


But looks are deceiving. Some will be cut down because they don't bear fruit. The tree Jesus talked about was not condemned because it was bent, deformed, or even diseased. To all appearances it was a perfectly healthy tree. The trouble was that it didn't have any fruit on it, only leaves.

A lot of human lives in our modern society are just like that. To all outward appearances, there is nothing wrong with them. There is no deformity of character or personality. These people are decent, honest, likeable, good citizens, good neighbors. They don't cause much trouble; they don't start riots; they carefully avoid all the social vices. Anyone of them might be compared to a lovely tree standing in the vineyard, well-formed and full of foliage. But there is no fruit on the tree, only leaves.

The Lord is not satisfied with that kind of tree. And He is not satisfied with a person's "good" life if it is not productive. It is not enough for anyone to point out the evil deeds of other people. PASTOR TOURS HOLY LAND AND GREECE

Rev. O. D. Matthews, pastor of the Copper Mines Church, Fredericktown, made a recent tour to the Holy Land and Greece. The tour left the John F. Kennedy Airport in New York on Novem-

ber 2 and arrived in Tel-Aviv, November 3, with a bus trip on to Jerusalem.

Visiting Mt. Olives, Pontius Pilate's Judgment Hall, the Pool of Bethesda, the Tower of David, the Upper Room, Golgotha, the Garden Tomb, and the Dome of the Rock made a busy and very interesting first day. Seeing these places where the Bible took place and where Jesus walked made the historical record of the Bible begin to take on a clearer and deeper meaning. The morning of November 5 was spent touring the place of the Ascension, the site where Jesus taught the Lord's Prayer, Gethsemane, Bethlehem, Church of the Nativity, and the cave where Jesus was born, while the afternoon included a bus trip south to Bethany, visiting the home and tomb of Lazarus, then to Jericho and the Dead Sea.

November 7 and 8 were spent visiting the northern part of Israel where many Biblical events had their setting. Nazareth, the Sea of Galilee, Jordan River, Jacob's Well, Samaria, Capernaum, Valley of Megiddo, and the Valley of Jezreel. A boat trip across the Sea of Galilee from Tiberias to the ancient city of Capernaum was a high spot of those two days.

The flight to Athens and the tour of both the ancient and modern city including the Parthenon, The House of Parliament, and Mar's Hill made a full day of November 9. On November 10 the tour continued to the ancient city of Corinth where Paul spoke so brilliantly and upheld the "Faith." The time in Corinth also included the Temple of Apollo, many Roman ruins and the Museum of Corinth.

This tour was under the direction of Rev. Harry Douma, pastor of the Pilot Knob Southern Baptist Church. "The entire tour," Brother Matthews recalls, "was spiritually uplifting and factually enlightening, as we saw the places of Bible history and the places where Jesus walked. We felt in our hearts a certain joy that comes from a better knowledge that leads to a closer acquaintance with Jesus."

We recently received word that eight university students were converted through Direcu's ministry. Pray that the Lord will continue to bless his work.

The Good News Team arrived safely in Japan and are busy with preparations for activities during the Olympic games. They will distribute literature and give personal witness to the thousands who attend the games. Pray for their good health and adjustment to the food, people and way of life in their new environment.

Missouri Missions. News from the Capitol City Church.

BRO. FRANK WRITES:

Well, 1971 is history now and nothing can be added to or taken away from that year.

I'm sure each of you have experienced desires like the one that seemed to flood my heart all day Saturday, Jan. 1st. A real burden regarding fleeting opportunities. Somehow I could not help but see many tasks that were left undone, and far, far too many people who allowed the year to close while rejecting Christ, all of which alarms me and burdens of my heart.

For the most part, I believe

looking back is futile business; however, there are some benefits to be derived from a backward glance.

Benefit 1: I believe we can profit from failures. We should note the cause of these failures and vow to be wiser in our approach in the future, asking God to aid us so that we never again suffer from such pitfalls.

Benefit 2: I believe we can profit from successes.... Now I do not mean that we should sit around and gloat about them or spend out days merely talking about the good old days, but instead, we should draw from them, profiting by the successful endeavor and also allowing it to be a means of encouragement for future attempts.

Benefit 3: I believe the presence of God with us in both success and failure (and I do not mean that God has failed, but that we have failed) should encourage our hearts knowing that ours is a God who never leaves nor forsakes us. (This is especially vital when working on the mission field.)

There are many, many more benefits that could be added here, however, I believe that even more profitable is the projected look to the future.

The Word tells us that without a vision the people will perish. God has brightened our hopes for the future. Before us is a brand new year like a fresh new snow or a brand new ledger sheet—no tracks, no entries, good or bad. Let us commit ourselves to God and the task before us and let us advance forward, claiming victory through Christ.

January marks the one year period for our mission work here in Jeff. City, and according to the program of our Missouri State Home Mission Board, our Church accepted some of the financial responsibilities of the work here.

The Mission is now paying a part of my salary—\$25.00 per week, and also the utilities of the parsonage. This is a tremendous load for our young work, but I am confident that with God's help our group will rally to the cause.

Our mission board continues to bear the large part of our salary—\$100.00 per week, plus our housing allowance, so don't neglect support for the Jefferson City account. Also, bear in mind that our building fund loan is still a great need. (Any funds sent for this account must be earmarked "Jefferson City Building Loan.")

Our need for pews is urgent. Can you help? Please contact us if you know where any are available.

BIBLE COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT OFFICE LAUNCHES "THREE-YEAR PLAN"

Jack Paramore, Director of Development for Free Will Baptist Bible College, has launched a "Three-Year Plan" of support for the school's building program. He proposes to raise \$750,000 by 1975, using these funds to construct a new activities building on the campus, add a wing to the Welch Library, and acquire new property for future expansion.

The "Three-Year Plan" is a program encouraging churches and individuals to make commitments to the school spanning 1972-1975, rather than making pledges for just one year. "The main thought behind the Three-Year Plan," Paramore says, "is what it will mean in promotional savings, both in money and man-hours."

The new plan is being launched at a time when the Bible College Development Campaign is enjoying wide support among Free Will Baptists. The drive has already passed the \$1,000,000-mark in gifts and commitments.

Paramore and Assistant Director Al Hamm will be contacting churches and individuals concerning their support for the program.

FWBBC BIBLE CONFERENCE TO BE HELD MARCH 12-16

Free Will Baptist Bible College's 29th annual Bible Conference will be held on campus March 12-16, 1972. Speakers for the meeting will be Stanley Outlaw, Chester

Phillips, Fred Warner and Willard Wilcox. All are highly competent men of God and able preachers.

Visitors to the Bible College and the conference will be welcomed.

BIBLE COLLEGE GENERAL FUND GIFTS SET NEW RECORD

Gifts to Free Will Baptist Bible College's general fund set a new record for a month in December, 1971, totaling \$25,827. This brings total giving to the school for the current fiscal year (June, 1971-May, 1972) to more than \$127,000.

With barely half the year gone, two states—Indiana and Virginia—have already surpassed their gift quotas. Other states nearing this goal are Georgia (93%), Kentucky (84%), Arkansas (77%), Florida (73%), and North Carolina (72%).


COLLEGE ANNOUNCES CHOIR TOUR/DRAMA TOUR PLANS

The Bible College will sponsor its annual Choir Tour and Drama Tour March 16-26, visiting churches in Missouri, Illinois, Oklahoma, and South Carolina.

Paul Ketteman, Director of Public Relations, reports that the College Choir will spend much of its 19th annual tour in Missouri. Other services will be held in Illinois and Oklahoma. Choir Director, David Randlett, has prepared a program of hymns, anthems, and gospel songs that will be a blessing to those who hear them.

The school's second Drama Tour, sponsored by the Office of Development, will hold their services in churches across South Carolina. Two plays, under the direction of Joseph Jones of the Speech Department, will clearly present the gospel, from both the Old Testament and the New.

He had changed; once a nice family man, he had degenerated into what his neighbors called a lunatic. Once he was a well-liked and respected business man who served on the town council, but now he seemed to have lost all control of himself. In fact, his neighbors now avoided him. His children lived in constant fear because at times he seemed to actually change into a mad-man. His closest friends had even tied him up when he lost control of himself but he had always broken free as if he were propelled by some strange "demon" forces. Lately he had reached the point where he had actually deserted home, family, and friends and spent his time in the cemetery and caves of the near by hills. At night the screams of his tormented voice made the darkness hideous with the cries of a seemingly trapped animal searching desperately for an escape. During the daylight hours those who dared venture into the area told of seeing him lacerate his own flesh with stones as if he despised his own body or maybe sought to free himself from this inhuman existence.

Then, finally, He came. The carpenter's son of Nazareth who travelled about doing nothing but good. The One who restored the withered hands; the One who had changed endless darkness into the golden day for blinded eyes; the One who had made paralyzed legs to walk for the first time; the giver of eternal life had come to rescue this poor insane demon-possessed being. Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God was now on the scene. What a beautiful picture, what a transformation, from a raving maniac into a calm, collected individual. "...clothed and in his right mind." (Lk. 5:15). Here was a man changed by the "touch of the Master" from an insane lunatic into a normal individual able to return home and to assume his responsibilities in the home and community.

Certainly everyone would be grateful to this Jesus who had accomplished what no one else could. Surely He would receive the highest acclain of the town fathers. However, they reacted as the natural man blinded by sin has always reacted to God. They asked Him to leave.

The New Testament reveals the truth that Christ was constantly attacked and finally viciously and unjustly murdered by a mob incited and urged on by the "religious" leaders of His own people. Peter in recounting this incident to the Jews (Acts 4:11) tells them that they had set Christ (the stone) at *naught*.

Rejected is seemingly a good description of

blinded sinful man's reaction to Christ and the Christian religion. Christ, Himself told His followers that if they remained faithful to Him that they would be reproached and rejected. He warned His earliest disciples that, "If they called the Master of the house Beelzebub, how much more shall they call them of His household?" (Matt. 10:25). The martyrs of the first three hundred years of the church are certainly good testimony to this truth. The unbelievable systematic destruction of Christians within the last twenty-five years by the demonic minds of Communism certainly gives a clear testimony to man's resistence to Christ and His religion.

The question is, "why?" Why do men reject the Person and religion which offers the only possible solution to the hopeless and helpless situation in which they find themselves? Jesus faced just such a situation in John chapter eight. He had just offered the Scribes and Pharisees, who were certainly bound by sin, freedom. He plainly said to them, "If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." (Jn. 8:36). However they rejected the truth and Jesus gives an explanation of their rejection. He says, "Why do ye not understand my speech? Even because ye cannot hear my word. Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do ... He that is of God heareth God's words: ye therefore hear them not, because ye are not of God." The word translated "cannot" comes from the Greek word dunamai and means "can" or "able." Thus Christ and His message are rejected because those whose father is the devil are not able to understand.

This accords very well with 2 Cor. 4:3-4, "But if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost: in whom the god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them." The unbeliever is thus not able to understand because satan has blinded his mind to the truth. Therefore Paul could say, "The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them because they are spiritually discerned." (1 Cor. 2:14).

The Gospel is hidden and man does not receive it because of a space-time fall. Man and God are no longer in harmony. Brilliant as he might be, the fall has distorted man's perception of total reality. Not only this but he is prejudiced against God. This dost not mean that he is incapable of perceiving the "bare facts" in the same sense that the Christian does. In other words, the non-believer perceives the bare fact that over there stands an oak tree in the same way the believer does. The same laws of mathematics, physics, etc., apply equally to both the non-believer and the believer. They both realize that if they should fall from that oak tree that they are going to fall earthward and stop suddenly when the body makes contact with the earth. The bare fact of gravity is accepted and applies equally to both. However, the point of cleavage comes when one goes "behind" the law of gravity or the kernal which produced the oak. It is when one asks the question of who flipped the switch which determines that a body falls earthward that the point of separation comes. Or, one might ask where the first kernal came from? Can a man only go back as far as the kernal or the law of gravity? Or is he able to go past them or "behind" them as the Christian theologian does and explain them on the basis of his God who controls all who is, "Before all things and by him all things consist." (Col. 1:17).

Thus it is a question of presuppositions. Christian theology works on the assumption that the Christian religion is true. Thus the Christian theologian maintains that he can explain the origin of the first kernal and who controls the "switches." It is the task of apologetics to validate this assumption.

Of course, the primary purpose of defense is to set forth Christianity in a manner which would convince the unbliever of its truth and with the aid of the Holy Spirit lead him to a personal commitment to the Christ of Christianity. The question is the point of contact between the believer and the non-believer. Is there a common ground between them which forms a point of contact for conversation and argumentation? Is it correct to maintain that such a common ground denies the absolute sovereignty of God over His total creation?

As is stated above the fact that both can perceive the bare facts at least gives some ground for discussion and does not in any way deny God's sovereignty. It would seem that of necessity there is a common ground on which the two can meet. Otherwise there is no ground for any communication between the saved and the unsaved. No matter what the Christian says to the nonchristian it will be meaningless chatter. This leads ultimately to Barth's blind leap of faith. God does not expect a man to believe meaningless chatter. The Bible does not demand a man take a blind leap. Saint and sinner can speak of Jesus Christ. H. G. Wells in his Outlines of History gave several lines to Jesus of Nazareth although he despised Him and the Christian religion for which He stood. The point is, if an individual takes history seriously he must share with the believer that there was a Christ. This, of course, does not mean that they will share the same presuppositions about Him. But the fact of a historical Jesus gives at least a connecting point and also diminishes the idea of a blind leap of faith.

AMERICAN HOMES ARE IN DESPERATE NEED!

According to the New York Times News Service, "the Census Bureau released striking statistical evidence recently that Mother knows best: people who marry young are twice as likely to be divorced as are somewhat older couples."

In a new analysis, "the bureau found that within 20 years of marriage, 28% of the men who married before the age of 22 had been divorced. This compared with only 13% among men who married when they were older.

The figures were nearly identical for women. Among those who married before their 20th birthday, 27% has been divorced, compared with 14% of those who married after...the STRIKING aspect of the new study, they say, is its showing of the MAGNITUDE OF THE PHENOMENON."

We are not shade trees. We are to be fruit-bearing trees. We must yield a harvest of Christian fruits as indicated by Jesus and the Scriptures. The fruit we must bear is often summarized in one word: Stewardship. That means a total responsibility in the use of our time, our abilities, and the material gifts God has given us. How about it? Are you bearing the fruits which the Lord demands of His children? The Lord of the vineyard said, "Cut it down. Why should it go on using up the soil?" This parable should be one which says, "Caution-Danger Ahead!" to those who are half-hearted in their service, busy with nothing and accomplishing less. It can well say to us all, "STOPstep out of the bustling, frustrating schedule you are in-LOOK-examine yourself, what you are doing; what are the motives urging you on-LISTENlisten carefully to what the Lord of the vineyard is saying.

The words of this parable, you see, have a very direct application to people like us—people who belong to the church of God. The fig tree Jesus spoke of was not a wild tree growing out in the wilderness. It was planted in the vineyard, in the cultivated soil of this cared-for garden. In Old Testament times God had His chosen ones—His garden of people. It is not boasting to claim that His favor has been lavished on us in a special way in our time.

Privilege always involves responsibility. That is what made the failure of ancient Israel so tragic. God had showered His blessings on the Israelites. He had nurtured and cultivated the soil in which He had planted them. But they had produced, for the most part, just leaves.

Our privileges are greater by far than theirs. The people of Israel had the prophets to teach them. We have the Son of God to teach us. They had a preview of the New Testament age; we are living in it. They had the promise of the Gospel; we have it as our possession . . . if we want it. They were blessed with prophecies of things to come; we are a thousand times more blessed, for we have the cross, the resurrection, and the church of the living Christ.

We Christians are the most privileged people on earth. We have Christ. If we live unproductive lives, if we are just as self-centered, just as money-mad and pleasure-mad as godless men, then God will punish. This truth is repeated time and time again in the Scriptures. The God of love is also a God of righteous anger when He needs to be for the good of humanity.

It sounds so good, and we hear it all the time: "God is a God of love, and surely He will not punish anyone." God is pictured as a gray-haired old grandfather who looks down from His throne in heaven and smiles at the immature attitudes and actions of people and says, "Someday they will grow up." But listen to the contrast of the words our Lord puts in the mouth of the orchard owner: "Cut it down. Why should it go on using up the soil?" It is clear to see that there is a cutting-off point, that those who do not conform to God's plan will be rejected.

Do we conform to God's plan? Do we follow the Lord Jesus Christ in faith? Do we now out of love for Him live productive lives? Are we good stewards?

Thank God, this is not the end of the story. In the parable Jesus told, the gardener pleads, "Leave it, sir, this one year while I dig around it and manure it. And if it bears next season, well and good; if not, you shall have it down." The gardener was pleading for the tree, asking for a second chance. We may be now living in the day of our second chance. There may be a parallel between this story and our lives. We may be living in a day of grace.

James said that faith without works is dead. There are people regularly attending church who are nothing but shade trees. They may be spiritually dead, or in the process of dying. God only knows.

And make no mistake about it—God does know. Right now, His Son, our Lord Christ, is cultivating, nourishing, pruning, and loving us toward production of His kind of fruit. He wants to make us alive in His service while there is still a chance. A great deal depends on you. Will you be used; will you bear fruit?




