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Tithes Gr Promises

Sometimes our churches are faced with the problem of income. That is the offerings will not take care of the expenses. Is it because the members do not realize what it takes to operate a church? Or is it possible they think the church should be able to grow without the needed financial help and giving? When the church offerings go up and down, one can't help but wonder if the Christians, who compose the membership, are true to His love.

Let's note in the Book of Malachi the promises of God to the ones that love and obey Him. Malachi 3:10 states, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." It surely is the will of God that every Christian should give at least a tenth of his earnings to the Lord through the church. The storehouse is the church. The devil will try to convince the believer that the church is not the storehouse, but, based upon the Scripture in First Corinthians 16:2, it seems rather clear that the church is the storehouse.

The local church and our state and national ministries are dependent upon the tithes and offerings. There must be the regular, systematic giving. I have talked to some people who have stated that when they got saved they made a promise that the Lord would receive a tenth of their income but later failed to keep that promise. Possibly someone reading this article may have done the same thing. Remember these words, "When thou vowest a vow unto God, defer not to pay it; for he hath no pleasure in fools: pay that which thou hast vowed. Better is it that thou shouldest not vow, than that thou shouldest vow and not pay" (Ecclesiastes 5:4, 5). So, the church needs more than promises.

I know of a pastor who asked the church he was serving to try or test God for six months. This was a rather small church but they tried it and needless to say it worked.

The person that gives the Lord that which he should will not have to slide under the pew when

the preacher uses tithing as his subject. But rather, he will rejoice in the Lord because he is doing what the Lord wants the child of God to do. The Bible states, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Galatians 6:7). The Bible also states, "But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:6, 7).

We should thank God for preachers that preach the whole counsel of God and remind the Christian that the tithe belongs to the Lord. Every pastor would like to see one hundred percent of his congregation tithe. If every Christian in our beloved denomination tithed, there would be no problem in meeting the needs of all phases of the Lord's work. This would result in a great revival in our denomination. God would pour out blessings that there would not be room enough to receive them.

The words of the Lord Jesus Christ in the Great Commission amplify the needs of the church, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matthew 28:19, 20).

The missionary program would not be a strain on the local church if Christians of the church would obey the Lord in storehouse giving. Have you heard someone say after a powerful message from the Word of God, "Why does the preacher always talk about giving?" Well, I will tell you; if a person gives as he should, he will say "amen" to the message and thank God for it.

Let me close this by asking, "Tithes or promises?"

Are you robbing God?

In closing the article the reporters write, "Farewell to a real man of God and his family. May God be with you until we meet again."


Richwoods Church Reports Blessings

Snow and Miracles

"The first word of my title made the month of January almost uneventful, but we were thankful that most services were still held," writes Sue Winchester, church reporter for the South Side Church.

Two men from the church have felt a touch from God. Rev. Loy Smith was hit by a reckless driver while repairing his car. Some thought he would never walk again. But God in answer to many prayers touched his body, and a few weeks ago he walked inside the church auditorium with two canes. Brother Glenwood Turnbough was stricken with leukemia of the bone shortly after Thanksgiving. Prayers went up continuously for him. He has suffered pain and agony much of the time and lay at death's door. But, he is still alive. We thank God for hearing and answering prayer.



The preacher is a steward of God and a servant of the church. He is the undershepherd over the flock. He is constantly on duty, subject to a call at any time. Because of his position and the fact that he usually lives in a church-owned parsonage adjacent to the church, he has little privacy. Everybody considers him to be working for them. Despite the fact that he and his family are on display, they do require some privacy and they must be allowed to

have a personal life.

The preacher's HOME AND FAMILY. Acquaint the church with your need for reasonable privacy. Establish some order for your life, meals, bedtime, and worktime. Be sure they know how you want to be approached. It will be better that your people preface your name with "Brother" when addressing you as pastor, rather than just a flat Jim or Harry. Some prefer to address the preacher as "Pastor" and that is good. Preacher, you had better not throw away your family. God will not excuse that. Spend time with your family. Every pastor looks back with dismay at his failure here. Don't complain about church problems in front of the children. This will cause them to reject future full-time Christian service and may even turn them from Christ.

The preacher's FINANCES. Don't love money or things. This is a pretty hard statement, isn't it? But you'd better whip this "root of all evil" now. Pay your bills on time; don't get into debt; have insurance; and don't do business with your church members. If you want the church to trust you in financial matters, take care of your own business

The preacher's PRIVATE DEVOTIONS. Commune with God daily in such a manner that your heart will be warmed, your fears removed, and your faith increased.

The preacher's MANNERS AND ETIQUETTE. Some of our preachers act like barbarians. They show no respect nor manners at all. "Man looks on the outward appearance." Watch how you dress, act, talk, sit, stand, address people, visit in homes, and conduct yourself. Buy a good book on etiquette and read it.

The preacher's PROPRIETY. Don't visit women alone; don't even drive across town with a young woman by yourself; and don't get the habit of touching women. Don't gripe about your church and salary; don't knock your denomination; and don't become lazy. There are many temptations along the way that can, if allowed, defeat the preacher. Space limits the list here. Use some judgment, brother.

The preacher's TIME. Attend all social, business, and devotional meetings of the church. Set aside time daily for study and devotions. Make at least 40 visits per week and read 50 good books each year. Observe office hours, and answer all correspondence promptly. "Buy up the time."

I read sometime ago a story about a town miser who had a reputation of never having given to any charitable cause. He always found some excuse or objection for not giving.

One day, following a Memorial Day service, several of the people in the community thought it would be well to erect a nice fence around the cemetery. A representative of the cause went to the miser and made the usual appeal. As usual the miser refused with this comment, "There is no need to put a fence around the cemetery, because those outside do not want to get in and those inside are unable to get out." Could this be the thinking of some who do not give or give very little to support the cause of Christ? I am in the fold; my family is in the fold, so why get concerned about anyone else? But how can the Christian be satisfied unless he is concerned and busy endeavoring to lead as many people to Christ as possible! Jesus said, "Go ye." The Apostle Paul asks this question, "And how shall they preach, except they be sent?" MICHIGAN FREE WILL BAPTISTS HOSTING NATIONAL CONVENTION

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Free Will Baptists return en masse for the second time to the Great Lakes area of Michigan and specifically to Cobo Hall in Detroit for another session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Meeting July 17-21, 1977, one week later than previous convention sessions, representatives from the 40 states where the denomination has active congregations will hear reports from all national boards and commissions, establish policies for suggested adoption by local bodies, make plans to further the Kingdom's work through the denominational outreach in the next year, and fellowship around the Word.

"Triumphant in Christ" has been chosen as the 1977 convention theme. Numerous workshops and seminars designed to offer helps to Christian workers in the local church are scheduled for Monday and Tuesday of the convention. Business sessions will follow on Wednesday and Thursday.

It was in 1963 that 23 Free Will Baptist churches in Michigan hosted the 27th session of their national convention. The task of hosting this 41st annual denominational gathering will be shared by 5,194 members of 52 churches which are members of the 4 associations comprising the Michigan State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Representatives of the state association are

serving on the local Steering Committee to assist national convention personnel. The planning and implementation of each national meeting is the responsibility of the National Executive Office.

Meeting simultaneously with the National Association is the National Youth Conference. Attendance for the Sunday night keynote service of NYC '77 is expected to draw near the record number of 4,245 present in 1976. Over 2,000 of those in attendance were young people.


