

The Plight Of The Christian Student On The Secular Campus

"Time changes things" is an old adage that is generally accepted. It has some merit, but like most such adages is not totally reliable. Time, for example, does not change God; and time, outside of God, does not change sin. And, interestingly enough, time does not change people. Hair may turn gray, facial features may soften with age, and experience gained may change an attitude or an outlook; but the person is not really changed. Personalities usually remain the same. Moral character stays on the same level—the obvious manifestations may vary with present company and immediate situation; but the level remains the same. In short, time does not change man, but God can!

One attitude that has changed over the past few years is the almost religious fervor for acquiring a college education. Time, the job market, and unfortunately the discontinuation of the draft—the unfortunate circumstance is not that the draft is discontinued, but that draft dodging was considered adequate reason to go to college—have all had their influence. Actually, it is a return to common sense. All people should not go to college. Some are not

inclined toward the academic and prefer to work in areas or skills better taught in vocational schools or on-the-job training. Many who begin college never finish because they lacked the necessary incentive. It comes as a surprise to many that college is not easy and unless there is adequate incentive there will probably be a very unhappy, premature conclusion to the college career.

The unhappy, premature conclusion is often considered a "waste of two years," or "a whole year and \$2,000 down the drain." This is, of course, a false philosophy. College time is really never wasted. People attend college to broaden their horizons and to be educated. Perhaps the most important thing many people learn in that year or two of college is that college is not for them; however, there are also a great many other lessons learned. Most of them do not come from books. In fact, though it is an arguable tenet, the most important lessons are not learned from books but from people and the interchanges and experience with them-fellow students, faculty, program advisors, the dean, and the remainder of the campus community. Probably in that order.



developmental period and can develop the bad as well as the good. The unfortunate circumstance here, however, is that concern did not begin much earlier, for the basic personality and the basic moral character is established long before a young man or woman ever starts to college. At the risk of creating a lively disagreement it shall be here stated that college, like time, does not change the personality or moral character of a person. It may be the situation where the true personality or moral character displays itself. The college experience is one that brings out the best or the worst in a person. It is indeed a trying ground. Not just in the usually considered sense of the flesh, but also of the mind and the spirit. Anyone who is at all aware knows the secular campus is such a trying ground.

The temptations of the flesh are probably most notably drink, drugs, and sex. While these are not just limited to the college campus, they all flourish there. There are many Christian young people who pass them all by; there are many who simply continue in them when they come to the college campus. Then there are those who, lacking the self-discipline to manage themselves, fall into sins they had not the courage to overcome. Almost any type of alcohol is readily available near the college campus. Some campuses even have a bar in the student union where beer is served. It is probably within easy walking distance to the nearest package

Drugs are available to the college campus as they store. are to any campus from the junior high up, and in some cases even in the elementary school. The degree drugs are used on the campus varies with the campus from a very small percentage to over fifty percent. Sex is always available. The campus community is no exception. Not only is live sex available, but there is a ready supply of all types of pornographic materials. Pictures and booklets dropped on campuses with addresses where more such materials are available. There are places near all college campuses where not only pulp materials are available but theaters where films are shown that would shock most readers beyond imagination. These temptations of the flesh are all available near the secular campus, but they do not just exist there. They are available temptations to anyone on the job or at school. More specifically identifiable with the college are temptations of the mind.

Jesus once said that a man was what he thought. How true! The powers of Hell know that through the mind, the mental attitude, men can most easily be lost. It is through this direction the most dangerous temptations come. Moral courage is adequate to overcome the temptations of the flesh. Even many who make no commitment to being Christian have the vision to see the harm involved in drink, drugs, and illicit sex and the moral courage to consider such with contempt. But the subtle questioning of basic spiritual truth is a different matter. One comes to college to develop mentally. He must approach things intellectually and scientifically.

Emotions and the illogical to man's mind cannot be accepted. So philosophy questions, "Are gods not just a crutch upon which man leans to find strength for his weakness or to escape from his innate longings, or, perhaps, his superstitious belief in life after death?" Karl Marx was right. Much that is religion is an opiate. But we must draw the bold line between religion and salvation. The Biblical Christian knows there is a difference. Philosophy wonders if all searchings for God are not equal? Is not the honest search of the Muslim, the Hindu, the Buddhist the same as that of the Christian? It takes nothing less than a firm knowledge of God's word and a strong faith in God based on a dedicated commitment to Christ through a personal experience to know the answer. All too often college young people do not have that necessary combination. The devil very subtly uses feared censure or the fear of ridicule for the felling blow for many who have made claim to being Christian.

Not many professors directly attack Christ and Christianity in the classroom, but some do. And the devil can use such disciples effectively. He defeats the young Christian through self condemnation. Not because he denies, but because he has not the courage to stand. Not too long back at Southwest Missouri State University there was such an instructor. He was disrespectful of all in his class by use of inexcusable language and finally made a direct attack against Christ and Christianity. A young lady in his class rose from her seat and stood her full five feet two inches and announced, "I have listened to your profanity and vulgarity and have remained silent, but I will not sit still and listen to you ridicule me and my fellow Christians and mock my Savior!" Whereupon she marched from the classroom and sat in the president's office until she had a hearing with him. Christians are also citizens and do have rights. Just as Paul claimed those rights when they were expedient, so should we. However, most parents are not wiling to take so strong a stand much less to have instilled in their young people that kind of commitment. The danger here is not something on which you can get a handhold. It is fear of ridicule, unaware that people always respect honesty. There is really no need for the fear. Oh. yes, the instructor never spoke against Christ. Christians, or Christianity in that class and his speech improved noticeable. The young lady passed

Anywhere science is taught there is always Darwins theory of evolution. Actually no general science or biology class can be honestly taught without reference to it. The amount of reference and the way it is taught depends on the instructor. It is of relatively minor significance. The church has probably done more to keep the theory alive than anything else. Anyone with a modicum of Biblical background and any degree of faith will have no problem here. The obvious is not usually the Christian's problem. It is the subtle working that generally undermines.

Another somewhat subtle temptation that young people face on the campus we shall call the temptation of the spirit. This is subtle in the sense that it is not obvious but gradually, almost unknowingly, creeps in to destroy. A close spiritual relationship with God is built and maintained through Bible study and prayer. The more one gets to know God's Word the better he knows God. Often college is a time of growing spiritually cold because studies, activities, and a lack of discipline push Bible study and prayer aside early in the college career. A lack of Christian fellowship is in the same class. The tragedy of this situation is the simple fact that such a lack is not necessary for there are always church and campus organizations. But somehow, far too many do not get involved in either. The reasons are various. The temptations of the flesh are readily available and their disciples encourage the student's involvement. These are attacks on the religious philosophy he has been introduced to in his home church; profanity, vulgarity, and sometimes blatant attacks upon his belief and his Savior; not enough courage to stand up, much less defend his beliefs and right to them; fear of censure and ridicule; and being too far from home and the home church to enjoy their influence and strength to sustain him. The pious church member who is so quick to condemn in such instances should have to face half the list.

To discuss problems or condemn action and not offer some suggestions for solution is a waste of time, both for the writer and the reader. It has long been the contention of this writer that the young person who has by his home and church been taught a faith he can live by will have no serious difficulty. Such a faith is not the pious, sanctimonious, ephemeral nothing that too many Free Will Baptists cling to, but one of brawn, blood, and guts. Salvation from the abyss is not gained by grasping at fleecy clouds, however beautiful, but by grasping a strong, living limb whose roots are deep in the rock. Those who work on the secular college campus and try desperately to turn eyes to such handholds are disgusted with the ephemeral loose ended ropes so many well-meaning people throw out.

With considerable boldness based on a number of years experience these suggestions are offered. First and foremost is the following of the Biblical teaching, "Train up a child in the way he should go." Basically it is all summed up in that not so simple statement. Unfortunately too many nominal Christians have made only nominal efforts to teach their children a nominal faith that fails in the bind.

There is probably a Free Will Baptist church in the city where your son or daughter is going to college. Know about it and inform the pastor of that church that your son or daughter is in town so the church can pick them up for services and plan to have families have them in their homes if they must stay on campus over weekends. Encourage your child to go to these services. If his training has been right, very little encouragement will be necessary. Pastors of the home church should also be in contact with the pastor in the college town. Pastors in college towns should be readily available and willing to provide in their churches programs oriented toward the college student and homes that will provide an open door to help them have the opportunity to get away from the campus and in a home atmosphere in which they can find a break from the fight to overcome whichever of the temptations face them on campus.

All the campuses in Missouri have a variety of Christian groups. Inter Varsity Christian Fellowship is non-denominational and provides Christian fellowship and encourages daily devotions and has weekly Bible studies. They also encourage church attendance. Campus Crusade is another good Christian organization. It is Calvinistic and, while there is no official ties, it is Southern Baptist oriented. However, it does teach the Christian walk, offers Christian fellowship, encourages, in fact, demands Bible study and church attendance. The Baptist Student Center or Union is near every campus. It is definitely supported by the Southern Baptist churches but non-members are welcome to take part in their program. They offer a very fine program and it is to be commended. Most campuses have an Assemblies of God youth center or Chi Alpha House. There may be some doctrinal differences. but they provide a highly commendable program of Christian development and fellowship. They are probably the most fundamental group and maintain an unquestionable Christian stance. It is unfortunate that Free Will Baptists have never seen the need to supply some kind of campus support for their young people. Perhaps they are not really concerned about the plight of the Christian student on the secular campus. In any instance, since there is such an absence, parents and pastors should encourage their students to become a part of one of those on campus.

Any place where sin and sinners are is a place for missionary work. The Christian college student can find moral strength and spiritual help by working with the Christian groups and in such work will ward off a great many temptations. The best position for the Christian is an offensive one. We do not have to defend God. Christ needs no defense. Christians need make no apology for their position. Only entrenched forces can put Christians on their defensive. Retreating forces cannot dig entrenchments. To be busy about our Father's business. then, is our offensive position which becomes our strongest defense. Parents, pastors, encourage your young people to be active with those in Christian

pursuits. Herein lies most of the answer.

CAPE GIRARDEAU CHURCH BUYS NEW BUILDING

"The Lord has done great things for us whereof we are glad."

This verse explains our feelings at Free Will Baptist Church in Cape Girardeau about our new building.

God has done great things to supply our needs. It is hard to believe so much has happened so fast. When we came to Cape Girardeau January 7, 1973, the attendance was 9 and 10. Sixteen was a high day. We were in a basement building with five classrooms and a small auditorium at one end. It leaked and flooded terribly in the rains we had last spring and summer. God showed us a building and we began to pray. Soon some of our people began to see how this could be a tremendous help to us with adequate space for a bus ministry and a day care ministry.

When 100% of our church voiced their opinion in a called meeting, that they believed it to be the will of God for us, we put earnest money on the building and got permission to begin using the facilities the first of June.

Thirty-four children are enrolled in the day care center. Several of their families have started attending our services. One mother has been saved and the father has attended. Pray for this ministry. It has helped us tremendously in finances.

November 11 we moved to the building for our first service. It was tremendous. This was formerly a General Baptist church building and several of their families have stayed with our church and are really helping us. The following Sunday there were new families again.

Our sanctuary seats 325, has 26 classrooms, baptistry, beautiful kitchen and fellowship hall (40' x 60'). We have as fine nursery facilities as I have ever seen, as well as a pastor's study, church office and several rooms on the second floor. On the third floor there are eight rooms. The three-story unit was built at a cost of \$66,000 about six years ago. The interior of the sanctuary was remodeled with padded pews and wall-to-wall carpet. The outside was sandblasted and trimmed. The structure is brick and simply beautiful. It is located about eight blocks from Southeast Missouri University on the busiest street in the downtown area of Cape Girardeau. two blocks from the Mississippi River. We bought this property for \$45,000 and have a contract on our old building for \$22,000 from another church group.

Our people have raised over \$3,000 to pay off a debt to the Home Mission Board. We also raised money above tithes to get into the bus ministry. One of our single young men has traded for a van

which he and our son Gary are using on a bus route.

God gave us a young couple last week who drove 16 miles to our church. Another young couple drives 28 miles. We thank God for some wonderful people to work with. We have a lady helping Peggy in the nursery school who is a school teacher. We believe with people like these and supporters like those of Missouri Free Will Baptists we will build a church.

I would also like to commend the members of the Missouri Home Mission Board. They are the finest men with whom I have ever worked. We could not possibly have done this without them. They have helped a lot of time at personal sacrifice.

ATTENTION, ALL CLERKS

New multi-copy church letter forms have been approved by the National Association of Free Will Baptists and recommended for use by our local churches as a replacement for all previous forms. Sample copies of this new form were mailed to all quarterly meeting clerks in August.

The local church clerk will complete this letter once a year, retain one copy for church records, and send three copies to the quarterly or district meeting. The district clerk will . . .

- 1) Keep a copy for the district's records
- 2) Mail one copy to the State Clerk

3) Send the other copy to the National office.

These new forms should be ordered before the next quarterly meeting from your state bookstore or Randall Bookstore, P. O. Box 1088, Nashville, Tennessee 37202. They sell for 75¢ per dozen (plus

10% shipping charge).

If these reports are distributed at the next quarterly meeting or before the end of December, the church clerk can compile the statistical information which will coincide with the church records for the fiscal year of 1972.

The church will keep one copy and send the completed letter to the first quarterly meeting after January 1, 1974—and each year thereafter. This will allow adequate time for the information to be forwarded to the state association and the national association.

Rather than sending one copy at a time, the National Office requests that the quarterly meeting clerk secure all the letters from every church and then mail a copy of all the letter forms in one large envelope at a time to the state clerk and likewise to the national association.

Although these new forms request more comprehensive information, the data is very essential to better evaluate our denominational work. The additional information will especially help the national departments serve our churches more effectively.

In addition to the annual report forms, a shorter report (Number EX 202) has been prepared for the church to use in reporting to the other three quarterly meetings during the year. These short forms may be ordered in quantity lots (30¢ per dozen), or an association may make necessary changes for their particular needs and mimeograph their own copies.

However, it is vital that associations cooperate in using the annual uniform letters in order to secure accurate statistical information at every level of our denominational work. We are counting on each association to cooperate in this endeavor in order to advance our beloved denomination.

THE STORY OF JOHN 3:16

The story really starts in March of 1972 when God laid on my heart a burden to help the Bob Carr family go to the mission field in Alaska where God had called them. My family first met the Carr family in September of 1971 after we moved from Joplin, Missouri, to Lakewood, Colorado. As we grew to know the Carrs and fellowshiped in the same church, we began to realize God was calling them to Alaska where the field was ripe for the harvest. One evening in the Carr home, Bob tossed a green stamp book away only to comment, "I wonder how many green stamps it would take to pay for an airplane." I said that was not a bad idea. The next morning I called the Green Stamp Company to arrange a program with them. Since then we have made arrangements with other stamp firms.

The Carrs departed Lakewood on September 10, 1972. As they left we made a promise to go to Alaska in 1973. As the year passed, God blessed in Lakewood and the stamps came in. July arrived and the airplane bearing call numbers JN 316 arrived in Lakewood for a dedication service which was held at the airport. On July 13, my family departed from

Idaho Falls, Idaho, by jet for the trip to Alaska. As the jet neared Fairbanks, the wait was over and we began a two-week stay with the Carrs. While we were there we saw God blessing and moving in the Carrs' ministry. We saw souls being saved as God dealt with the natives of Alaska. While in Alaska I made a trip north of the Arctic Circle in John 3:16 to be present when the first Bible was presented to Mrs. Jonas in her cabin in Wiseman, Alaska.

We returned from Alaska with a new zeal and a new burden to be a part in the ministry to the natives of Alaska. At the present the balance on the plane is \$11,500. God has supplied \$16,000 the first year of this project. With the national being held next year in Wichita we would like to pay the balance and burn the mortgage in that city since that is where the plane was made. 

We Can't Afford Not To Tithe

Stewardship testimony of Gary and Carol Bandy, members of Olivet FWB Church, Marshall, MO



1 T USED to make me quite angry when my pastor would preach about tithing," said Gary Bandy, when we began the interview about his and his wife's stewardship experiences. Gary and his wife, Carol, now smiled almost in disbelief at their former attitude toward Christian stewardship. Though the Bandy's income was well into the five figure bracket, they explained that they used to nearly always be in financial straits. When the offering plate was passed they might have put in as much as \$25.00 a month but did not worry much about the financial needs of their church since they always seemed to have such pressing needs of their own.

"We always wanted more than we needed or could afford," Carol explained, "and just went into debt for it." The Lord had to teach Gary and Carol some things about stewardship of possessions, and not all of the lessons were pleasant nor easy to learn. Looking back, however, the Bandys have nothing but praise for the Lord for His patience in teaching them the joy of faithful stewardship.

Both Gary and Carol had been saved in their youth, but their early married life was spent as only nominal Christians, attending church only when it was convenient and not getting tied down with church responsibilities. When they moved to Marshall, Missouri, in March of 1968, they joined the Olivet FWB Church unaware of what the Lord was going to do in their lives. He gave them a faithful pastor, Brother Cliff Bowman, whose preaching and

patient counsel continued to hammer at their need of total dedication to Jesus Christ.

"We knew we needed to be more dedicated," Carol said, "but we knew it would involve tithing and we thought we just could not afford to tithe." It was through a series of divinely guided events in their lives that Gary and Carol learned that just the opposite was true, they could not afford NOT to tithe.

First, they wanted to own their own home, but could not raise enough down payment to secure a loan. They tried to trade cars and again their efforts were blocked by the Lord. Gary had always wanted to take flying lessons and had opportunity to use the training in his business, but after years of waiting, they found they were no closer to being able to afford the lessons.

"We had gone as far as we could go," Gary said. "We had to do something different to what we had been doing. Somehow, I felt that our not tithing was the problem, but that didn't really make sense either."

One night after discussing their problems and their relationship to Christian dedication all night long Gary and Carol Bandy made a decision that was to change their lives more than they believed possible. They decided to put God first in every area of their lives, including finances. They began to attend all of the services of their church and change other things on their schedule to permit their church attendance instead of subordinating church attendance to other things as they had done before. They also began to tithe their income into the treasury of their church.

"Ten percent of the gross," Gary said, "I couldn't get by with less, and oh, what a change began to take place in our lives."

"Such a peace and joy come into our lives," Carol recalls, "for just doing what we knew was right." That was October, 1971.

"So, what changed in your lives?" I asked.

"Well, apart form the spiritual blessings that we began to experience," Carol explained, "Gary started his flying lessons that very month. We discovered that the car that we were going to trade off, thinking that it was about worn out, had a lot of good miles in it yet. In fact, we drove it for another year and a half. Then, quite to our surprise, this house deal came along. We just happened to go to an open house sponsored by a real estate firm, fell in love with this house, and miraculously the deal went through, and here we are."

"We have learned to pray about our business," Gary went on. "We prayed that if it was the Lord's will we would get the house, and if we did not get it we would accept that as His will. I've learned to pray about decisions I have to make in my job, such

as the hiring of men."

"What would you say to someone," I asked, "who told you they could not afford to tithe."

"I would tell them they can't afford not to. The Lord will always supply your needs when you put Him first," Gary responded.

"We have found that many times the Lord will give us even more than we need, if we will just wait on Him and keep Him in first place," Carol said. "Like when we moved into this house we didn't have enough furniture for all of the rooms, but instead of foolishly going into debt for it, like we used to do, we decided to wait until we had the money to buy it. Not long after that, Gary won a sales contest that he had not expected to win that provided the money for all the furniture we had picked out."

I learned when doing this interview that everyone who compliments the Bandy's home or furnishings gets the same reply: "The Lord gave it to us. We

know He did."

I asked the Bandys if they ever gave above their tithes. "Oh yes," Gary replied. "We've learned that we can't outgive God." They support State Home Missions and Foreign Missions regularly as well as giving above their tithes to various local church projects.

The Bandys pastor, Rev. Cliff Bowman, has this to say concerning Gary and Carol's testimony, "Because of the Bandy's example and testimony our congregation has been strengthened. If every bornagain Free Will Baptist would follow their example we would be able to fulfill our commission and reach the ends of the world with the Gospel message. 'Jesus saves!' "

"Tithing," according to Gary and Carol Bandy,

"doesn't cost. It pays."

Carol is a nurse, and she and Jerry have three boys. Remember her and her family in your prayers especially this month and let her know you care. I wrote and asked her to share something with us. Her reply is as follows:

"For many years I have had a suppressed fear that



God would call me to the mission field. Naturally, I wanted to be useful for my Lord, and active in the church in the states. Was that not enough? I have been in services where the message has been given and the need for more workers stressed, and I blocked it all out in my mind. Why? Because, in my head, I was busy hand-picking couples for the task. According to my thinking, they should be young and have the very best Biblical training, and preferably, be without children. (We already had three boys, so this would put us at the end of the calling list.) It seemed right to me that the doctors, teachers, and dynamic preachers would be the first choice for the mission field.

Was it honest of me to feel that I could not be used? Of course not! It was just a trick of the devil; and, as long as I was looking for an excuse to not go myself, it worked just fine. However, there was still a problem. I had picked out these qualified people ... but what if they did not go? I could not make the choice for them. There was only one person I could answer for ... myself.

It was when I allowed the Lord to guide my thoughts and I quit trying to convince someone else to go that there was a change. Perhaps God had other plans for the people I had chosen. I could only answer for myself. If God wanted me and could use me then I was ready. I did not have many of the high requirements that I required for my handpicked people. But when I became quiet and let God speak to my heart and did not think of other people, a new thought came across to me loud and clear—it would not be what I was that would count. The important thing was what God could do THROUGH me. Simple and easy...just tell what God had done for me personally and let Him, through the Holy Spirit finish the task.

God needs workers everywhere. He cares about us as individuals. And works through us as individuals. I am thankful to be counted among many who serve Him with hearts of LOVE."
