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

The journey would not be easy, and there was no assurance that they would ever reach their destination; but they had rather be drowned in the depth of the sea than to be drowned by the flood of false doctrine that was flooding their homeland.


loving, and serving Him.

She made a mistake in thinking God would not give her a child as He had promised. She tried to get ahead of God and it created some problems, as it usually does. But before we get too critical of Sarah, let's remember that it had been many years before that God had made the promise to Abraham and both he and Sarah were getting older. Sarah had to learn patience. She did. And, at the appointed time, God kept His promise and gave to them the child He promised. Yes, God always keeps His promise. He always has and He always will.

It took a lifetime, a long lifetime, but I believe that Sarah finally became the woman God intended and planned. How many of us (yes Christians) will waste a lifetime never bothering to try to be the person God wants us to be? I believe a good way to begin is to use Ephesians 5:19-33 and 6:1-4 as instructions from God to guide our family relationship. This is a must before we can become the person God wants us to be. I say bah-humbug to Woman's Lib!!

We should be thankful that we are who we are and we should be willing to use the talent and ability that God has given to us as a means of being a witness for Christ. God can and will use our efforts to accomplish His will and purpose in each one of our lives. Let's just let Him do it! (Ephesians 4:11-16, Living Bible).
