

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Do Smokers Hurt

March?

THE SUBJECT of smoking Christians could be approached from several different angles: its damage to one's health, its expense, its mastery of the smoker's will, its affect upon non-smokers, its affect on one's Christian witness. This article will deal with only one of these: the affect that smoking Christians have upon the testimony of their church.

In the three churches I have pastored, there have been members who smoked. Let me share with you some comments I have heard through the years relative to these smokers.

"When I walked out the door of the church last Sunday morning, and there stood my Sunday School teacher with a cigarette in his hand, I couldn't believe it!" That statement was made by a visiting prospect who had come from a church with a higher standard than ours. She never joined our church.

"Preacher, what are we going to do about the smokers' line outside by the door every Sunday morning?" That question was asked me by one of the best soul-winners in that particular church.

"Why do you ask?" I inquired.

"Because I've got a neighbor who just moved in and is looking for a church home. I would like to bring him with me to visit our church, but he's already told me that he wouldn't attend the _____ church down the street because they have smoking deacons."

So how was I supposed to answer that question? What should we have done about the smokers' line by the door?

Then there was the fellow who had attended our church regularly for a few months, looking for a church home. We needed him and his family in our church. They were leadership material. Both he and his wife had taught Sunday School in the past. He had served as a deacon. They were spiritually mature. After they missed services for a week or two, I stopped by their house and asked, "How's the search for a church home coming?"

"Well, I'm sorry to tell you," he replied, "but we have eliminated your church from the selection. I really am sorry," he went one, "because we all enjoyed the fellowship there, the order of your services, and the preaching and teaching. Would you like for me to tell you why we eliminated your church?" he asked.

"Yes," I said, "it might be helpful to know."
"Well, it's your smokers," he said. "I might have been able to overlook it if it had not been your leaders. But I have children and grandchildren that I will be bringing with me to my church, and I don't want to expose them to church leaders with that kind of testimony." He never came back.

Most sinners have the idea that Christians—at least dedicated Christians—do not smoke. Many times I have heard sinners remark that one of the sins they would have to give up if they became a Christian was smoking. If they feel that way, what do they think of your church with smokers in the membership?

Last Sunday in my Sunday school class, a man in our church gave this testimony: "My wife and kids had nagged me for years to quit smoking. I sort of wanted to, but not really enough to go through the agony of quitting until I realized that smoking was hurting my witness. I couldn't quit in my own strength. I had tried that many times, and always failed. But when I really committed the problem to the Lord and asked Him to help me, He did, and I've quit. I've been off six weeks now!"

Without a doubt, smokers hurt their own Christian testimony and the testimony of their churches. If the weed has got you hooked, why not claim God's power over your habit today. Your church will be glad you did.

FREE WILL BAPTISTS MAKE THE WALL STREET JOURNAL

In a front page article of the Thursday, January 11, 1973 edition of the Wall Street Journal Free Will Baptists were named by Wall Street Journal staff reporter, Barry Newman, as one of the small conservative churches that is growing. The exact quote is as follows:

"It hasn't happened for a long time in the nation's liberal protestant denominations, one of the most liberal of which is the two-million-member United Church of Christ. (This statement refers to the Wellesley Congregational Church, a member of the United Church of Christ, taking in 41 new members in one Sunday.—Editor) There were 25.6 million Protestants during 1971 while the small conservative churches—such as the Church of the Nazarene and the Free Will Baptists—gained. These same Protestants gave nearly \$4.3 billion to their churches in 1971. But again, the conservatives were moving ahead while the liberals were backsliding."

While we are not working for the recognition of the world, it is gratifying to know that this prestigious journalistic spokesman for the business and financial world has taken note of Free Will Baptists.

JOPLIN CHURCH GROWS WITH A BUS

The First FWB Church of Joplin has experienced significant growth since the first of the year. A bus ministry can be credited for the major portion of this growth.

In the first four weeks of its operation, the bus brought 10, 35, 32, and 46 new people to church. Three laymen have been faithful to at least three hours of "Bus Visitation" on every Saturday of the bus's operation to date. They are Bob Howard, the bus captain, Mrs. Sue Howard, and Mrs. Mildred Gandy. Others have helped with the visitation as they were able.

The increased attendance has necessitated en-

larging the junior Sunday school department from two to four classes, and threatens to soon do the same with the beginner, primary, and junior high classes. Mr. Bob Hunter's Primary Boys' class had only had one student in attendance for several weeks, since others in the class moved away. On the second Sunday of the Bus Ministry their class grew 1,000% to an attendance of 10.

A Children's Church was also started the last of January. Mrs. Elaine Jay, Mrs. Joan Lewis, and Mrs. Sandra Parish are sharing the responsibilities of this ministry. Thirteen salvation decisions have been witnessed in Children's Church during the first two weeks of its operation. First through sixth graders are invited to worship in the Children's Church during the Morning Worship hour.

"We're looking for another bus," Pastor Andy Lay reports. "What else can we do? This has been the 'goingest' thing we've experienced here in Joplin."

In the February business meeting of the Joplin Church a motion was made, second, and unanimously carried to enter our Sunday School in the Spring Attendance Contest sponsored by the National Sunday School Department, and settle for nothing less than first place in our division. Only time will reveal whether or not this ambitious goal can be fulfilled, but with that kind of determination, what can we lose?

The Hillmont Leadership Training Programs provide unique experiences for senior high teens. Challenging demands are made of all participants, camper and camp leader alike. The Word of God is taught and its practice is expected. Considerable attention is given to help each one relate the truths of the Bible to everyday practical Christian living.

The Hillmont programs were begun a few years ago by the National Church Training Service Department, but last year was sold to an individual corporation of Free Will Baptist ministers and laymen. The emphasis of the Hillmont Training programs are similar to those under the direction of the CTS Department.

Boys attending the Hillmont Engineer program will arrive on Sunday, June 17, 1973, and the girls attending the Hillmont Evangeline program are due to arrive on Thursday, June 28, 1973. Engineers and Evangelines will depart together via chartered bus for Macon, Georgia, on Saturday prior to the National Youth Conference. The training programs conclude on Thursday, July 12, in Macon. Participants are responsible for their transportation home.




