

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Catholics for Christ

When God placed me in the full time ministry in California, I was privileged to get acquainted with a bright young man who was a Roman Catholic. There was no set way to win him to Christ. We just prayed and loved him and studied the Scriptures together. Many times our friendship was almost severed because of his religion. Finally, he was able to see that I loved him and that I only wanted to introduce him to my Lord. When he saw that, the battle was over and he came to Christ. The change and excitement which took place in his life gave me the zeal and desire to win others to Christ.

Later, the Lord placed me right in the midst of a Roman Catholic City. While serving there among them, much dedication to their church was seen. However, there was no knowledge of the Bible or its Lord. One was immediately aware of the apparent wickedness of the Roman Church. Its followers could sin without feeling the least bit guilty of doing so. Therefore, it was definitely known by a follower of Christ that they were loyal to their church, but lost to Christ. All ties were bound to this earth rather than to Heaven. If we were to win them we had to know this for sure.

There is no real special method in winning them to Christ. But much prayer, love, and concern is the only thing that will work. However, there is a tract written by Oswald J. Smith entitled, "Your Roman Catholic Bible Has the Answer." Also we used their own Bible according to the individual we were trying to win to Christ.

We began to pray and search the Scriptures for more light concerning a method which we could use to win more of them to Christ. Also a deep love grew in my heart for them. We finally came to the conclusion that it was never going to be an easy matter. There was going to be a real struggle against Hell itself. Like all sinners, they had to be convinced they were definitely lost and needed to be saved by someone rather than by something, namely the Roman Church. This conclusion was not reached by a mental attitude alone, but by a deep yearning love in my heart for the people who were caught up by this monster.

A method was finally formed in my mind that would work for me and be natural. A prayer ministry began for those whom we knew personally. Too, we began to visit and be a friend to them, even though the people we loved seemed to be constantly running from us.

One of the first obstacles to overcome was the thought that they had been offended in some way.

More prayer and Bible study was the only way and answers could be found for light to guide us in what to do.

Finally, it was realized they were not offended at us, but rather at the Christ who lived in us. Also they were not aware that Christ was trying to show them the way to life. The whole answer was in the fact that their sins were not to be taken personally by us. We were not to hold their actions as being against us, but they were fighting against the reality of a living Christ. They were not aware of what the real issue was because of their Roman Church background.

The Roman Church teaches that their people are the only ones who are saved and it is the other people outside their church who have wrong

doctrine and are lost.

For them to come to Christ they must recognize their need for Him. This is a real struggle and they are the only ones who can fight this battle. Of course, we were praying and witnessing to them all the time, which was a means for Christ to show them the way.

Three Scriptures which we constantly used were 1 Timothy 2:4-5, Hebrews 10:11, and Matthew 23:9. After these verses were understood, they were ready for us to give out a sound message of good news of Christ. Following is a list of the Scriptures which may or may not be used: John 3:1-8; John 1:12; Luke 13:3-5; Romans 3:23; Romans 6:23; Romans 10:9-10; Revelation 3:20; and 2 Corinthians 5:21.

The next best way I know how to say this is by a personal testimony of a Roman Catholic who has been saved through our ministry. This young mother was saved about six months ago. She has grown in the Lord and is having an influence for Christ.

The day the Lord saved my soul was the greatest day of my life. When I finally turned loose of my pride and went down to the altar to ask for forgiveness my heart felt 100 pounds

lighter.

I remember while I was still in St. Louis we would attend church with my husband's parents. During every service I felt the desire to go to the altar, but my pride held me back. Satan used my pride in battling against the Lord. After services were over I felt as if I had actually been in a real fight. I really was, but at the time I did not realize I had been caught in the battle between the Lord and Satan. While going home in the car after each service, I would begin to cry because of the never ending conflict going on in my heart. I actually had a pain in my chest from it. I praise God that, even though Satan won those battles, the Lord won the war and my soul.

Brother Wayne Wagner would come over to the house. Everytime he would come over, I would immediately start thinking of the excuses to get rid of him. Most of the time I would not even let him past the front door. I actually started to hate him for pestering me so much. When he moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, I felt so relieved. About a year or so after he left, we moved to Springfield. After living here just four months we found out that Brother Wagner was going to pastor a church here in Springfield. All I could think about was that it was going to start all over again. Sure enough Brother Wayne started coming by the house inviting us to church again.

Just about two months later Gary's parents were down visiting and we decided to attend church with them. I had no idea or the slightest intention of going up to the altar that morning. I know it was the working of the Lord that I went up to the altar that particular Sunday because my husband had asked me the Wednesday before what I would do if he went up Sunday morning to get right with the Lord. He had been saved when he was younger and had got away from the Lord. I had started to say that if he did I would never be able to go up. Instead, I said that if he did I hoped that he was really sincere. That Sunday I went before he did. I had even forgotten that he had told me he was going up that morning.

Now that I have got right with the Lord I love Brother Wagner and his family very much, in the Lord. I now know the reason I felt the way I did about him was because I was under conviction and did not want to admit that what he was saying was really true. I thank God that he cared enough about where I would be spending eternity to keep coming back

when I was bitter toward him.

There are many, many things for which I am thankful. Things that have become important to me are reading in the Bible and attending services every chance I get. All my life I was told that I would not be able to understand the Lord's Word. Only the priests were able to understand it. I was cheated out of the privilege of reading and learning more about my Lord in His Word. Now I read and understand His Word through the help of the Holy Spirit. Before receiving Christ, attending church on Sunday for just 45 minutes was such a waste of time. I always came away empty and lacking something. Now the services we attend on Sunday and Wednesday nights do not seem to be enough. I want to be able to go every

God gave His only Son to die on the cross for my sins and those of everyone else that we may gain eternal life in Heaven. Now the only thing for me to do is turn my life over to God that He may work through me and spread His Word to others.

The Lord has given me far more than I deserve and I am very thankful for it each and every day.



Cave Springs Quarterly Meeting assembled with Thayer Church on Saturday, April 6. Twenty-two churches, including Piney Church which recently reorganized, represented. I was given a brief time for our Missouri program report. Ministers Clark Stephens and Darrell Strain preached the sermons. The church reports indicated people being saved and baptized and added to their congregations.

I was privileged to bring the weekly Sunday morning radio broadcast, sponsored by the Cave Springs Association over Thayer radio station. I enjoyed a fine service Sunday morning, April 7, with pastor C. Stephens and Faith Chapel FWB Church which has recently been organized in the West Plains area. Two young ladies were saved and two young men returned to the Lord. Pastor Stephens held a baptismal service in the river nearby on Sunday afternoon. They gave an offering to the Cooperative Plan too.

State Association in August.

Churches of the Northeast Missouri Quarterly Meeting assembled with New Harmony Church on Saturday evening, April 20. Columbia's pastor, Rev. Mark Vandivort, delivered the gospel message. Moderator Cooper granted Brother Beatty time to present our Missouri promotional program. Graysville's pastor was issued a certificate of good standing. Their presbytery ordained Brother Sponsler as a deacon for Hazel Creek Church to succeed the late Brother Herman Miley.

I delivered the message in Low Ground FWB Church, on Sunday morning, April 21. They designated their Sunday school offering to Foreign Missions Call-A-Thon. They also sent an offering to

the Missouri Cooperative Plan.

The same evening we enjoyed a fine service with Columbia Church. I delivered the sermon and gave commendations to the congregation which fully participates in every phase of our work. Their new brick church with full size basement, located at 1807 Grindstone Road, is nearing completion. New people are attending regularly. One lady joined the church Sunday. Thanks in behalf of Columbia Church to every person and church who has given time, labor, and other gifts to erect this nice

sanctuary. Fourth Church did a fine job hosting St. Louis District Quarterly Meeting on April 21. Fourteen churches represented with delegates. Rev. Vernon Long preached the 11:00 a.m. sermon. 



"It takes so much patience and hard work but we know that God will work it all out. We had 34 for church May 5, our largest attendance since we have been here.

"We truly desire your prayers across the state and extend a welcome to each of you to visit our services when you are in our area."
