

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Pitch In

We see a great display of posters, bumper stickers, etc., with the inscription "Pitch In." The purpose is to promote ecology; thus, to work for a cleaner, more appealing atmosphere in which to live.

Picking up the thought from a somewhat different appeal, we too would like to present the challenging thought of "pitching in." The phrase is not uncommon to us. "Pitch in and help" is a phrase we hear quite often. The fact of more people pitching in and bearing their share of the responsibility in the church is a great need in most congregations.

In the Book of Numbers, chapter 32:1-26, the story is told of the children of Reuben and Gad who were content to stay on this side of Jordan because they liked the fine grass and grazing land of Jazer and Gilead. They said to Moses, "With your permission, we will stay on this side of the Jordan. We are satisfied with this side and do not care about going any farther."

Moses reprimanded them for their unthoughtfulness in verses 6 and 7: "Shall your brethren go to war, and shall ye sit here? And wherefore discourage ye the heart of the children of Israel from going over into the land which the Lord hath given them?" It is amazing how many there are in our churches who are like the children of Reuben and Gad, willing to sit while the others go to war. It is a very discouraging thing to those who are faithful and who are willing to work and give their best in the Lord's service and have others to sit idly by.

As Moses admonished the children of Reuben and Gad by declaring: "Wherefore discourage ye the heart of the children of Israel from going over into the land which the Lord hath given them?" We should be very careful not to discourage the workers for God by our indifference, unthoughtfulness, and even laziness. It would probably shock us if we knew how many people who frequent the Lord's house are in love with the things on this side of the promised land and are unwilling to fight the good fight of faith and combat the devil so as to reach that land that is fairer than day which the Lord has promised those who will live for Him and do His will.

May the Lord help us not to become satisfied with "this side" so as to lose sight of the Christian's goal and also forget the great commission of going into all the world with the gospel message.

Moses placed a challenge before the two tribes. He admonished them to pitch in and help fight the battles: "If ye will go armed before the LORD to war, and will go all of you armed over Jordan before the LORD, until he hath driven out his enemies from before him." They could have the land they desired. This is the challenge to our hearts today!

First: *Pitch in and work*. As Moses challenged the two tribes of Jacob to work with their brothers, so are we admonished to labor "together" in God's vineyard. "We are labourers together." If the people who make up the church will labor and pull together, victory can be as sure as it was with the people in Nehemiah's day. "They built the wall because they had a mind to work!"

Second: *Pitch in and pray*. If revival tarries and the blessings of God seem to never shower down upon our services, it is without doubt, because of the lack of prayer. Things can be accomplished through prayer that can be done by no other means. Jesus was not merely using idle words when He said: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." "If ye ask anything in my name and it will be given thee." "Pray without ceasing."

Third: *Pitch in and study*. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." "The Word will keep us from sin or sin will keep us from the Word," is a cliche that remains true. Back to the Bible is a crying need for this hour! God help us to pitch in and search the Scriptures to find out what God would have us to do and how to go about doing it.

Fourth: Pitch in and be faithful and loyal to God

and His church. I read of a short statement that was inscribed on a grave marker. Very simply it stated: "He was faithful." What greater epitaph could one have on his tombstone than "He Was Faithful." What a need in our day for faithfulness in the church. The attitude of "letting George do it" has gone too far. If many folk were as slipshod and sloppy with their secular work as they are with the Lord's work, they could never hold down a job!

Hear me for eternity! We are all going to come face to face with the King of kings and the Lord of lords and give an account of our faithfulness. May it be said of us when this life is through and when we stand before the Eternal Judge, "He was faithful."

Fifth: Pitch in with visitation and personal work. Jesus' message to a man that had just been cleansed from his sins and had a multitude of devils cast out of him was: "Go tell thy friends what great things the Lord hath done for thee." He tells us to go into all the world. "Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled."

Look around you in the church. How many in the congregation that have come into the church by the way of the altars of the church have you been personally responsible for? Any? Every church needs workers; and the church that has a lot of personal workers, without exception, is a growing, soul winning church.

Then: Pitch in and tithe. Malachi 3, Matthew 23:23, 1 Corinthians 16, and many other Scriptures teach us how to support God's work. God did not bring into existence such a tremendous institution as the church without providing a method in which it should be supported or financed. If every member would tithe, every church could do those things that they would like to do for the Kingdom's cause very simply! However, because some choose to sit idly by and let others do the paying (and most usually, only a few carry the financial load of the church), the work is hindered and progress is slowed down drastically. Pitch in and pay according to the teaching of the Word for God said that He would "open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it" (Malachi 3:10).

Finally: Pitch in and fill your responsibility. "And I sought for a man among them, that should make up the hedge, and stand in the gap before me and for the land, that I should not destroy it: but I found none" (Ezekiel 22:30). No one can take your place of service. Your absence brings about a vacancy. Every professed Christian has a solemn obligation to fill his place of duty. God will require it of us. Moses told the children of Reuben and Gad: "If you will not go and lend a helping hand and fight the battles with your brothers...ye have sinned against the Lord: and be sure your sins will find you out."

We will all be accountable to God for not pitching in and doing our share of the work that is to be done for Him and His church.

FORM LETTER FOR WRITING YOUR STATE REPRESENTATIVE ABOUT THE GAMBLING ISSUE:

Dear Representative:

I am writing to you concerning HJR No. 59 by Representative Gray from Independence, and HJR No. 82 introduced by Representative Earl Schleff of Dellwood. These two bills seek to amend Section 29 of Article III of the State Constitution concerning the legalization of lotteries and gift enterprises plus pari-mutuel betting on horses.

Sir, I am opposed to these two bills for the following reasons:

1) When government-sponsored legal gambling is introduced, organized crime's illegal gambling flourishes. As former Attorney General Robert Kennedy said, "Organized gambling is the cornerstone of organized crime." Also this will allow more corruption like the State of Illinois has experienced.

2. The major proponents of these bills say look at the revenue it brings us.

a. In those states where there is legalized gambling, actually only .6 of one percent comes from gambling revenues. Of that revenue, at least 50 percent must be spent to promote it and administer it. This does not count the cost of more police and law control.

b. In those states that have legalized gambling the per capita tax is \$458 while those without average \$319. Plus, the average state debt in all of the gambling states averages 7.7 times greater than that of Missouri.

3) Legalized gambling has an adverse effect on business and industry. Did you know Nevada has the same number of manufacturing establishments it had in 1904? The Secretary of Commerce of Holyoke, Massachusetts, said, "Gambling losses prevent payment of bills."

4) According to Gamblers Anonymous, one out of every ten people who gambles in any way becomes a compulsive or addictive gambler.

Legalized gambling is an evil we can live without in Missouri. As former Governor Collins of Florida said, "Florida would be much better off with no pari-mutuel gambling. Once such an operation gets a foothold, it is almost impossible to get rid of it!"


Therefore, sir, for these reasons I ask you to vote no on these two bills.

Taking A Chance

Edmund Burke said: "All that is needed for evil to triumph is for the good people to do nothing." I recently attended a meeting of the Christian Civic Foundation where I learned the following facts about gambling. I quote from Mr. C. R. Horne, Jr., and his book, Gambling Facts Every Citizen Should Know. 1. Gambling is the primary source of revenue for organized crime. Experience has proved that, when a government-sponsored system of legal gambling is introduced, organized crime's illegal gambling racket flourishes and is actually strengthened. 2. Gambling with its relationship to syndicated crime has been exposed as one of the major corrupting influences upon state officials, courts, and police. 3. In states which have legal gambling, income from this source is an insignificant percentage (less and 1% of their total budget). Taxes on a per capita basis in these states average higher than taxes in non-gambling states. Increases in costs for police, courts, and welfare more than offset the revenue from gambling. 4. Claims of increased business and industrial activity as a result of legal gambling are false and deceptive. Legitimate business actually suffers as a result of gambling. 5. Over four million people are gambling addicts. The number of people who gamble is greatly increased when gambling is legalized and when gambling becomes a government-sponsored enterprise. Thus, the number of people hurt is increased. Human weakness should not be exploited by government. Rather, government should do everything possible to resist such criminal exploitation.

I also learned that the Missouri Constitution, Article III, Section 39, states that the General Assembly "shall not have power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose and shall enact laws to prohibit sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets, or tickets in any scheme in the nature of a lottery." This constitutional provision stands as the barrier to legalization of gambling in the state in any form.

To legalize gambling, pari-mutuel wagering on horses or dog racing, lotteries, or bingo, this state constitution would have to be changed by a majority vote of the people. Two propositions to so change the constitution have been introduced. One bill (HJR No. 59) introduced by Representative Gray from Independence calls for the legalization of games for religious, labor, civic, educational, and other service organizations. In addition, this bill would let the legislature make "such additional laws." This would pave the way for lotteries and pari-mutuel betting. Another bill introduced by Representative Earl Schleff of Dellwood seeks to amend the constitution by legalizing lotteries and gift enterprises for religious, veterans' service and educational purposes, and also provide for a Missouri state lottery and pari-mutuel betting on horses. This bill would provide that any money left over after cost would be used as the General Assembly sees fit. One ruse would have it to be used for mass transportation.

As has already been stated the constitution can only be changed by a majority vote of the people. The question of legalized gambling can be placed before the people in the next general election by one of two ways: (1) The legislature can pass one of these two bills and call for a vote of the people in the next general election, or (2) Voters can call for a referendum by petition. In order for this to happen, at least 5 per cent of those who voted in the last general election in 8 out of 10 congressional districts must sign the petition.

Should Christian people and the Church become involved in the opposition to legalized gambling in Missouri? Lycurgus M. Starkey, Jr., states in his book, *Money*, *Mania*, and *Morals*, "The Christian will refrain from the private practice and the public endorsement of gambling in any form, realizing that gambling is detrimental to the purpose of life as defined in Jesus Christ." Church participation in this campaign to oppose gambling need not interfere with the traditional ministries, such as worship, evangelism, etc. Involvement with the gambling issue is simply another ministry, vital and pertinent at this time to all members of the Body of Christ.

Well, if what you have said this far is true, pastor, how can I get involved? There are a number of answers to this question. Let me share some of them with you. 1. Our church will soon receive a free will offering to contribute toward the efforts of "Missourians Against Legalized Gambling" to defeat legalized gambling. You may contribute as God leads you to. 2. You can write or call your state senator or representative and tell him why you are opposed to the two bills which have been introduced to legalize gambling in Missouri. 3. You can pray. God still answers prayer.

In conclusion, remember Edmund Burke's words: "All that is needed for evil to truimph is for good people to do nothing." Dear friend, don't hesitate act at once!



EVANGEL CHURCH EYES GOAL

On December 30, 1973, members of Missouri's newest FWB mission-church, the Evangel FWB Church of Webb City, were challenged by their pastor, Rev. Andy Lay, to set a goal of how many souls they would try, with God's help, to win to the Lord in 1974. Each member was asked to write down on a piece of paper the number of souls he would attempt to win during 1974. After the papers were collected and the numbers tallied, 149 souls were claimed. The pastor then added one more soul to his number, making the church's goal for the year 150 souls. That seemed like a pretty ambitious number, but the folks at Evangel began to pray and work toward meeting that goal.

Now, six weeks into 1974, 15 souls have made first time decisions at Evangel Church; three new families have begun attending regularly; and a record 66 attended the worship service February 10.

The youth of the church have shown their love of the Master in rededicating and giving their lives to Christ for Christian service. They stand ready at all times to pray, to sing, and to lead other young people to the throne of grace.

Sometimes we hear it said, "The young people are our church of tomorrow." But we feel that our youth are a part of our church of today and will be tomorrow also.

The forth and fifth Sunday evening services are for Youth Night Services. The choir is made up of our youth, and a young minister is usually the speaker. During the past several services our youth have played the main part in coming and praying for souls around the altar. The National Home Mission Department would like to thank the people of Missouri for what you gave to home missions in 1973. Thirty states exceeded their quotas. Your state was one of these. You gave \$19,463.29 to National Home Missions, which was \$2,463.29 over your quota and \$4,861.03 over what you gave in 1972.

The total income to National Home Missions in 1973 was \$382,330.20, which was \$106,330.20 over our quota. The reason for this was an increase in missionary personnel (we now have 43 couples) and an increased awareness of the need for home missions on the part of our people.

Your quota for 1974 is \$22,000. We are praying for your success.

There are yet 11 states and 27 capital cities without the witness of Free Will Baptist churches. With your continued prayer and financial support we will enter these soon if the Lord tarries.


