

COLUMBIA WORK GROWING

Our church's record attendance was 65 on Sunday, April 7. There were 50 in the evening service. Communion and feet washing were a blessing. Several participated for the first time.

We are proud of our Wednesday evening Bible Club with 20 to 25 elementary children enrolled. We anticipate this program growing when we get into our new building. About 40 people usually participate in our Wednesday evening service which includes Bible Club, Teen Action, and adult prayer and Bible study.

Our women have organized an auxiliary, and our men have a special prayer time at 6:00 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

Our building fund has less than \$500. We are about \$2,000 to \$3,000 and another month's work short of obtaining an occupancy permit from the City of Columbia. When we move into our new building, we will need a piano for the church basement, Free Will Baptist hymnals, a baptistry, steel chairs, tables, and equipment for Sunday school rooms, plus many other items too numerous to mention in this article. Please pray with us about these needs. Our people have given extra and have contributed nearly 2,000 hours of volunteer work on our building.

A faith budget of over \$1,000 per month was adopted at our last business meeting. Our budget includes 10% of our general fund to the Missouri State Cooperative Fund. Our people and friends of our church usually designate \$300 to \$500 per month to missions, Bible Colleges, and other special projects, above their general fund giving.

God has been good to us. Pray with us for a good revival soon. The opportunities are challenging.



JUNE 8 TARGET DAY FOR BIBLE COLLEGE BUILDING FUND

Jack Paramore, Director of Development for Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, is attempting to raise \$100,000 in one day for the school's building fund. He is currently lining up 100 churches that will sponsor a Walk-A-Thon on June 8 on behalf of the college, each with a goal of \$1,000 to be raised. By early April over 40 churches had announced their intention to join the drive.

Asked why he was sponsoring the special day, Paramore explained, "To completely liquidate our indebtedness and get ready for the construction of another building, we are intensifying promotional activity through this year." While no specific building has been named as the next to be constructed on the campus, the need for a new auditorium and two new dormitories has become apparent.

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE SUPPORT FROM MISSOURI

In March Missourians gave a total of \$2,056.79 to Free Will Baptist Bible College. \$890.93 of that was for the general fund, with the largest gift coming from the Fellowship FWB Church in Flat River. \$1,140.86 of the total was designated for the building fund, with the largest gift coming from the Hurryville FWB Church. They gave \$301.86.

Missourians have now paid \$8,008.00 on the Library Wing Project. We should note, however, that we are falling behind our quota for general fund giving to the school. At the end of February we had given \$8,992.44 of our annual \$17,500 quota, or 51%. To be on schedule we should have given 75% of our quota.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION PLANS FINALIZED

Three pastors, a television evangelist, and a college professor will be delivering the 5 main messages of the 38th annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The Kansas State Association of Free Will Baptists will host the meeting July 15-18 in Wichita's Century II Center.

Despite the current energy crisis, Free Will Baptist leaders are predicting that this session will be one of the best attended. National convention planners are optimistic that an adequate supply of gasoline will be available during the peak traveling months of summer. The shortages have already eased in many sections of the country since the lifting of the oil

embargo.

The Reverend Rue Dell Smith, pastor of the First FWB Church in Purcell, Oklahoma, will introduce the 1974 convention theme, "Growing Toward Maturity," in his keynote address opening night. Other facets of the convention theme will be explored by Leroy Forlines, professor of Bible and Acting Dean of Students at Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee; Calvin Evans, pastor of Union FWB Church in Wheelersburg, Ohio, and founder and director of Evangelistic Outreach, Inc., a ministry that reaches thousands through a weekly television program and radio broadcast aired on a total of 10 stations; Raymond Riggs, probably the foremost missionary pastor in our denomination, currently ministering with Central FWB Church in Royal Oak, Michigan, and serving on the National Foreign Missions Board; and Melvin Worthington, pastor of the First FWB Church of Albany, Georgia, who has enjoyed a unique ministry as pastorevangelist in the denomination because of his Biblical exposition.

The Reverend T. S. Rendell, Three Hills, Alberta, Canada, will launch the National Youth Conference with the keynote address on Sunday evening, July 14. NYC will then run simultaneously with the National Association. Over 1,000 youths are expected to participate in the competitive activities

and the Music and Arts Festival.

The pace for the business session of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention on Tuesday, July 16, could undoubtedly be set during the annual banquet on Monday evening when Mrs. Mildred Stamm, Kansas City, Missouri, will challenge auxiliary members and guests.

Reservations for housing during the national meeting are being handled by a central housing agency. Special rates have been secured for those affiliated with the National Association. Available accommodations with prices and the appropriate reservation forms are contained in both the April and May issues of CONTACT Magazine, the official denominational publication.

Youth groups of 10 or more who are traveling and staying together during the National Youth Conference can qualify for special room rates. For full information write NYC '74 Office, P. O.
