existence today. In many ways it is very amazing. A fully-grown male ostrich may weigh up to 300 pounds, and is strong enough to carry a man on his back. When provoked, he is capable of killing a man. He can run with tremendous speed, but despite his wings, he cannot fly. When he senses danger he hides his head. For him, any danger he cannot see does not exist.

In Genesis 3:8 we find man doing much the same thing. This reference reports simply, "Adam hid himself." Here was the crowning glory of God's creation acting very much like an ostrich. He had committed the original act of rebellion and disobedience against God-so he hid. He knew what he had done. His wife knew. God knew. Still, Adam hid himself. Like the ostrich, he seemed to think if he couldn't see God, God couldn't see him.

People have been acting the same way ever since. Men have deluded themselves into thinking they can hide from God. Some try to hide by denying the very existence of God. Others simply ignore Him. But, strangely enough,

HE OSTRICH is the largest bird in many of us find our escape from God in our religion. We build our own neat little religious ideas like so many little hiding places in which to hide our heads and then think all is well. It has been said that religion is like a rope; it can be used to rescue you or hang you.

> It isn't very difficult to identify many of the "religious" escapes from the God of reality. For the moment, let us consider two.

The first is that old-fashioned virtue called sincerity. We place a great value on the sincere person, and rightly so. Nobody likes a "phony." The word itself tells a lot about the quality. It comes from two Latin words, sine and cere, meaning literally "without wax." It seems that some of the old Roman sculptors were not above a little cornercutting once in a while. They had the practice of filling the accidental little gouges in their statues with wax and then selling them for perfect merchandise. The real article—the perfect piece then came to be the one without wax. The *sincere* one. The word eventually came to describe the trait in people too-honesty, unaffectedness,

hearted genuineness.

We do admire sincerity. It is a basic virtue in all of life. And in a person's religious practice, we consider it absolutely indispensible. But there are some limitations. For example, we often hear people say, "It doesn't make any difference what you believe, as long as you are sincere."

A Christian-a real Christian-is sincere. An insincere Christian is no Christian at all. But sincerity alone doesn't make anyone a Christian. Sincerity by itself can never become a test of spiritual truth or an evidence of uniquely Christian conduct. Sincerity alone cannot save a man's soul.

If it could, then those 850 prophets of the idol Baal the Old Testament tells us about were right, and they were worthy of God's acceptance. They staked their all on the highly sincere belief that their idol-god could produce fire to consume the offerings on their altars.

If sincerity is enough, then the Apostle Paul was saved long before his conversion to Christ. Even then, he sincerely thought he was serving God by supporting the drive to annihilate those upstart heretics who called themselves "Christians."

If one needs only sincerity to be right, then Hitler, Mussolini, Stalin, Castro, and Mao and all the rest have given their names as well as their ideals a clean bill of health. No matter how violently we may disagree with them, there can be little doubt as to their sincerity.

Quite obviously, it does matter very (Continued on page 10)

Bible College Gifts Set New Record; Request \$250,000 For 1972-73

Free Will Baptists gave a record \$227,700 to the Bible College general fund during the school's 30th year, June, 1, 1971-May 31, 1972, Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman announced recently. Seventeen of the 29 states that operate under general fund quotas met or exceeded their quotas and pushed gifts to more than \$27,000 above the anticipated \$200,000 gift budget.

These "second mile" gifts went far in helping to cover the extra cost incurred by the school with a new record enrollment of 534 students.

Anticipating another jump in enrollment, the Bible College

Board of Trustees has recommended to the National Association that a gift budget of \$250,000 to the general fund be set for 1972-73. New state quotas have been set to help the school reach this new gift budget.

Missouri exceeded her assigned Bible College quota of \$14,000.00 by giving \$16,465.87 during 1971-72. The 1972-73 quota assigned is \$16,500.00.

What Does A Pastor Do?

Then on Monday he smiles when some jovial chap roars, "what a job—one day a week!"

What is your attitude?





THE ROMAN'S ROAD

In soul winning we hear a lot about THE ROMAN'S ROAD. This is a simple outline that can be used to lead someone to Christ. You should commit this outline to memory for your own personal use in winning souls. We are going to give you the outline in this article so you can use it to win a soul for Christ.

ROMANS 3:10—Before a sinner can repent of his sins and be saved, he must first realize that he is a sinner and stands in need of

divine help. This verse will give that proof.

ROMANS 3:23—This scripture further proves that a man is in need of salvation. This verse tells us that no one is exempt from sin but all have sinned.

ROMANS 5:12—This verse tells the unsaved man that not only has he sinned and failed God, but the punishment for his sin is death. At this point he sees himself in a hopeless condition.

ROMANS 5:8—Now, in this verse, for the first time since we stepped on the ROMAN'S ROAD, we see a light of hope. In this scripture we have a great promise. First of all, consult your physician to determine when and how much medicine to give your child. Remember, aspirin, vitamins, and cold tablets are drugs, too. Your doctor should advise on these.

At home, you control your child's medication. Don't encourage a young child to open his medicine or get it for himself unless you are there to guide him. Keep all medicines out of easy reach until your child is old enough to be trusted to use prescribed medicines properly.

—Always give the medicine to your young child. Have him take it in your presence. Never leave a bottle of medicine in a young child's room. Stick to the doctor's recommended dosage. If in doubt, check.

Do not let the baby sitter give medicine to your child unless it is absolutely necessary. Write down all instructions for giving the medicine so the sitter will make no mistakes.

Do not place undue emphasis on the taste or effect of a medicine. The child's confidence should be in you and the doctor that the medicine is necessary and not to be taken as a delightful experience.

Everyday drugs matter, too. This applies to vitamins and aspirin, as well as prescription drugs. The child must be taught that drug use decisions are in the hands of the doctor and parents until he is responsible enough to take medicine on his own.

—What kind of example do you set:

1. Do you take too many medicines?

2. Are you dependent on any drug (including alcohol)?

3. Do you have a lot to say about how much better you feel after taking medicine?

4. Do your children see you run for the bottle of aspirin, tranquilizers, or alcohol when you get angry or upset?

If so, you should try to change your attitudes and approaches

to these matters. Maybe you are abusing the use of drugs.

—Show your child that you can stand a certain amount of pain or emotional upset without turning to drugs or drink for quick relief every time.

Medicine is no substitute for tender loving care. Love and understanding help a child learn to handle pain and sickness which are a part of every life. There are no magic drugs to make them all go away. Drugs can only help.

Drugs, however, are a part of our lives. We cannot avoid them. Treat them carefully as a temporary necessity to correct a condition for which your physician has prescribed the particular drug.

—If your pre-schooler does take medicine without permission, handle the incident firmly but with no lectures on drug abuse. Try to set up good drug use habits so your children will learn to think of drugs as medical aids, not sources of pleasure.

Most of all, look forward to setting a good example of living in a way that discourages drug abuse. Encourage your child to enjoy life, to seek out satisfying and varied experiences. He can do this more easily if he sees you doing these things and enjoying yourself without always having the crutch of drugs or drink.

much what we believe, as well as how sincerely we believe it. Fortunately, our Christian faith gives us a kind of checklist by which we can test our sincerity to see if it is pointed in the right direction:

... If that sincerity of faith leads us to recognize that we just do not measure up to the requirements of a just and perfect God . . .

... If it drives us to an experience of real repentance over our hopeless condition without God in our lives . . .

... If it points us to Christ as the way out of our dilemma, as the Center of a completely new way of life . . .

... Then, and only then, is it genuine. To place faith in anything less, no matter how sincerely, is to engage in "ostrich religion."

An equally self-deceptive religious hiding place is morality. We would all agree that the Christian faith provides us a highly-developed moral code. In fact, the stress on morality is so strong that we sometimes get a mistaken idea. We get the notion that Christianity and morality are one and the same-that if you live a certain way, you are a Christian, and vice-versa. But that kind of belief is sand too. To adopt it is to

hide your head and your vision from the reality of the genuine Christian faith.

One thing the Bible makes abundantly clear: a follower of Christ is a moral person, but his moral living is not the quality that saves him. Morality cannot be a substitute for the real substance of Christianity, which is faith in the saving Christ.


It is at this point that we meet the oldest and most widespread heresy in religion. Take any of the world's non-Christian religions and reduce it to its fundamentals, and you will always find the same. Each one is basically a system of moral behavior, and little more than that. Each one bases a person's chances for a good afterlife on the moral quality of the life here and now. The Christian faith stands alone in holding up Christ. not good living as the key to eternal life.

There is a difference. Morality is man-made. It varies with the society and the culture of the times. Its goal is to reform the behavior of people to a certain level. But Christianity is Godmade. It is interested not just in reforming, but in transforming people into the image of God. Simple morality has no need of a church, a Bible, a Christ, a cross, a resurrection, and a hereafter. But Christianity has need of them all. Moral-

ity is man's duty to man. Christianity is man's duty to God. Morality is sometimes interpreted as man's right to sin nicely. Christianity is a drive that God's Holy Spirit can put inside a man to make his life take on the qualities of the life of Christ.

It is fully possible to be an atheist and be moral. Morality makes good sense, and we encourage it in all men. But men are not made religious or God-pleasing simply by conforming to a moral code, desirable as they may be in its own right. It takes the action of God Himself in us to produce the quality of living that genuinely pleases Him. If for us the heart of the Christian faith is found in the Golden Rule rather than in the rule of faith in Christ, then we are not facing the divine truth of God.

Have you ever seen a bird beat itself to death against a closed window, trying to escape from a room, when all the while the door is open? The glass proves to be a blockade to freedom. Too many people beat themselves to death against the window panes of such deceptions as sincerity and morality, while all the time the door of Christ stands invitingly open. Let us with Paul "know nothing . . . but Christ and Him crucified."



Go into your chamber, shut the door, and cultivate the habit of praying audibly. Write prayers and burn them. Pay no attention to literary form, only to spiritual reality. Read a passage of Scripture and

then sit down and turn it into a prayer, written or spoken.

Learn to be particular, specific and detailed in your prayer, so long as you are not trivial. General prayer, literary prayers and stately phrases are, for private prayer, traps and sops to the soul. To formulate your soul is one valuable means to escape formalizing it. This is the best, the wholesome, kind of self-examination. Speaking with God discovers us safely to ourselves. We find ourselves, come to ourselves, in the Spirit.

Face your special weaknesses and sins before God. Force yourself to say to God exactly where you are wrong. When anything goes wrong, do not ask to have it set right, without asking in prayer what it was in you that made it go wrong. Pray without a break between your prayer and your life. Let prayer be concrete, actual, a direct product of life's real experiences. Pray as your actual self, not as some fancied saint.

"TRY IT . . . YOU'LL LIKE IT"

Here is a delicious punch recipe which comes to us from Fern Ellis of Duenweg, Missouri:

Boil together for three minutes: 6 cups of water and 4 cups of sugar. Let cool. Add the juice of 2 lemons, 1 large can of frozen orange juice, 1 large can of pineapple juice, and 5 bananas (mashed).

Pour into milk cartons (usually 2 half gallon cartons) and freeze. When ready to serve, put in large punch bowl and add 2 large ginger ales. You can garnish with orange slices, maraschino cherries. Serves about 30.

June 18 thru 30, as usual, was a real good time of inspiration and spiritual revival-Missouri State Youth Camp meeting at Niangua. Rev. Bronco West from North Carolina served as camp evangelist both weeks. I attended two teens services, June 21 and 22, during the two week encampment.
