

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST GEM

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Raispensable GOREROOM ES. Ability to Gare

From a prison cell in Rome in the year A.D. 62, the Apostle Paul wrote these words to the church at Philippi: "But I trust in the Lord to send Timotheus shortly unto you." Then in verse 20 he said, "For I have no man likeminded, who will

naturally care for your state."

There are so many nuggets of spiritual gold that we in the twentieth century jet age could reap from this one verse of biography concerning the young man, Timothy. Paul speaks here of personal confidence which he has in Timothy, concerning his willingness to go wheresoever he may choose to send him. In other words Timothy was willing to be used. How, when we were servants of Satan, we were so willing to be used! How persuasive we were that others should follow us in the paths of sin. Yet are we willing to be used to this great extent in the work of God?

I do not think Free Will Baptists are lacking in talent, money, or ability; but many times it becomes very, very obvious that our great denomination is hampered drastically by the amount of souls that refuse to be used or who possess an attitude of not caring. How heartbreaking it is to have to beg the God-given talent out of some one, talent that God has given freely; but, before they will freely give it, they must first be begged.

Timothy must have been such an unusual lover of the work of God, because Paul admitted, "I have no man likeminded." What words of spiritual praise the apostle is giving this very young preacher! What a tremendous biography of his young life and character! Timothy was one of a kind because Paul said, "Timothy will naturally care for your state." Yes,

praise God because, he cared!

Why are churches continually running the same figure or less in attendance? It is very simple: Nobody cares! Why is it becoming less and less popular to go to church on Sunday night for so many Free Will Baptists? Because they just do not care! Why is the attendance on midweek service so low that Satan must laugh? Because nobody cares! Why is the average Free Will Baptist church hampered financially from doing what they really know they should be doing? Because nobody cares! How can souls in our state and country die in their blind, lost condition without one Free Will Baptist hand knocking on their door inviting them to meet the Savior, Jesus? That is right; you guessed it; Nobody cares!

Paul said, "Timothy will naturally care for your state." Did that mean that Timothy was the only worker that Paul had to call upon? Probably not. But it seemed that all the others must have had a chronic, twentieth century, Free Will Baptist problem. Notice Paul's words in verse 21, "For all seek their own, not the things which are Jesus Christ's." What could be said more or less of all the others except they just did not care. They were too busy to care, too busy doing their own thing to be bothered with the things of Jesus Christ. Men who were supposed to be leaders, lovers of God, yes, even soldiers of the bloodstained cross, but they refused to be bothered with the things of Jesus Christ. How sad! How frightening! How shocking was the apostle's biography of 99 percent of all his workers. Once a man was heard making this statement as a joke, "The average new convert has to backslide three times before he can have fellowship with the average Free Will Baptist church member." Perhaps this should be taken from the joke column and be placed on the realistic column.

The Bible plainly says that we are bought with a price; therefore, we are to glorify God in our bodies and in our spirits, which are God's (1 Corinthians 6:20). Again, in chapter 7, verse 23, Paul said, "Ye are bought with a price; be not ye servants of men." If we have been bought and purchased then we do not even belong to ourselves. We belong to God. How then could we care for the things of ourselves

more than the things of Jesus Christ?

It would appear that the average people which constitute the population of the United States, and, yes, even the whole world, are like the class of people that lived back during a very strange time in history. The last 11 words found in the Book of Judges describes this moment of history by saying, "Every man did that which was right in his own eyes."

For the unsaved to adopt a doctrine of life with this attitude is one thing, but for the so-called Christian to adopt this doctrine of life is quite another. Christians must care! They should be the most caring people in all the world for the things of Jesus Christ. Every thing should take second place to the things of Jesus Christ. What are the things of Jesus Christ? The complete work of the church.

The godly Elijah, while standing on a certain mountain, cried out the message that Christians the world over ought to greatly consider during this contemporary jet age time in which we live: "If Baal is your god then serve him, but if the Lord be thy God, then serve Him." It seems that God is saying through Elijah, "Make up your minds as to what you are going to do." Get off the balance and, if you have chosen God, then act like it by caring for Him and His work."

Today, I believe God is speaking to Free Will Baptists the world over and this is what He is saying, "If I am your God then serve me all the way, all the time. Care for the things of Me. Care for My work, which is the work of the church. But, if your flesh is your god, then serve it, but not under the pretense of Christianity; for then you are just lukewarm and I promise that I will spue thee out of my mouth" (Revelation 3:16.)

WORK AT CAPE GIRARDEAU PROGRESSING by Rev. Bill Adkisson

Looking back, it is almost unbelievable how much has happened in just 17 months at Cape Girardeau. We have moved out of the basement building we had and sold it and have purchased as fine a building as could be found for only \$23,000 and our old property. These facilities can accommodate attendance up to 350.

Our attendance has come from 9 to 99 in 12 months. God has given us some great families who were already saved and were tithing. The church has

been able to assume the pastor's salary.

In April and May we had a family of six saved and added to the church and a mother and her son saved.

We operate a day care center, which has been granted state approval. The "Kiddie Kampus," as it is called, contributes \$150 a month to the church, plus half the phone bill and all the cost of furniture and equipment used in the center. This also helps us in our Sunday school.

Our whole church is praising God for the outstanding leadership and support our State Home Mission Board has contributed to our work at Cape. Without them this work and the program of First FWB Church of Cape Girardeau would have been impossible.


