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A Tribute to the Free Will Baptist

In beginning this writing on the growth of our Missouri state monthly periodical, the GEM, I trust our readers everywhere will hearken to the many facts I have gathered in the reading of almost 300 former copies.

I had said I would write a history; but, since I do not have all the former copies, I will strive to put forth an enlightening picture to our people of this most important newsletter.

There will be items of interest taken from early editions of the GEM. They will not always be in order chronologically, but they will be of benefit to GEM readers everywhere.

If our readers missed the August, 1972, issue, they missed a most complete "History of the GEM," written by Dr. Robert E. Picirilli of our Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee. With the help of many, he has obtained every issue of our GEM except one. His writing of the historic facts of the GEM was exceptionally good. (Note: anyone desiring a copy of Brother Picirilli's article may have one by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to me at 8528 Palmetto Dr., Affton, MO 63123.)

Since I did not have the complete list of all editors who have served in making the GEM what it is today, I will copy these names from Brother Picirilli's history to be used as information:

Rev. B. F. Brown, January, 1929—June, 1939 Rev. John Rollens, July, 1939—January, 1944

Rev. C. B. Dees, February, 1944—April, 1946 Rev. B. F. Brown, December, 1946—August, 1947 GEM

Rev. Winford Davis, October, 1947—December, 1949 Rev. Lloyd Jeffries, December, 1949—June, 1955 Rev. Eunice Edwards, October, 1955—August, 1956 Rev. Albert Halbrook, September, 1956—August, 1959

Rev. Roger Reeds, September, 1959—June, 1962 Rev. Bud Hill, July, 1962—September, 1969 Rev. Alton Loveless, October, 1969—September,

Rev. Eddie Altis, October, 1970—September, 1972 Rev. Andy Lay, October, 1972—present

Each and every one of these was indeed a dedicated, Spirit-filled, ordained minister of the gospel, using his talents in editing this most important denominational newsletter.

News for printing came from several states in the early years: Arkansas, Kansas, Texas, Tennessee, Michigan, as well as Missouri. News of yearly meetings, state meetings, and news of our Free Will Baptist churches was news of interest to our readers.

To correct an earlier error, the size of the first GEM was the same as the present, but the cost was

\$1.00, instead of the present \$2.00.

There have been many, many good gospel messages by our ministers printed through the years. Some of the editorials were as messages from God's Word. We, of our state, can give thanks for each of our editors.

In the November, 1929, issue, Rev. B. F. Brown, in his editorial, wrote of "Man's Unerring Guide and Critic." He said,

The Bible is the only holy book in the world, being the message of the Creator, and should be guarded with jealous care, studied with diligence, and proclaimed to all mankind. We have newspapers, magazines, and books without number, all devoted to telling what the world is thinking and doing. Yet, we cannot know human life until we know what God says about it in the Bible.

Thank God for our Christian publications, enabling us to discern the "signs of the times." And thank God for our editors of the GEM. In getting the news that is sent in by our people, editing it, and getting it ready in time for publication, they have produced a real good Christian news magazine, written by Free Will Baptists, for Free Will Baptists everywhere. I am sure our readers everywhere can say, "It is the most looked for newsletter I have ever subscribed for."

If you are not a subscriber at present, then by all means, become one. As a member of the church, it is your duty to be a live member. Can you be a real live member of our denomination and not take the GEM?

In 1948 the "Every Church Family Plan" of subscriptions was begun. I believe the Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church of Flat River, Missouri, was the first church to begin this plan. It was called "the ideal plan" by Rev. Winford Davis, editor at that time. It was recommended by the Publications Committee at the 22nd annual setting of the Missouri State Association which met near Kirksville.

This plan was for the many members of the local churches who could not afford it, or would otherwise not receive the GEM. It consists of the local church paying from the church treasury the subscription price for each member.

Let me recommend this to all the churches that do not now have this plan in action. I believe that every member would benefit in keeping up to date in the many phases of our state and national work.

I am enclosing two pictures I took in the spring of 1954 while visiting the Rev. Lloyd Jeffries, GEM editor. It was taken at the GEM office and printing establishment located in Monett, Missouri.

May God bless our readers everywhere.

JOPLIN FIRST CHURCH GROWING

Pastor N. R. Smith writes, "In the months of June and July we received 15 new members, baptized ten, and have witnessed a number of people saved and several others rededicating their lives. "On Sunday night, August 10, our church surprised Cathern and me with a 25th Wedding Anniversary reception. After evening worship, the pastor started through the fellowship hall to his study and to his surprise, when he walked into the darkened area, he saw the candles burning around the cake. One hundred of the church folks were waiting to surprise their pastor and his wife. We were very appreciative of the thought that went into the reception, the cake, and the gifts we received."

State Association Report

BROTHER AND SISTER BEATTY HONORED

Retiring promotional secretary, Rev. Harry Beatty and his wife, Lucille, were honored last month in the Wednesday night service of the State Association at West Plains. They were presented a book of letters of appreciation from pastors in the state, an engraved plaque as a reminder of the dates of Brother Beatty's service as promotional secretary, and 41 feet and 6 inches of checks representing love offerings from more than 55 churches. The total amount of the retirement gift was \$2,500.00

The Beattys' two sons, Kenneth from Oklahoma and Gordon from Florida, surprised their parents by arriving in West Plains in time for the service, unannounced. The four Beattys treated the State Association to two gospel songs during the reception following the evening service.

After the presentations were made Brother Beatty said, "We are retiring so far as the promotional work is concerned, but so far as the ministry is concerned, we'll not stop until we go beneath the clay." Mrs. Beatty scolded the FWB women in the state saying, "You all have spoiled my husband." She jokingly said Brother Beatty was harder to live with after being treated so cordially in his travels. But on the serious side she said she would be glad to have him home more.

Nearly 500 people attended the reception in honor of the man one pastor referred to as "Mr. Free Will Baptist" in the State of Missouri. No doubt all would agree that the plaque presented Brother Beatty summed up his ministry in one word: FAITHFUL.

BUSINESS

State Association business went smoothly, demonstrating a growing maturity among Missouri

Free Will Baptists.

A Board of Christian Education was created to follow up the work of the College Commission which has been in existence for the past three years. The primary function of the new board will be the oversight of the Missouri Bible Institutes in the state. Members of the board are Millard Sasser, chairman, Dennis Bowman, secretary/treasurer, Howard Bowers, R. B. Spurgeon, and Andy Lay.

The State's by-laws were officially changed to accommodate the change in time of meeting of the State Association to the first week of June. The change will take effect next year when the association will convene June 8-10 at the Trinity FWB Church in Bridgeton. The 1977 session will meet in the Kansas City area.

RESOLUTIONS

An anti-abortion resolution was passed unanimously as was a pro-capital punishment statement. The Women's Lib movement was deemed "contrary to Scriptural teachings" in a third resolution.

The State Association voted to continue membership in the National Association of Evangelicals upon the recommendation of the representatives who attended the 1974 NAE convention. The NAE report stated that the preaching at the NAE convention was "powerful, moving, evangelistic, and practical." The business sessions were described as "as open...as one of our state associations." The benefits Missouri Free Will Baptists stand to derive from NAE membership were outlined as follows:

- 1) Assistance in understanding the issues and legalities involved in higher education and Christian Day Schools.
 - 2) Help in training for evangelism.
- 3) An outlet for New Testament type social action.
- 4) Access to the national political scenes that we could not have as a separate unit.
- 5) An avenue of active involvement in opposing the increase of liberalism.

In a note of warning the committee reported, "The historical and first hand evidence indicates that any organization designed for promoting truth and righteousness, unless carefully attended, will often turn in the opposite direction. With this in mind, we as Missouri Free Will Baptists need to keep a close and constant surveillance of the philosophy and direction NAE travels."

Four ministers were nominated for NAE Commissions; our promotional secretary, Rev. Clarence Burton was nominated to the NAE Executive Committee, and, as last year, money was budgeted from the State General Fund for a contribution to NAE.

ELECTIONS

Jim McAllister and Bill Evans were reelected as moderator and assistant moderator. Roger Harwell was elected clerk; N. R. Smith, assistant clerk. Elected to the general board were: James Reed, Max Courtney, Len Gardner, Fletcher Riley, Vernon Maggart, Glen Rehkop, Charlie Hoover, Cecil Campbell, and Murry Southwell.

New members of the Youth Camp Board are Keith Johnson and Charles Miller. New members of the Sunday school—CTS Board are Dale Smith and Kent Tallent.

The newly elected executive committee of the general board are: Jim McAllister, Bill Evans, Roger Harwell, Glen Rehkop, Cliff Bowman, Millard Sasser, and Dale Smith.

BUDGET

A 70,000 dollar budget was adopted by the body for the State Cooperative plan for the nine month year (due to the new fiscal year ending March 31). Fifty-two percent of the co-op money will stay in the state while forty-eight percent will go toward the support of regional and national ministries.

AWARDS

The State Youth Camp board presented a plaque to the First FWB Church of Mountain Grove for the most money given to the Youth Camp. Lynn Wood is the pastor of that church.

The State Home Missions board presented three plaques: highest per capita giving award went to the Olivett FWB Church in Marshall where Cliff Bowman is the pastor; the most-money-given plaque went to Victory FWB Church in Kansas City where Lawrence Thompson is pastor; and the most money given to the perpetual loan fund was from the Olivett FWB Church Woman's Auxiliary.

The State Sunday school-CTS Board honored Bob Clay as the superintendent-of-the-year. Mr. Clay is Sunday school superintendent of the First FWB Church of Farmington.

Every comment heard by this editor in reference to this year's state association was a positive one. The spirit of the services was good. The preaching was good. The attendance was good. The accommodations were good. (Much credit is due Pastor Dale Skiles and the First FWB Church of West Plains.) We will have more about the state association next month.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION STAND ON OFFENSIVE TELEVISION PROGRAMMING

The following resolution was adopted by the National Association in Dayton in July, "Whereas, the gross moral depravity portrayed in many TV programs is utterly degrading and lacking in redeeming social values; and whereas filthy language. rape scenes, and murders occur with disgusting regularity on TV; and whereas there is now evidence for a causal link between watching TV violence and subsequent aggressive behavior by the viewer; BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED: that the National Association of Free Will Baptists hereby express its firm conviction that television programs which degrade sex, glorify violence and deny moral decency have no place on the airwaves. We strongly oppose programming which undermines the moral values and ideals of our great nation. We urge all FWB members to enthusiastically express appreciation to producers, networks, and sponsors for morally wholesome TV programs. And we call upon FWB members to vigorously oppose the showing of offensive movies on TV through letter writing to the Federal Communications Commission, legislators, local station managers and sponsors, and through selective buying practices and selective viewing."

FROM FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

Missourians gave \$1,374.25 to the Bible College in July. The largest single gift came from the First FWB Church of Farmington: \$192.84.

The school announces plans for the annual Pastor's Conference to be held this year November 3-6. Seminars on preaching, public service, promotion and publicity, church outreach and issues will highlight the conference.

One of the featured speakers will be Dr. John Rawlings, pastor of the Landmark Baptist Temple, Cincinnati, Ohio. Other seminar participants will be Rev. James Murray, Rev. Billy Morris, Rev. Dale Burden, Mr. Jim Bowman, Rev. Irvin Hyman, Rev. Dennis Wiggs, Rev. Guy Owens, Rev. Frank Davenport, Rev. Randy Cox, Rev. Dave Joslin, Rev. Tom Malone, Rev. Leroy Welch, Rev. Luther Gibson, Rev. Keith Kenemer, and Rev. James McAllister, our own state moderator from Missouri.

The college is providing meals and lodging on campus for pastors for \$15. Reservations must be made in advance.

We surely appreciate the very fine work Brother Beatty has done and we pray we shall continue to build on his labor. May the Lord continue to bless


this fine servant.

"Do you remember, when Jesus was sitting with His disciples at the Last Supper, how He lifted up His voice and prayed, and in the midst of His prayer there came these wondrous words: 'For their sakes I sanctify myself, that they also might be sanctified'?

"Is there anything in all the teachings that man has had from the lips of God that is nobler, that is more far-reaching than that—to be my best not simply for my own sake, but for the sake of the world? You can help your fellowmen—you must help your fellowmen; but the only way you can help them is by being the noblest and the best man that is possible for you to be."

A preacher friend of mine once told of a missionary that God had called to work in Indonesia. He was a fellow Christian, a good devoted man, except for one thing—he had a known sin in his life.

Now this man had sin in his life, and probably the only two who knew about it were himself and God. But like so many professing Christians today he didn't feel the need to set himself right with God. Most likely he thought no one else would ever find out, so he could take his time about going to the Lord with his shortcoming. But as he entered his first church in that foreign country, he was heading for an open shame.

What he hadn't taken into consideration was, that maybe, just maybe, someone else could tell that he had sin in his life. This was just the case, and still is

the case in Indonesia.

The missionary, who was probably "God Called," entered the Indonesian church, showing himself as a devoted Christian, giving as a testimony that he was there to preach the word of God, to lead people to Jesus, and show them the Christian way to live. He walked up to the minister of that church, shook his hand, and met him as one Christian meeting another. He then waited to be introduced to the congregation.

The minister introduced him very politely and in a friendly manner, then, he proceeded to tell the congregation that this missionary that he had just introduced, who was there as an example of Christ,

had a known sin in his life.

Well, this was surely a shock to the missionary, but he was probably already thinking of a way out of this accusation. To cut his victory short the minister went on to tell the congregation exactly what the sin was and that he thought the missionary should get himself right with Christ.

Now you say to yourself that this is impossible; but, believe it or not, it is a true story. It seems that most of the men that are native to that country, who have been saved, and are called to the ministry, have a gift of like manner. (The main gift, I believe,

is their God given faith.)

As Jesus said in Matthew 17:20—"If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you."

We see here in the above story two different directions for a Christian life. The life that has its foundation built on sand, and the life that has its foundation built on solid rock, (Jesus Christ).

The missionary was actually on a downward path from Christ, on life's sinking sand. Why? Because of five immediate things which the worldly would do.

First, he had sin in his life. Now many Christians and some ministers that I've met (I'm sorry to say for their sakes), don't believe that one sin will send them to hell. But let us take a look at the word of God for the true answer to this. If we can't take the word of God to mean exactly what it says, every word, then why take it at all? God's word is literal and final, even as the Bible is described in the Free Will Baptist Treatise—"The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice."

Now from God's own word comes the answer to the question, Will one sin make you fall from grace?

Second Corinthians 5:10 says, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad."

And Ecclesiastes 12:14 says: "For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil."

So through God's word we see we will be judged of everything, whether it is good or bad. We could quote many verses pertaining to this, but as Christians we all need to study this subject and be sure in our own hearts, just where we are headed.

We can see a few examples of what one sin can do by just glancing at a few *true* stories in the Bible. Such as, why didn't Moses, God's chosen man in Old Testament times, get to go on into the "Promised Land"? The answer is simple, because at one time, he didn't sanctify the Lord before his people.

Why did the people tie bells and a rope around the priests before they went into the innermost part of the Tabernacle? Because if the priest had any sin at all in his life, then God would strike him dead when he entered. So when the bells stopped ringing, he was considered dead and pulled out by ropes. If God couldn't look at His own Son when he was on the cross, (because it stood for sin), then how much more must it disgust Him when a mere mortal man has sin in his life, and he arrogantly comes before the Almighty God thinking he has hidden it from Him? This ought to tell each and every one of us something.

Then finally in Acts chapter five, why did Ananias and his wife Sapphira both die? Because, as Peter said, they had lied unto God. Oh, it was just a little lie, but they received their reward. I wonder where they are now?

So, we have seen one of the missionary's down-

ward steps because of his one sin.

His second step was that he thought he could deceive others. This is a striking resemblance to Ananias and Sapphira. Just as Peter knew of their sin, so the Indonesian preacher knew of the missionary's sin. God does not let sin go unnoticed in anyone's life.

Thirdly, he thought that he could cover up his sin before God, and in this action he was almost putting himself on the same pedestal as the devil did when he said in his heart "I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God." Isaiah 14:13.

In other words the missionary thought he could outdo God and stay one step ahead of Him until he himself was ready to make things right, which brings us directly to his fourth downward step.

He was telling himself that he had plenty of time in which to be repentant of his wrong. But once again we go to God's word in Proverbs 27:1 which says: "Boast not thyself of to morrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring."

We see here, God telling us that "now is the accepted time." He should not have waited, and neither should we if we know the wise thing to do, which is to be clean before God.

Finally, when he had all these other things behind him, he did the worst thing yet, he put off asking for the help of Christ. Many Christians think that it is a disgrace for them, once they have accepted Christ, to ever get on their knees and ask Jesus to help them overcome their weaknesses, or to forgive them for their human sins. But it is not!!! Even Paul said, "I die daily." Paul knew he had weaknesses, and he knew the only way to overcome them was to die daily, (in Christ), to submit himself to Christ, and ask for help in his weakness and his temptations.

This is one of the main troubles with Christianity today. Just as the missionary wanted to see souls won to Christ, so is the thought of all Christians. But how many of us, brothers and sisters, are completely like the missionary? How many of us want to lead souls to Christ, and want to see them, once they are saved, grow in Christ? How many of us want to be examples for them? Before we want these things, we had better want ourselves clean and perfect before an all-wise God.

We can never do God's work with a shadow on our own testimony. We ourselves need to be in God's perfect grace before we can see the fruits of our labor come into being.

We all want revival, and praise God for revival!!! But we can't really have a true revival until we begin with ourselves. Our hearts need revival first, then our family and church. With these in tune to God's will, we can branch out in our town, state, country, and world. Praise God!!!

Let us all endeavor as one big family (God's family), to do the perfect will of God. God will win in the end, but, won't it be wonderful, if we're all on His side?
