make things right for the Ladies Banquet and the Tuesday night opening official session of the State. At the Auxiliary Banquet Sister Willey again spoke and even those who worked in the banquet hall and kitchen were challenged by the spiritual magnitude. At the close of the meal and devotional presentation a tip was left for those who had served so efficiently-one lad returned his whole part of the offering, touched by the hand of God, he wanted it to go to the Church. (This 22 year old young man does not attend church anywhere.)

After all of the wonderful blessing that had preceeded the opening session it would be inconceivable that this 1971 State Meeting would not be above all that had preceeded it. The Tuesday evening congregation was near 400 and to our displeasure the heat was too much to bear but God blessed with His presence and the meeting blessed the saints of God with Rev. Glenn Rekhop bringing the key note address. During the evening Rev. Bill Reeves and wife were given special plaques of recognition for their part in the 21 years of service to the State at the Youth Camp at Niangua, Missouri. "The uncomfortableness of the heat in the auditorium could not do it!" Those attending the Missouri State were determined to be in the Spirit of God and unity and the heat "welded us together" in prayer for the lost and the full effect of the gospel in the State of Missouri through the efforts of a united Free Will Baptist Church.

Wednesday morning the reports of each Board and National office began to bring the mind of the saints to a greater challenge. Then Rev. Henry Long took the stand for God to challenge us with the Master Builder Himself as his theme. Three hundred were packed into the building that is at capacity only to seat a little over two hundred. The man of the hour was more than competent to speak about the Master Builder; he could speak of a personal acquaintance and challenged to introduce anyone who dared to come to Him. What a blessing and there was more to come! The afternoon session began by—the devil at work again—all the electricity in the area going out; no air conditioning, no fans and about 175 delegates, visitors and friends trying to do business for God in "Building God's Church in the Twentieth Century". Is the Church durable? "Praise God, it is." The intense heat of the summer afternoon could not melt the strong bond of unity and love for the advancement of the Lord Jesus Christ through the Free Will Baptist of the State of Missouri. The meeting that is always expected to be the Spiritual high of the week of worship proved to be an added blessing with a "new block" of attenders some 250 youth— "Glory, they did come!" God blessed and the man of the hour, Rev. Wesley Calvery, presented the voice of God that the Church must be "real and genuine" souls came to the altars weeping to be used and "genuine". The attendance was estimated as being between 750 to 800.

The Youth Banquet Wednesday night following the Spirit filled Missionary services at the newly built Ted Williams Steak House on Interstate 44; and a "howling success" it was. The management reported 312 steaks and meals served with more than they could even dare to expect in courtesy for the time it took to get all served. The statement in describing the banquet was "howling" those that howled the loudest were the preachers when Bro. Maness asked all of them to rise from their comfortable seats and retire to the kitchen. After so time of readjusting there was a place for everyone to sit and "enjoy" the evening and meal. (Some have expressed a desire to know if all of the money was turned in for this meal, 312 were served and 294 paid. The difference has been taken care of and maybe through some mistakes some one forgot or over looked the amount that was the difference.) This writer knows that some of the sponsors had to wait until the program was almost over to get their meal but we thank God for their understanding and desire to be used of God to bring their youth to the meeting. Some of the groups were until 3 and 4 a.m. getting home but we are sure they are better for having come to the State and Youth Banquet. The local youth of the First Church are and were greatly strengthened for having gone. Little "Oscar" from the Ozarks, Matilda & Clime Kadidlhoper, were among the honored guests. But the special guest to bring the gospel in song was John Yasuda and the Calvery family, God bless these dedicated, wonderful people. They have been a real boost and blessing to the State of Missouri in their itinerant work-may we be a boost and blessing to them as they return to the mission field to labor for Christ and Free Will Baptists.

Wednesday services may have been the high in attendance and were truly a great peak in Spiritual values but the Thursday worship service was another great high as the man of God for the hour spoke concerning the "Durability of the Church." He reminded us that the Church is durable and lasting but that, "we need, yea, must become more involved to make it effective." A structure may be durable and lasting without being useful. The prophet, Rev. Jim Bundy, used words that rung clear and true as the nation Israel had come to the same place that he warned the Church is going toward. (References Haggai, Chapters 1 and 2 along with Revelation 2 and 3. During the days that followed this pastor talked to residence of the town and the message that was most discussed by those in attendance was this parting "revelation from the hand of God" through His dedicated servant.

The reflection is nostalgia in that I would love to do it all again! I believe the State can be the long prayed for Revival in any Church that will host it. The community will long remember and know about Free Will Baptists; don't be afraid to introduce them they'll love each other. Invite the State to your Church, we are planning now for another time when we can truly with all of the accommodations being available at the Church host the "Revival Meeting" again.

N HIS PLAY, "The Iceman Cometh", Eugene O'Neill deals with the matters of belief and of self-delusion.

What, really, is the difference between a deeply held conviction and a fantasy? That which to one man is a profound religious faith may seem to another little more than a foolish set of superstitions. Which man is correct?

O'Neill and others have long since maintained that belief, even when it is belief in un-belief, is the stuff of sanity and that without it men move toward despair.

It is easy, I think, to imagine an individual who methodically conjures doubts about long held truths, systematically reducing them to absurdity, and strips himself of every vestige of faith. Presumably if this is done thoroughly enough and completely enough, the futility of existence itself becomes clear and despair emerges. This kind of doubt, it seems to me, is the road to spiritual and/or physical suicide. If nothing is of value, even life itself, then why live?

If this be so in the case of individuals, what of nations and people?

Once upon a time the mere threat of attack upon this Nation by a foreign power drove young men to the recruiting stations; today there are those who comtemplate the national mood and wonder whether an actual attack upon the United States would impel many young persons to seek to serve.

Once upon a time a single policeman—the symbol of law—could calm an unruly mob; today policemen store up military equipment and bloody fights between the law and the citizens are commonplace.

Once, active, wholehearted participation in the economic system was the goal of Americans (...Horatio Alger..."the point is to make a dollar"..... etc...etc...): today one gets an impression of apathy toward participation and a sneering contempt for what is labeled "gross materialism".

Once one read regularly of serious problems met and solved by imagination and enterprise; now one hears almost too much about problems growing more and more severe and the only hope for solution is massive new government programs—Why don't "they" do something.

Once one heard of unfriendly, probably uncharitable, confrontation and conflict between religious bodies with an obvious pride of conviction characterizing each of them; today a bland tolerance has ended much of the conflict and with the hostility has gone the pride.

Five examples of millions of instances in which old-time verities have yielded to uncertainty and in which doubt has lead to apathetic indifference and to utter rejection of one time certainties.

So this is Progress? Or is it?

Is something of value replaced by nothing an improvement?

Is the shedding of worn-out "fallacies" desirable if these are not replaced or are followed by questionable, shallow, superficial novelties?

Can a person, or a nation, survive if all that it once considered valid and valuable is cast aside to be supplanted either with moral and intellectual anarchy or, perhaps more serious, by the simple, easy, altogether new and exciting propositions of a demagogue who moves into a vacuum of disbelief?

Undoubtedly one can conceive of and then develop a system of doubt regarding every value, truth and tradition known and held by civilized man. One can in the process learn to sneer at ancient truths as specious and discredited.

The question is: if these be foolish; if these be worthless; if these are but transitory value judgments to be rejected at one's convenience, how is it that so many of them have endured for so many centuries and have been esteemed by so many generations of wise men?

In the manufacture of doubt we tend to be

much like the sophomore who lectures his parents on their ignorance of the realities of life as he has learned them in Survey of World History, 136. We are like the village atheist who announces that he has insights never known by Aquinas, Luther, or Calvin. We are like the plumber about to undertake open heart surgery.

Long-standing values, traditions and beliefs are valid and deserve our respectful attention because they *are* long-standing; because they *have* withstood the test of centuries of human experience and analysis; because their rejection in the past has again brought pain and suffering. Just as we *could* re-invent the wheel; just as we *could* try to improve Shakespeare's grammar, so we can try to start afresh in the creation of value systems and benefits.

But should we?

There are those who maintain that every important insight and judgment into value and truth has already been discovered and that to ignore or reject these hard-won discoveries of the past is to invite disaster.

Libraries seek to serve the needs of the here and now to help men as they move toward the future. Those who would conserve the precious heritage of the past and would see that Treasury maintained for generations yet to come know that the library is also the place where the voices of the past, the calm, firm, wise voices of the past, speak out against the raucous and discordant ranting of the sowers of doubt and that it is the place which provides reasonable assurances that truth and value do exist and that sanity, both individual and national, can be maintained.
