



Brother Burton asked me to write an article about my life as a pastor's wife. Time and space will not permit me to go into details so I will just recall some of my most memorable experiences.

We were saved just a short while and Cliff answered the call to preach. The evening he came home and said, "Frances, I'm going to preach tonight," did not make me aware that this was the beginning of a completely new life. Soon I was to become a pastor's wife.

The first job I remember was time-keeper. Cliff asked me to signal him at the end of thirty minutes. He was to start giving the invitation when I gave him the signal. I don't believe he was ever convinced that he had only preached seven minutes, and that included the invitation.

It seemed so easy for Cliff to dedicate his life to Christ. But, I was a stubborn, self-willed person. who, like Jacob, spent many nights wrestling with the Lord.

It didn't take long to find out that a preacher is a marked man and a preacher's wife is a marked woman. People watched the way we dressed, the way we handled our children, and the way we kept the parsonage. It seemed everyone's eyes were upon me. I really wanted to be a good preacher's wife but so often I forgot to pray about these things. Finally, one day the Lord spoke to my heart and said, "You please me, and you won't have to worry about the way you do things—I'll help you please the people."

The pastor's study has always been in our home and it is easy to remember the lonely hours while Cliff studied. I can still hear him say, "Frances, be still. I'm studying." What a blessing it was when my stubborn will was broken and I said, "Lord, he is not mine anymore—he belongs to you also." And then I also said, "Lord, here is my little boy . . . and please, Lord, try to do something with me." I soon found so many things to do I would almost wish Cliff could find more time to study.

God was not only good in letting me be a pastor's wife—He let me be a mother. Like every pastor's wife, I have felt the need to be both mamma and daddy, when the pastor was away doing the Lord's work. I laugh when I remember our children longed for the day they would be fourteen so they could go with us as we visited in the hospital, rather than sit alone in the waiting room. But they understood. I remember also the many times we would plan for an evening with the children and the phone would ring—someone needed us and we would go. So many times my heart has been broken because some people expect so much of the preacher's children and often times the people cared so little for them. But we always taught our children how much God loved them and what a privilege it is to serve Him. I am thankful that neither of them, Kathy nor Dennis, have resented being a part of a busy pastor's family. Our son announced his call to the ministry at the age of twelve and has been involved in the Lord's work through the years. Kathy dreams of the day God will give her a preacher husband, just like dad. But, she said, "Mama, they don't make men like dad anymore." We always found God's grace sufficient in bringing up our children.

As a pastor's wife, Hebrews 13:2 has meant much to me. "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." It makes me happy to share what I have with others. I have always felt our home belonged to the Lord. It has always been fun to never know who would be at the table for the next meal. The Lord always provided food. I appreciated the kind remarks by someone such as Greg McAllister who thought I could cook the best grilled cheese sandwiches in the

world. I have always loved the church and the need to be

faithful. I always tell our ladies that there is one job I do in the church that I refuse to let anyone else do—be the pastor's wife. I am glad to be a pastor's

wife.

Every morning as I awake I ask God to help me throughout the day. I remember one morning the doorbell rang and it was a young couple about ready to separate. Cliff was at the hospital. I was glad that I could tell them that God loved them and He has the answer to every problem. That afternoon a funeral was held for one of our loved ones and that night we shared the happiness of a bride and groom as they began life's road together. This along with cooking, cleaning, washing, and visitation is an average day for a pastor's wife. However, every day is a new day with new experiences and joys.

Most everyone knows Cliff has been sick this past year. We know God loves and understands. We don't know the future but we know who holds the future.

For many years this has been our poem and the feeling of our hearts.

Let me hold your hand as we go down hill, We've shared our strength, and we share it still. It hasn't been easy to make the climb, But the way was eased by your hand in mine.

Like the lake, our lives have had ripples too, Ill health, and worries, and payments due, With happy pauses along the way, A graduation and a raise in pay.

At the foot of the slope we will stop and rest, Look back, if you wish; we have been truly blest. We've been spared the grief of being torn apart By death, or divorce or a broken heart.

The view ahead is one of the best, Just a little further and then we can rest. We move more slowly, but together still, Let me hold your hand as we go down the hill.

I thank God that He chose me to be a pastor's wife.

-**CO-OP**-A WORKABLE PLAN

If an organization of any kind is going to be a success, it will be because its members are cooperative, working together, and each one doing his fair share

A church or denomination certainly is not any different. If a church is to grow and do the work that God intended, it will come about by cooperation of the membership. Every person in a church has a place of responsibility to fill. In chapter 12 of First Corinthians, the apostle Paul drew a parallel between the human body and the Church. He declared that the body is made up of many members and that all members work together to make the body function properly. And so it is with the Church. If the Church is going to function properly, every member must shoulder his responsibility. The same thing is true with our State and National work. If every church in the denomination would feel the need to carry its share of the load there would be no real need in any phase of the work.

This writer is convinced that the Cooperative Plan of Support is a very workable plan and if all the churches would support this plan our State and National needs would be met without very much

difficulty.

Let me insert at the very beginning that cooperative giving (that is, 10%, a tithe) should be the minimum and not the maximum of our giving. However, giving 10% of our churches' income to the Cooperative Plan would be much more than many of us are giving now.

The purpose of this article is to tell how the Lord has blessed in this writer's ministry because the churches in which I have pastored supported the

Cooperative Plan.

What is the Cooperative Plan? If I understand the plan correctly, the intent is to give 10% of the churches' income to the State and National work. As the money is sent to the State Treasurer, he in turn allocates the money to the various phases of the State and National work. In fact, 52% goes to the State departments. 7% goes to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and 41% goes to the 8 National departments. I don't know of any better way to support all the State and National departments than the Cooperative Plan of support.

I have found this system to be a real blessing to the church. The three churches of which this preacher has had the privilege to serve as pastor all supported the Cooperative plan by giving 10% of their income. To be sure, there were times when meeting the bills were close. However, I don't know of a time that we were unable to meet all of our

obligations.

I am convinced that God will bless the church that will tithe its income just as He will bless the individual that will obey the Lord's command and give the Lord's tithe.

If the 8 different departments of the National Association are worth having, such as Foreign Missions, FWB Bible College, National Executive Department, National Home Missions, National CTS Department, Department of Retirement, Layman's Board, Theological Commission, then they are worth supporting.

If the 7 departments in our State Association are worth having, such as Missouri Home Missions, Missouri Promotional Department, Missouri Youth Camp, Missouri Bible Institute, Missouri General Fund, Free Will Baptist Gem, Missouri CTS and Sunday School Department, then each one deserves our support.

If Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College is worth having, then it is worth our support; and one way in which we can support each department is by

supporting the Cooperative Plan.

The writer believes and preaches that God will bless the individual that will be obedient to the Word and tithes because the Bible gives us this promise (Malachi 3:10). Furthermore, I believe that God will bless the church which after it receives the tithes and offerings from its constituents will in turn tithe that income so that the 16 National and State departments might be aided.

I am convinced that tithing is God's plan for the support of His great insitution, the Church. I am further convinced that the Cooperative Plan is a workable plan for the support of the denominational departments. And let me again further emphasize—let our Cooperative giving not be the

maximum giving, but rather, a minimum.



Just as surely as individuals are accountable for their personal stewardship, a church is equally responsibile for its stewardship. Most of us would agree that our tithe and offerings given to God through our church should almost be taken for granted. We would like to feel that our congregations accept this as God's plan. Surely this is God's method of financing His church and its outreach.

In this item we are looking at the responsibility of a local church in its worldwide outreach. What should be the attitude of each church toward

denominational programs?

A few years ago a study was made to determine what percentage of a church's income should be given outside to meet the quotas and budgets of state and national departments. At that time 22% of a church's total income was needed to reach the proposed goals. The average then was about 17%, which meant that some or perhaps all the various

ministries of our denomination were coming short of their goals.

These percentages may have changed but they probably are relatively close today with the increase

in gifts and offerings to local churches.


It would be well for every church to take a good look at its outside giving. Ask some of the following questions: Are we supporting all our state programs, i. e., State Missions, Cooperative Plan, Christian Education, Youth Camp, Sunday School, and CTS. Are we totally denominational minded? Do we support Missions, Bible Colleges, Auxiliaries, CTS, and Sunday school departments?

Just as a Christian is encouraged to be totally involved in all programs so should your church. If a pastor serves on a board, he will usually push for its support a little harder, and this he should do; however, none of our "children" should be neglected. A bus ministry cannot suffice for missions giving; missions gifts cannot take the place of giving to Christian Education, etc. Building programs sometimes get blamed for a church's failure to give for worldwide causes. I am firmly convinced that no church can build a building with missions money or Christian education money and be God blessed.

We in the state of Missouri are greatly blessed with many local, state, and national programs of which we are a part. Everyone of us can be justly proud of the fact we are totally involved in all OUR denominational efforts. We dare not fail the Lord and, as He has said, "In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

THE NEED TO KNOW

"Hey, man, how come you go to that church you do?"

"Because I'm a Free Will Baptist."

"Oh yea, well why is that any different from any other church?"

"Come with me and I'll tell you about it. You see, we believe "

Sound familiar? To many young people, the above is a dialogue they have experienced many times. Adults may not find their beliefs challenged too frequently by their peer groups, but the youth of our churches are finding many people of other churches and even other religions are questioning them about their faith. Doctrinal issues are being discussed in the school hallways as well as in the churches. It is no longer enough to merely say, "I'm a Christian." One must now know why he is a Christian and what he believes.

This interest in Christianity is surely a good thing. It is wonderful to be asked to talk about Christ. There is, however, another aspect of this situation that bears examining. We must ask what the motive is of those questioning our religion. There are many today who come teaching doctrine contrary to our Free Will Baptist beliefs and, more seriously, contrary to the teachings of God's Word. These are undoubtedly those referred to in the Bible as the false teachers who come teaching for doctrine the commandments of men.

Much of the false doctrine being taught today is easily recognizable as such and may be avoided. There are other doctrines false and harmful. These doctrines and ideas are incorporated with other fundamental beliefs and as such are being used with great speed and effectiveness to confuse and hinder Christian youth.

A surface knowledge is not enough when you are doing battle with the devil. He is, after all, the author of these false doctrines, no matter how harmless they may seem. The knowledge necessary is available to all who seek to know the truth. God's Word promises us that if we know the truth, we will be free (John 8:32). The truth comes from studying the Bible with the help of the Holy Spirit for understanding. Other helps available are publications such as books, pamphlets, and magazines written by fundamental writers. Along with personal study of the Bible must come the benefits of the educational programs of the local church. These should be designed in a manner so as to give the student a working knowledge of the Scriptures and prepare him to face the ever-increasing flood of false doctrine the modern Christian must face.

Another excellent source of knowledge of God's Word is the Bible College system we as Free Will Baptists have the right to be proud of. Our colleges in Nashville, Tennessee, Moore, Oklahoma, and Fresno, California, are institutions that are equipped to offer to the student an outstanding religious as well as secular education. These, along with state institutes provide for those willing to learn a ready source of training so necessary in our age.

There is a need to know. Let's satisfy this need with a good dose of the Word of God and be able to stand against the onslaught of the devil.
