Daily Soul Winning



To Church Growth

"And daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ' (Acts 5:42).

The key to building a scriptural, New Testament church is daily personal witnessing and evangelism. Christianity is a daily business; a seven day a week job with no time off. The greatest tragedy of our present day is that Christianity has degenerated into a matter of Sunday morning church attendance, rather than a daily living and witnessing for Christ. Jesus said, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9:23). I have yet to find in the Bible where He ever rescinded those requirements for the Christian.

The Book of the Acts of the Apostles leaves no doubt in the mind of the reader that daily soul winning and personal evangelism was the main

business of the early church.

A study of the word "daily" in Acts is both stimulating and soul searching. The early church in Jerusalem, which won souls, overcame opposition, defied kings, shook kingdoms, brought fear and conviction to thousands of souls, and made Jesus Christ known everywhere had an exciting and fruitful ministry, because it was a church with a daily ministry.

1. They had daily fellowship (Acts 2:46): "And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of

heart."

- 2. They had daily conversions (Acts 2:47): "Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."
- 3. They had daily growth (Acts 4:32; 5:14; 16:5): "And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily."
- 4. They had daily administrations of material necessities (Acts 6:1).
 - 5. They had daily Scripture study (Acts 17:11).

6. They had daily witness for Christ (Acts 17:17; 19:19).

It wasn't long because of its daily ministry that we begin to read of churches (plural) rather than of the church (singular). Let us examine the daily ministry of the early church and perhaps better prepare ourselves for a daily church ministry.

First of all, let us see their persistence. These Christians were persistent, not sporadic or spasmodic. They were not easily discouraged; they were not easily dissuaded. The motivating force of their lives was to influence their society for Christ. This

they did because they were persistent.

The church today needs some persistence among its leadership and its laity so far as this matter of daily involvement in the kingdom work of Christ is concerned. We oftentimes get stirred up during revival time or after attending a conference on church growth or evangelism and go like a house afire for a few days; then we completely burn out. What we need to do is settle down to a persistent day-by-day approach to evangelism.

I once heard a man testify that he had been won to the Lord because of a local Baptist group's persistence. He said that every Tuesday night for three months this visitation team would come to his house and interrupt his favorite TV program. He finally became so aggravated with them that he made a bargain with them. He said that, if they would quit bothering him on Tuesday night, he would attend their church the following Sunday. This he did, heard the Word of God preached, was convicted of his sins by the Holy Spirit, went to the altar, and was saved: all because of the persistence of God's people.

Secondly, let us see the participants: Not just the disciples, or preachers, but every born again believer was involved. Acts 8:1, 4 says, "And Saul was consenting unto his death. And at that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem; and they were all scattered abroad throughout the regions of Judaea and Samaria, except the apostles. Therefore they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the word." Notice that the church was scattered abroad, except the apostles. The apostles stayed in Jerusalem. However, it was those born again believers who were scattered who went everywhere preaching the Word.

The deacons were involved. Stephen and Philip, both deacons of the early church, became great soul winners. The deacons along with other church and Sunday school officers and teachers should be involved in personal soul winning today. In fact, it should be required that a man who holds office in the church be a daily witness for Christ.

Failing to participate in personal evangelism is in direct violation to Ephesians 4:11, 12: "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

Thirdly, let us see the *partnership*: They went "two by two." This is the scriptural method; you can't improve on that. We read in the Scriptures of the partnership of Peter and John, Paul and Barnabas, Paul and Silas, etc. Jesus sent His disciples out two by two (Mark 6:7; Luke 10:1).

I think the reason for this is obvious. Two together would have greater courage than one by himself. Their ministry could complement one another. The Bible says, "Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labour."

Fourthly, let us see the plan: They went "from house to house." Acts 20:19, 20 says, "Serving the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears, and temptations, which befell me by the lying in wait of the Jews: and how I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publickly, and from house to house." The question sometimes is asked, "How often should a home be visited?" Here is a study released recently from the National Retail Dry Goods Association: 48 percent of the salesmen make one call and quit. 25 percent of the salesmen make two calls and quit. 88 percent of the salesmen quit after 1, 2, or 3 calls. 12 percent of the salesmen keep on calling. The 12 percent who keep on calling do 80 percent of the business.

Most Free Will Baptist churches that I am acquainted with have about 50 percent of the Sunday morning crowd on Sunday night. They have about 35 to 40 percent of the Sunday morning crowd on Wednesday night. They have about 20 to 25 percent of their people who pay their tithes. They have from 2 to 5 percent of their people involved in some type of weekly visitation or some form of personal evangelism. This means we have about 10 to 15 percent of the people doing 90 percent of the work.

I think it is obvious that, if we expect to do the kind of job Christ has ordained us to do, we need a better plan than the one we now have operating. Every child of God should be actively engaged in some type of personal evangelism; and, if he is not, he is miserably failing in the purpose for which Christ has saved him.

Then, let us see the *place*: They were "in the temple." The evangelism of the early church in the Book of Acts was a church-centered evangelism. It was an evangelism which had as its base of operation the local church.

If we are ever going to get our people soul conscious, we are going to have to first get them church conscious. We must begin again to preach the importance of regular and faithful church attendance (Hebrews 10:25). I believe, from a study of the Scriptures, that it is sinful for a Christian to whom God has given health and opportunity to absent himself from the services of the church and that it casts a reproach on the name of Christ.

Modern day evangelism must once again have as its basis for operation an undying love and loyalty to the church, its ministry, its doctrine, and its outreach in the community. Modernists in religious movements today are making their attacks against the organized local church, but the church always has been, and always will be, God's ordained organization for the propagation of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Then finally, let us see the *preaching*: "They ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ." Christ did not save us nor ordain us to put on a show, but to preach and teach the Word. Paul said, "And I, brethren, when I came to you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified" (1 Corinthians 2:1, 2). We need to pay less attention to enunciation and more attention to the unction of the Holy Spirit of God upon the preached Word.

Young Timothy was exhorted to "Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Timothy 4:2). In order for him to do this, he is further exhorted to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15).

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL AND CTS BOARD

On January 17-19 the State Sunday School and CTS Board composed of three members and one proxy visited the national offices for Sunday School and Church Training Service. The visit was the first of its kind by any state Sunday School and CTS board. The leaders in the national offices hope to use it as an example for other such visits to come. The trip made it possible for the members to see a step-by-step presentation of the design, development, and production of each department's literature. Thus, by becoming more aware of the detailed duties of each department the board can mediate some of the possible discrepancies that arise spasmodically. But the visit had more importance than mere inquiry, because we wanted to find out firsthand what preparations are being made and what we can expect in the years to come as we seek to fulfil the 25-Year Challenge. In this present age the "Challenge" is regarded as the largest goal established by Free Will Baptists since inception. If we are to succeed, then more boards of our type must work hand in hand with those designing the foundations of this great Sunday school superstructure. Firsthand knowledge and adequate contact with the populace are leverages that open wider the door of accomplishment: a million Free Will Baptists. Let me quickly share with you some of the many faceted goals of your Sunday School and CTS Board.

- 1. We feel certain that a closer relationship with the national offices will help us to see what is available and to help them keep in touch with the present Sunday school needs. Obviously, boards such as ours can be a vital lifeline to the national offices as we accumulate the weaknesses and enlarge upon the strengths of the individual programs. It would be both informational and economical to all of us. Communication is one key to successful goal attainment.
- 2. We want to assist our Missouri Sunday schools to grow and develop by informing them of the latest tools and methods on the market.
- 3. Our desire is to be more than an abstract, uninvolved board. We do not want to just chart growth but rather to be an aide in seeing it happen! By expanding our horizons personally we can be doing whatever is necessary to help each Sunday school benefit from exposure to growth and development principles.
- 4. We want our Sunday schools to be enlarged through training. Growth is not just for the largest groups but for those who are trained for growth. E.T.T.A. courses, seminars, and exposure to qualified people are just some of the steps up the ladder of success.
- 5. We shall remain open and flexible. Our ear is to the ground listening for the sign of things to come. We know that the next 25 years are going to bring changes to our state and it is our goal to be ready for the changes when they develop. Also we trust that our churches are prepared for what the Lord is going to do with Free Will Baptists in these next years.

In the months to come a regular feature will appear in the *Gem* informing our state of what is happening in Sunday schools both here and out of state. Articles will include special information such as books, methods, examples of successful schools, and similar, related materials. Our desire is that you will want to read it regularly and that it can be an effective tool of communication for all of us. If others have contributions of related materials, they may mail them to the *Gem* editor. We will edit and produce them as they meet our needs.

"I am writing to express appreciation to the good people of Missouri for their faithfulness in supporting National Home Missions in 1976. Missouri gave seven thousand one hundred ninety-one dollars over its quota," writes Associate Director, Roy Thomas.

The budget for 1977 calls for \$696,000.00 for the National Home Missions Board. The board is depending on the faithfulness of every Free Will Baptist to help meet this budget.

Mark Vandivort, a former home missionary to Twin Mountain, New Hampshire and also Columbia, Missouri. The Vandivorts will be working in Flagstaff, Arizona. Rev. Wayne Phillips, former pastor of Peace Free Will Baptist Church, Indianapolis, Indiana will replace E. R. Mayo at Enterprise, Alabama. Rev. Sanford Davis is a former pastor from Texas and will graduate from Free Will Baptist Bible College in May. He is unassigned at this time.

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE ANNOUNCES CONFERENCE SPEAKERS

Free Will Baptist Bible College officials are preparing for crowds in excess of 1,000 people at the school's thirty-fourth annual Bible Conference, March 13-17. Guest speakers will be Reverend Galen

Dunbar from Norfolk, Virginia, and Evangelist Van Dale Hudson from Amory, Mississippi. Other conference speakers will be members of the administration and faculty.

Special music for the conference will be provided by the college choir, ensemble, and various quartets and trios. The 100-voice Choral Union will sing the Easter Section of Handel's, The Messiah, in a half hour presentation before the Wednesday evening service, climaxed by the singing of the "Hallelujah Chorus," with members of the audience joining the Choral Union.

The CTS Department reports that exciting things are in store for the 2,000 or more Free Will Baptist young people and their sponsors who will converge on the Detroit-Cadillac Hotel and Cobo Hall in Detroit, Michigan, July 17-21, 1977.

The theme for the conference is "Jesus Christ...Lord of All." The keynote speaker is Reverend Billy Bevan from Tupelo, Mississippi. Reverend Leroy Welch will serve as the director and area coordinator of the Michigan State Mass Youth Choir.

Banquets will be held again this year. Two special events will be offered this year, boat cruise and Ford Museum (cost: \$2.00 each).

Registration is the same as last year, including family plan for pre-registration before July 1.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE OFFICE REPORTS COOPERATIVE GIVING CONTINUES TO INCREASE

Eugene Workman, executive assistant, reports that giving through the Cooperative Plan reflects a 23 percent increase over the previous year.

Missouri was the second largest giver with Oklahoma still remaining in first place. Missouri showed an increase of over \$8,000 in cooperative giving from the previous year.

Mr. Workman continues by stating that "The Cooperative Plan is designed to distribute funds proportionately to all phases of the denomination's outreach, both at the state and national levels. The plan has proved to be workable, but it needs to be promoted and utilized effectively."



HAVE YOU TRIED THIS?

We called it Operation Andrew because each time the Apostle Andrew is singled out in the New Testament narrative he is bringing someone to Christ. Many of our Christians have trouble getting people to come with them to church, or otherwise getting them under the sound of the gospel. This method of evangelism helps solve that problem.

We rented a private room in a moderately priced restaurant, then announced to the church several weeks in advance the day and time of the Operation Andrew. Each couple in the church was urged to invite an unsaved couple to come as their guests for the meal and about a 45-minute program. Our ladies decorated the tables in advance, placing some eye-catching tracts at each place.

As the guests arrived at the restaurant, each person was given a name tag with his first name on it. A congenial atmosphere was created as our church people introduced their guests to the others in the group.

After the waitresses had taken the meal orders, we had a gospel music trio sing three or four songs until the meals were served. After everyone had finished eating, I called on two of our laymen to share testimonies of their lives before and after they accepted Christ as their Savior. The trio then sang two or three more gospel songs, after which I gave a brief salvation message, with an invitation for the lost to receive Christ.

Our church has had three such Operation Andrews and we have had people saved as a result of each one. At one of them we had 72 people present, 35 of which were unsaved. That is more unsaved individuals than I usually get to preach to in several months, including most revival meetings.

The cost of the project is just for the meals and literature. Each church couple buys four meals, his own and his guests, which only amounts to about \$12. In many cases the invited guests reciprocate and return the meal favor at a future date, at which time there is another opportunity to share Christ, if the couple did not get saved at the Operation Andrew.

It is my prayer that many of you will use this method of evangelism and see souls come to find Christ as a result.

WHAT'S IT LIKE TO BE A P.K.

Being a P.K. (or preacher's kid) has been an experience in itself. It has had its ups as well as its downs, but I have learned a lot through this experience.

It all started when I was four years old. Suddenly without warning, my life took a drastic change. I was living in a good home with my father, mother, and two older brothers. My father worked with IBM in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and we seemed to be living pretty comfortable.

But then it happened! God called my father to become a preacher of His Word. That meant *drastic* changes—like a move to Nashville, Tennessee, where he began his training at the Free Will Baptist Bible College. This wasn't too bad on me, for I was yet to know what was happening.

Life went on pretty fast for me and my family for the next five years which we spent in Tennessee. My father pastored Oakland and Mt. Zion Free Will Baptist Churches. There isn't a whole lot I remember while living there except for sitting with mother in church

However, I found many changes after our move to Auburndale, Florida. There were several girls in our church around the same age. Fussing and sneaking around to do "little" dishonest things were about the only things which I learned, through punishment, that could and should not have been tried. This was also the beginning of my feelings that I was being treated differently from the other kids. I didn't really know why, but I blamed it on my being a P.K.

Our next move was to Midland, Texas, in 1970. I was in for a lot more than I realized. For it was here that I started in junior high. It seemed that those two years I had to prove that just because my father was a preacher didn't mean that I was "Miss Goodie Two Shoes." During my freshman, sophomore, and half of my junior year I was miserable. I couldn't figure out what the deal was. The more I tried to fit in with the group the more miserable I felt.

In 1975 my father accepted the pastorate of the Thayer Free Will Baptist Church. I, along with a younger brother and mother, moved with my father. A lot has happened here and I have made mistakes for which I am ashamed. But, I have also learned a lot, too.


In the summer of 1976, I turned my whole life over to God. I did this at a District Youth Revival held by Brother Dennis Dotson. After this God seemed to reveal to me my one BIG mistake. I was looking at myself as a "different" person and was blaming it on my father's profession. According to God's Word, we become "different" or separated from the world we live in when we become born again children of God.

I thank God for showing me this and also for all my blessings. Many people do not realize how lucky they are to live in Christian homes with Christian parents who love and care for them. I know I am guilty of taking God's *many* blessings to me for granted.

If it wasn't for a God who cared enough to send His only Son to die on the cross, life wouldn't be worth living. I thank God for my Christian parents who have taken the responsibility to raise me up in the way God commanded. They have taught me verses from the Bible, songs from the church hymnals, and most important the plan of salvation.

So, you see, my life of being a P.K. has been an experience in itself. If I had to choose right now whether or not to remain a P.K., I would choose to stay. For the ups outweigh the downs by a long shot. If I wasn't a P.K., I more than likely would not have had the opportunities to be in church competition or involved in the district, state, and national activities of our denomination—THE FREE WILL BAPTIST. I can now say, "I'm a P.K. and proud of it."

One of the most important details of the making of the preacher is "his calling." How do you know when God is calling you to preach? I well remember those days that ran into weeks and then into months when I wrestled with this calling. I never had any intention of refusing God, but I did want to know, without doubt, that God was calling. I found the answer, and I believe I can share some things that will help you discover whether God is right now calling you to preach His Word.

Now assuming you want to know God's will and intend to obey His will, let us proceed to the four steps in a Biblical formula that will help reveal God's will for your life.

First, know you are a saved man. Isaiah 1:18 tells us that saved men are clean, pure, innocent, and saved. You have been redeemed. Getting the salvation question settled in your mind will not only keep you from being confused and insecure in your relationship with Christ, but will also continually

assure you that God's redemptive power is sufficient to save anyone. Second, be surrendered. God will not use an unsurrendered man. Read Romans 6:13; John 7:7; 1 John 3:22; Acts 5:32. Publicly surrender your body, mind, energy, and will to God. Third, be filled with the Spirit. Dr. Torrey said, "The word of God is the instrument through which the Holy Spirit does His work." Being filled with the Spirit is a definite, distinct, and different experience from being regenerated, and it is always given for the purpose of testimony and service. Now all saved people possess the Holy Spirit, but ask God to fill you with His Spirit for power in Christian service and witnessing. Fourth, obey God now. Start obeying God now by doing the things you know He has called every Christian to do, and possibly you have been neglecting. Obey in such things as Bible reading, daily prayer, faithfulness in worship, and soul winning. Go down the street soul winning. If that is repulsive to you, forget about preaching. We have enough "preachers" who never win anyone to Christ. Start obeying God right now. He always calls busy, obedient people to do His greatest work. You can know God's will for your life. Maybe it is to preach. If so, then PREACH, BROTHER.
