

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BE PREPARED!

PLAN AHEAD!

The New Testament describes the church as a building or temple where God dwells, a body whose life source is Jesus Christ, a brotherhood that loves one another, and a bride preparing herself for her wedding day. The church is not a building, a denomination, or a hierarchy. It is a living organism composed of all believers in Jesus Christ whether red, yellow, black, or white. To this living organism, Christ issued two commands, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you . . . Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature [evangelism] ... and teach all nations [make disciples-edification]." To accomplish this task, God ordained an organization-the local congregation. Why are some congregations accomplishing the task and others are not? The growing congregation is a prepared people who have a plan of action to accomplish their purpose.

WHY PLAN AHEAD?

Our Heavenly Father is the example planner and designer. The universe reveals His master plan of creation. The Bible tells of His plan of redemption for man. From Genesis 1 through 11 the need of redemption is seen-there is man's creation, his sin, and his evil nature shown in the days of Noah and the Tower of Babel. From Genesis 12 through Malachi God selected the channel of redemption-Abraham and the nation of Israel. He predicted it through the prophets. The Gospels show how Christ fulfilled the prophecies and thus, purchased our redemption. Acts shows the proclamation of the redemption, the epistles explain it, and the Book of Revelation shows the consummation of it-the judgment of wickedness and reward of righteousness. When did God plan all of this? Ephesians 1:4, "According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world..." God didn't let this happen by chance—He planned it carefully before the creation. If God is a careful planner why shouldn't we be?

God's plan for proclaiming His redemption reveals organization or planning. The local congregation is to be led by a bishop or pastor and served by deacons or elders. Each member of the congregation has a part in the ministry whether it be teaching, ministering, praying, or financial support.

Planning ahead brings glory to God, 1 Corinthians 10:31, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." Colossians 3:17 states, "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus." Matthew 5:16 states, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." Everything a Christian does either influences a person to turn to Christ or reject Christ. Thus, it is imperative that the church use the best equipment and best personnel. The average Sunday school teacher spends less than one hour in preparation for teaching and usually misses 10 Sundays a year, comes ten minutes late, and then wonders why the church isn't growing. The average layman never studies his Sunday school lesson, never opens his Bible during the week, never prays except on Sunday, and never visits the sick-much less seek to win the lost. What a tragic testimony!

HOW TO PLAN AHEAD

First, there must be a vision. Proverbs 29:18 states, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." A vision is a goal, an aim, or a purpose. The purpose

of the church is to evangelize the lost and edify the saved. These two go together. Evangelization without edification causes a stagnant church. A growing church grows in number as well as in spirit.

Without a vision, the people wander aimlessly. The church brings in bingo, raffles, rummage sales, and cake sales. It becomes selfish and more concerned with the ball team and bowling league than those who need Christian growth or Christ as Savior.

Second, a vision needs a foundation. There are three foundations for the Christian: Jesus Christ, His Word, and the Holy Spirit. A college professor once said, "One's theology determines one's philosophy which determines one's methodology." One's view of God will determine his thoughts and ideas and thus the methods he uses to accomplish his task. For example, a person may not believe Christ is virgin born; thus He will have a humanistic philosophy and his methods will usually be more social-oriented. He will preach, "Clean up the slums and you'll clean up the man." Today, we hear great emphasis on the Holy Spirit. In fact, many people worship Him more than Jesus. This wrong view of the Trinity leads to a philosophy of spontaneous services-just let the Spirit lead. Thus the methods will be unplanned—let things happen by feeling—if feeling is there—surely this is the Holy Spirit. Therefore, in order to obtain the right vision, a Christian must be convinced who Jesus is; and He can only do this in the Word and the Word can only be understood through the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

Third, the proper foundation will lead to an examination of purpose and method. Why are we doing this? Is this method Christ centered? Would

He be pleased? Some people condemn our liberal friends for their sin, yet they practice "the end justifies the means." If it works, I'll try it! They will use any method to draw people so their attendance will be up! One church gave away free pizza, another church uses the drive-in worship service, another church served beer and hamburgers for communion services.

The proper foundation will discover five purposes for the church: worship, witness, educate, minister, and apply Christian principles to all areas of life. Every method should be tested according to these purposes. If the event or method does not scripturally fulfil the purpose of the church, it should not be used.

THE RESULTS OF PLANNING

One word can describe the results of organization and planning—GROWTH!!

There will be people saved because the church—the living body—is doing what Christ commanded. There will be Christian maturity because the people are being fed meat and are enjoying every meal. As a result, the church will grow. Each one will win one and will teach one. God grant us men and women with a vision—a vision that plans ahead!!

The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met with the West Plains Church in August, 1975. This was the best association I have attended. My wife and I went as elected delegates from the Fourth Church. We certainly enjoyed the fellowship of God's people and doing business for the Lord. I thought of this verse of Scripture, "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." (Psalm 133:1)

I had the privilege to meet and talk with Rev. Andy Lay, the past editor, and Rev. Clarence Burton the present editor. I thank God for these who have been faithful in fulfilling their obligation as editor. I am thankful for the Gem.

One of the reports most looked forward to each month is the report of progress written by the promotional secretary and treasurer. Brother Beatty wrote these reports for many years. He retired from the work of promotional secretary and treasurer last June. I should like to go back a few years to the beginning of this work.

In the September issue, 1960, there is an interesting article about an item of business brought before the Missouri State Association. Item 4 of the business committee's report is as follows: "Whereas, the Missouri State Association has grown in numbers, and whereas, the financial status has been strengthened through the cooperative plan of support, and whereas, the potential is unlimited, and whereas, the Great Commission of our Lord is, Go ye, we your business committee feel that the time has come when the Missouri State Association should make a great effort to fullfilled the Lord's commission. Therefore, we recommend that this body elect a study committee to study the feasibility of a fulltime promotional worker, whose duty would be to promote the entire program of our state and national work."

Surely, it was after much prayer and deep study, that the committee recommended to the Missouri State Association that a promotional worker be elected.

Rev. Harry Beatty was elected to serve as the first promotional secretary in 1961. And, from the very beginning, the cooperative plan of giving began to grow. He was faithful in visiting churches throughout the state, promoting this plan of giving, that promoted the Lord's work. As I read again some of the reports given by Brother Beatty, I was reminded of his faithfulness to this cause. But the state was for the cooperative plan from the beginning. When it was recommended to the Missouri State Association, which met in Fredericktown, there was not one vote in opposition. Surely, this indicates, that God was in this plan to support His work. I have always favored this plan for giving. And, through the years I have

helped promote it. What better way to support a worldwide ministry.

Through the pages of the Gem we have been able to know of the visits made by the promotional secretary, to churches, quarterly meetings, yearly meetings, state associations, national associations and special services.

Cooperative giving has grown over the years. At the last state association the \$90,000 goal was almost met. Brother Beatty has led the state of Missouri to the top. The Missouri State Association stayed at the top until 1974. This has encouraged other states to give and share in a worldwide ministry.

The Gem was faithful in showing the financial reports. Certainly, it was a blessing to all to read and follow. But, it was a greater blessing to hear Brother Beatty give his report. They have been called "Hallelujah and Victory" reports. Surely, they were.

It was only proper that something special be done to recognize Brother and Sister Beatty for the work they had done. At the close of the Wednesday evening service, of the state association, special recognition was given. Rev. Andy Lay presented them with fifty-eight checks, stapled together, reaching across the platform. Churches and individuals had responded because they loved. God bless you Brother and Sister Beatty. You have been an inspiration and help to many.

Pastors, churches let me challenge you to support and keep on supporting the Cooperative Plan. Give at least one-tenth to help support the Lord's work through our denomination.

MISSOURI BIBLE INSTITUTES

The Missouri Bible Institutes will begin second semester classes the week of January 12, 1976. Institutes will be held in four areas—Liberal, Mountain Grove, Leadington, and Kansas City. (The one in Kansas City will be on a seminar basis, with leadership as its subject.)

The cost for college credit is \$25.00 per semester hour or \$50.00 for each course, plus \$10.00 registration fee for new students. The cost for taking the course without college credit is \$12.50 per semester hour or \$25.00 for each course plus \$5.00 registration for new students.

The institute is designed to help Free Will Baptist ministers and laymen who desire college level training that they may be more effective servants of the Lord. The institutes have proven to be helpful and practical.

Missouri Bible Institute is an extension school of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Moore, Oklahoma. The Christian Education Board of Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists supervises the institutes in Missouri.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY AT CARTERVILLE

The First Free Will Baptist Church of Carterville observed its fiftieth anniversary rededication service on Sunday, November 23, 1975. Rev. Kenneth Turner, a former pastor, delivered the morning message. A basket dinner was enjoyed during the noon hour.

SPECIAL NEWS FLASH— FILKINS RETURN TO IVORY COAST

Howard, Jo Ann, Dave, and Dale left the United States December 28 for the Ivory Coast, Africa. The Filkins have been uncertain about the date of their return because of their financial need. They said, "To be able to return at the scheduled date is an answer to prayer." The need for them to return at that time was twofold.—The Ivory Coast Academy, where they serve, begins its second semester and the Pinkertons, who have been filling in for them, will be able to return to their village ministry.

A step of faith was taken in returning the Filkins to their field of service. The financial need remains. One church has given \$1,500; another has committed itself for \$1,000 between now and June. If 60 churches would respond with \$100 this need would be met. This money could be sent to the state treasurer marked "Filkins-special Missouri" or sent to the Foreign Missions Office in Nashville. Let's respond to this need in January or February!



"Make a joyful noise unto God, all ye lands: Sing forth the honour of his name: make his praise glorious." Psalm 66:1, 2

These are the words of the world's greatest songwriter, the psalmist David. David was a lover of music and as a youth was skilful with the harp. He probably had long hours of practice as he watched his father's sheep.

Singing is mentioned in other places in the Bible. At the Last Supper they sang a hymn, probably one of the Psalms. In the jail at Philippi, Paul and Silas sang at midnight. Later, writing to the church at Colosse, Paul wrote, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord."

Down through the history of the Christian Church, singing has had an important role. The fathers of the reformation, Luther, Wesley, and others, gave us hymns that are still used today. It was not until the middle of the nineteenth century that gospel songs as we know them came on the scene. These were used extensively during the great revival years at the turn of the century. They gave power and enthusiasm to evangelistic meetings of that day, and still do today.

Music is one of the greatest forces on earth. It is used to sell everything from soup to soap. It affects us mentally, emotionally, and spiritually.

One can feel a surge of patriotic pride when "The Star Spangled Banner" is played. The weary feet of the foot soldier becomes stronger and more steady to the beat of a drum or a lively march tune played by a brass band. The effect is just as great in the spiritual realm.

The spiritual effect is a combination of all three. When we hear sacred music our emotions of joy, grief, sorrow, remorse, and conviction are stirred. "A simple strain from a remembered hymn of untainted youth has sometimes melted a brazen heart and reconstructed a wrecked life." (Edwards)

Aileen Calvary, missionary to Japan, tells of how one man's heart was melted by a song. He was the father of one of the young men in the church. The youth of Japan are much easier to win to Christ than the elders. This is easy to understand if you imagine your son or daughter bringing home a buddist monk, trying to convert you. Of course the difference is the power of the Holy Spirit. "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me" (Acts 1:8a). She and some others were guests in this young man's home. They took the opportunity to witness, read the Scriptures, and pray. Many prayers and much concern had already been shown for him before the visit, but nothing seemed to move or convict him to accept Christ. Apparently everything had failed and there was nothing else to do but leave, when for some reason she felt impressed to sing a song. They sang the first stanza of that lovely song most of us have known from youth, "Down at the Cross, where my Savior died, down where for cleansing from sin I cried, there to my heart was the blood applied, glory to His Name." Tears began to flow from the man's eyes and his heart was melted as the Holy Spirit convicted him of his sins.

Twenty years earlier he had heard that song at a street meeting. It was the only gospel song he had ever heard, and for twenty years the seed of the gospel had been buried in his heart. Hearing it again, his emotions were stirred, his heart melted to the wooing of the Holy Spirit, and he gave his heart to Christ. Of course it was no accident that that was the song they sang that day, "And, lo, I am with you alway," even in Japan. Truly we can sing from the heart, "Glory to His Name."

This brings to mind another thought. There are many so called gospel songs that do not give the proper honor and reverence to the Name of Jesus. Many today try to make Him sound real folksy. True, He is the dearest Friend; true, He loves us as no other can love us, and has a personal interest in our every need. He gave His life in a cruel and despicable death on the cross; but when He said "It is finished," He meant exactly that. Now according to Philippians chapter two verses 8, 9, 10 Christ has been given a name which is above every name and at the name of Jesus every knee should bow.

Now, the Jesus I love and sing about is not wearing sandals, walking on the water, or working in a carpenter shop. He is best described by John the revelator, "And I saw heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and he that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness he doth judge and make war. His eyes were as a flame of fire, and on his head were many crowns; and he had a name written, that no man knew, but he himself. And he was clothed with a vesture dipped in blood: and His name is called The Word of God." (Revelation 19:11-13) Then, John states in verse sixteen that His name is KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS.

When we stand and sing in our worship services, let us as the psalmist said, "Sing forth the honour of his name; make his praise glorious." Also, as the Apostle Paul stated, sing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.
