

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Accepting the Task

God has not mentioned in His Word the great hour nor the day when He will take His people away; therefore, let us approach this new year with great expectations and with thankful hearts that our Lord has given us this year. Let us use it to serve Him. We can learn by our mistakes and shortcomings from previous years. We can praise Him for His blessings and increases and then set new goals for the future.

Let us follow the example of a man by the name of Nehemiah. Ezra had led a group of captives from Babylon back to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls and the city in 457 B.C. Some men wrote a letter to King Artaxerxes I (Ezra 4:7-16). The work was ordered stopped, and the walls and gates were once more destroyed. It was in December of 445 B.C. that Nehemiah heard of this new affliction.

First, Nehemiah was filled with CONCERN to the point that his heart was broken. He spent many days in fasting and prayer for his people (Nehemiah 1:3, 4).

Second, he shared the blame of his people's sins and had genuine REPENTANCE (Nehemiah 1:5-11). This is what brings revival.

Inasmuch as he was the king's cupbearer, it was important that he be joyful in his presence and in the presence of any guest that he might have. If he wasn't, it could mean "his head." Nehemiah was so concerned about his people, there in Jerusalem, that he was sad in the king's presence (chapter 2). Artaxerxes I questioned him about this. Nehemiah was afraid for his life but he found favor in the king's eyes and made a request of him: "If it please the king...send me unto Judah...that I may build it" (Nehemiah 2:5). This comes from real DEDICATION and love. So Artaxerxes I sent Nehemiah to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls.


Nehemiah went to Jerusalem and completed his task but it was not easy.

Let us, as we approach 1977, realize the task that lies before us. We need compassion and concern, repentance of our past failures, and determination to stand for God and to be used of Him. Your church and pastor needs your help. Would you be a Nehemiah or an Isaiah in saying, "Send me"?

Keep in mind that Nehemiah did not find his job easy. But he was determined to complete the task (2:17). He knew that the devil would try to hinder. In fact, nothing that you do for God gets done but that the devil tries to stop it. He also knew God was greater and on his side.

Nineteen hundred and seventy-seven can be a year that can glorify God and reap a harvest of souls if each one of us will say, "Lord use me," and then follow His leading.



all men." PASTOR. Pastoring includes counseling, personal witnessing, visiting the sick, leading the church, promoting your denomination, teaching the people, and leading them in worship. Three things are necessary to make a pastor successful: a calling from God, a reverential love for Christ, and a deep love for your people. PARENT. Carefully read 1 Timothy 3:1-7. A pastor's children should set the pattern for the other children of the church. Don't win the world while you lose your own family. You don't have to give your children to the devil in order to give your life to the Lord. PATIENCE. Read 2 Timothy 4:5 and 1 Thessalonians 2:2. People are going to talk about the preacher. Remember how Miriam and Aaron attacked Moses? Some will do the same to you. "Be blameless." That tears out their fangs. You can't hurt a man who is "blameless." Patient is a word that must describe you, preacher. Learn to be patient with those who disagree with you and actually rebel against you. Patience is a fruit of the Spirit and certainly should be learned early by the preacher.

There are some definite rewards for the preacher of the Word. You will see souls saved from sin, lives rescued from Satan's clutches, Christians grow in the Lord, and God's church grow; and you will help appreciative people. Like Paul you can know, "There is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing" (2 Timothy 4:8).

Report from Executive Secretary

Amazing! Fantastic! Terrific! These are some of the words used by representatives from eighteen state associations in describing the M.I.N.D. Motivational Seminar conducted by the guest speaker, Mr. Jack Lannom, for the annual Leadership Conference. The state leaders present for the conference had the privilege of hearing Mr. Lannon in two sessions.

Executive Secretary Rufus Coffey introduced the conference theme, "Toward New Horizons," in his address on opening night. Free Will Baptists leaders developed the theme in presentations concerning new horizons in fellowship, Sunday school growth, state leadership, national ministries, evangelism, and personal outlook.

The conference is sponsored annually by the Executive Office of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for state and national promotional workers in cooperation with the various national departments. The sessions were held at Camp Hillmont, which is located near Nashville at White Bluff.

Dr. Homer Willis of Evangelism Unlimited Writes:

"I have shared with you before my great burden to see the Free Will Baptist Church planted in the English speaking nations of the world; and with your prayers and support, I hope to have some meetings this year in Great Britain and/or Australia. All of the many English speaking nations are mission fields, and there is no language barrier to those who will go and minister to them.

"I will have some time available this year for Discipleship Revivals; these are five day meetings with the church people. God blessed these meetings last year."

Free Will Baptist Bible College Reports

Eight students finished semester examinations in mid-December and completed the semester with a 8

straight "A" average. Another 91 students maintained a "B" average for the first half of the school year. Listed are the ones from Missouri: Senior: Verlon Long, Festus, Missouri; Juniors: Richard Greenup, Columbia and Alvin Hook, Lee's Summit, Missouri; Sophomore: Mike Wilhite, St. Louis, Missouri.

Student witnessing by the students in Nashville has been described by Dr. Joe Ange, as "Interest on Fire." The results of this during the first three months of the school year were nearly 1,000 messages preached, over 6,000 dealt with about their souls, and nearly 800 recorded decisions.

Missouri is still running ahead on giving to the general fund but the Missouri Project has not met its quota.

With Our Missionaries

The Pooles write: "We want to express our deepest appreciation for the concern, interest, love, and hospitality to everyone. We are looking forward to returning to Brazil. We are especially thankful for the care and concern the Lord has given the church. 

"Little children, keep yourselves from idols" (1 John 5:21). These words penned by the beloved Apostle John might cause us to wonder and question just a little bit. And yet, since they are a part of God's Holy Scriptures, we know that they are true. Since we do know that they are true, it is up to us to study and to learn the lesson that God would have us to learn from this particular passage. Does an idol have any place in the life of a Christian? Ideally, no! But then most of us as Christians are not ideal Christians. Unfortunately, some don't seem to be even striving for the ideal. Most Christians would be appalled at the idea of bowing down before an idol. The image that pops into our minds is of an African bringing a sacrifice to a pile of stones or to a tree, or perhaps a man from the Orient bowing to a statue of Buddha. To a Christian, such an idea is absurd. But since 1 John was written to Christians and in this verse John warns Christians of the danger of idols, there must be some danger of Christians having idols in their lives. So let us think about it and heed the warning of John.

One of the American idols or "ideals" as we might prefer to call them is the phenomenon of hero worship. In the secular world, our people find their heroes in the sports field, in the political arena, in the music world, or in movieland. Most of us seem to think that as long as these heroes are reasonably honest and upright men that this hero worship is not so bad, perhaps even good. Some feel that it gives the young person something to strive for, someone to look up to. This hero worship seems to be a natural instinct for humans, and Christians are not immune to it. If we would use Jesus as our Hero, our Pattern, then we would make it all right. But most seem to think that would be impossible and so we choose someone that we know and work our way up to being like Christ. Most of the time we choose a fellow Christian as our ideal (idol). Perhaps we have chosen someone who has had a great influence on our becoming a Christian or one who has helped us to grow and mature as a Christian. In our mind, we elevate him; he is near perfect. He can do no wrong or, at least, not very much wrong. Is this hero worship wrong? It is a very dangerous practice (I've found out the hard way!), for no human being can live up to our mental picture of him. Somewhere along the way, he will falter and fail, and you will be the one that is hurt. But being human and not willing to admit our mistakes, we pick up our little mental image, dust it off, polish it

a little bit, and place it back on the pedestal of our heart. There he sits until once again our ideal fails and down comes our image. We have laid ourselves open to hurt again. Being hurt, Satan steps in and tempts us to give up or to become cynical. Then we go to the other extreme and become a faultfinding Christian. Our faith in our fellowman is virtually destroyed, and, if we are not careful, we will drift away from Jesus. What is the solution to this problem? A close, working relationship with Jesus is the surest way to come out the victor in such a situation. (By a working relationship, I mean, "talking to Jesus and then listening to His answer!") Keep in mind that the most dedicated Christian has human failings, and no one will always live up to your expectations. Love him when he does; hold him up in prayer when he does not. But most of all, keep him in his proper place. Make your IDEAL-JESUS. Place Him on the pedestal of your heart. You will fail Him from time to time, but He will never fail you. You can save yourself a lot of heartaches and tears by heeding the warning of John-"Little children, keep yourselves from idols."
