Howdy Folks!

I call you "folks," for many of the readers of this may possibly be related to me, if not in flesh and blood, by the Spirit of the Living God. I am first a child of God, a born again Christian! I believe Romans 3:23 that all men are sinners, by nature and by practice. I believe that all men (and women) who sin must die to their old nature and put on the new nature of Christ. For sooner or later all of us will die and be judged. Isn't it wonderful that Christ died for all of us, and we have an advocate at His throne? I truly love the Lord!

My grandfather, Rev. Richard Milo Standley, of Cave Springs Association, gave his life for the cause of Christ. He traveled many a mile in a buggy, pulled by a white mule whom he called Maude. He preached in the Missouri and Arkansas lapland: Many Springs, Walnut Grove, Bonds, New Salem, Hideout School House, Corning, and Paragould, Arkansas, to name a few. Many were saved and baptized under his preaching. He and his wife, Caroline Harder, foster daughter of Judge John F. Harder of Many Springs, lived at Couch, Missouri. Some of our family members live in Thayer, Malden, Couch, Springfield, and St. Louis areas. Only three of his family of twelve children are living: my mother and her two brothers. Although many have passed away, the memory of Milo and his words still live, not only in my heart, but in the hearts of his offspring.

Milo Standley was a small man in stature, but big in heart. He was a jovial person because he loved the Lord. One night he was hauling a load of logs and felt the Lord talking to him. It was about midnight and he was singing the song "The Wayfaring Stranger" when he stopped his wagon and prayed and asked God to forgive him for his sins and promised him he would preach. Grandad did just that. I often think of how he traveled in that buggy, singing and not worrying about food or anything for he knew God would provide. He never asked for money, but was given so much love from those with whom he came in contact. He never needed a place to stay, for someone always provided for him. Many love gifts were given him. The church dinners on

school house grounds were wonderful! We lived near West Plains on a farm, and I can still remember my grandad singing, "Precious Name, Oh how sweet!" He got louder as he drew near our home.

He preached one time in a rural school near us, and I, being about ten years old, got tired of the long sermon, and played with my finger in the ink well and giggled and made childish gestures. After the service my grandfather shook me and said, "Don't you know God's business is serious business." My smiles left too, for grandad wasn't smiling. He was serious! That left an impression on my life I have never forgotten. Now, I am a Christian worker and I know it is the best business in this world to be employed by Jesus Christ as His servant.

Memories and incidents would fill this GEM, but on my grandfather's deathbed, I watched and saw and heard as with his last breath he said, "I am spotless!" I know he loved the song "Are you spotless, free from sin?"

Through tracing my ancestors I came in contact with a second cousin who sent me the address of the GEM and I kept asking why there were no Free Will Baptist churches in Iowa. A few weeks later my phone rang and a voice said, "This is Rev. Leland Horton." You can imagine my surprise! I am sure the Lord will bless this couple and their family who have come to Des Moines to establish a Free Will Baptist work for the Lord. It takes time to plant the seeds and let them grow, but some seeds sown produce a bountiful harvest.

Many of my father's family (Asa M. Jones married to Bertha G. Standley) were saved under the preaching of Milo and were baptized as Free Will Baptists. My grandparents, Jim and Arabell Jones lived over 50 years in the West Plains area of Howell County. Some are in this area yet, and some are in the Kansas City vicinity.

Many of Milo's children went to school and to church at the old Bonds Church. They were early pioneers of this church.

My grandparents, Rev. R. Milo and Caroline Standley, and James R. and Laura Bell (Arabell) Jones have gone to claim their crown. The Standleys are buried in the New Salem Cemetery (Salem means peace). The Joneses are buried in the New Hope Cemetery. Isn't it wonderful to know that through Christ we find peace and new hope in the future. My Easter offering is going as a living memorial to my departed loved ones.

FROM THE FILKINS IN IVORY COAST

Excerpts from a recent letter read as follows . . .

It's a beautiful Lord's day in Ivory Coast, and this one finds the Filkins at Doropo with the Mileys, Paynes, Sherwood, and summer missionaries Debra, Elaine, and Susan. After services this morning, a baptism was held in a nearby stream by Dr. Miley for seven converts and it was a privilege to witness this step of faith for these Lobis.

Since our last newsletter, we've completed our final trimester of school. A new outreach program was put in operation during this session and the results were a great blessing. In cooperation with local Christian and Missionary Alliance missionaries in the Bouake area, our students could volunteer to participate in village evangelistic services, youth rallies, and hospital visitation. They gave testimonies, tracts, and presented various musical numbers. Without fail, the students came back rejoicing over the experience of sharing their faith with a pagan world. We feel this has been a great lift for the student morale and the problems we faced during the previous trimester were greatly diminished. Isn't this true of each of us? When we're busy sharing our faith with others we look beyond our problems and live more victorious lives. Praise Him!

This past year has been a rich experience for all of us. Dan and Dave feel they have grown both spiritually and academically. The "things" they may have given up at home have been given back in many other ways. What a privilege it is having Bible classes in high school, taught by experienced missionaries, playing soccer against skilled African teams, learning the language and customs of tribesmen, then helping out on mission stations during breaks. Yes, we praise God for so many blessings this past year and look forward to our second year at Ivory Coast Academy.

We have felt your prayers many times. Please keep us before the Lord as you continue to pray. Thank you for each gift that you have given for this part of the Lord's work. Without you, we could not have come. May God bless each of you and keep our churches on the homefront growing and victorious is our constant prayer.

FROM THE PINKERTONS IN IVORY COAST

Our boys are home from school now for their two months vacation. School starts again in September. They'll not be home again until December, so these days are precious.

Our account is still in the red. You've been so good with your support, and we thank you for helping us. Perhaps soon the balance will be better after all these first time costs are taken care of.

The language is still the major prayer item. We've found the Koulango language to be even harder than French. However, we've been able to have several good laughs with the Africans because of our errors and strange pronunciations.

What is summer missionary work? It is more than a fun-filled adventure for six weeks, more than a

romp to another country. It is toil, sweat and tears. Tears for the lost in whose homes you placed a gospel tract and the results show up on a Tuesday evening for Bible study. Tears for the dirty faced children of the Bible clubs and a little boy tells a missionary child to translate to an American summer missionary, "I like you and glad I got to meet you." And that child has tears in his eyes (also the summer missionary). It is all added joy from our blessed Lord in having a part in His ministry.

Our account has recently gone in the red. The cost of living is very high here in Panama and we would appreciate it very much if you would help us pray about our financial needs.

NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

For the second straight year, an increased interest in the business of the denomination was evidenced when 687 of the registered delegates cast their votes on one particular item facing the convention. Perhaps the interest was gendered because of the 56 positions that had to be filled on boards and commissions in compliance with the body's instructions in 1973 to increase each of the standing boards of the National Association to nine members this year. This was the largest number of vacancies ever to be filled by delegates in a single convention.

In a resolution concerning ministerial discipline, local churches, associations, and state bodies were forewarned that preachers too must come under subjection to discipline when circumstances demand such. Little discussion preceded the approval of this

warning.

The first definite project enroute to the production of a Free Will Baptist Encyclopedia was presented. Next year's goal is the printing of booklet form a brief history of all active state associations. A call was issued for volunteers to form a network of workers across the denomination to facilitate the Historical Commission's goal.

The Treatise reference, "Most associations do not ordain women to the ministry," was deleted in deference to a motion from the Kentucky State Association tabled last year. This clause had been interpreted as officially approving the ordination of women to the ministry. The concensus was that if a stronger statement was not going to be made, the deletion of the sentence would satisfy those on both sides of the discussion.

The total budget adopted by the National Convention for the next fiscal year surpassed the \$4 million mark for the first time. Included in the \$4,590,000.00 budget are operating budgets exceeding \$1 million for three departments. They are the Sunday School Department, Foreign Missions Department, and Free Will Baptist Bible College.

All cooperative funds for the next year are to be distributed on a national level in the following manner after the portion of the Executive Office budget above direct gifts is underwritten: CTS—13%; Board of Retirement and Insurance—13%; Layman's Board—3.5% and Commission on Theological Liberalism—.5%. The remaining 70% is to be allocated on a percentage basis to Free Will Baptist Bible College, National Home Missions and National Foreign Missions. Currently this breakdown is Free Will Baptist Bible College 37.3%, Foreign Missions 36.8% and Home Missions 25.9%.



We attended the 38th Annual Convention of the National Free Will Baptist Association on July 14-18, in Wichita, Kansas. Several special singing groups and choirs rendered the gospel in song throughout the convention. Powerful gospel preaching proceeded from God's messengers, T. S. Randal, Rue Dell Smith, Dan Merkh, Leroy Forlines, Raymond Riggs, and Melvin Worthington. Thus the business sessions were harmonious. There was a real good response in the missionary offering Wednesday night. Souls were saved in the altar service. Others responded to the missionary call. All in all, this was a great meeting.

Cave Springs annual Association assembled with Cotton Creek Church July 26-27. Twenty-two churches were represented with letters and delegates. Ministers sharing the preaching hour Friday were D. Strain and Brother Hollis. Saturday preaching was done by D. Skiles and J. Reed. I gave Missouri Cooperative Program and some purchased Bibles from our portable Lebanon Bible stand.

We enjoyed a great service Sunday, July 28, in Thayer Church. We participated with Pastor Hill and one former pastor, Rev. Johnson, in the 20th anniversary service with an overflow crowd present. Rev. Keith Johnson, who was the first pastor for one year, delivered the anniversary sermon. We helped organize Thayer Church and pastored there five years, 1955 through 1960. The original sanctuary was constructed and furnished in those years. In recent months the building has been enlarged and furnished and an educational building and baptistry have been constructed. We have a good church plant plus a fine Christian congregation there. Thayer Church supports Missouri Cooperative Plan consistently. OVER-FLOW CROWDS ATTEND STATE ASSOCIATION

The First FWB Church of Flat River did an extremely good job of hosting the Missouri State Association last month, especially in light of the over-flow crowds that attended the three nightly services of the convention.

An estimated 600-700 persons were in attendance in three different services of the State Meeting. More than 150 were turned away from the packed auditorium on Wednesday night to view the services via closed circuit TV in the basement. As a result of the crowded conditions, the body passed a resolution that in the future the state association be invited on a district level, rather than by a local church, and that an air conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of at least 500 be provided for the nightly services. Since not more than a half dozen churches in the Missouri State Association have that large a seating capacity, it will necessitate the use of civic auditoriums in some cases.

LOUIS AND MIRIAM WILLHITE RECEIVE SUNDAY SCHOOL AWARDS

The State Sunday School—CTS Board has begun the policy of honoring the Sunday school superintendent and Sunday school teacher of the year at the annual state convention. Recipients are chosen from written nominations submitted by their pastors. This year's Sunday school superintendent to receive the award was Mr. Louis Willhite, of the Fourth FWB Church in St. Louis.

Part of the tribute paid to Brother Willhite read, "For over sixteen years Mr. Willhite has faithfully served Christ in Fourth FWB Church. His life has been a Christian example of the highest order. In his home, church, and social life he maintains a constant witness for Christ in faith, doctrine, and practice of life."

The 1975 session will convene on the same date as in the past, August 18-21, at the First FWB Church of Thayer.


