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A Tribute to Brother Beatty

"Today I'm going to give a hallelujah report . . . "
What Free Will Baptist in Missouri has not heard
those words from Brother Beatty? Promotional
Secretary for the Missouri State Association since
1961, Rev. Harry Beatty leaves the office this
month. But his hallelujah reports will long be
remembered.

Not many folks can take a dry statistical report and make it "preach," but Brother Beatty's lively, enthusiastic accounting of the state cooperative plan has brought many a quarterly meeting and state association alive. It usually went something like

"So, for those \$4,000 over our budget, the Lord gets four hallelujahs. Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah! And for the \$2,000 we gave over the foreign missions suggested quota, the Lord gets two 'praise the Lords.'"

And so it has gone, up and down, back and forth across the state of Missouri for the past 14 years with nearly a half a million miles of driving. Dropping in on a pastor friend tonight. A lonely motel the night before. An all day meeting with dinner on the grounds today. A long drive home into the wee hours of the morning. Tomorrow it's half a day in the office, then back on the road again—all in behalf of his beloved Free Will Baptist denomination and for the glory of his precious Lord Jesus!

Brother Beatty's ministry began in the Thayer, Missouri, area when he was saved at age 19 and called to preach the same night. His first three pastorates were at Rose Hill, Cane Hill, and Pleasant Hill Free Will Baptist churches. He pastored the Myrtle Free Will Baptist Church two different times for a total of 14 years.

Brother Beatty has always had a missionary heart. Two of his pastorates have been new works which he organized. They are Garfield and Thayer. He also pastored Norman, Royal Oaks, Walnut Grove, and Clifton churches on a parttime basis.

It was while he was pastoring at Shiloh that the Lord gave Brother Beatty his helpmeet, Lucille. And what a helpmeet she has been! She has for many years been active in the state woman's auxiliary work, serving about every office in the organization at one time or another.

"Cille," as Brother Beatty affectionately calls her, has, like many pastors' wives, worked at public work

to supplement church salaries. A skillful beautician, Mrs. Beatty has always enhanced her husband's ministry by her attractive personality and sweet Christian spirit.

Until 1947, Brother Beatty's pastorates were all parttime works. He also worked with his father on his 500-acre farm operation. When asked recently if there was anything about his ministry that he would change if he had it to live over, Brother Beatty replied, "Yes, I would have given full time to the ministry from the beginning."

In 1947 he did go full time as he began pastoring the Fredericktown Church. Later, he pastored the Thayer Church, and two Oklahoma churches: Drumright and Bartlesville.


The summer of 1944 is still vivid in Brother Beatty's recollection as perhaps the highlight of his ministry. That summer he helped conduct three revival meetings and saw a total of 100 conversions. Only God knows for sure how many souls have been born again, how many backsliders have been reclaimed, and how many Christians have been encouraged to keep on living for the Lord as a result of Brother Beatty's life; but, surely, the devil has suffered many a bruise as a result of the life of this man of God.

It was October, 1961, when Brother Beatty became the promotional secretary of the Missouri State Association. He was the first man to be elected to that office. During his years in that position, Missouri has led all the other states in national cooperative giving most of that time.

Asked what changes he has seen in Missouri Free Will Baptists during his ministry, Brother Beatty replied, "Things are 100 times better now than 40 years ago, especially as it relates to tithing, missions, etc."

He has visited all 145 Free Will Baptist churches in the state (with the possible exception of some very new ones), he has provided the leadership Missouri State Association needed in his hour, and he has set before those who follow a worthy example as a man of the cloth.

We'll miss your Hallelujah Reports, Brother Beatty, but we have no doubt that there is going to be a greater Hallelujah Report some of these days around the throne of God where hundreds that you pointed to Christ will be praising the matchless name of the one you served faithfully here.



While I was growing up, my family sang in churches and went to Sunday school sporadically. I heard and understood the bare basics of salvation and even seriously considered accepting Christ and being baptized, but I was encouraged not to until I was older. One night when I was sixteen I dreamed that Christ had returned to earth. I didn't understand much about eschatology then, but He was in the air and people were rising to meet him. I could see His head but was terrified of seeing His features. I felt I would die if I saw His face. It was the most terrifying dream I've ever had. When I awoke, I prayed and asked Christ to forgive my many sins, enter my heart to live, and teach me everything possible about Him. Since I had been taught that churches were mainly social institutions, I did not start attending a church until almost a year later. I did read the Bible faithfully.

During the following summer, Lila (Hiatt) Thompson and Roberta (Dabney) England came with Rev. Andy Lay to invite me to a young people's camp-out on the Cheriton River. During this time I was very impressed with the sincerity of the kids and also the singing. After this time, two families of the church (First Free Will Baptist in Kirksville, Missouri) "adopted" me. The Howard Filkins and the Andy Lays helped and encouraged me to grow in the Lord. The Filkins took me to Bible Conference at Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee, the spring I was to graduate from high school. I had already attended two universities during summers but was quite unprepared for this experience. After this visit and much prayer, I determined in my heart to go to Bible College.

I worked in a factory and sold Avon the following year, saving every penny possible. In 1968 I entered Bible College in Nashville. During my four years there the Lord supplied my financial, educational, and spiritual needs in many different ways. I graduated from FWBBC in 1972 with a BA in Bible and music.

The BA degree requires two years of a class in a foreign language. I tried so hard to get into Greek class but my "schedule" (it was really the Lord) would not allow it. In my junior year I got stuck

and had to take Spanish. Mr. Jerry Griffith was teaching his first year of Spanish. Though I entered the class with less than an enthusiastic attitude, the Lord blessed me in that class. The class itself was a spiritual blessing, plus the Lord spoke to my heart, even through the homework, about working with Spanish speaking people.

I tried to go to Mexico that Christmas vacation under Operation Mobilization, but I could not read the required books before time to leave. The following year, six other girls and I went to Mexico on our own. We held services almost nightly, singing and giving testimonies in broken Spanish or in English for Brother Dave Cochran to translate.

I applied to Free Will Baptist Home Missions that spring and was tentatively approved. In the spring of 1974 I was still tentatively approved and teaching in a Christian school in Nashville. The Lord's voice had not diminished, yet the Board had serious doubts about sending a single girl to Mexico, especially since the door to Mexican missionaries is closing so rapidly. So, they did not send me.

After much prayer and discussion with missionaries, I applied to Rio Grande Spanish Language Institute in Edinburg, Texas. I saved all the money I could that spring and summer. Because of the highly condensed course of study, the school does not want the students working while studying. The Lord is now supplying my needs day by day. It is a bit nerve-racking but exciting to see the Lord working to give me what I need.

First semester I helped in the music department of the Spanish Bible Institute here. I not only learned Spanish doing this, but I also got my initiation to the Latin culture. It is quite different from ours, but not worse. Our culture is not better, just different. Music plays an important role, I feel, in the Latin culture too.

It is very dangerous for girls, regardless of age, to live by themselves in Latin America. The tourist visa is now only for one month to three, so it is difficult for missionaries to work in Mexico.

Plans are still uncertain, but it seems the Lord is working these two problems out for me. Next year I am planning to teach second or third grade and music in a Christian school in Guadalajara, Mexico. The school will get me legal work papers from the government. I will also have classes in the Free Will Baptist church in piano, songleading, guitar, Bible clubs, and anything else I can do. I will live in the same block as the missionaries I will be working with: Rev. and Mrs. Jerry Barron. I cannot say how much their encouragement has meant to me.

The necessity of having prayer support is one of those things in life that cannot be properly explained. I have felt the desperate need this year as never before. Not only do missionaries really need prayer support, they need the emotional encouragement that comes from knowing that others are interceding for them.

Pray for me that God will use my life to His glory.

"VICTORY NIGHT" SOUTH SIDE FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH by Bob Frances

On Friday night, March 21, 1975, the members of the South Side Free Will Baptist Church gathered to burn the mortgage on the church. This night was referred to as VICTORY NIGHT. The actual mortgage burning ceremony was preceded by a huge meal in the basement of the church and followed by a time of singspiration.

A small group of people with God's help bought our present church building in 1951 moving from a location on Idaho street.

The first payment was made in August, 1951. Two years later, April, 1953, the W. C. Hill Building was bought. The church used this property for the parsonage and additional rooms. Then in May, 1959, the church bought a four-family flat. At this time all loans were combined to one loan and a mortgage was given on all three pieces of property.

During the time we have had the loans, our pastors and members have worked hard. Our pastors, Hill, Franklin, Hales, Reeds, McFarland, Evans, Wagner, and Francis kept as our goal "the Lord first" realizing that material needs would follow.

During the property loans, four men have served as treasurers. They were: Mr. McGraw, Mr. Snell, Mr. Britton, and Mr. Cruse. The time involved in paying off the mortgage was 23 years and 8 months with a total of 284 checks being written. The first check for \$120.00 was written in May, 1951, and the last check was written in February, 1975, for \$336.14. In one of the above pictures you can see all of the checks displayed. If each check was laid end to end, they would extend 189 feet 4 inches. Assuming you can write a check, bring the balance up, and have it ready for the mail in two minutes, you would have 9¼ hours work in these 284 checks.

In the accompanying pictures you will note Mr. Cruse blowing out 23 candles on a cake representing the 23 years of the loan, and you will also see Pastor Bob Francis burning the mortgage. As this was being done, the remark was made that this is not the end

but just the BEGINNING of greater things for Christ at South Side. To God be the glory for great things He has done.

JOINT BAPTISMAL SERVICE

REEDS RECEIVED DOCTORATE

MISSOURI RANKS SECOND IN 1974 COOP GIVING

Missouri Free Will Baptists ranked second in 1974 in giving to the Cooperative Plan of the National Association of Free Will Baptists both in total dollars and per capita giving. During 1974 the state's total Cooperative Giving was \$35,688.78. Based on the 1974 statistical records this is \$2.42 per member. This per capita amount was surpassed only by FWB in Illinois and Arizona who tied for the number one place with an average of \$2.83 per member in 1974.

Oklahoma FWB for the first time in 1974 replaced the state of Missouri as the largest contributor to the Cooperative Plan in the amount of dollars. They gave a total of \$39,909.04; however, their per capita giving was only \$1.98.

The Cooperative Plan is a channel of stewardship whereby local churches can respond to various state and national ministries. It is an expression of cooperation which manifests a unity of purpose. The Cooperative Plan links the individual believer in a common fellowship of sharing in the total ministry of the church.

NEW PUBLICATIONS FROM CTS

The National CTS Department announced the publication of three new training courses: The Ministry of Music, a thirteen-week course for the untrained song leader, prospective song leader, the volunteer choir, or as a refresher course for present song leaders and singers. Teacher In Training, a thirteen-week course for potential teachers and/or a

Twenty-two churches of Cave Springs district assembled with Garfield Church on Saturday, April 5. They received the Poplar Bluff Mission by petitionary letter into their fellowship. Some of their churches contribute to this mission. They also licensed one minister. I gave the Missouri cooperative report with commendations. Forty-three percent of their churches give to this program. Some purchased Bibles from our portable book stand. The pulpit committee selected Rev. D. Strain and Rev. H. Bowers to share the preaching hour.

That same afternoon I participated in the laying of the cornerstone for Cabool's new two-story brick church located where the original one stood. Pastor Max Courtney, several former pastors, other local ministers, laymen, and the entire church shared this service. The trustees and deacons placed the large cornerstone in proper place, thus completing their

building. They began a revival Sunday night with Brother James McAllister.

We enjoyed another good service with the Houston Church on Sunday evening. I preached the evening message and gave commendations for their cooperative participation in the Missouri state program. Pastor Elmer Turnbough reports that they have several new people in their congregation since he assumed pastoral duties there a year ago. Houston, Cabool, and Union churches all support the cooperative program faithfully.

More than 100 youth from eight churches in the St. Louis area participated in the various CTS competitive activities run-offs on Saturday, April 19, at the Fourth Church. The winners will repre-

sent the district in the state competition.

I was privileged to bring the message at the Berkeley FWB Church in the absence of Pastor Burton who was away conducting a revival meeting. We had a real good service with large attendance in both Sunday school and church. Berkeley church is one of our largest churches in Missouri and also one of the best supporters of every phase of our state denominational work.

Rev. Gene McCulley has started a work recently in St. Charles, Missouri. Freedom FWB Mission is located at the corner of Trendley and Cunningham streets. I was privileged to bring the message there on Sunday evening. About 40 people were in attendance.

Thirteen churches plus Freedom Mission were represented with letters and delegates in St. Louis District Quarterly Meeting on Saturday, April 26, held with the O'Fallon Church. Rev. Sasser preached the 11:00 a.m. sermon. I gave the cooperative report. Seventy-seven percent of their churches support consistently. Commendations to Pastor Stanley Jones and Hartville Church. Their church adopted the Cooperative Plan of Support and sent two checks within

the month of April.

Fifty-seven contributions total \$7,584.55 during the month. Thanks brethren. This is good. We are about \$3,000 under projected schedule, but we can make it yet by June 30, provided every individual responds as we Free Will Baptists are capable of

doing. Let's cease saying as Gideon of old, "We are poor and of the least of the tribes of the Lord." Rather let us go in the strength of the Lord and accept the challenge of the Joshua and Calebs, "Go forward and possess the mountains and the valleys too, for the Lord." Maranatha!


